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Town Holds Special Session To Authorize Home Rule Message For Resource Recovery

The Oyster Bay Town Board, in a special session held at noon on June 29, authorized sending a home rule message to the New York State Legislature supporting legislation the Town requested in order to allow the implementation of resource recovery for refuse disposal.

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby said that, "the law that the Town had requested is the final legislative step needed for

implementation of the Town's resource recovery program. By virtue of a last minute amendment made by the State Assembly to the Town's legislation, we were informed at noon on Monday, June 27, that contrary to prior advice, a home rule message expressing the Town Board's support of such legislation was required.

"Although the State Legislature has adjourned," Colby continued, "we have

been informed that the Assembly will be called back into session in July, just as the State Senate will. Since the Senate has already passed the Town's requested legislation, the special Town Board session was held to insure that all technical requirements of the State Assembly have been met. We have been assured by the Speaker's office that with receipt of the home rule message, the Assembly will act as soon as it reconvenes

to pass the necessary legislation."

The Town has been conducting intensive negotiations with American representatives of the Swiss firm of Widmer-Ernst, for the construction of a resource recovery facility for the Town. Contract negotiations have progressed rapidly and it is anticipated that the Town will enter into agreements before the end of the summer.

Woman, 70, Dies In House Fire

A fire, in a single family dwelling, burned undetected for at least 30 minutes before neighbors, searching for the source of smoke, discovered the blaze, and as a result, the worst predictions of Hicksville fire officials came true—a life was lost. It can and does happen here, not only in Valley Stream where a child died or in Bellmore where a senior citizen died, but right here in Hicksville. In all these tragic fires—A SMOKE DETECTOR would have made the difference.

The July 2nd alarm was reported at 9 West Ave. at 1:47 p.m. Upon arrival, firefighters and Police were told that a person was trapped inside. Repeated attempts to enter the oven-like conditions in the home failed. Firefighters, using self-contained air masks, gained entrance to the second floor bedroom and removed 70 year old Mrs. Ervolina of 8403 101st Ave., Ozono Park, N.Y. C.P.R. was started immediately and the victim was taken to the Nassau County Medical Center where additional efforts to revive her failed. Two 8th Precinct Police officers and one fire officer, Lt. W. Lyster of Engine Co. 7, were

also taken to the Medical Center due to smoke and heat. The East Meadow Fire Dept. Rescue Co. assisted at the scene.

The fire originated in a ground floor-rear bedroom and was confined there by firefighters who took a beating from the heat and smoke. Several Vamps were treated at the scene. The deadly heat and gases rose to the 2nd floor bedroom where Mrs. Ervolina was resting.

The cause of the blaze, which caused an estimated \$30,000 in damages, is under investigation by the County Fire Marshal. Other occupants of the dwelling were out at the time of the fire. Hicksville Chief William Donlon commended his men for their actions at the scene, under extreme conditions.

Vamps responding were hampered by parked cars all along West Ave., a very narrow street, and two vehicles were struck resulting in minor damage.

House Fires
On July 3, fireworks ignited an apartment house at 22-24 West Cherry St., Hicksville. The fire caused over \$3500.00 damage to (Continued on Page 12)

Roosevelt International Trot On July 23rd

Legolas, an unbeaten Swedish horse riding a nineteen-race winning streak, will be one of two horses to represent Sweden in the twenty-fifth Roosevelt International Trot at the Westbury, oval July 23rd.

Marco Anic of Malmo, Sweden, owner of the five-year-old gelding, accepted Roosevelt Raceway's invitation on Monday (July 4). Since the start of the trotter's racing career as a four-year-old he has compiled a streak of 11 straight 1982 victories. So far this year he has added eight more. Legolas will go for his twentieth triumph in his greatest test to date in the International. No defeated horse ever before has come

to the International with an unblemished record.

Darister F, also a five-year-old, will be Sweden's second entrant in a field which includes trotters also from Italy, France, West Germany, Canada and the United States. Nine horses in all are expected to compete for the title in the silver anniversary year of the International. Darister F is the highly regarded Swedish star who defeated current reigning International Trot Ideal du Gazeau last year in Stockholm. He will attempt to duplicate the feat in America since Ideal du Gazeau is returning to seek an unprecedented third victory in the International.

Post Office Issues "Medal Of Honor" Stamp

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On Tuesday, June 28 impressive ceremonies were held at the Hicksville Post Office to honor those who have won the Armed Forces "Medal of Honor," for which a special "Medal of Honor" stamp was issued earlier in June.

