## Hicksville H.S. Soccer Loses To Arlington 2-0

Arlington of Dutchess County advanced to the New York State finals with a 2-0 verdict over Hicksville at Hericks Tuesday afternoon.

Hicksville, as Nassau County Champions, was shorn of three of its starting players because of an altercation in the Long Island Champion game with North Babylon.

The Comets bore the brunt of an uncontrolled, inflammatory contest when leading the overtime 2-1.

North Babylon withdrew from the field, defaulting the State quarter-final match.

In that second overtime period, a Hicksville player fell to the ground covering the ball and according to witnesses, two players tried to pry it loose.

A pushing, shoving, kicking fracas resulted as Hicksville players rushed to the aid of the prone Comet.

Section VIII officials had made no provision for crowd control nor restraining ropes or barriers.

The players were unprotected from a flood of spectators, who came on the field and added to the pushing, shoving and kicking.

The game was played at Suffolk County's Bellport High School.

According to eyewitnesses, the acrimonious Suffolk attitude towards a Nassau County team was demonstrated at the very start. The verbal attacks from North Babylon parents directed at Hicksville players were savage and degrading.

This heightened the intensity of the contest.

Reaction to the incident resulted in unpleasant and outraged behavior from both sides.

It was a failure of tournament, school administrators and officials to provide the required control.

Acting for the Hicksville District, Athletic Director Richard Hogan, self imposed the suspensions on the three Hicksville players and they were barred from the semi-final.

## Hearing Set On Hicksville McDonald's Request For New Access/Egress And Hours Of Operation

The Oyster Bay Town Board has scheduled a public hearing for Tuesday, January 24, 1984, on an application to modify restrictive covenants on an entrance/exit and hours of operation at the Hicksville McDonald's.

"The applicants, Kidder-Hunt Management Corpo-

ration, McDonald's Corporation, Sanford Abrams and Sidney Bach, are seeking permission to modify restrictive covenants to permit construction of an entrance and exit on Princess Avenue through the existing parking field," Town Councilman Kenneth S. Diamond explained. "Currently, all

traffic must enter and exit from Broadway.

"The applicants are also asking to change hours of operation to Monday through Friday 6 AM to 11 PM, Saturday 7 AM to midnight, and Sunday 7 AM to 11 PM," Diamond continued. "Hours of operation are presently limited to 7

AM to 11 PM Monday through Thursday, 7 AM to midnight Friday and Saturday, and 8 AM to 11 PM Sunday."

The hearing is scheduled for January 24th at 10 AM in the Hearing Room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

## At The School Board Meeting

The November 9 meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education began with a round of compliments from Board members for a wide range of activities. Included in the exchange of congratulations were Elaine Kabakoff and Beverly Brown for their curriculum in "Consumerism" for intermediate in-depth study students, Dutch Lane and Woodland for their very informative newsletters, and Nancy DeSorbo for her supervision of the SHS Student Government project to bake and send cookies and brownies to our Marines in Lebanon for the Thanksgiving holiday. Also

commended were the players and spectators at the soccer finals for their outstanding performance and behavior, and the Marching Comets, who took second place in the Tournament of Bands Chapter Championship last Sunday.

The action section of the meeting began with the approval of the textbook Success in Spelling for use in grades 2 through 6. The book was recommended by Fork Lane Principal Richard Jennett and teachers Evelyn Grib, Rita Schmitt, and Majorie Mitchell.

The Board approved a resolution raising the critical maximum income amount for a partial exemption for real property taxes for persons 65 years of age or older from \$10,500 to \$13,500. This follows the amendment of the Real Property Tax Law, Chapter 991 of the Laws of 1983 providing a graduated maximum income eligibility level for the granting of partial exemptions for general, county, town, village, or school purposes.

In further actions, bids were awarded in the amount of \$13,765.78 for athletic supplies for winter sports, and claims and warrants totaling \$5,850,231.11 were authorized. The Board also approved recommendations from the Committee on the Handicapped from the meetings of October 12 and November 2.

The Board accepted the resignation of Robert Sklarz, SHS social studies teacher for the past 25 years, effective February 1, 1984.

The Board also approved schedules of winter interscholastic athletic assignments, elementary intramural assignments, and additional student activities professional staff

The Superintendent's report included a presentation by Dr. Rieck on high school registration information supplied to the State Education Department. The data in the report helps the High School and the S.E.D. to determine to what extent the school meets requirements established by the Education Law and the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education, as well as other relevant laws, court decisions, and directives from other appropriate sources. The report solicits information on such items as attendance, length of the school year and school day, teacher load, instructional program, language of instruction, Regents exams, diplomas, students with handicapping conditions, and other subjects relating to the operation of the school.

