Help For Purchasers Of Firewood

Before you order wood for winter, send for a free pamphlet on the "Intelligent Purchase of Firewood." pampoiet on the "Intelligent Purchase of Firewood," being offered by the Nassau County Office of Consumer Affairs. It gives valuable advice on what wood to

select, how to store it and how to get what you pay for, according to Commissioner James E. Picken.

Because prices are high and not all buyers are knowledgeable, the County office enforces State regulations covering the advertis-ing and sale of firewood. "Knowing your rights can keep you from getting burned," he said.

Under the regulations, you must be told three

things when you order wood by the cord or portion of a cord:

THE DIMENSIONS IN FEET AND INCHES. A cord is the amount of wood contained in a space of 128 cubic feet when it is ranked and well stowed. The dimensions for a standard cord are 4 feet high, 8 feet wide and 4 feet deep. The term "face cord" can describe either a half or a third of a cord, but is not sufficient information. All three dimensions must

be given.
2. THE IDENTITY OF THE WOOD. The term "hardwood" may not be applied to pine, spruce, THE poplar, willow, aspen, grey

birch or paper birch.

3. THE MANNER OF SEASONING AND LENGTH OF TIME, if represented as seasoned. It could be kiln dried or air



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
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