Engraved albums of the stamps were presented to the three local Medal of Honor recipients, Charles W. Shea, George C. Lang and Anthony Casamento, by Postmaster and MSC Manager Anthony M. Murello.

After the arrival of guests, family members and celebrities, the Colors were posted by the U.S. Army and the U.S. Marine Color Guards. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mr. Dennis Dunne, State Veteran's Counselor.

The invocation was delivered by Father Frederic Harrer, Pastor of St. Ignatius RC Church, Hicksville.

Honored guests were introduced by MSC Manager and Hicksville Postmaster Anthony M. Murello. Among those attending were Colonel Donald R. Gardner, Deputy Director of the First Marine District in Garden City, Mr. Dean Pfeiffer, representative of Congressman Norman Lent, Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby, Hempstead Town Supervisor Thomas Gulotta, L.I. Dist. Director of Customer Services John Kelly, Postmaster Robert Haskett of Levittown, Postmaster Louis Kriss of West Islip, Past Commander of the Hicksville VFW Connie Steers.

Postmaster Murello, while making the presentation said: "With this stamp, the Postal Service reaffirms its respect and pride for your inspiring deeds. Long Island and the nation thank you again for your

superb efforts to preserve our liberty.

A writer once called courage "grace under pressure." The ability to act with cool-headedness in the raging heat of battle provides the inspiration needed to overcome the enemy. "These three gentlemen we honor today are here because their acts were so extraordinary and outstanding. In the hour of emergency, their courage shone."

"Their acts of heroism will forever inspire our deepest appreciation. You gentlemen are true Guardians of Democracy."

In conclusion, Dennis Dunne lead in a closing prayer and the Colors were posted.

The records of the three Long Island Medal of Honor recipients follow:

Charles W. Shea

Rank and organization: Second Lieutenant, Company F, 350 Infantry, 88th Infantry Division. Place and Date: Near Mount Damiano, Italy, May 12, 1944. Entered Service at: New York, N.Y. Birth: New York, N.Y.G.O. No.: 4, Jan. 12, 1945. Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at risk of life above and beyond the call of duty on May 12, 1944 near Mount Damiano, Italy.

As Lieutenant Shea and his company were advancing toward a hill occupied by the enemy, three enemy machine guns suddenly opened fire, inflicting heavy casualties upon the company and halting its advance. Lieutenant Shea immediately moved forward to eliminate these machine-gun nests in order to enable his company to continue its attack. The deadly hail of machine-gun fire at first pinned him down, but, boldly continuing his advance, Lieutenant Shea crept up to the first nest.

Throwing several hand grenades, he forced the four enemy soldiers manning this position to surrender, and disarming them, he sent them to the rear. He then crawled to the second machine-gun position, and after a short fire fight forced two more German soldiers to surrender. At this time, the third machine gun fired at him, and while deadly small arms fire pitted the earth around him, Lieutenant Shea crawled toward the nest. Suddenly he stood up and rushed the emplacement and with well-directed fire from his rifle, he killed all three of the enemy machine gunners. Lieutenant Shea's display of personal valor was an inspiration to the officers and men of his company.

Anthony Casamento

Rank and organization: Corporal, 1st Marine Division. Place and date: Guadalcanal, November 1, 1942. Entered Service on August 19, 1940. Birth: November 16, 1920. Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at risk of life above and beyond the call of duty on November 1, 1942 at Guadalcanal.

On July 16, 1965, the Navy Dept. Board of Decorations and Medals unanimously recommended that Anthony Casamento receive the Medal of Honor based on findings regarding his actions on Guadalcanal. The Fifth Marines came under heavy small arms fire on November 1, 1942. Most of the 30 man detachment was hurt immediately. The machine gunner was killed. Tony, though wounded, manned the gun. He held off the enemy by firing round after round and hurling hand grenades. He was hit again and knocked off the machine gun and re-manned it. He sent back one of his

comrades to report the debacle and to get help. He increased the fire to cover his comrades retreat. When reinforcements arrived, Tony slumped at his gun. He received 14 wounds and grenade fragments in the head, chest, neck, left arm and leg. However, he was able to protect his comrades from a bayonet slaughter and prevented their position from being overrun which would have jeopardized the entire battalion. He received the Medal of Honor in September, 1980.

George C. Lang

Rank and organization: Specialist Fourth Class, U.S. Army, Company A, 4th Battalion, 47th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division. Place and date: Kien Hoa Province, Republic of Vietnam, February 22, 1969. Entered service at: Brooklyn, N.Y. Born: April 20, 1947, Flushing, N.Y. Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty.

