Legislation passed in the 1986 session in Albany requiring tax assessors to treat condominiums under four stories in height as single family homes for taxing purposes, is a boon to real estate speculators and owners of condos.

Previously, condominiums of three stories or less, located in New York City and Nassau County, were assessed differently than one, two and three family residential dwellings because they fell within the classification of commercial properties in these areas.

The reclassification will save condo owners tax dollars while reducing tax revenue for local villages and school districts.

School taxes will have to rise to the degree covering a major part of the tax revenue loss.

Renters Less Worthy

Apartment renters are still deemed as less worthy citizens since the law still leaves apartment residents forced to pay higher rents to cover the high taxes placed on apartment dwellings.

With the loss of revenue from condo taxes, apartment owners are confronted with increased makeup costs which are passed on to tenants.

Single family homes were never included in the higher assessment classification and that statute is retained.

However, with lower condo assessments, single family home owners will not entirely escape some makeup taxes.

The Nassau Board of Supervisors voted the higher assessment for apartment owners a few years back. Protests from apartment residents were turned aside at the time under the philosophy of one supervisor, who stated that the "single family resident is the bedrock of our communities."

Apartment renters did not receive the same evaluation.

**Postmasters Ask Owners
 To Restrain Pets**

With the arrival of warmer weather, Postmasters have asked dog owners to help protect letter carriers, utility workers and other citizens from the dangers of dog bites.

Nationally, more than 5,000 letter carriers were bitten by dogs last year.

"In recent years, the public has responded to our plea to keep their pets restrained, and we have seen a decline in bites nationally," Sahn said. "Nevertheless, much is still to be done to eliminate the hazard to our employees and other citizens who might be bitten."

All dogs are territorial by nature, and even the most gentle pet will bite if it feels its domain is threatened by the presence of a carrier or other person. "With a little care, a pet owner can not only protect our carriers, but his or her pet and pocketbook, too, said the spokesman.

It was stressed that the Postal Service protects its carriers from dog bite hazards. Among remedies in situations when a pet owner fails to restrain a dog is interruption of home delivery to the residence or, in some cases, to entire neighborhoods. The Postal Service will also seek to recover worker's compensation damages and provide counseling to carriers who have been bitten and who wish to seek legal action against the dog owners.

These policies underscore the Postal Service's commitment to protect its employees, and added that pet owners can easily meet their responsibilities to control their pets.

"We suggest that pets be kept away from the mailbox and areas the letter carrier uses for access to the property. If the pet cannot be kept behind a secure fence, the owners should restrain it with a secure leash or tether or at least keep the pet inside the house during the usual hours carriers are making their rounds."

"We try to do our part by stressing awareness of dog bite dangers to our carriers, but we rely heavily on the support and cooperation of the community to help us end these painful and costly injuries."

1914 Hicksville Map

A 1914 Hicksville Map appeared in *The Hicksville Illustrated News* July 10. Many calls have indicated citizens from all years are engrossed in learning history of our town.

Presented here is Chapter Two of Hicksville Anecdotes. Take out your map.

- **Catholic Church Property** was (on the west side of Broadway) the home of the **St. John's Protectors Boys Orphan Home**. It was operated by the Arch Diocese of Brooklyn. The boys farmed the land for potatoes, corn and other vegetables to supply the dinner table.

- The cluster of homes and businesses at the intersection of **William Street** was where the original gold beating artisans who founded Hicksville, practiced their craft. Only one shell of a building remains today.

- **Rheinhardt Park** was a community gathering place for celebrations. Descendants of **Frank Rheinhardt** opened and operated the famous bathing pavillion at **Bayville** on the shores of **Long Island Sound**.

- Another well-known waterside enterprise originated by a Hicksville family was the **Pig and Whistle Hot Dog and Refreshment stand** in **Bayville**. The place which delighted **Long Islanders** for two decades was owned by the **Robbback family**.

