Hicksville Athlete Named GW's "Athlete Of The Week"

Theresa Dolan, a 1980 graduate of Holy Trinity High School in Hicksville, was named 'Athlete of the Week' by the George Washington University Women's Athletic Department for the week ending September 29th.

Dolan, a senior defender on the women's soccer team has played exceptionally well in the sweeper position this season despite the aggravation of leg injuries which limited her playing time in prior seasons. In 1980, her first year at GW, Dolan was selected as an honorable mention All-

American, the first All-American soccer player from the GW Women's squad.

During the last week of September Dolan anchored the GW defensive effort against George Mason and Radford although both matches were GW losses. In GW's first win of the 1983 season, Dolan efforts propelled her squad to a 1-0 victory over the University of Virginia.

Dolan, a student in GW's School of Education, is the daughter of James and Ruth Dolan of Hicksville.

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Gas Stations Charged With Selling Adulterated Gasoline

Nassau County District Attorney Denis Dillon announced that eight service stations were charged with selling adulterated gasoline. The probe, conducted jointly with the County Consumer Affairs Weights and Measures Division, uncovered stations pumping unleaded gasoline that had been mixed or switched with regular leaded gasoline.

Dillon said, "Over four days in September, 87 gas stations in the County were selected at random. Investigators from the District Attorney's Office and technicians from Consumer Affairs went into the field with portable lead testing machines. Eight stations had twice the permitted amount of lead in their unleaded gasoline and will be criminally prosecuted. An additional station had more lead than allowed and will be handled administratively by the Consumer Affairs Department."

The District Attorney said, "There is a significant financial motive in this practice since leaded gasoline sells for approximately 12 cents less per gallon than unleaded gasoline. The effect on the motorist who unknowingly uses leaded gasoline in a car manufactured for unleaded gas is that the catalytic converter eventually will be destroyed and the car will not pass on emissions inspection and will require expensive repair work."

Dear Sir:

We wish to enter our complaint regarding the illegal use of the property owned by Remington Aluminum, located at 100 Andrews Road, Hicksville, and rented or leased to a trailer rental or leasing company for the illegal parking of over-the-road trailers.

This property is adjacent to residential properties. We find it to be very degrading to the community. We are abused by the noise of the tractors siam-banging on the 5th wheel of the trailers when they hook up. Also the very annoying and scary

noise emitted when the tractors disconnect the trailers, namely the escape of compressed air used to operate the air brakes.

These trailers (roughly 150) are not owned or used by Remington or their parent company Evans Products. They are leased or rented to other common carriers. Please see photographs for various logos.

Their rigs start operation very early in the morning and continue all day long. They are either hooking up, parking, or roaring down Andrews Road to and from Bethpage Road. We have observed these rigs jumping the curbs from their lot onto Andrews Road, also run-

ning along the landscaped area between their lot and the town road.

The noise and smell of these diesel tractors is very air polluting and degrading to this residential area.

We would appreciate your cooperation to eliminate this illegal operation.

Parola To The Rescue

Frederick E. Parola Jr., our can-do N.Y. State Assemblyman with numerous legislative and local-interest feathers in his cap, bids fair to add another.

His influence may well help cure a situation at the Hicksville Station of the Long Island Railroad that has harassed and endangered commuters for decades.

First, some background. Hicksville, transportation hub of Nassau, now lies in a corner of Fred's redrawn district (14th AD). Hence his immediate interest in the welfare of Levittowners. Hicksvillians and other residents who patronize LIRR.

For some 20 years, actually, from those days when we ourselves commuted to Queens, we have pleaded for red-green lights underneath the LIRR trestle. There are no traffic controls over Newbridge Road and Jerusalem Avenue, never have been!

On and off, we wrote letters to LIRR and officials of Hempstead and Oyster Bay Towns. LIRR responded once, we recall, "It's not our responsibility." (But didn't it care?)

And our politicians pledged "surveys." (To be fair, those things don't come easy for a variety of reasons, some legitimate. And admittedly other problems often come first.)

But picture this at Hicksville LIRR. Going to and from work, Long Islanders who don't use nearby parking lots, have to cross at their own risk. Cars speed going north to West John Street and south to Duffy Avenue along Newbridge. (A similar condition reigns on Jerusalem Avenue.)

It's a very short distance, perhaps a total of two long blocks. And there's the rub. This distance is so short it becomes a lie-or-death challenge for station-bound and

homebound workers to try to cut through. They have no chance, if motorists don't slow down, let alone full-stop.

We asked Fred recently to intercede.

You may wonder why over these long years commuters have not protested. Maybe most of us are meek, disinclined to complain, or just accustomed to accept inconvenience, or even love to run a gauntlet!

Be that as it may, before long, Fred hit paydirt. He contacted Sam Ippolito, regional director, New York State's Department of Transportation, in Hauppauge. Mr. Ippolito has just replied, as follows:

"Dear Assemblyman Parola:
(Re: Your letter of August 25, 1983, Route 106, at Hicksville Railroad Station, Pedestrian Crossings.)

"Thank you for your letter expressing the concerns of your constituent for additional traffic controls at the subject location.

"We will schedule an investigation and notify you of our findings at the conclusion of our survey.

"Regrettably, there may be some delay in concluding our study since this office receives numerous requests for traffic controls in Nassau and Suffolk Counties. These requests are scheduled for survey by the end of February, 1984.

"Thank you for bringing this matter to our attention. Sincerely (signed) Sam Ippolito, Regional Director."

