The 1982-'83 History Of Hicksville

Editor's Note: As we promised you last week, here is a summary of some of the 1982-'83 "Happenings" in Hicksville, for which we thank Hicksville Community Council Director Carole Wolf.

It was not the best of years. The cement hopper, the blizzard, the second hottest summer on record and the illegal truck station at Sears all add up to making life uncomfortable. We lost "Uncle" Chlumsky and gained a sump at Dutch Lane and a mountain of cement. But let's look at the positive things that happened this past year.

Last September, the doors of our schools opened once again. Constance Clarke was elected President of the Chamber of Commerce, the Fire Department held its annual tournament, HHS "Launched its 50th Grid Campaign," and obnoxious fumes began creeping into homes on Bay Avenue.

In October, the animals were blessed at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church. HHS won its homecoming game 17-8, there was a chemical spill on W. John Street, "Mr. Hicksville" died at 96, the "World of Mushrooms" invaded the Gregory Museum, the VFW had a Military Ball, St. Ignatius School celebrated its 75th Anniversary. Candidates were shaking hands, HAD celebrated 13 years of community service with its annual dinner and the ghosts of Halloween invaded many parties.

The November Community Council meeting had speakers discussing Consumer Fraud, the Community Crime Watch and Mothers against Drunk Driving. Principals and Administrators picketed the school board, Hicksville won the soccer title 2-1, a memorial was planned for two HBA directors - Al Greene and Wally Collins, Louis Detloff retired as Superintendent of the Hicksville Water District, the Lions had a Pancake Breakfast, there was gold beating at the Gregory Museum and the Jones Institute was planning to relocate in Bayville. The 1937 Charter of the Kiwanis Club was turned over to the new president, John Budnick and TOB Supervisor, Joe Colby, announced that the cement hopper must close. On the last day of the month, the administrators ratified their new contract.

Tom and Peggie O'Connor entertained at the December HCC holiday meeting, the Joffrey Ballet danced at the high school, the Girl Scouts completed the "Gift of Water" project, Dr. Wilbur Hawkins announced his resignation as Superintendent of schools, the Singing Boys of L.I. performed their last Christmas concert, Santa visited the Fire Department's Open House and the VFW made a generous contribution to "Our Lady of the Harbor."

The new year came in with a blaze as a \$500,000 fire destroyed a warehouse on Old Country Road. Dr. Catherine Fenton was appointed Superintendent of Schools, the Girl Scouts visited with cookies, Hal Mayer was elected President of the Hicksville Republican Club, and, in the shades of the 'old west' an armed bandit robbed L.I. Trust for \$25,000.

For 20 years, the Gregory Museum had served Hicksville, and on February 6th, there was an anniversary celebration. The school board discussed semesterization; the HCC featured the Neighborhood Watch Program, cement hopper, and the dinner theater; the Vietnam Veterans established a chapter in Hicksville; the Boy Scouts celebrated Expo '83 at Mid-Island Plaza; Old Country Road school celebrated its 30th anniversary; the Council of PTAs honored Nancy Staron at the Founders Day Dinner; the VFW held its annual Voice of Democracy contest, Hicksville faced a school tax increase; and it snowed so hard that windows were covered, cars were buried and Hicksville was white.

In March, the HCC discussed the Newbridge Road reconstruction plan. Howard Finnegan was elected President of the Hicksville Alumni Association and five students were selected for 1983 Alumni scholarships. Skip Monteforte was elected Venerable of the Galileo Galilei Lodge and the Vernon Wagner Funeral Home was accorded membership in the International Order of the Golden Rule. Michael Collins, who played for many years with the Hicksville American Soccer Club was honored with a presentation at a NY Arrows Soccer game. And the Elks honored firefighters Capt. Farrell, David Rock, Raymond Seeley and Jack Janovsky.

April saw "Hicksville," a grayhound owned by Joe Normandy, win his 11th race. The Hicksville Baseball Association opened its 30th season, the Library budget passed 249 to 139, and Mr. DeNinno was unopposed for Library Trustee. There was a heated blaze at the Depew Mfg. Co. which caused \$350,000 in damage; the Galileo Lodge celebrated its 11th Anniversary; the Lions sponsored a 5K race at Cantiague for the blind; Firefighter Glen Blazo was injured in a garage fire, Jones Manor opened up on the Sound in Bayville, Kiwanis distributed cheese, proposals to fund foreign language and guidance were added to the budget, Burns Avenue had a balloon launch and it rained.

It rained and rained in May. In between the drops, the HCC heard school board candidates and presentation of the budget. Hicksville schools began a fingerprinting program and sports were played when the field dried out. When the votes were counted, the school budget passed, foreign language and guidance were defeated and two very dedicated

Long Island To Feds: We Want Our TV Coverage!

Armed with an impressive array of grass roots support from the Long Island Congressional delegation, the two County Executives and both county legislative bodies, the Long Island Coalition for Fair Broadcasting recently announced its campaign to win a VHF Commercial TV channel for Long Island.

Buoyed by a statement from Long Island's U.S. Senator Alfonse D'Amato and support from an extraordinary coalition of Long Island business, labor, civic and educational interests, the Coalition formally petitioned the Federal Communications Commission for the kind of TV service other comparable communities across the nation enjoy.

The 41 page document which the Coalition mailed to the Federal Regulatory Agency recently calls for an amendment to the FCC's Table of Television Assignments, a scheme of TV station allocation devised in 1952, when Long Island had a relatively small population compared to New York City.

