The St. Ignatius Girls Drum & Bugle Corps of Hicksville is looking forward to hosting its nineteenth annual Pageantry in Brass drum & bugle corps competition with mixed emotions. The contest, which has become quite a popular annual event in the mid Long Island area, will this year mark two very auspicious occasions in the proud history of the award-winning marching/musical organization: It will be their Silver Anniversary show, and their final full-field hometown performance as an all-girl unit. "Next year at this time, the 20th annual Pageantry in Brass will be hosted by New Image - our new, co-ed drum corps which will replace St. Ignatius girls this fall," said Pageantry in Brass Committee Chairman Dom Valente recently. "So this year's show is very special to us. We cannot help remembering the pride and the joy that we felt as we watched these champions of our hearts achieve their now-famous reputation." Mr. Valente, who has three daughters in the corps, also said that his preparation for Pageantry '83 were based on the momentousness of this occasion. Founded in 1958 by Mr. Thomas R. Costa, the St. Ignatius Girls Corps once drew its membership primarily from the St. Ignatius Loyola Parochial School in

Hicksville. Since then, the corps has gained an international reputation for excellence, and has trained thousands of youngsters of all religious and ethnic backgrounds from all over Long Island. In 1967, the corps switched its priority from parades to full field marching and maneuvering competitions. By 1973, they had won their first World Open Championship in Lynn, Massachusetts. "That was a shining moment for all of us," said chief instructor Carman Cluna, "the exhilaration and feeling of accomplishment were fantastic! We were just bursting with pride for our girls." At that time, no drum corps had ever won the World Open Championship two years in a row. The St. Ignatius Girls went on to win it six times in a row, and eight times in nine years. Don Grazioplene, the present corps director, points out that this admirable achievement record is in little danger of ever being equaled. In December, 1982, the decision to open enrollment to boys as well as girls was made. Carman (Cluna) and I agonized over that decision and its subsequent ramifications around the clock for an entire weekend," Grazioplene said. "We knew that, once the decision was final, it would be irrevocable, that we would have put into motion the machinery which would end the St. Ignatius

Girls identity forever." Mr. Grazioplene then went on to explain that decreased enrollment and a desire to offer the benefits of drum corps activity to all the youngsters in the community were the primary reasons for the change. "Looking ahead to 1984, we saw a clear probability of extinction if we continued to restrict enrollment only to girls," he said. "In these times, it is tough enough to maintain a decent activity for our children without eliminating half the population from eligibility." Everyone on the corps staff seems to be very excited and optimistic about New Image. In fact, they already have several boys in training for next year, and the instructors say they are showing a great deal of promise. The expert instruction, the discipline, and the highly organized structure of the St. Ignatius Girls Corps is obviously going to apply full force in New Image. Surely, this will pave the way for a second generation of excellence, and provide the spark to propel the co-ed corps to new heights. "We plan, and we hope for the future," said Grazioplene, "but we will not, must not overlook the business at hand - our beloved St. Ignatius Girls." Then he, Cluna and Valente rerouted the discussion back to the July 16th Pageantry in Brass show. Mr. Valente men-

tioned that hundreds of former members of the all-girl corps would probably attend the show to cheer their Alma Mater for the last time, and to say a tearful good-bye to the organization which played such a major role in guiding them through their most impressionable years. Certainly, these people have a very special feeling for their corps. Everyone I spoke to at St. Ignatius Girls projected an extraordinary love and pride for it. Large, burly truck drivers were moved to tears as they watched their daughters strive to uphold the corps proud tradition. Corps mothers sat on the sidelines with well-stocked first aid kits, keeping a vigil for the sake of the girls welfare. The instructors dashed about from section to section, barking out finishing-touch instructions above that now-famous sound which raises goose flesh and quickens the heartbeat. A casual, first-time observer cannot help but be overwhelmed by the intensity and dedication of the whole thing.

This reporter is certainly looking forward to Pageantry '83, and I will follow the adventures and progress of the corps as they prepare and compete in contests all over the country this summer. Look for more about the corps and the show next week in these pages. Mr. Valente men-

SOCIAL SECURITY AND SURVIVORS

Social security payments often are associated only with retirement, but there is a vast program of monthly payments available to survivors as well. Below is a partial list of those who are likely eligible for this program:

- 1) An unmarried surviving child under the age of eighteen, up to age twenty-two if a full-time student.
- 2) An unmarried surviving child over eighteen who was severely disabled before the age of twenty-two and is still disabled.
- 3) A dependent widow or widower sixty years old or older.
- 4) A single mother, or widowed father, who was benefiting from the earnings of the deceased.
- 5) A widow or dependent widower fifty years old or older who is now disabled.
- 6) A dependent parent, sixty-two years old or older.
- 7) A surviving divorced wife - based on age and/or disability - if the marriage lasted twenty years or more.

er, courteous, Be enthusiastic; Be friendly; Be honest Be prepared to show how your experience matches the job for which you are applying; Be prepared to take required tests such as interest, aptitude, personality, intelligence, etc.; Be punctual or ahead of time; Be sincere; Be straight forward; Be unafraid to look your interviewer in the eyes; Be diplomatic when asking about such things as wages, vacations, benefits, health insurance and job responsibilities (above and beyond the call of duty) if the interviewer has not spoken of them earlier.
