Giese Park Civic Assoc. To Meet August 4th

The Giese Park Civic Association will meet August 4th at 7 P.M. in the community room of the Hicksville library. The main topic will be an update on the Giese Park issue.

At the last meeting of the association on June 30th, plans for proposed development of the property by the Town of Oyster Bay were presented to the residents. These plans included 2 soccer fields, an off street parking facility, a children's play area and underground plumbing for a future restroom building. These plans were unanimously denounced by the residents who stated that the plans represented a sports complex rather than a park and that such a facility was not appropriate for a residential neighborhood in close proximity to private homes. Alternatives to these plans were discussed which included a more passive park, the return of the property to the tax rolls for the building of homes and the development of senior citizen housing. All of these ideas were acceptable to the residents whose utmost concern is maintaining the residential atmosphere of the neighborhood. A town attorney has been requested to attend the meeting to answer questions concerning the issue. Also at the meeting plans will be discussed for residents to go to Town Hall to express their views to all members of the Town Board,

A spokesperson for the association has stated that the town's plans for the property is estimated to cost the taxpayers approximately 1700,000 and could very well be more. The spokesperson also stated that the quality of life of the neighborhood is at stake and urges all interested persons to attend.

Hicksville Annex Open For Tax Payments

Post Office Insurance Tips

If you send merchandise or valued objects through the mail, you can buy postal insur-ance. The key is knowing the rules that apply.

Hicksville Postmaster Roger Nienaber points out that while almost all packages and envelopes handled by the U.S. Postal Service reach their destination without incident, insurance is a safe and economical way to assure reimbursement in the event of accidental damage or loss.

Insurance is available up to 1500 for fourth class parcel and book-rate mail, third-class business mail and for merchandise mailed at the Priority Mail or First-Class rates. For articles insured for more than \$25, a receipt of delivery is signed by the recipient and filed at the delivery post office

The cost of the insurance ranges from a minimum of so cents to a maximum of \$4.40. Express Mail is covered by limited insurance at no additional charge

Postmaster Nienaber offeres these tips. 'First, send irreplaceable articles, regardless of value, and all items worth more than 1500 by Registered Mail for greater security.

"Second, do not overinsure your articles. Payment for a lost item is limited to the actual value of the item, less depreciation.

Third, insurance does not cover the spoilage of perishable items. Sentimental value isn't covered either.

Fourth, if a mailed article you insured ! has been lost or damaged, you need to pick up the claim forms at your local post office where the required procedures for filing claims will be explained to you. The same forms also are used for claims on registered. COD or Express Mail

Money orders offer another kind of insurance

"The Postal Service does not want its customers to send cash through the mail," adds Postmaster Nienaber. "If they do, the cash can't be insured. The safe answer is to purchase domestic money orders, available at all post offices in amounts up to \$700. If your money order is lost or stolen, present your customer receipt and it can be replaced.

Concerning Dr. Curtis's office above Huettner's Emporium, our research indicates that the original Huettner store was on the northeast corner of Broadway and Mary (Marie Street).

As noted on the 1914 map, Huettner's did own the comer property on the southwest side of Broadway.

It was occupied by a hotel at that time. Mr. Unverhau opened his pharmacy on the original site when Huettner's secured ownership and built on that site.

However, we could be wrong. Confirmation research will be done again. It is great fun to share and exchange these Hicksville historical antedotes with you.





Skate Long Island At Hicksville



In The Shadow Of a Veteran

Four thousand runners will rally outside the Mitchel Field Athletic Complex on Sunday, September 7 at 9:30 a.m. in the (Vietnam Memorial) 5 Mile Race, in which each runner will symbolize a Long Island veteran killed in action during the Vietnam War. The proceeds will help fund the Vietnam Veterans Resource Center in Hicksville, Long Island.

The race has been classified as a historical first, taking place on Long Island at the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum. Dennis McCoy, Race Coordinator has limited the field of runners to 4,000, which represents the number of Long Island veterans who were killed during Vietnam, according to Pentagon sources. The memorial service will commence at 7:30 a.m. on Sunday, September 7.

