"Next year at this time, the 20th annual Pageantry in Brass will be hosted by New Image - our new, co-ed drum corps which will replace St. Ignatius girls this fall," said Pageantry in Brass Committee Chairman Dom Valente recently. "So this year's show is very spe-cial to us. We cannot help remembering the pride and the joy that we felt as we watched these champions of our hearts achieve their now-famous reputation." Mr. Valente, who has three daughters in the corps, also said that his preparation for Pageantry '83 were based on the momentousness of this

occasion. Founded in 1958 by Mr. Thomas R. Costa, the St. Ignatius Girls Corps once drew its membership primarily from the St. Ignatius Loyola Parochial School in

Hicksville, Since then, the corps has gained an interna-tional reputation for excellence, and has trained thousands of youngsters of all religious and ethnic backsands of youngsters of all religious and ethnic back-grounds from all over Long Island. In 1967, the corps switched its priority from parades to full field marching and maneuvering competitions. By 1973, they had won their first World Open Championship in Lynn, Massachusetts. "That was a shining moment for all of us," said chief instructor Carman Cluna, "the exhileration and feeling of accomplishment were fantastic! We were just bursting with pride for our girls." At that time, no drum corps had ever won the World Open Championship two Open Championship two years in a row. The St. Ignatius Girls went on to win it six times in a row, and eight times in nine years. Don Graziose, the present corps director, points out that this admirable achievement

The instructors dashed about from section to section, barking out finishing-touch instructions above that now-famous sound which raises goose (lesh and quickens the heartbeat. 

Accompanied by her proud parents and sister, and by a dedicated crew of officers from the Plainview-Old Bethpage Auxiliary Police, Dawn completed the race in 3 hours and 13 minutes — finishing ahead of all those who couldn't take the oppressive heat and decided to drop out of the race.

A large crowd of runners and spectators waited patiently for Dawn to cross the finish line. David Katz of Finish Line Promotions kept his entire crew on hand the entire finish line



Suggestions For The Members Of The Class Of '83 Who Will Be Entering The Job Market:

Do the unemployment statistics depress you? No matter how high they go, it always seems that a statisti-cal breakdown shows teen unemployment rates may be twice as high as the rest. Does this mean that there really aren't as many jobs out there for teens as for others?

courteous: Be enthusiastic; Be friendly; Be honest Be prepared to show how your experience matches the job for which you are applying: Be prepared to take required tests such as interest, aptitude, personality, intelligence, etc.; Be punctual or ahead of time; Be sincere; Be straight forward; Be unafraid to look your interviewer in the eyes: Be diplomatic when asking about such things as wages, vaca-tions, benefits, health insurance and job responsibilities (above and beyond the call of duty) if the inter-viewer has not spoken of them earlier.

"First impressions are lasting ones. Absolutely DON'T have a friend or relative tagging along with you. Show that you are prepared by having a resume with you. Even if you are asked to fill out an application, do it; then attach your resume to it as you turn it in to the interviewer. Most applications are forms covering standard information, whether the applicant is there for a job as janitor or assistant manager. Your resume is an accurate des-cription of YOU, and what you have to offer." Benjamin advises
