Second Precinct Police Report

Starting October 4, for the fifteenth consecutive year, the Nassau County Department of Senior Citizen Affairs will be offering its award-winning series of Pre-Retirement Planning Workshops at ten locations

serving residents in over thirty communities (see attached schedule). These workshops focus on the key elements involved in making a smooth and trauma-free transition from the workplace to retirement living.

Offered in cooperation with libraries and Adult Continuing Education Departments of local school districts and universities, the workshops are geared toward persons ten or more years from retirement. In a series of six weekly two-hour evening sessions, professionals lead discussions

on "Leisure and Housing," "Social Security," "Financial Planning," "Wills and Estate Planning," "Psychology of Aging" and "Maintaining Good Health in Later Years." Volunteer coordinators from local communities serve as moderators during open discussion periods following each session.

Last fall, for the first time, Pre-Retirement Planning Workshops were offered to County employees 50 years of age and older and their spouses. Dear Mrs. Neder:

Our Town Attorney has informed me that, after trial, Judge Fertig ruled in favor of Sears.

The Judge feels that the transfer of truck containers carrying store merchandise does not constitute a freight terminal. A terminal, according to Judge Fertig, is prohibited only when it is intended as a primary use and operated by an interstate trucking company catering to the general public. Apparently he feels that Sears can use the premises to tranship merchandise purchased at any Sears store, or by catalog, anywhere in the world to any Sears customer in the world.

I have discussed the decision with Supervisor Colby and wish to advise you that our Town Attorney has been instructed to appeal the Judge's decision.

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Air Traffic Personnel Sought By Federal Aviation Administration

The Federal Aviation Administration will recruit for air traffic controllers for a one-month period beginning September 19 and ending October 17, 1983.

Although FAA already has more than 12,500 controllers on the job or in training, the agency expects to continue hiring at a rate of 1,800 trainees per year. New hires primarily will be to replace retirees and fill other losses from attrition.

Applicants who pass the written examination and meet the other job qualifications will be added to the list of persons eligible for controller jobs, according to

their test scores. This assures a continued flow of well qualified people into the controller training program.

Applicants for these positions must pass a written test as well as a rigid physical examination before appointment. They must have three years of general work experience as well as appropriate specialized experience. Substitutions for experience may be made based on education or written test score.

The 30-year age restriction has been temporarily extended through age 35 for qualified persons. Consideration of these eligible persons will continue until the

end of next year. Persons in the 31 to 35 age group must qualify in one of the following categories to be eligible for consideration:

- * Individuals with experience in the direct separation and control of air traffic under instrument flight rules who have received air traffic control specialist certification in accordance with FAA standards.

- * Those with experience in flight service station operations, including weather observation, flight data, and pre-flight advisory service.

- * Pilots with air transport rating, or commercial

license and instrument rating, and at least 100 hours of instrument flight time.

Other applicants must not have reached their 31st birthday by the time of appointment.

Persons interested in obtaining job announcements, application forms, and a list of test locations should contact the nearest Office of Personnel Management, Federal Job Information Center after September 19. These offices are listed in the telephone directory under the heading of "United States Government."

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Community Program Moves To New Quarters

"Alcohol and drug abuse can be kept under control, if not cured!" These are the words of Barbara Bartell, Director of the Community Program of the East Plains Mental Health Services, Inc., 248 Old Country Road, Hicksville. "If the patient is willing, we know we can help. Our success rate is high."

Mrs. Bartell's remarks were recently made while giving a tour of her agency's new quarters located behind Antun's. The key word is, "willing." "If they are, we are," states Mrs. Bartell.

The therapy offices of the Community Program are brand new, having just moved from 76 North Broadway, in Hicksville. Their therapists, though, are old hands at seeking solutions to the difficult problems of drug and alcohol abuse. "We have an experienced and qualified staff who are very skillful in helping our patients understand the inner reasons that they turn to drugs and drink."

The Community Program has been in existence for 10 years and has treated an average of 300 patients a year. The therapists use individual, group and family therapy. "To help bring their patients' problems into focus," explained Sena Warner, Senior Social Worker of the Community Program. "Once that is accomplished, we can begin to work on the solution."

The Community Program's new location is right next door to its parent agency, the East Plains Mental Health Services, Inc. at 246 Old Country Road, Hicksville, also located behind Antun's.

"We feel we now have two of the best out-patient services in the county, housed practically under the same roof," proudly states Robert M. Bressler, Executive Director of East Plains. "We are very pleased to welcome our affiliate agency right next door to us."

The parent agency moved into their new quarters, from 35 Broadway, Hicksville, last April 1982. Since that time they have continued their 11-year tradition of effectively treating large numbers of families and individuals of all ages from the surrounding communities of Bethpage, Farmingdale, Hicksville, Jericho, Old Bethpage, Plainedge, Plainview and South Farmingdale. The kind of problems treated include depression, loneliness, family problems, school phobia and any other obstacles to realizing one's potential.

"It's not the problem itself," Mrs. Bressler confirmed. "It's the patient's desire to work on it that promotes health." With a total professional staff of thirty for the two clinics which include psychiatrists, psychologists and psychiatric social workers, the combined clinics of East Plains and the Community Program are an effective community resource for those in need.

The two clinics, licensed by the State, accept Medicaid, Medicare, and third party payments. Their fees are set on a sliding scale according to income and family size. Both program are open six days a week and have evening hours as well.

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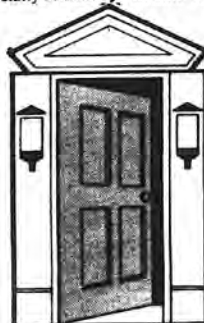

SHOULD A CHILD ATTEND THE FUNERAL?

The funeral is a sad, but important event in the life of the family. Generally speaking, there is little justification for not permitting a child to participate. It allows him to express his own love and devotion. Keeping him away may damage his sense of belonging and deprive him of the opportunity to share his emotions.

On the other hand, the child should never be forced to attend the funeral - no matter how therapeutic one thinks it might be. At the same time, try not to make him feel any shame or guilt for wanting to stay home. Instead, you might suggest that sometime later, when he feels like it, you could visit the cemetery together.

If the child is to attend, then it is important that you explain the details of the funeral service in advance. Being well-prepared and understanding what is going on will do much to relieve unnecessary distress.
