We hear from U.S. Sen. D.P. Moynihan that he has recently proposed that the federal government reimburse local communities that lose tax revenues by "hosting" tax-exempt foreign missions and consulates to foreign diplomats. Alfonse D'Amato writes to say that he has recently testified before the Senate Judiciary Committee on behalf of a prison construction bill he has introduced to provide \$1 billion a year for the next 3 years to the states on a 2-1 matching basis (\$2 state to \$1 federal). "If this nation can spend billions of dollars in foreign aid, the least we can do is make an investment in the safety of our communities. Westbury Chemical Blaze

A suspicious fire in the storage yard of Adchem Corp. 85 Sylvester St., New Cassel (Westbury) caused an estimated \$200,000.00 damage and almost damaged the environment of the local area.

Westbury Fire Dept. received the alarm shortly after 7 a.m., Sunday, July 31. Upon arrival of the first units, Chief John Olsen ordered a second alarm and mutual aid assistance from Hicksville for a tower ladder and Engine Co. Before the fire was under control, additional units from Jericho, East Meadow and Carle Place were called to the scene.

The Hazardous Material Response Teams from Hicksville and East Meadow were called to the scene due to chemicals mixing with water and flowing into the sewer and storm drain systems. The Dept. of Environmental Conservation, Health Dept. and federal authorities were called to the scene. The chemical waste solution was flowing into a sump south of Old Country Rd., behind the Children's Shelter. Nassau County D.P.W. crews were called to build an earthen

dike around the growing pond of polluted water.

The Haz-Mat teams identified the chemicals as Methyl Ethyl Ketone (M.E.K.), Toluene, Isopropyl Alcohol, Isopropyl. A test of the area catch basins with gas detectors produced explosive range readings and all man hole covers in the area were removed to vent the gas vapor buildup.

At the fire scene, special alcohol foam was brought from Hicksville to extinguish hot spots in the storage yard. The special foam was also sprayed on the sump. 150 gallons of foam was used along with an estimated 16,000 gallons of water.

The fire was contained in the storage yard. Nearby buildings sustained minor damage. LILCO lines caught fire and fell to the ground. Several 55 gallon drums exploded spreading flames.

Four minor injuries were reported. About 170 firefighters were on the scene.

County and State Health officials praised the efficient actions of firefighters in keeping the pollution con-



finied. They stated it was one of the fastest cleanups they have seen. They also praised officials of the chemical firm for its fast actions calling in toxic waste cleanup firms.

Haz-Mat operations were directed by Hicksville Chiefs Owen Magee and Gerard O'Brien with assistance from East Meadow Chiefs. A six block area was

affected. The Bowling Green Water Pumping Station was shut down due to its close proximity to the sump. Water table tests will be taken before it is put back on line, even though officials stated they believe the quick clean up prevented damage. They will take no chances.

The Fire Marshal and Arson Squad is investigating.

Park And Ride Lot At Sears

The New York State Department of Transportation is pleased to announce the opening of a leased commuter park and ride lot located at the Sears Store in Hicksville Nassau County.

Regional Director Sam Ippolito stated that this lease commencing today, will be in effect until May 31, 1984. Further leasing agreements are predicated on the degree of commuter usage which will be monitored by the State DOT.

The leased facility which will occupy a portion of the Sears parking lot, is located at the intersection of Route 106/107 and Nevada Street, less than one mile south of the Long Island Expressway (Exit 41) and the Northern State Parkway (Exit 35). Signs will be erected in the vicinity to direct motorists to the lot. The lot will be opened to the public free of charge.

Mr. Ippolito encourages use of the lot as part of the Department's continuing effort to foster carpooling. Carpooling reduces air pollution, gasoline and oil consumption, and decreases road congestion.

The leasing of this lot is part of a comprehensive ride sharing effort in Nassau and Suffolk Counties. Funding is being provided by the Federal Highway Administration through a Transportation System Management grant.

CONSIDER THE SURVIVOR

Unfortunately, when the income producer in the family dies, often the survivor's mode of living has to be changed dramatically. The effect of this can be devastating if it has not been anticipated.

During their joint lifetime, a couple should evaluate what the net estate will be and what income it can reasonably be expected to produce.
