

Frank (Francis) Sheridan, who grew up on McKinley Avenue, Hicksville, survived a harrowing plunge into the waters of Lake Michigan when the motor on his private Cessna 182 failed.

He was returning home from a flying vacation to the Rocky Mountain states with his friend and partner, Raymond Hanney of Floral Park, when the accident occurred.

Soon after takeoff on the final leg home from Chicago Airport, quick decisions were called for when the engine failed.

Sheridan spotted a space between two yachts sailing on Lake Michigan and ditched the disabled aircraft in rough water between the boats.

The plane fortunately did not flip over allowing a quick escape.

Departure from the plane was not without problems. On descending Sheridan followed the necessary escape procedure and checked both of the plane's doors.

However, on impact Sheridan's door jammed and he had to scramble to the other side as the waters rushed in.

Neither flyer was hurt. The plane sunk to the bottom of Lake Michigan some fifty-five feet below the surface.

There had been time to radio a distress call. Both were picked up by one of the nearby yachts and were quickly taken ashore by Chicago police.

With all luggage lost the two flew home on American Airlines. When the airline crew was appraised about the lack of luggage, royal first-class accommodations were extended. The two Long Islanders were treated royally.

Sheridan averted a disaster as he called upon all the skills acquired in twenty years of flying.

Graduating from Hicksville High School he assumed directorship of his father's live Maine lobster business supplying Long Island restaurants and fish markets.

He moved from that enterprise some years ago establishing an oil distributor business on Nassau's south shore.

Married to the former Madeline Naso of Hicksville he lives in Massapequa. They have four daughters and a son.






...Recently, as I was walking up and down the super clean aisles of the beautiful Publix supermarket in Florida-and wishing so much that I could have my market give the same wonderful service (bag boys at every check out and then boys to push the carts to the car, unload, and they are not even permitted to accept a tip!)---it's heavenly---but anyway, my thoughts drifted back to the grocery store that I went to with my Mother when I was little. Do you remember? . . . it was a place where self-service had not yet been invented. You went to the counter and the nice grocer "waited on" you. He went for each item that you needed-butter he cut from a large wooden tub filled to the brim and resting on a bed of ice-and he was always so pleased when he cut a chunk and it was almost exactly the two pounds you had ordered-it was a kind of game he played to see how close he could come...And then, the sugar was in a large barrel on the floor and was weighed out in a kind of scoop and carefully poured into a brown bag. The coffee was in burlap bags and you ordered it ground to your own taste-and the smell was delicious!... There was no weighing of bananas-they were sold by the dozen so it was smart to choose a hand with large bananas. . . And then if you wanted canned things or a box of cornflakes, the grocer had a long wand and it had a kind of "grabber" on the end and he could reach things even from the top shelf....The meat was in a different store-the butcher, not the grocer, sold meat. ... and how I remember that my Mother did not want the chuck chopped which was sitting already ground in the butcher's case-she wanted it freshly chopped, so, when she sent me to the store, she would say, "Tell the butcher one and a half pounds of chuck, and if he says, 'do you want it chopped?', you say, 'no-then he brings it out and weighs it, you say, 'Oh, I told you wrong, she does want it chopped -- and, although I never did it, I understand that some mothers sent along an onion to be chopped with the meat. ... I always liked to go to the butcher with my Mother because our butcher always had the pocket of his white butcher coat filled with thick slices of "small baloney"and no baloney ever tasted quite so good.


Oyster Bay Town Board approved construction of 25 mother-daughter, two family houses running east from South Broadway in a cul-de-sac. 



#### Zero Interest Bonds

We are in an unusual period of time in the financial marketplace. New investment products have been introduced in unprecedented numbers. Just to list them would exhaust our space. One of the most successful and innovative issues is zero-coupon bonds. They are offered in many varieties - U.S. Treasury, or ported, and municipal, and are sold under a wide variety of names.

Because the payoff is far into the future, you pay less for them. They are discounted according to a schedule that is determined by the interest rate of the bond and the time to maturity. The higher the interest rate and the longer the time, the deeper the discount. A 10% bond gives a deeper discount than an 8%, and 20 years a deeper discount than 10 years. The financial schedule is called the present value of a dollar.

Zeros increase in value each year because you get closer to your payoff. This increase is taxed by the IRS even though you received no cash dividend.

Are they safe investments? Yes, depending on the type you purchase: U.S. Treasury zeros are absolutely safe because at maturity U.S. government has guaranteed that the dollars will be paid. Municipals and corporates are as safe as the issuer. Incidentally, municipal zeros do not have the tax liability because they have the same rules as an outright purchase of municipals. Any risk attached to the zeros occurs if you have to sell them before maturity. They will be

redeemed according to the prevailing market place interest rate.

You might be asking yourself at this point, what good are the things if I do not receive interest, I pay taxes on the value increase, and it can fluctuate in value if interest rates change?

They are excellent vehicles for IRA's and Keogh's, and for financing a child's education. IRA's and Keogh's are tax deferred so the tax consequences are unimportant.