Dr. Fenton reviewed major points of the Regents "Proposed Action Plan to Improve Elementary and Secondary Education Results in New York," referred to hereafter as simply, The Action Plan. This plan makes recommendations in a number of areas including curriculum development, increased requirements for both local and Regents diplomas, introduction of new courses, more specific standards and expectations on all grade levels with remedial instruction for students falling below State reference points, extension of the school year by 20 days, and new regulations regarding the certification of teachers. A more detailed summary of the Action Plan will appear in the next issue of the Bulletin Board, the district's newsletter, which is mailed to every home in the district.

Faculty meetings are being conducted with the staff by Dr. Fenton to inform them about the proposals outlined in the plan. A meeting with staff members from Burns, Willet, Woodland, and East Street was held recently and meetings with the other schools will be scheduled in the near future. The Board has also directed Dr. Fenton to write a letter expressing the concerns of the Hicksville community about provisions of the Action Plan.

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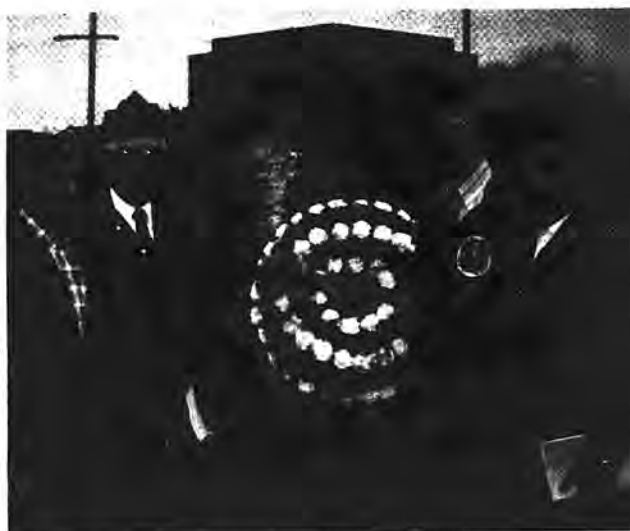

"The co-op provides parents of disabled youngsters cost-free care and the knowledge that their youngster is being cared for by parents who not only have a disabled youngster of their own, but who have been specially trained in respite care through a series of workshops offered to co-op families by the Long Island Respite Network."

## Legislators To Hear About New Method Of Removing Organics From Water

A new and relatively inexpensive method of removing volatile organic chemical contaminants from drinking water is the focus of the Long Island Water Conference's legislative meeting scheduled for Monday, November 21 at the Crest Hollow Country Club in Woodbury.

New York State senators and assemblymen and women will attend the meeting to learn about air stripping, a system which blows

air up through falling water causing the organic contaminants to be cleansed from the water and be dispersed.

Air stripping is effective on such volatile organics as trichloroethane, tetrachloroethylene and trichloroethylene which have been found in some groundwater on Long Island. This method is especially significant because of its relatively low operating costs compared with other methods.

The Long Island Water

Conference annually sponsors this meeting with legislators to bring them up-to-date on significant developments in the water supply management field. It was founded in 1951 as an association of water utilities in Nassau and Suffolk Counties. Currently, there are about 150 members including 51 water utilities providing safe and reliable water service to approximately 2.5 million Long Island residents.

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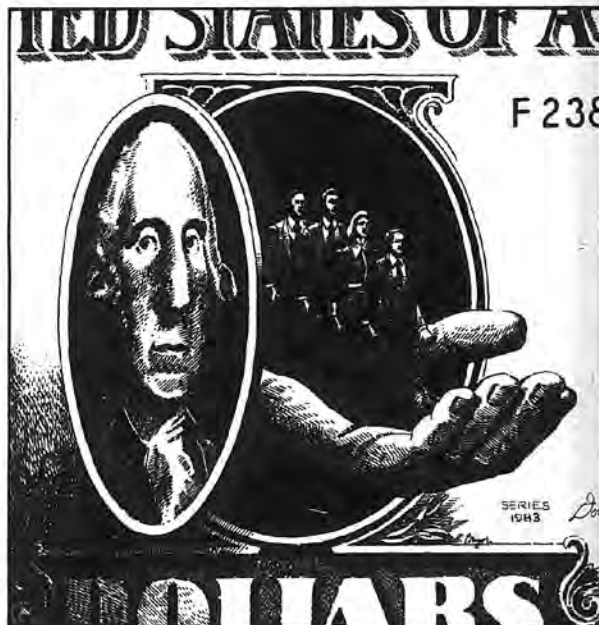

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## New Chemical Bank Survey

Although they are beset by the same problems facing all small businesses in the metropolitan New York area, Long Island entrepreneurs feel less threatened than their urban counterparts, and more a part of the various institutions that exist to serve them, according to a major survey just released by Chemical Bank. Furthermore, despite their problems, the majority of Long Island business owners say they are optimistic about their ability to succeed through the 1980's, and would, if given the chance, do it all over again.

