At The Hicksville **School Board Meeting**

The Hicksville Board of Education meeting of October 26 featured an educational presentation from the Senior High Gifted and Talented program by Dr. Leo Kanawada and Humanities Students. Tenth-graders presented the results of their studies on the ancient world which were on display for Agora Day held earlier this month. Maps, charts, models and reports were exhibited and a live performance of dances and dramatizations completed the program. A brief synopsis of the proceedings was presented to the Board. The program is coordinated by teachers Gerald Shanley, Pauline Jonason, Dr. Kanawada and Charles Arnold.

During the action section of the meeting, the Board authorized the administration to retain the Urac Corporation to review the district's LILCO bills for errors. All refunds due to Hicksville because of overbilling which are obtained through Urac's services will be split evenly with the corporation and there will be no other fees or charges paid by the district.

Bids were awarded for magazines and periodicals in the amount of \$4,928,99 and for music supplies in the amount of \$7,741.84. A transportation bid for \$13,512 and a bid for \$19,621.89 were also awarded, for a grand total of \$45,804.72. The Board also authorized the payment of claims and warrant totaling \$5,439,054.88.

The Superintendent's report included a presentation by Mr. Friedman on staff absenteeism, breaking down absences into the categories of sick leave, personal absences, family illness absences, jury duty, and bereavement leave. Comparative data presented over a four-year period showed improvement in attendance rate for staff members, which compares favorably with information from other districts. The average daily attendance of students throughout the district for that same year was also exactly 93.3%. Discussion was tabled pending advice of counsel, on the issue of voting to close a meeting at midnight and the number of votes required. The Board is concerned with the need to conduct business in public at a reasonable hour, and a method for limiting the length of meetings is under discussion and review.

Barbara Granai was appointed as a teacher aide at Dutch Lane School, and Barbara Thunell was appointed full-time clerk in the Mail Room/Duplicating Department.

The Board also approved the examination rate for school physiciaps conducting employee bus driver physicals.

The district's Curriculum Council met last week to discuss and review past, present and future procedures and recommendations regarding the district's educational program. The Council is composed of 20 professional staff members and representatives from administration and PTA under the chairmanship of Mr. Dempsey, Director of Instruction.

During the committe report segment of the meeting, Mr. Wolfson briefly described the meeting of the Long-Range Planning Committee with a representative from the State Education Department regarding facilities use. Mr. DeSimone gave an overview of the issue and indicated that the major factors in planning to be considered are grade level organization, educational programming, enrollment projections

tions and economics.

Mrs. Singer announced that contacts had been initiated with the American Field Service by the School/Community Relations Committee to lay the groundwork for the founding of a local chapter. It is hoped that a student exchange program can be organized in Hicksville in the future.

Board Adopts '84 Budget

The Oyster Bay Town Board on Tuesday, November 1, adopted the 1984 budget as proposed at a public hearing held on October 25, 1983.

Under the proposed fiscal plan, the costs reflected in the 1984 General Town Budget amount to \$32,811,621. The General Town tax is levied on all properties throughout the

Crediting Department Heads for tightening operations and finding more efficient ways to deliver needed services.

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby said that "the homeowner will pay 87 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. a reduction of 1/10 cent from the 1983 rate. or a total of \$60.90 in taxes on the average home assessed at \$7.000.

Because Town Department Heads have made a determined and concerted effort to find a better way to provide a service, despite inflation driving costs to 150% of their 1977 level, a homeowner in Oyster Bay will pay only \$3.22 more than he

Under the State law controlling assessments in Nassau County different classes of property will have different tax rates. The rate stated above is for Class I properties (1, 2 and 3-family homes.) The General Town rate for Class II (apartments) is 93.4/5 cents per \$100. the same rate as 1983. Class II properties (utilities) would continue at 94.9/10 cents, and Class IV properties (all others) would increase 1/2 cents 10.47/10/cents. cent to 94 7/10 cents.

Under the budget for Part Town (Planning, Building and Zoning) the tax rate for Class I and Class II properties would be set at 21 3/10 cents and 23 1/10 cents respectively. remaining the same as the 1983 rate. The Class III and Class IV rates would be 23 5/10 cents and 23 4/10 cents. showing slight increases of 1/10 cent and 1/5 cent, respectively.

The Highway Budget for 1984 will increase the Highway tax slightly from the current rate of \$1.30 4/5 cents, to \$1/32 and \$1/5 cents, for Class 1 properties. For Class 11 properties the rate would be set at \$1.43 7/10 cents, for Class 11 properties the rate is \$1.45 and 4/5 cents and for Class 1V. \$1.45 and ½ cents.

The Highway and Part Town taxes do not apply to property located within Villages.

Perty located within Villages.

"Also contained in the budget." Colby noted, "are the 1984 financial plans for the more than 50 special districts in the Town which provide such services as fire protection. water supply, refuse collection, community parks, etc." Many of these districts are administrated independently by commissioners elected at local levels. Although State requires those budgets to be reflected in the Town's budget. each special district sets its own tax rate. These budgets were adopted as proposed with some special district taxes increasing, some decreasing and some remaining the same

Colby pointed out that "only 5% of the tax bill paid by residents goes to the Town (including General. Part Town and Highway Funds), while 12% goes to local special districts. The remainder of the total property tax bill is comprised of clocal school district taxes (57%) and for such Nassau County services as its General Fund. Police District and Community College and Sewer District (26%). Nassau County and the school districts each prepare and adopt their own budgets.