The service includes a fly-over by the 107 Tactical Fighter Wing, Michigan Air National Guard, and a religious service for our MIA's (Missing in Action) and KIA's (Killed in Action), led by various religious faiths throughout Long Island, and a 21 gun salute. A color guard representing 24 active veterans associations on Long Island will escort the runners to the starting line. 4,000 balloons, representing the veterans killed in action will be released prior to the start of the race by Chris Moeller, Jr., son of Chris Moeller. Opening remarks at the memorial service will be made by Francis T. Purcell, Nassau County Executive.

A fund raising dinner will be held the evening of the race at the luxurious main ballroom of the Marriott Hotel in Uniondale, Long Island. Corporate sponsors and contributors will pay \$150 per plate in which the proceeds will help fund the Vietnam Veterans Resource Center. The West Point Glee Club will perform at the dinner and the Postal Service will pay tribute to our veterans with a multi-image slide presentation "America".


Quaker Past And Present Interface Over Homestead By DAGMAR FORS KARPPI

The Town of Oyster Bay will be appealing the decision of Justice Stanley Harwood of the State Supreme Court. He has ruled that Friends Academy has won the right to dismantle the Jackson House in Jericho.

Not yet, says Town spokesperson Marlene Kastleman. The Town Landmark Commission will appeal the decision on two counts. First, said Ms. Kastleman, "we don't want the Town to lose control over changes that may be made to the house that will cause it to lose its Landmark status." Second, she said. "we feel that the Judge's decision as to the time frame to receive a 'complete application' is incorrect." It all happened in the early 1960s, when Jericho Turnpike was lifted to go over Rte. 106. Houses and stores were demolished.

History was sent packing. That loss is what is behind the desire of the people of Jericho to keep the Jackson House where it is. Perched on top of a hill overlooking a gas station and peering at a large modern shopping mall, it hides from the road behind a mass of shrubbery. The house in its way is as lovely as the modern office building is in its way.

When Miriam Jackson, owner of the house, died in 1982, she left the house to Friends Academy. The Friends would like to move the house to the Friends Academy property on Duck Pond Road. They would like to use it as a Quaker Museum. If they are able to move the house, they will sell the property to developer Jerry Spiegel for over (450.000.

Stay On Courts, Not Bench

By GLENN SHIEBLER

Even if you don't aspire to play tennis like John McEnroe or Chris Evert Lloyd, the difference between being a winner or a loser on the courts might very well be the time you take to warm up before the first serve.

Dr. Ellen Ellis, sports medicine physician at the New York College of Osteopathic Medicine of New York Institute of Technology, in Old Westbury, L.I., gives that advice to tennis players of all levels to insure that they are on the court more than on the sidelines. She recommends a five-minute acrobic or calisthenic warmup, followed by five or ten minutes of stretching before beginning play.

'Too many people go onto the court 'cold' and end up either injured or very sore," says Dr. Ellis.

She tells older people that they, especially, need 15 to 20 minutes of warmup and stretching because they tend to lose some of their flexibility with age.

Even athletes in good shape from other sports can suffer tennis injuries, Dr. Ellis warns, if they do not stretch the muscles needed for tennis. "Though a person may be in excellent shape for skiing, for example, he may not be ready to play an hour of rigorous tennis," she says.

John Braun, a registered physical therapist at the college, says: "It is necessary to stretch the calf muscles, hamstrings and quadraceps in the legs as well as the upper part of the body prior to even picking up a racquet.

"Use the net pole to stretch your legs by placing the heel on the top of the pole and lowering your forehead to your knee. To stretch the calf muscles, stand on the bottom step of a set of stairs and let your heels drop off the edge."

This stretch helps prevent Achilles' heel injury, another common and extremely painful tennis injury.

Mr. Braun says it is also important to stretch the elbows, wrists, neck and lower back. "The shoulder is another very vulnerable spot," says Dr. Ellis, "and must be stretched to avoid such serious injuries as rotator-cuff tears and tendonitis.