Entitled "Small Business Speaks: The Chemical Bank Report," the survey questioned over 1,000 owners or principals in New York City's five boroughs, as well as in Nassau, Suffolk, Westchester and Rockland counties. The first survey of its kind, "Small Business Speaks" addresses small firms with annual sales in

the \$500,000-\$5 million category. The overall findings were announced at a Chemical press conference last week, and the Long Island results were presented today to more than 250 local business owners and leaders at a Garden City Hotel cocktail reception.

The survey elicited area entrepreneurs' opinions and attitudes on a variety of economic, family, lifestyle and political issues. The responses, according to

Robert McBride, senior vice president and head of Chemical's Long Island Division, "are both exciting and sobering, and provide the forum through which we at Chemical express our continued commitment to helping small businesses succeed and grow."

Like other small business owners polled in the survey, a sizeable group of Long Island entrepreneurs say

they have not yet felt the economic upswing. An average of only 43% say their companies are better off today in terms of profit than they were during the peak of the recent recession. Furthermore, another one in four say their company is worse-off today in terms of the amount of competition they face than in the past.

Despite these adverse factors, a full 77% of Long Island business owners say that based on their past experience, their business would be better able to weather another recession. This theme—optimism in the face of adversity—emerges time and time again throughout the survey, according to McBride, and is especially evident in Long Island.

Long Island entrepreneurs also say there are several factors which may limit their future growth. For example, about 1 in 3 say

federal and state corporate income taxes pose a limitation on their growth. Another 1 in 4 say government regulations may also restrict growth. In addition, the cost of energy concerns many business owners...an average of 42% see this as an emerging problem.

The survey found that in spite of the risks and sacrifices, trials and tribulations, Long Island small business owners are a unique breed who have hope for the future. A full 91% say they are optimistic about their business's ability to succeed through the 1980's, and 93% would again choose to own their own business.

Yet, paradoxically, Long Island business people are less likely to have made plans for their company's future. About 58% say they have not prepared for the transfer of management or ownership.

Chemical commissioned this survey in preparation for the introduction of its Business Action Unit Program, designed to provide specialized financial services for small businesses in the Metropolitan area. More than 30 Chemical Bank small business specialists have been assigned to Business Action Units on Long Island.

"Small Business Speaks: The Chemical Bank Report," was conducted by Research and Forecasts, Inc.

Keynotes for the conference stressing careers, global education, and New York State Regents decisions affecting foreign language teaching, included Dr. T. H. ## DOT Receives \$54.1 Million In Low Bids For 22 Projects

The State Department of Transportation recently received apparent low bids totalling \$54,118,229.26 for 22 projects involving highways and bridges.

Transportation Commissioner James L. Larocca said contracts are expected to be awarded and work to begin on most projects in about a month, following analysis and verification of the bids and processing of legal papers.

Projects include reconstruction or improvements on highways in Jefferson, Nassau, Rensselaer, Westchester and other counties. An Albany County project, to build ramps to carry westbound I-90 traffic to I-87 northbound, has been rescheduled for November 17. Flood control measures to protect highways and property are planned in Broome, Clifton and Essex Counties.

Bridges will be repaired or replaced in Albany, Broome, Greene, Orange, Rensselaer, Steuben and other counties.

## Town Highway Vehicles Expand Communications Capabilities

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby has announced that the Town's Highway Division has expanded communications capabilities through the installation of a telephone/radio communications system.

"This additional telephone 'patch' system," Colby said, "will make it possible for highway vehicles equipped with two-way radios to be 'patched', via

telephone, directly to supervisory personnel at any Town facility for first-hand reports as the men travel Town roadways during the course of the business day."

Colby added that the system will enhance the communications system recently implemented by the Town in conjunction with the Civilian Radio Motor Patrol. "Town forces who might be the first on the scene of an accident," Colby explained,

"will be able to speak directly with the police or fire departments via telephone 'patch' to give an accurate and immediate account of what has occurred to those agencies, insuring that the proper assistance and support will be dispatched as quickly as possible."

The Town joined the Nassau County Police Department sponsored Civilian Radio Motor Patrol pro-

gram in June, when police officers from the Crime Resistance Unit trained over 200 Town employees in the proper methods of reporting accidents, suspicious incidents or individuals in need of aid. "The new radio/telephone communications system, now available to over 200 trained men and women Town employees," Colby said, "will greatly assist the Nassau County Police in helping to keep Oyster Bay communities safe."
