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## Seldin Releases 1983-84 Nassau School Tax Roll

The 1983-84 Nassau County school assessment roll, released on August 9, shows a total taxable value of \$3,675,669,455. This is an increase of \$26,399,799 for 1983-84 or 0.72 percent when compared with last year's total taxable value for school purposes of \$3,649,269,656, according to Abe Seldin, Chairman of the Nassau County Board of Assessors. The school tax roll is the basis on which school taxes are levied in all but one of Nassau County's school districts. In Glen Cove the school tax is part of the city tax and is based on the city assessment.

While the increase in taxable value is less than last year's, there was 19 percent more assessed value added this year than last due to new construction. On the 1983-84 school tax roll, new construction accounts for \$36,079,477 in assessed valuation, compared with \$30,326,386 last year. Some of the projects completed for the 1983-84 school tax roll include: condominiums in North Hills and Port Washington; the Garden City and Marriott Hotels, office and industrial buildings in Jericho, Manhasset, New Hyde Park and the Mitchell Field area; and garden apartments in Oyster Bay. Special franchise assessments - on which utilities pay property taxes for the right to use public rights of way - also increased by \$3 million. So, the school tax roll would have increased

about \$39 million except for the large number of court-ordered assessment reductions which resulted from writs of certiorari.

"Writs are a double-edged sword," Seldin stated. "Not only does the county have to pay back huge sums in tax refunds for past years, but it loses tax base for the future as well." Seldin said, "If there were no court-ordered reductions as a result of writs, we would have had the biggest dollar increase in assessments in Nassau County in thirteen years!" Carrying forward court-ordered reductions accounted for \$13-14 million in 1983-84 school tax roll.

There is, however, one bright spot for homeowners. A one-year-old state law which created four classes of property for assessment purposes in Nassau also specifies that new certiorari reductions affect only the tax rate in that class. Since practically all of the 5,360 writs of certiorari filed last year in Nassau were on commercial property, the resulting assessment reductions in the commercial class will not adversely affect homeowners.

Of those school districts showing a change in assessment, 44 went up and 18 went down. The five school districts with the largest increases in assessment were: Uniondale, 6.75%; East Norwich, 6.37%; Syosset, 3.16%; Herricks, 2.40%; and Garden City, 2.10%.

## At The Town Board Meeting

At its regular meeting held on Tuesday, August 9, the Oyster Bay Town Board conducted a hearing to consider the map showing real property to be acquired for the realignment of Avery Road in Woodbury. This is necessary due to a severe drainage problem in this area. And, because the LIRR will be changing its lines to double tracks in this same area, every effort is being made by this Board, to complete preliminary hearings and necessary paperwork so that these projects may be done at the same time, in this way shortening the period of inconvenience to local residents.

Father Michael and Carol Malti spoke at this hearing, as representatives of the Coptic Church located in this locality. They expressed concern about a cornerstone and also about what portion of their property might be needed. In as much as they were not sure of details on these matters, the Board gave them two weeks to clarify the details and get back to the Board.

The Board reserved decisions on this matter.

### Resolutions Passed

Further along in the meeting the Board passed two resolutions as follows:

Resolution No. 677-1983: amended the capital budget of the Town of Oyster Bay for the purpose of acquiring the property necessary to make the road alignment and correct the Avery Road drainage problem.

Resolution No. 678: they authorized issuance of serial bonds and capital notes to cover the costs of the Avery Road realignment and drainage correction, in Woodbury.

They passed Resolution No. 679 appointing Irwin Cohen, Esq. as special counsel for this condemnation proceeding.

The Town Board passed Resolution No. 665-1983 granting the request for a waiver of building code requirements on property located at 83 East John St., in Hicksville and thereby allowing a second floor to be added to this building.

The Board approved Resolution No. 666-1983 granting the request of the B. P. Oil, Inc. of Hicksville, for an

extension of time until Feb. 28, 1984, in connection with their building permit.

The Board approved Resolution No. 667-1983 relating to site plan approval of the petition of Kynouria Restaurant Corp. and Howard T. and Betty S. Hogan, located on Jericho Tpke., in Woodbury. This changes the capacity of this restaurant from 131 to 190 seats.

The Board approved Resolution No. 669-1983 relating to the Town Environmental Quality Review Commission's recommendation on the petition of Hubert and Gertrude Baumgartner of 14 Holman Blvd., in Hicksville, for a special use permit.

The Board approved Resolution No. 671-1983 relating to authorizing a consultant to proceed with the design phase of contract No. DP83-310...the removal of architectural barriers at the Plainview-Old Bethpage Community Park.

The Board approved Resolution No. 673-1983 relating to the authorization of a consultant to proceed with the design phase of Contract No. DPW82-278...for restoration work to be done at the Hicksville Gregory Museum.

The Board approved Resolution No. 685-1983 relating to Community Development...the removal of architectural barriers at the Midway Jewish Center.

The Board passed Resolutions No. 686 and 677, 1983 amending the capital budget in connection with the planting of trees and shrubs "to be in ground by Sept" in all TOB parks and beaches.

The Board approved Resolution No. 691-1983 relating to the Town Environmental Quality Review Commission's recommendation on the petition of Gary's Towing Service, of 14 North Jerusalem Ave., in Hicksville, for a special-use permit.

The next regular meeting of the Oyster Bay Town Board is set for Tuesday, Aug. 23, starting at 10 am at Town Hall on Audrey Avenue in Oyster Bay.

One of our elected officials, Nassau County Comptroller Peter T. King, has announced that he will refuse to support Governor Mario Cuomo's \$1.25 billion infrastructure bond issue until Cuomo specifies which projects the bond issue will finance and guarantees that Long Island will receive its fair and proportionate share of the funds.

Stating that Nassau and Suffolk Counties provide 24.8% of the state's revenues, King attacked Cuomo for his "incredible arrogance" in refusing to identify the projects that will be funded by the bond issue. King noted that under the original version of Cuomo's bill, Long Island was only

going to receive 13.8% of the money.

Because of Cuomo's obvious bias against the suburbs, it is imperative that prior to the November referendum he spell out in detail how the bond issue money will be spent. King said that unless we are guaranteed that Nassau and Suffolk will receive a fair and equitable share of the money consistent with our 24.7% payment of state taxes, the voters of Long Island must be urged to reject the bond issue.

Because Cuomo is refusing to provide a project-by-project breakdown of the bond issue proceeds, King is concerned that Cuomo will use the money from the bond issue for repair and maintenance rather than to build new structures. Noting that New York State already pays a greater share of its budget for debt service than any other state in the nation, King charged that Cuomo would be using long-term debt to finance short-term repairs and would be

enhancing his short-term political status at the expense of future generations and at the expense of the state's fiscal status.

The responsibility for the state's deteriorated infrastructure lies with the refusal of the Carey and Cuomo administrations to provide sufficient operating expenditures to pay for necessary repair and maintenance said King. The 1983-84 budget has dropped to 2.7% from 4.9% in the 1974-75 budget for repair and maintenance.

## Expressing Sympathy To Family

Many people worry about what to say to the family or closest friend of a person who has died. They often feel the need to say something positive and uplifting, to find a reason for the death. This is unnecessary and, on occasion, inappropriate - as with the death of a child or young person.

You continue to visit with them, and stay in touch after all the relatives and friends have gone, you can convey your genuine sympathy and concern. It can also be a help to them in getting through this period of grief.

Sometimes death simply cannot be rationalized. It is fine to want to console the family, but not if the sentiments expressed are awkward and artificial. In many cases the best consolation is to simply hold the person's hand and share your own honest feelings and emotions.