"Don't stretch an hour before you begin playing," she cautions. "Begin playing im-mediately after you stretch so your muscles don't get tight."

She recommends asking your tennis pro to help you establish a stretching routine.

He or she may be able to offer exercises or a weight-lifting program that, by strengthening parts of your body, can help prevent injuries.

Mr. Braun says being in good physical condition is the best defense against injury. He quotes a saying in his field that applies to not only tennis players, but all athletes: "You get in shape to play sports - you don't play sports to get in shape."

"Being properly equipped is also very im-portant in preventing injury." Mr. Braun Says. Have your racquet grip sized by someone who knows what he or she is doing and make sure the string tension is suited to your ability level and style of play.

Also, learn the proper form for the forehand, backhand, and serve. Improper form can lead to "tennis elbow" and strained muscles. "Too many people think they can pick up any racquet and go out and swat the ball back and forth without risk of injury," says Mr. Braun.

Tennis elbow is an inflammation of the area around the outside of the elbow and is usually a muscle strain. "The best way to describe tennis elbow," Mr. Braun says, "is to compare it to the result of thousands of repetitive taps with a hammer on the same spot."

A combination of variables can lead to tennis elbow, such as poor form, especially on the backhand; improper grip size; incorrect string tension, and the size of the racquet itself

"Many people use large or oversized racquets today, and the sweet spot - the spot where the racquet's string tension is ideal is located higher up on the racquet than on regular-sized racquets," says Mr. Braun. This can lead to tennis elbow because you may be hitting the ball on a weak part of the racquet, placing undue stress on your arm.

Once you begin to feel pain, stop playing immediately. "Otherwise you may miss a good part of the season," Dr. Ellis says.

In most cases, applying ice is the best way to treat tennis elbow and any other injury where there is inflammation. "Heat before you play and ice afterwards is the general rule," Mr. Braun says.

"Too many people feel they can play through the pain," says Dr. Ellis, "This can lead to a more severe injury because the body will send blood to the area in pain and give the player a false sense of relief."



The Chum Pot

Last week I took my fishing partner out to Captree to try one of the open boats, the Capt. Leitch. Well I guess the old timer outfished me again. When we were done we had 16 keeper flukes and 10 throw backs. It was a good day. The old timer was my Dad, I guess I taught him well. If you're thinking about going out flukeing, now is the time; fishing has been very good, especially on the flood tides. Fish from the five island inlet to the bridge and you can't miss. It does look like another body of small fish has arrived because a lot of shorts were caught. Flounder fishing surprisingly is still holding up in the deep holes, in fact the 4:30 trip out of Freeport has been doing real well. Crabbing has started at the town docks, Seaford and Freeport vicinity, they are still a little small. Snapper have started and are still small. Blue fishing has been great just about everywhere, in fact surf fishing for blues has been good at Bayville and Center Island beaches at high tide and daybreak. If you're going crabbing or flukeing, killies are still difficult to buy. I stopped at Causeway Bait and Tackle and got a pint of killies and was told they are small. Well he wasn't kidding, because I had a hard time finding their lips to put them on the hook. If you're going going crabbing, buy some uncooked chicken, it works great in the traps. Don't forget those flukes have to be 14" to keep. If you want to keep the small ones, it may cost you a \$50.00 fine, so let the little ones grow up.

As I promised last issue, here is a sure fire way to keep those snappers from stealing your bait and taking the hook.

Get a long shank snapper hook without the leader, if you have some already with leader just cut off the leader. Bait shops carry the hooks without leader. Also try to get the hooks without the bend at the top by the eye. Run the top part of the hook (the eye) through the spearing bait, starting at the tail and bring the eye of hook out the mouth. This is why it helps not to have a bend at the eye, it makes passing the hook through the bait a lot easier. Next put the eye on a snap swivel, to the swivel add about 8" of mono, then attach a small torpedo sinker. Now you are ready, just tie your line and add your float at the desired height. After catching a fish take the hook off the swivel and put on a new bait and you're ready to go again. Next issue, tieing those two hook flounder hooks. REMEMBER THROW THOSE LITTLE ONES BACK.