- The last vestige of Hicksville's architectural history — which was buzz-sawed and plowed under by the drawing boards of **Albany, Nassau County** and the **Town of Oyster Bay** — was a small pile of bricks on **Broadway** just a few steps from **Old Country Road**. The bricks were the remains of the **William Braun** summer ice house. He was one of the **Prime Butchers** along **Broadway, Hicksville**, which provided the meat and poultry provisions to the village and the important homes of **sprawling North Shore Gold Coast**.

In preparation for the torrid **Long Island Summers**, great blocks of ice were cut from the lake that used to be in the front of the **Jericho** home that is now known as **The Milleridge Inn**. The blocks were transported to the brick storehouse where they were interspersed with heavy mounds of hay. Much of the meat was frozen cold in this manner.

In the winter **Mr. Braun** hitched horses to his huge sleigh and dashed over the impacted snows to procure supplies from terminals in **Jamaica** and **Brooklyn**.

As late as a few years ago the historic sleigh was in the possession of grandson **Thomas, of Huntington**.

Thank you and Rita for the message on how you enjoy *The Hicksville Illustrated News*.

On your question concerning what team the Hicksville Field Club was playing December 7, 1941.....

With 3 minutes, 29 seconds remaining Ken Zisk arched a 31-yard field goal from the right sidemarker, over the west goal post in Hicksville Stadium, to give the Freeport Lions a 3-0 victory over the satin clad Black and White.

A few minutes before E. Irving Jesser, voice of the Field Club, relayed (from radio reports) over the loudspeaker that "The Japanese Navy has attacked the United States at a place called Pearl Harbor, somewhere in the South Pacific"

A crowd of 7,600 funneled out of the stadium disquieted and wondering what was to be the full extent of that announcement.



The Investor's Corner

I woke up early the other morning, unable to sleep, and turned on the TV. I watched a long, long commercial on how easy it is to make a fortune in real estate with little or no money down. You are probably aware of this pitch. All you have to do is purchase their tape and use their techniques to become rich. The home course of cassette instruction costs only \$150 to \$250, so pick up your telephone, use your credit card, and be on your way to wealth and financial independence.

It is true that real estate makes millionaires—ninety percent of the millionaires in this country made their millions through real estate. So what is the hitch? All we have to do is buy the cassette or go to the seminar. Unfortunately, it is not all that rosy or all that easy.

There is a lot they do not tell you, and it is in the omissions that we find the hitch. What they do not tell you is that the process takes a great amount of time—lots and lots of time. You can become rich through real estate using their methods if the conditions do not change—and they

always do!—and if you have the time to put their ideas into practice.

It is possible to buy real estate with little or no money down, and to use you recently purchased real estate as collateral to end up with more money than you had when you started. There are a variety of strategies: government foreclosures, buying mortgages at a discount; probate buyouts from estates; and bank foreclosures to name a few. Do these methods work? Sure they do, if...

What the TV gurus do not tell you is that for every deal you try to get, you have to try many—I estimate that about one in eighty works out. To get property you need money for down payments or fees, but what you need most is time—almost full time.

One of my recent articles laid out a part-time, step by step process for building wealth by buying houses with two to four rental units. These are manageable and can be purchased with only part-time work.

The moral of the story is that there is no instant elixir for becoming rich—it is hard work.

But do not write off the TV gurus—and do not buy their tapes—go to your library and borrow their tapes and books. Read their books, use their ideas, but understand the drawbacks.

The bidding:

East South West North
Pass 2 NT Pass 3 NT

Opening lead — four of spades.

Let's suppose you're declarer at three notrump and West leads a spade. You duck East's queen at trick one and take the ten return with the ace. How would you continue?

When the deal occurred, declarer cashed the K-Q-A of clubs, hoping dummy's ten would become his ninth trick. When the jack failed to fall, South next led a heart to the nine, losing to the ten.

West cashed his two spades and exited with a diamond, taken by dummy's jack. Declarer then led a heart to his queen, but when West

showed up with the king, the contract went down one.

It is true that declarer was very unlucky to go down on the method of play he chose. It offered better than an 80 percent chance of success. Nevertheless, the fact remains that a different approach was available that was almost 100 percent certain to succeed.

