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# **Westbury Chemical Blaze**

A suspicious fire in the storage yard of Adchem Corp. 85 Sylvester St., New Cassel (Westbury) caused an estimated \$200,000.00 damage and almost damaged the environment of the local

Westbury Fire Dept. received the alarm shortly after 7 a.m., Sunday, July 31. Upon arrival of the first units, Chief John Olsen ordered a second alarm and mutual aid assistance from Hicksville for a tower ladder and Engine Co. Before the fire was under control, additional units from Jerichor East Meadow and Carle Place were called to the

The Hazardous Material Response Teams from Hicksville and East Mea-dow were called to the scene due to chemicals mixing with water and flowing into with water and flowing into the sewer and storm drain systems. The Dept. of Environmental Conservation, Health Dept. and federal authorities were called to the scene. The chemical waste solution was flowing into a sump south of Old Country Rd. behind the Children's Shelter. Nassau County D.P.W. crews were called to build an earthen

dike around the growing pond of polluted water.

The Haz-Mat teams identhe Haz-Mai teams iden-tified the chemicals as Methyl Ethyl Ketone (M.E.K.), Tulene, Iso-propyl Alcohol, Isopropyl. A test of the area catch basins with gas detectors pro-duced explosive range readings and all man hole covers in the area were removed to vent the gas vapor buildup.

At the fire scene, special alcohol foam was brought from Hicksville to extin-guish hot spots in the stor-age yard. The special foam was also sprayed on the sump. 150 gallons of foam was used along with an esti-mated 16,000 gallons of

The fire was contained in the storage yard. Nearby buildings sustained minor damage. L1LCO lines caught fire and fell to the ground. Several 55 gallon drums exploded spreading

Four minor injuries were reported. About 170 fire-fighters were on the scene.

County and State Health officials praised the efficient actions of firefighters in keeping the pollution con-



fined. They stated it was one of the fastest cleanups they have seen. They also praised officials of the chemical firm for its fast actions calling in toxic waste cleanup firms.
