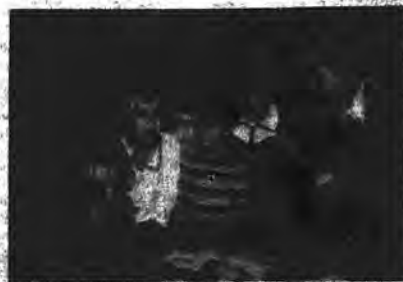

## Offer Savings For Early Zip Code Directory Orders

Postal Service customers who order the 1984 National Five Digit ZIP Code and Post Office Directory no later than November 20, 1983, will receive a discount, according to MSC Manager/Postmaster Anthony M. Murello.

By ordering a directory or directories early, the postmaster explained, customers will get each for \$8.00, instead of the \$9.00 they will cost when the directories go on sale at the post office in

January. Early orders also will result in direct mailing of directories to customers from the publisher in January, either in single copy or case lots.

In addition, Mr. Murello said, a \$1.00 trade-in discount for old directory covers is being offered, and case lots will get one free directory per case as a discount.

Order forms for the directories are available at Hicksville Post Office.

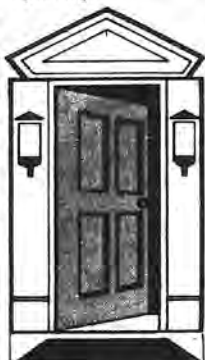

## Help For Purchasers Of Firewood

Before you order wood for winter, send for a free pamphlet on the "Intelligent Purchase of Firewood," being offered by the Nassau County Office of Consumer Affairs. It gives valuable advice on what wood to

select, how to store it and how to get what you pay for, according to Commissioner James E. Picken.

Because prices are high and not all buyers are knowledgeable, the County office enforces State regulations covering the advertising and sale of firewood. "Knowing your rights can keep you from getting burned," he said.

Under the regulations, you must be told three things when you order wood by the cord or portion of a cord:

1. THE DIMENSIONS IN FEET AND INCHES. A cord is the amount of wood contained in a space of 128 cubic feet when it is stacked and well stowed. The dimensions for a standard cord are 4 feet high, 8 feet wide and 4 feet deep. The term "face cord" can describe either a half or a third of a cord, but is not sufficient information. All three dimensions must be given.

2. THE IDENTITY OF THE WOOD. The term "hardwood" may not be applied to pine, spruce, poplar, willow, aspen, grey birch or paper birch.

3. THE MANNER OF SEASONING AND LENGTH OF TIME. If represented as seasoned. It could be kiln dried or air dried.

## Purcell Selects Firm For Audit

On Nov. 3 County Executive Francis T. Purcell chose Ernst and Whinney, one of the Big Eight accounting firms, to do a three-year audit of Nassau County. The firm, located in Melville, is currently auditing the county hospital and the A. Holly Paterson Home.

Ernst and Whinney's total price of \$255,000 for the three years was the lowest among six proposals received by the county. Proposals from the other firms ranged up to \$600,000.

Purcell chose Ernst and Whinney on the recommendation of a committee he had appointed to evaluate the proposals submitted in response to county RFP (request for proposal) issued on Sept. 14. The responses were submitted in two parts. A technical package, opened on Oct. 24, contained the firms' proposals on how they would proceed and spelled out their qualifications; the committee deemed all six firms fully qualified.

A financial package, opened on Tuesday, Nov. 1, contained the prices the firms said they would charge. The committee made its recommendation yesterday, Wednesday, Nov. 2.

Ernst and Whinney will audit the county for 1983, 1984 and 1985, using generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). For 1983, the firm will audit the county's balance sheet (assets and liabilities), scheduled to be released on Feb. 28, 1984. In 1984, the firm will audit the balance sheet and the county's income statement (statement of revenues and expenses). In 1985, the firm will do a "full scope" audit, repeating the prior two years' analyses, and adding all other county financial statements.

The other firms which submitted proposals were Deloitte Haskins and Sells; Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Company; Touche Ross and Company; Arthur Young and Company; and Arthur Anderson and Company.

two-month period ranged from \$3.75 to \$6.60 per square foot. The cost of retail space ranged from \$15.50 to \$22.00 per square foot, and the cost of office space averaged \$13.00 per square foot, he said.

Among the new leases is one for a 3,700 sq ft building in Westbury for Pepperidge Farms. The Connecticut-based baking concern will use the site for warehousing and distribution. The building, located at 102 Bond Street, was designed and built for Pepperidge Farms by Spiegel Associates, and is scheduled to be ready for occupancy in December.

For the past year, Pepperidge Farms has maintained a similar facility in a 4,000 sq ft rental space in a building at 96 Bond Street, Westbury, also built and owned by Spiegel Associates.

The largest transaction in the two-month period was a lease covering a 15,000 sq ft building at 25 Lumber Road in Roslyn. Telco Products Corp., the new lessee, manufactures electronic components.

Spiegel Associates is one of Long Island's major commercial builders, developers, and real estate management firms.