Once West shows out on the third round of clubs, all of South's attention should be focused on the best way to try to make a trick with the queen of hearts. One way of going about this is to do exactly what declarer did, first finessing the nine and later the queen. A much better way, though, is to try to compel West to lead a heart into the A-Q.

Since it is known after the first two tricks that West has at most four spades, and since he presumably has no longer suit, there is a sure way to make him lead a heart without losing five tricks first. After taking the three top clubs, declarer simply cashes the A-K-Q of diamonds and exits with a spade.

In the actual deal, West scores two spade tricks before finding himself forced to return a heart into the A-Q. Even if West has the thirteenth diamond to cash after taking his spades, the heart return on his next play is certain to hand South his ninth trick.



New Rule On Points

Dear Edith: We are refinancing our home. We must pay points and loan origination fees and a funding fee to the VA. Are these expenses tax-deductible? Most of them seem to be for a specific purpose but the points appear to be pure interest upfront and as such tax-deductible. I have received contradictory answers even from the IRS. I want to remain honest and above-board in all matters especially tax matters. — Mrs. F. B.

Points paid by the buyer who originally purchases a home are indeed tax-deductible interest payments, in the year the house is bought and the mortgage placed. (Sellers' points are not deductible).

The IRS recently ruled, however, that when it comes to refinancing, points are deductible only bit by bit, over the life of the loan. This rule, which formerly applied only to investment property, now covers refinancing on one's present residence as well.

Your other expenses are not deductible at all.

53 and Disabled

Dear Edith: About that \$125,000 tax break. Does it make any difference if you are disabled? My husband is 53 and disabled. I'm 52 and working. — Mrs. M. P.

The one-time chance for tax-free profit on the sale of a longtime residence is possible as soon as at least one reaches 55. Disability does not change the requirement.

First Buy At 53

Dear Edith: I am 53 years old and anxious to purchase a place to live in. It will be my first time. Is it wise or good that my son, 25 years old, and I will be 50/50 partners on down payment and ownership? The plan is that I live in and pay monthly payments unless I stop working (retire) or sick, he will take over. — Mrs. N. E.

You don't say why your son plans on going 50/50 with you, so I can't tell why it's a good idea. I can give you some reasons it might be a poor idea.

If your son later wants to buy a home of his own, the fact that you are making the payments won't help. Banks will assume he has a debt for half your mortgage and is personally responsible for half your payments. That may make it difficult for him to qualify for his own loan.

If you decide to sell, some day, you can take a homeowners' tax break on only half your profit; your son will owe capital gains tax on the rest (unless he's living there himself). If your son becomes bankrupt, or marries and divorces, your property could be caught up in complications.

If your son's name is on the mortgage, you may not be able to take your full interest and property tax payments as an income tax deduction; better consult an accountant about that one.

Three Or Five Years

Dear Edith: Are we eligible for the one-time \$125,000 tax break for over age 55, if we have owned and lived in our principal residence for the last three years? We do not understand if we must own it five years. — Mrs. F. D.

If they are the past three years, then three are enough to qualify for that homeowners' tax break. The rule is that you must have owned and occupied the dwelling as your principal residence for at least three of the five years before you sell — and you have.

Taking It With You

Dear Edith: Can my house stay in my name even though I am dead, until my husband dies?

I am writing my will. I own the house we live in. I would like to will it to our four children, but if I die before he does, he would have the use of it as long as he is able to stay in it, paying all bills and reasonable maintenance. — Mrs. D. F.

The arrangement you suggest is not uncommon, and the lawyer who draws up your will can suggest the right wording to accomplish what you want. The house can't stay in your name after your die (that's along the lines of "you can't take it with you") but it can be left to your husband with the provision that it must go to the children when he is no longer in it.

Inherited \$200,000 Property

Dear Edith: I have inherited some property in Texas, approximate value \$200,000, now listed for sale with a broker. When it sells, how would it be best to accept the total amount to my advantage for income tax purposes? A lump sum, or an equal annual payment over ten years? I have heard about income averaging, and also long-term capital gains etc. What do you suggest?

I am 59, earn \$30,000. My income tax now is large. I will retire with a small pension plus social security. Please give me your opinion and advice on how to handle this large one-time income for my greatest benefit for tax purposes. — Mr. T. D. H.