Sp4c. Lang, Company A, was serving as a squad leader when his unit, on a reconnaissance-in-force mission, encountered intense fire from a well fortified enemy bunker complex. Sp4c. Lang observed an emplacement from which heavy fire was coming. Unhesitatingly, he assaulted the position and destroyed it with handgrenades and rifle fire. Observing another emplacement approximately 15 meters to his front, Sp4c. Lang jumped across a canal, moved through heavy enemy fire to within a few feet of the position, and eliminated it, again using handgrenades and rifle fire. Nearby, he discovered a large cache of enemy ammunition. As he maneuvered his squad forward to secure the cache, they came

wounded. Although immobilized and in great pain, he continued to direct his men until his evacuation was ordered over his protests. The sustained extraordinary courage and selflessness exhibited by this soldier over an extended period of time were an inspiration to his comrades and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the U.S. Army.

Note to Editor:
The following letter was sent on June 30 as a telegram to Governor Cuomo.

June 30, 1983

The Honorable Mario Cuomo
Governor of the State of New York

Albany, New York 12248

Today's newspapers report that, confronted by anti-Shoreham demonstrators last night in Woodbury, you on the spot appointed Leon Campo, of Mount Sinai, an anti-Shoreham activist, to your task force trying to determine whether the nearly completed reactor should be permitted to operate.

We respectfully but with all force at our command protest this appointment of another anti-Shoreham activist to what should be an impartial jury of qualified citizens if, indeed, you seek truth in this highly charged matter.

Do qualified experts who could contribute intelligently to your truth-seeking have to picket and badger you on the street to be recognized by appointment to your task force?

We who are acknowledged professionals in nuclear power, nuclear medicine and nuclear safety, and are residents of the community surrounding the reactor, wrote to you on April 30 offering our members for membership on the task force.

Leading media have commended our letter to you a "A Temperate View of the Shoreham Controversy." Newsday said: "Cohalan and Cuomo -- and all Long Islanders -- should consider the letter carefully..." The newspaper suggested that you would do well to accept our offer. Television station WPIX similarly editorially commended our letter to you.

However, we have had no answer from you -- unless your appointment last night was our answer -- namely, picket me, trap me on the street if you want me to cave in to acknowledge you and appoint one of your members to my fact finding task force.

In all honesty, we don't believe that was your intention. But that is what your response to the demonstrators said to us and to all who know of, or read of last night's shocking happening.

We still think you want the facts. We know you can't get them from Campo and his fellow demonstrators, nor can you get an impartial judgment from them. And we respectfully suggest you act summarily to reverse the message your action last night sent to the citizens of Long Island.

A CHILD'S TEARS

Often, children attend the funeral of a loved one without any obvious demonstration of emotion. The child stands there stiffly, dry-eyed. The child is neither being brave or unfeeling; rather, the child is probably too stunned or uncomprehending to fully express his or her feelings.

Sometimes, the child gets a subtle, or not so subtle message from adults to keep a lid on emotions. Psychologists generally agree that this is wrong, that it is unhealthy for the child to bottle up grief. The youngster who stoically represses his or her feelings may later find a release in an explosion more dangerous to psychological well-being. "Big boys don't cry" is a statement that does more harm than good.

Adults are advised by psychologists not to fear the allowing or even causing of tears. There is no reason to steer conversation away from the deceased for fear of starting the tears to flow. Expressing grief through crying is both normal and therapeutic. A child's tears are a fitting and tender tribute that should not be stifled.

"Getting To Know You" Sarah Huettner

When Gertz closed, replaced by Stearns as Mid Island's department store, some looked back nostalgically at the loss of a familiar store, but how many recall when Huettner's was the place to shop in Hicksville?

Long time resident, Sarah Huettner, 79, remembers the family store that operated from 1890 until 1952 on Broadway, both Sarah and the store have contributed to the enrichment of this community, and while Huettner's no longer exists, Sarah lives in the same house on Jerusalem Ave. where she came as the bride of Arthur Huettner 60 years ago.

In 1890, Sarah's father-in-law and mother-in-law, Henry and Caroline started a department store on Broadway. Huettner's Furniture Store opened where Whalen's Drug Store now stands. And on the south west corner of Broadway and Marie Street, Huettner's enlarged store opened in 1923. Stolz's Meat Market was on the left and a motor

car company on the right side of the store.