The proposed amendment would recognize 2.6 million Long Islanders as a distinct community, for FCC purposes, and reassign one of the five NYC Commercial VHF TV stations to Long Island.

"Nassau/Suffolk has the greatest buying power of any other metro area in the Nation," stated Abby Kenigsberg, Coalition Executive Director, citing the much publicized 1983 survey of buying power for Sales and Marketing Management Magazine. "Yet we lose out in the video coverage game. Long Islanders are second class citizens when it comes to TV coverage of our politics, our economy, our civic, charitable and educational activities. We don't have the VHF advantage. We don't get coverage for our community in depth and on a daily basis because no channel is assigned to do it."

Last year Congress, citing a lack of service to New Jersey, reassigned WOR-TV Channel 9 from New York City to Secaucus, N.J. Ms. Kenigsberg commented that New Jersey discovered after years of dealing with a dilemma similar to Long Island's that VHF commercial TV service is vital because it is the most powerful communication voice in America today.

"Since the Coalition organized, some New York City stations have improved coverage of Long Island developments," Ms. Kenigsberg reported, "but for the economic, political and civic well-being of our community, we want a station we can call our own. Because the New York market is so enormous, Long Island is unfairly minimized. Our community would be better served were it anywhere else in America."

The petition to the FCC states that the lack of primary service for Long Island is contrary to the will of Congress and to the Communications Act of 1934. "That law mandates 'fair, efficient and equitable service among the states and communities' - what we've got is consistent," Ms. Kenigsberg proclaimed, "it's not fair, not efficient and certainly not equitable."

In addition to support from the Nassau Board of Supervisors and the Suffolk County Legislature, signed statements

Support from labor groups includes local organizations of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, the Iron Workers, and the International Union of Operating Engineers. Education organizations include SUNY campuses at Farmingdale and Old Westbury, Hofstra University, Adelphi University and SUNY at Stony Brook Council. Health delivery and civic groups include local chapters of the American Lung Association, the American Red Cross, Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, the Guide Dog Foundation for the Blind, March of Dimes, United Cerebral Palsy, Big Brothers/Sisters, the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

Highlights of The Long Island Coalition's Petition to the FCC are the following statements:

- * The Stations to which Long Islanders must look for VHF Commercial Service (WABC-TV, WNBC-TV, WPIX-TV, WNEU-TV) presently have no regulatory obligation to serve them. The service which does accrue to Long Islanders is due to either the largesse or business acumen of New York based management at any given time.

- * The market's enormity and the primary service obligation to NYC of all five VHF Commercial stations causes an unfair minimization of news and public affairs programming for Long Island. There is not enough local material for a huge, developing community, which, were it anywhere else in the Nation, would be better served.

- * No UHF outlet in the New York market can realistically compete at the present time with the affluent resources of the VHF outlets. If a low power or drop-in channel were available it could not compete effectively in this prosperous, VHF-dominated arena.

- * Long Islanders are the largest concentration of people in America who have no local daily TV news program - no coverage of county and town governments, economic developments, school districts, cultural and civic associations unless they pay for it. The local news service which citizens in Albany, Houston, Atlanta, Buffalo, Baltimore, Miami, and Syracuse receive for free has a price tag on Long Island.

- * Long Island weather and road conditions, especially in times of crises when public safety is involved, has been unavailable over most major TV stations. Local political campaigns are not covered and election returns are not broadcast. This is despite the fact that some of the contested offices have constituencies larger than those of the Governors of many states. Also, the community sustains a serious economic deprivation because tourism, one of its crucial "lifestyle" industries, has no ongoing announcements and feature material from a VHF presence.

Dr. Kanawada and FDR

Dr. Leo V. Kanawada, Jr., a social studies teacher in the Gifted and Talented program at Hicksville High School and a resident of Hicksville for over 30 years, has had two books published recently, one a significant work on President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Entitled Franklin D. Roosevelt's Diplomacy and American Catholics, Italians and Jews, Kanawada shows how these ethnic and religious groups, then as now, were powerful enough to turn the entrance of the

Oval Office into a revolving door, thereby influencing and determining much of America's foreign policy during the era of World War II.

Partially based on interviews with James A. Farley, W. Averell Harriman, Roosevelt's secretary Grace Tully, Speaker John W. McCormack, Thomas Corcoran, Ben Cohen and others, Kanawada makes telling points. Roman Catholic pressure, he says, led Roosevelt to force upon the

Russians a clause promising religious freedom for American nationals as part of the price of diplomatic recognition. It also led to improved religious conditions in anticlerical Mexico. Contrary to the conclusions of a number of historians, he sees Catholic sentiment as the crucial factor in preventing the lifting of the Spanish embargo during the Spanish Civil War. Similarly, Italian-American pressure

was so strong during Mussolini's Ethiopian war that Roosevelt was deprived of the power to curtail trade with Italy.

The most important sections of the book challenge the claims of several scholars who downplay efforts of the Roosevelt administration to rescue Jews from Nazi-dominated Europe. Kanawada finds that considerable rescue efforts were made. In addition, under

Jewish-American pressure, Roosevelt successfully convinced the British to keep immigration open to Palestine prior to the outbreak of World War II.

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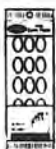
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Trinity Lutheran Worship Service For Handicapped