For a child's education, you gift the child the money - up to \$10,000 per person per year and buy zero U.S. treasuries in the child's name and under the child's social security number. The maturity dates are selected for the child's college years. The tax consequences are minimum (what other income do most children have?) and the payoff is assured.

You might ask - how deep are the discounts? An 8% - 11000 treasury bond which will mature in 15 years will cost about 1550 with all commissions. That's a deep discount. One last word — most brokerage houses require the purchase of five bonds of 10000 each. Also,

shop around among the brokerage houses - there is a difference in prices for the service. Finally, there is a Federal Savings bond that has a FSLIC government insured "INCA" - insured certificate of accrual — minimum investment 1:000, 5 year minimum, interest compounded daily (giving a higher yield) and no commission. Since I do not plug any company in these columns, send me a self-addressed stamped envelope and I will tell you where to get an "INCA".



"None of us ever expected to have to write fan Fleming's obituary so soon. It is a real shock, as if 'Tarzan' had died. It is really as if the grownups had Won because we all assumed, all the time, that Fleming thought he was James Bond...just as each of us did.


"We all sat back and worried about our cigarets and our extra drink and felt a little fatigued at the thought of love. Bond went ahead with all the things the grownups said were impractical: He smoked like Peter Lorre; drank like Humphrey Bogart; ate like Sydney Greenstreet; used up girls like Errol Flyun...then went out to a steam bath and came out looking like Clark Gable.

"It was all so reassuring that we never stopped to think that all these people are dead—until Fleming died. What he was was a facile writer who created the dumbest Secret Service agent in history. And he seemed to believe that brand names would forestall Fate.

"But to a lot of us, he was also a symbol of defiance of growing up....and when you're in your 40s, as most of Fleming's fans are, this becomes kind of a critical symbol.

"With Tarzan now a grandfather and Fleming dead, there is no one else in sight. The thing that scares us most about today's new heroes is that they are all too clearly mortal.

This letter to the Town of Oyster Bay Board of Appeals is addressed to "All Board of Appeals Members & Interested Parties:" It appears Weingarten Bros. (Robin Hood

Houses) are requesting an amendment on (Lot 244-Sec 45, Blk. 66).

It has been alleged that after the variance was issued and approved in 1985, they again requested and took the plans out of town hall and revised them again without another hearing or approval. Can this be done after a variance was issued?

They were permitted to erect a south side chimney, against the recommendation of the Director, Robt. V. Close P.E., Bureau of Air Quality Mgmt., Nassau Co. Dept. of Health. Wherein, my chimney top faces north of the new construction into their south window, where *fumes* and *soot* will enter.

I want the potential owners to be aware of these conditions before contract and certificate of occupancy is given.

Mr. Corbin received from me (a letter) via Certified Mail, regarding Mr. Weingarten cutting my fence with a saw, his contractor cutting branches off trees from my property overlapping this site. I either have been ruefully ignored or he just refuses to answer my letter; if this was considered "mischief, criminal conduct."

With little regard to our neighborhood, they have rented a small house for 11,200 a month to a group of what appears to be new immigrants, and unable to understand the laws. There are approximately 9 to 10 adults, 1 baby, occasionally 2 or 3 children (4 or 5 are women/4 or 5 are men). Approximately, it totals 15 people at times. Is this considered "slum lords" or "absentee landlords?" They are on the construction site often and talk to these people, so they must have knowledge of their presence.

I would appreciate this letter being presented and read by all Board of Appeals members, and at the public hearing, so whoever buys this property, and the taxpayers, are aware of the conditions appearing in the Town of Oyster Bay.

This letter gives me the opportunity to express my concern over the health of one family member who has a lung disease, and may be affected by these conditions, and the health and safety of my neighbors; as a taxpayer. I feel the town fathers are ignoring my plea or not even trying to follow up on these conditions.




## The Chum Pot

Fluking is still good, with the size improving every day. Captree area is excellent from the bridge to the inlet. Incoming and high tide seem to be the best times. Snappers are just about everyplace, with Jones Beach and Captree piers doing well. Crabbing has been hit and miss, some days doing better than others. Seaford area docks and piers seem to be doing well early a.m.s on incoming tides. Fluking from Seaman's Neck Park piers has been doing very well, using live killies. If you can't get out in a boat try this area; you will be surprised at the amount of fluke around here. Jones Beach area is getting bigger fluke, with the area of the Coast Guard Station to the inlet proving best. Try the sand bar across from the Coast Guard Station, just off the summer shacks.

Took a trip to Sandy Hook last week for some fluke fishing. New Jersey now has a 13" limit and that's about what we caught. Maybe now they will see some big fluke, since the small ones will have to be returned. Next year New Jersey goes to a 14" limit which will be the same as New York (it's about time).

While we are talking about limits, I hear that New York is going to put an 8" limit on flounders; this too is needed, since no one ever throws those little flounders back. Probably 10" limit would be better, but we shall see what happens in the future. Get those black fish rigs ready. In the coming issues there will be some tips for flounder fishing.

(Keep that bait long and flowing and throw those little ones back.)