In addition to furniture, hats, dry goods and groceries could be purchased. Arthur was in charge of installing all the linoleum, window shades and blinds. His brother Harry worked in the office in charge of ordering everything. Huettner's had a great reputation for the quality of goods and also it's gourmet food items. They served all north and south shore estates as well as the local residents. Sarah fondly recalls accompanying her husband to measure the Roosevelt family home at Sagamore Hill.

Outside Huettner's became a congregating place. "Hicksville was home, a friendly beautiful town," Sarah said. "Everyone helped one another. Saturday was a big day at the store. On Saturday night, farm families stood outside and talked about the week."

Someone who stands out in Sarah's memory is Father

Bitterman, pastor of St. Ignatius R.C. Church. "He was a very good customer and a very kind person, who treated everyone alike. My husband and I thought a great deal of him." Father Bitterman later became a monsignor.

Sarah was born on a farm in Brookville on April 13, 1904, the daughter of Everett and Annie Dodge. Today, C.W. Post College is close to the site on the corner of 25A and Route 107. In her early childhood, there was no electricity. She went to Glen Head Grammar School, which had two classrooms to accommodate 25 pupils. All were taught by the same teacher. She attended Friends Academy in Locust Valley. Sarah had one brother, Ralph, who became a farmer like his father.

The Mineola Fair was an important social event of the early 1920's. At the fair, where he had a tent showing linoleum and shades and she was entering baked goods for a prize, Sarah met

Arthur Huettner. They were married in 1923 and had two children, Sarah and Arthur, Jr. Her son passed away in 1970 and her daughter lives in Williston Park with her husband, Gene Steffanetta. Sarah praises her son-in-law highly. "He is a fine wonderful man, more like a son to me." She has two grandsons, Capt. Gene Steffanetta, who is in the marines and resides in Fairfax, Va. and Gary, who graduated from St. John's Law School on June 5.

Religion is all important to Sarah. "My church has been my life," she said. Ever since I was a young girl, I was very religious." As a young married, she was active in the Hicksville Reform Church and has for years been active in the many programs in The Parkway Community Church, including Senior Citizen lunches, where Sarah is famous for her lemon pies.

During World War II, Sarah helped with the Gold Star Mothers, the Red Cross

and the U.S.O. She started a recreation place for the soldiers who were encamped in Bethpage in the evenings, young ladies talked and danced with the boys and served refreshments. Once a month Sarah and the girls would go to Mitchell Field to welcome the servicemen who just came in from overseas. Many times they ran dances in the Hicksville Jr. High School gym for the boys from the Bethpage camp.

When Saah first came to Hicksville as a bride, she was apprehensive but found reassurance and many friends. On her recent 79th birthday, she received 68 cards. Sarah Huettner would have lived a good life anywhere. Her many projects and good works have been assets to her adopted community, as was the fine quality department store of many years ago, whose name she bears HUETTNER'S.

When Mrs. Ervolina retired to an upstairs bedroom for a nap, her daughter turned on an electric exhaust fan in a bedroom below. According to Det. Tom Gulla and Fire Inv Tom Tilly, a short in the fan wire started a fire.

A neighbor turned in the alarm. PO's Roger Silke and Dan Volpe responded, and made repeated attempts to enter, but were thrown back by heavy smoke. As the Hicksville FD began responding, Fireman John Lyster attempted to enter, but was also unable to. Eventually the fire was extinguished under the direction of Ch. Dorlon and 30 men. The fire, which took approx. 1 hour to extinguish, was contained on the first floor. Once Mrs. Ervolina was found, she was transported to NCMC, but died from smoke inhalation at 2:31 pm.

Officers Silke and Volpe and Fireman Lyster were also transported to NCMC. Officer Volpe was admitted for smoke inhalation, while the other two were treated and released.

The room of origin was completely gutted, while the rest of the first floor suffered heavy smoke damage.

FATAL AUTO ACCIDENT

Battle Row Campground To Open On Weekend

Opening day ceremonies for Nassau County's first year-round camping area — Battle Row Campground in Old Bethpage — will take place on Saturday, July 9, at 2:30 P.M. County Executive Francis T. Purcell announced on July 5. The ceremonies will include entertainment, a ribbon-cutting and reception. The new campground is located on Claremont Road, off Sweet Hollow Road, in Old Bethpage, near the Old Bethpage Village Restoration.

The 44.1-acre campground contains 52 campsites, 30 of them with water and electrical hookups, as well as comfort stations, showers, dumpstations, a playground, rally field and ballfield. An unimproved area has been set aside for tent camping and for additional camping rigs.

Campsites with water and electrical hookups cost \$8 a day for county residents and \$12 a day for non-residents.
