Petition School Board For New Vote On Propositions

A petition to resubmit the defeated foreign language and guidance counselor propositions for public vote was presented to the Hicksville Board of Education at the June 22 meeting by Guid ance Counselor Lillian Gold. She learned that only 181 signatures were required by law, but presented 851 signatures gathered by resi-dents, including students.

Board Attorney Campa-nella confirmed the petition was valid but advised the Board "It is up to your dis-cretion if you want to hold this special election. The two propositions were advisory only because the items were not within the power of the electorate to decide." He suggested when the Board meets on July 5, it could vote to see if a majority was in favor of the special vote.

Trustee Bill Bennett strongly opposed the peti-tion, calling those who pre-sented it "a lobbying group." He said "In a democracy you don't declare an election null and void because you don't get your way." But several people from the audience argued the democratic process does allow for recourse when there is a disagreement over laws that are passed.

And several people wished to speak-positively about an employee who was not recommended for not recommended for tenure: They were informed by President Charlene Anci the general rule regarding personnel matters bars "public talking." She sug-gested they speak to Supl Catherine Fenton privately before the Board entered Executive Session to discuss Executive Session to discuss personnel. At the Executive Session, tenure was granted to Donald J. Haggerty, Chairman of the Junior High Mathematics Department, Susan Pfizenmayer N-6, Lois Glanzer, Attendance Teacher and George Baer N-6. It was also

decided a special meeting will be held for the purpose of Executive Session on June 28 at 8 p.m. to handle incompleted items.

The Board awarded bids,

approved claims and warrants, approved textbooks and recommendations of the Committee on the Handi-

capped.

It approved routine personnel matters including the appointment of Roberta M. atcher as Coordinator of Elementary Arts/Reading. The position involves being a liaison between staff and central administration. It changed the title of the posi-tion of Richard Hogan to Director of Physical Health Education and District Activities. This change in title does not affect tenure area according to Mr.

Superintendent Fenton reviewed the Course Catalog for the Junior High School and High School. she named the courses not being offered because of poor enrollment. Trustee John Ayres asked for the amount of students enrolled in BOCES and she said she did not know, but would



At its regular meeting held on Tues., June 21, the Oyster Bay Town Board acted on the following matters:

At the request of the petitioner the hearing was postponed on the petition of Colonial Auto Body, Inc. and 475 West John St. Co., for a special use permit to maintain and operate an auto body and fender works on property located on the east by Alpha Plaza (a private right-of-way) east of Charlotte St., in Hicksville, where auto body and fender works would be done. This hearing is now scheduled for the July 26 Town Board meeting.

At both a day and a night hearing, they reserved deci-sion on the petition of Main Urban Realty Corp. and Preco Industries, Ltd., for a special use permit in an Ind. H. District to prepare mixed packages of sand and cement; store said packages until sold in the ordinary course of business; for general warchousing pur-poses, to maintain and operate the silo hopper for a storage facility with com-partments which will store rement, lime and sand from which, by gravity feed, amounts of each of those materials in measured proportions will be mixed in a mixing machine located directly beneath the silo and