This double-barreled action, we hope, will in time relieve commuters and other LIRR customers of an enormous amount of stress and strain that can make life miserable. Readers equally concerned may wish to express their views to Fred.

Levy Urges Increased Home Security

Senator Norman J. Levy (R.C-Merrick), noting that residential crime in most of the Eighth Senatorial District has decreased or stabilized over the past months, is urging residents to continue their efforts in preventing burglaries to their homes.

Levy explained, "While the Nassau County Police Department has done an outstanding job in protecting our communities from crime-and I believe recent statistics bear this out-homeowners themselves can take relatively easy precautionary measures to further secure their residences from a potential burglar."

Levy stated that at his Anti-Burglary Crime Resistance meetings last year, the Police Department had offered the following home security advice to local residents:

- lock doors, windows and garages when you leave and maintain signs of activity by leaving lights on and a radio playing when you are away;
- don't hide keys outside the house;
- notify the police and your neighbors of any

extended absence from home;

- don't keep jewelry or cash at home-if you must, hide them and lock securely;
- check your locks-use more than one type lock on exterior doors (spring-latch lock, dead-bolt lock);
- lock ladders out of sight;
- install flood lights at the rear of your home;
- install peep holes in solid exterior doors.

Levy said that Police have also noted that a favorite spot of entry for burglars is a cellar window, particularly in the rear of the house, emphasizing that locks specially designed for those windows should be installed.

"The most effective deterrent to crime within our local areas is alert and concerned neighbors," stressed Levy, who urged homeowners to report suspicious persons, cars, or activities in their neighborhoods to the police by calling "911".

"Homeowners can also take advantage of programs and information offered by the Police Department,

including the Neighborhood Security Program and Operation ID, which allows residents to clearly engrave identifying numbers on personal property at no charge," said Levy, adding, "The Nassau County Police Department's Crime Resistance Unit also has a variety of free brochures available to help residents learn to protect themselves and their

homes from crime."

"Operation Safe Halloween"

On Oct. 6 a four-pronged effort to insure the safety of the people of Nassau County during the Halloween season was launched by Police Commissioner Samuel J. Rozzi. Calling for total community cooperation, Rozzi has contacted school officials, PTA groups, clergy and local merchants, in an attempt to curb lawless acts which have plagued the community during the Halloween season.

"While we are certainly unable to totally eliminate the problems of vandalism and food tampering which occur during this time of year," stated Rozzi, "we hope to significantly decrease the number of incidents which threaten our residents by gaining support of the entire community. Perhaps then we will see progress."

The program is a joining of several efforts including enforcement, community education and merchant cooperation. The entire focus is to provide an increased level of protection to residents during this holiday season.

1. Letters have been forwarded to the business community asking merchants to restrict the sale of spray paints, shaving cream and eggs, which are the tools of the vandal used to cause property damage, and in some cases, personal injury. Retailers are being asked to use common sense in limiting the sale of these items to teenagers during the Halloween period.

2. School officials have been contacted by the department

Over 30,000 brochures are presently being distributed to elementary schools in the county with guidelines for a safe Halloween. In addition, the department has asked schools to notify their students that the police will be out in force during this period to deal with vandalism and related problems. Similar information has also been disseminated to local PTA groups and members of the clergy.

3. Police forces will be focused on the problem of young vandals during the Halloween weekend, with increases in youth patrols in all precincts. Residents should direct specific vandalism complaints to 911 as in the past.

4. The placement of foreign substances in Halloween candy and various other foodstuffs has increased dramatically over the past few years. Here in Nassau County the vast majority of the reports have been fraudulent, generated perhaps by a desire for notoriety, financial gains through insurance claims or revenge on family members.

"The department will thoroughly investigate any and all reports of this nature to determine their validity and source," stated Rozzi. "Under no circumstances do we want to panic an entire community due to false reports by misguided individuals. If false reports are made, we will make arrests of those responsible."

Reports of foreign substances still should be made to 911 and Police Officers will be sent to investigate. All of these reports will then be forwarded to the Chief of Detectives Office who will conduct detailed investigations. The department has already been in contact with the Federal Food and Drug Administration and has established the necessary investigative procedures.

Nassau County Police Department, in addition to the four main objectives, are asking that parents be concerned as to where their children go; what they eat and what costumes they are wearing. Some homemade costumes can be flammable and others restrict the children's vision when crossing streets. The department has issued the following advice for youngsters:

For trick-or-treaters

- Don't trick-or-treat alone.
- Don't go inside a stranger's home.
- Wear light-colored clothing after sundown.
- Don't wear masks that block vision.
- Walk on sidewalks or paths, not on streets.
- Don't eat candies or other treats until your parents check them.

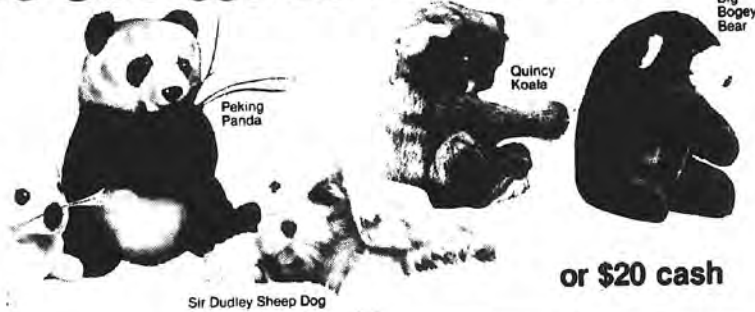
