The Mid Island Singers will present their annual "Messiah" Sing In at the Parkway Community Church on Stewart Avenue in Hicksville on Sunday, December 11, at 4:00 P.M. William Goleke will be directing Part I of Handel's "Messiah" plus the famous "Hallelujah Chorus."

Herbert Bradensten, Jr., former accompanist of the Mid Island Singers, will be playing the organ. Soloists will be Lee Ann Rubino Razzagone, soprano; Carrie Clark, contralto; William

Reynolds, tenor; and Edmund Tompkins, bass. The Mid Island Singers will be the nucleus of the chorus, but to make the event really exciting, other singers are invited to participate. If you come to sing, please bring your own score. They will not be available at the Sing In.

Of course, listeners are also welcome. If you love the "Messiah," as many people do, but prefer not to sing, come anyway and enjoy the event.

The Hicksville Board of Education discussed a resolution at last night's meeting which would grant a property tax exemption for physically disabled persons in accordance with Section 459 of the Real Property Law. The resolution provides for the exemption from property taxes of improvements to a residence made to facilitate use and accessibility by an owner who is disabled or by members of the resident owner's household. The resolution was tabled until additional information on application and limitations could be obtained.

In other actions, the Board approved claims and warrants totalling \$7,608,499.40, budgetary transfers in the amount of \$115,523.79, and the first quarterly operational report. Recommendations of the Committee on the Handicapped generated at the meeting of November 16 and parent members of the committee were also approved.

The Superintendent's Report included the presentation by Mr. Greenberg of

the district's guidance plan. This document was developed in response to changes in the Commissioner's Regulations and state mandates to provide a plan to comply with those regulations ensuring minimum standards for guidance programs throughout the state. The district plan was incorporated with the guidance handbook so that it would be a working document subject to frequent use and referral by supervised the development of the handbook, with the participation of Ken Loftus, John Miller, Pat Quinn, Selma Notov, and Michael Sinatra.

The Board accepted the resignation of Edith Wolloch, SHS science teacher. Mrs. Wolloch is retiring after 17 years with the district.

The Board also accepted the resignation of Arnold Dudley, instrumental music teacher at Fork Lane School. Mr. Dudley served as the director of the Marching Comets.

Arlene Gambino, media aide at the Junior High School, also submitted her

resignation to the Board.

Irene Cooney was appointed account clerk in the Building and Grounds Department, and Grace Esposito was appointed account clerk for the Health Insurance Department.

Marcella Krzeski was appointed senior typist clerk in the Business Office, replacing Angela Antonucci, who retired this month. Joan Thomas was appointed account clerk in the Business Office to replace LaVerne Williamson, who also retired this month.

Lillian Fricke was appointed school monitor at the Senior High, and a schedule of additional substitute teachers and substitute registered nurses was approved.

During the general public session, Mrs. Norma Goerke reported that Hicksville youngsters received honors for artwork submitted for a competition at the PTA conference. Of the 318 entries, 12 winners and 12 honorable mentions were selected. JHS students

Frank Bondiero and Jean Sturz received honorable mention and Woodland first-grader Glen Hinckley was a New York State winner. Their artwork will be on display throughout the state for one year.

THE AGE OF ANXIETY

The present decade may well be termed the Age of Anxiety. Anxiety is nothing new. In the Sermon on the Mount we read (Matthew 6:25, 33-34) "Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things shall be yours as well. Therefore do not be anxious for tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Let the day's own trouble be sufficient for the day."

We need not rehearse all the problems with the economy, crime, terrorists, and assassination attempts. The evening news plays the same familiar tune night in and night out. Sometimes we feel that these days we have to take the bad with the worst. Much of the time we feel apprehensive about the future. Feeling uneasy, we sometimes wonder what impending ill will befall us next.

In the light of many troubles, the Sermon on the Mount seems to be a tough saying from Jesus. It states that if our minds were set on God, we would not lack the needful things of this earth. When we are anxious over daily concerns, it often

has a paralyzing affect on our religious life. Worrying about items of food and clothing directs our life inward towards ourselves rather than outwards towards the Lord.

In his sermon the Lord does not speak out against working, or planning, or saving for the future. But our obsession with having the so-called better things in life and the increased amount of time it now takes to be able to afford them, has, too often, supplanted the art of living. Further, and inexcusable in God's eyes, work has threatened the worship life of many Christians. Many people are working on Sundays. Others work so long and, so hard during the week that they say they do not have the time for God on Sundays. Jesus has no understanding of this and says in reply, "Do not be anxious about tomorrow. Seek ye first the kingdom of God, then all else will be added unto you."

Jesus concludes his teaching on anxiety by stating that we are not to be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Let today's troubles be sufficient for the day. In Deuteronomy God says, "as thy days, so shall thy strength be." [Deuteronomy 33:25] We either trust in the Lord for strength to meet tomorrow or we don't. Oth

Postal Service: Shop And Mail Early

"Last year, our customers helped us tremendously. They mailed early in the season and early in the day. We hope they will choose to cooperate with us again this year, so we both will have an enjoyable holiday mailing season."

School/Community Relations Committee Meeting

The School/Community Relations Committee of the Hicksville Board of Education invites all interested residents to attend the next meeting, scheduled for Wednesday, December 7. The special guest for the evening will be Mary L. Shea, Field Development Consultant for the American Field Service, who will explain the procedures for initiating a local chapter of AFS in Hicksville. This will lay the groundwork for our community's participation in student and teacher exchanges with other nations.

The American Field Service was founded in 1914 as a volunteer ambulance corps with the French armies. AFS Drivers established a fellowship program to sponsor student exchanges to help other Americans gain a greater understanding of the French people and culture. Between World Wars, 222 fellowships were granted.

AFS was reactivated in 1939 and volunteer units served on fronts in the Middle East, Africa, Europe, India, and Burma. After World War II, drivers of both wars felt that stronger bonds and greater understanding between nations would prevent the horror and destruction of future wars, and the scholarship and exchange program was re-established and expanded. Today, students from nearly 60 countries come to live with American families and attend local

secondary schools, and American students take places in communities in other lands.

In the past 35 years, more than 120,000 students from 85 nations have participated in AFS with the guidance of AFS International headquarters and 2,300 local chapters.

The School/Community Relations Committee will spearhead efforts to establish a sponsoring chapter in

Hicksville so that district students, families and the entire community can benefit from learning about other countries and their people, languages, and cultures. The Committee extends an invitation to all residents interested in working on this important project to attend the meeting on December 7, at 8 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building on Division Avenue.
