Seldin Releases 1983-84 Nassau School Tax Roll

County school assessment County school assessment refil, released on August 9, shows a total taxable value of \$3,675,669,455. This is an increase of \$26,399,799 for 1983-84 or 0.72 percent when compared with last year's total taxable value for school purposes of \$3,640 year's total taxable value of school purposes of \$3,649, 269,656, according to Abe Seldin, Chairman of the Nassau County Board of Assessors. The school tax roll is the basis on which school taxes are levided in all school taxes are levied in all but one of Nassau County's school districts. In Glen Cove the school tax is part of the city tax and is based on the city assessment. While the increase in tax-able value is less than last

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year's, there was 19 percent more assessed value added this year than last due to new construction. On the 1983-84 school tax roll, new construction accounts for \$36,079,477 in assessed valuation, compared with \$30,326,386 last year. Some of the projects completed for the 1983-84 school tax roll include: scnool tax roll include: condominiums in North Hills and Port Washington; the Garden City and Marriott Hotels, office and industrial buildings in Jericho, Manhasset, New Hyde Park and the Mitches Field areas and acrees

The 1983-84 Nassau about \$39 million except for the large number of court-ordered assessment reductions which resulted from writs of certiorari.

"Writs are a double-edged sword," Seldin stated, "Not only does the county have to pay back huge sums in tax refunds for past years, but it loses tax base for the future as well." Seldin said, "If there were no court-ordered incre were no court-ordered reductions as a result of writs, we would have had the biggest dollar increase in assessments in Nassau County in thirteen years!" Carrying forward court-ordered reductions accounted ordered reductions accounted ordered reductions accounted for \$13-14 million in 1983-84 school tax roll.

There is, however, one bright spot for homeowners. A one-year-old state law which created four classes of which created four classes of property for assessment purposes in Nassau also specifies that new certiorar reductions affect only the tax rate in that class. Since practically all of the 5,360 writs of certiorpri filed last writs of certiorari filed last year in Nassau were on commercial property, the resulting assessment reduc-tions in the commercial class

will not adversely affect homeowners.
Of those school districts showing a change in assessment, 44 went up and 18 went down. The five school Hyde Park and the Mitchel Field area; and garden apartments in Oyster Bay. One of our elected officials, Nassau County Comptroller Peter T. King, has-announced that he will refuse to support Governor Mario Cuomo's \$1.25 bil-Mario Cuomos \$1,25 milion infrastructure bond-issue until Cuomo specifies which projects the bond issue will finance and gua-rantees that Long Island will receive its fair and propor-tionate share of the funds.

Stating that Nassau and Stating that Nassau and Suffolk Counties provide 24.8% of the state's revenues, King attacked Cuomo for his "incredible arrogance" in refusing to identify the projects that will he funded by the bond issue. King noted that under the original version of Cuomo's bill. Long Island was only

going to receive 13.8% of the

Because of Cuomo's obvious bias against the suburbs, it is imperative that prior to the November referendum he spell out in detail how the bond issue money will be spent. King said that unless we are guarenteed that Nassau and Suffolk will receive a fair and equitable share of the money consist-ent with our 24.7% payment of state taxes, the voters of Long Island must be urged to reject the bond issue.

Because Cuomo is refusing to provide a project-by-project breakdown of the bond issue proceeds, King is concerned that Cuomo will use the money from the bond issue for repair and maintenance rather than to build new structures. Noting that New York State already pays a greater share of its budget for debt service than any other state in the nation. King charged that Cuomo would be using long-term debt to finance short-term rapairs and would be

enhancing his short-term political status at the expense of future generations and at the expense of the state's fiscal status.

The responsibility for the

state's deteriorated infras-tructure lies with the refusal of the Carey and Cuomo administrations to provide sufficient operating expenditures to pay for necessary repair and maintenance said King. The 1983-84 budget has dropped to 2.7% from 4.9% in the 1974-75 budget for repair and maintenance