If you inherited the property recently, you don't have much to worry about. Your cost basis will be the value of the real estate when the previous owner died. That should be pretty near today's value, so your taxable gain won't be too much.

I'm not an accountant, and you'll want to check my information out with one. A lawyer should also be consulted when you are dealing with a sum this large. Tax reform will probably change the rules on capital gains and income averaging, and new techniques may be required.

Once you have the money, don't let your worry about income taxes lure you into investing in tax shelters, which require some degree of sophistication. So near retirement, you should probably avoid the stock market also. Put the money into several safe income-producers like Ginnie Maes, treasury securities, and certificates of deposit.



Nassau Sports Review

History of Nassau H.S. Sports

Back in 1926, Baldwin and Lawrence emerged as the top two baseball teams in the county. The North Shore and South Shore leagues wouldn't begin to organize baseball until 1928, so teams simply made up their own schedules. Fans from both schools clamored for a playoff to decide who was better. It was arranged and the first Nassau County baseball championship, although unofficial, was played with Baldwin winning two straight by scores of 4-1 and 6-3.

It would not be until 1945 that an official Nassau Champion would be crowned. For various reasons, the North and South Shore leagues couldn't or wouldn't get together from 1928 to 1944. The first title game matched Garden City and Valley Stream Central. Future N.B.A. all-star Carl Brown was on the mound for Garden City and he hurled the Trojans to a 3-2 win.

From 1945 through 1964, one game decided the championship. In 1965, the current best-two-out-of-three format was adopted. Today, instead of North Shore and South Shore champs meeting, it is the American and National League champs.

Only one no-hitter has been thrown in the history of the finals. Bob Kenyon of Berner blanked Locust Valley, 4-0, in the 1977 opener.

Perhaps the most remarkable individual achievement was turned in by Jim Chenevey of Levittown Memorial on June 1, 1983. Chenevey, a left-handed pitcher, set a tournament and possibly an all-time Nassau County record by striking out 25 Bethpage batters in 11 innings. Ironically, he lost the game, 5-3.

Valley Stream Central has the distinction of winning the most Nassau Titles with five, followed by Sewanhaka and Wantagh with four each. Central also has the mark for runs scored in a game. The Eagles beat Farmingdale, 20-2, in 1947.

Nassau Sports Review

History of Nassau High School Sports

Most Americans regard soccer as a relative newcomer despite its prominent position in the world of sports, but in Nassau County high school athletics soccer is as American as baseball, hot dogs or whatever Lee Iacoca is building.

As far back as the mid 1920's soccer was played here. The first public schools to field teams were Oyster Bay, South Side and Sea Cliff. They were joined in the 1930's by Garden City, Manhasset, Baldwin, Long Beach, Great Neck and Woodmere (now Hewlett). Private schools such as St. Paul's, Kew Forest, Fieldston, Poly Prep, Riverdale and Horace Mann often appeared on the public school schedules.

Sea Cliff (now North Shore) emerged as the dominant team in the 1930's as coach Stan Goodwin led his squads through 52 games without a defeat from 1934 until November 3, 1939 when the streak was broken by Garden City. The Trojans were coached by Jim Steen who fielded his first varsity squad in 1933 and his last in 1970. In 37 years his Garden City teams won 279, lost 114 and tied 52 while winning six county titles. The Outstanding Player Award is named for Steen who now lives in Florida.

Playoffs began in 1947 and soon after Sewanhaka under coach Carl Faulkner began a streak of 47 consecutive games without a loss. The Indians captured nine straight South Shore championships between 1949 and 1957.

Nassau's winningest soccer coach was Oceanside's Art Wright. Wright won 315, lost 80 and tied 40 over 27 years. The sailors won 19 league, 11 South Shore, 9 Nassau and 4 Long Island titles under Wright including a remarkable string of six straight Nassau Championships (1968-73).

In recent years, Hicksville has approached the same level of dominance. The Comets, under several coaches, have reached the finals eight of the past nine years and have won or shared six titles.
