**Hicksville Woman
Killed By Motorcycle**
A 66-year-old Hicksville woman
was killed by a motorcycle while she
was crossing from south to north on
Old Country Road, 30 feet east of
Morgan Street.
Mary Maiorino of Evers St., Hicks
ville, and her husband, Peter, 72, had
tited a bus returning from Atlantic
City at approximately 10:20 p.m. on
Friday, Sept. 12. They were hit by the
westbound 1980 Harley Davidson
motorcycle driven by Leonard Mastro,
24, of Aldershot Lane, Manhasset.
Mrs. Maiorino was pronounced
dead at the scene. Her husband was
transported to Nassau County Med
ical Center for back and leg injuries.
Mr. Mastro, who suffered face and
head injuries, was also transported to
the medical center, and was issued a
summons for operating the motorcy
cle without a proper license. The
motorcycle was impounded by Nassau
County Police for a brake test.

**Hicksville Vamps Hazardous
Material Training**
The Hicksville Fire Department
Hazardous Materials Response Team
hosted a seminar for firefighters from
the tri-state area. The seminar, on Sun
day, Sept. 14, was given by Haz-Mat
Training Specialists from Safety Sys
tems of Jacksonville, Florida. The
training focused on handling
hazardous material leaks-spills and
fires. Control of hazardous materials
spills and leaks, many under pressure,
require the development of special
skills.
Most fire departments in recent

years have been faced with an increase
in hazardous materials accidents. The
Safety Systems Team has provided
valuable assistance for a small fee to
firefighters. The hands-on training
plus classroom discussion and theory
help Vamps sharpen their skills.
Over 100 paid and volunteer mem
bers took part in the eight-hour course
at Hicksville Fire Headquarters. The
Safety Systems Team is headed by Ron
Gore, Capt. of the Jacksonville, Fla.
F.D. Haz-Mat Team.

A True Story From Hicksville's Past

My father came to Hicksville in 1923 to work for a harness and saddle shop. During the 1st World War he was gassed and it was suggested that he settle down in a more rural area, rather than Brooklyn where he worked after the war. After a couple of years of working, he bought out the shop and became his own boss. The shop then was located where the present fire house is now. In 1931 he purchased a piece of land on what was then called Hicksville Jericho Road (now North Broadway) with all intentions of building a typical two-story building, with the shop on the first floor and living quarters on the second floor. He purchased the land free and clear at that time and shortly after that I was born. It was then my father decided to build the building to house his business and family, which now totaled five with my mother and two older brothers.

It was deep in the middle of winter in 1932 and deep in the middle of the Great Depression which started in 1929, when my father sought to obtain a loan from his bank, the Bank of Hicksville. With a set of plans he borrowed from a local townsman who had built a similar building on the other side of town, my father approached the president of the bank for a three thousand dollar loan. The bank president said, sure, the bank would loan him the money after making a title search of the property. My father who had owned the property for less than three years was upset that a new search would have to be made at a cost to him of \$50.00, which in those days was a large sum of money. He felt when he bought the property in 1929 and it was searched that another title search was not necessary. He had no liens or judgements against the property. Well, to say he was miffed was an understatement.

One day soon after the bank episode, a local farmer from Plainview came in to have some harness repaired, and as always there was local talk about this and that and then the story of the bank president and my father trying to obtain a loan. Well, this farmer became upset... He said to my father... "Bennie, don't worry, I'll loan you the money... I never liked those bank people anyway." Of course my father was flattered and thanked the man many times. Within two weeks, the old farmer came back and with much hesitation explained to my father that he couldn't loan him the money at this time... it was frozen. My father understood, figuring the money was tied up, not realizing until the farmer (showing much chagrin) explained, that his roof was leaking and water had gotten into the nail keg he carefully squirreled his hard-earned money into—not trusting the banks. He did, however, promise my father that after the spring thaw, and he could dry out the money, that he was more than welcome to it. With tongue in cheek and on the verge of laughter, my father thanked him warmly.

About two weeks later, the bank president sent his chauffeur to my father's shop and told him the bank had reconsidered having another search made. My father politely told the chauffeur to tell the bank president that he wouldn't need the money from the bank after all. The following spring my father managed to put the building up without having to borrow the money at all. My father was Ben (Bennie) Levitt, who remained in business in Hicksville until he died in 1955, at which time I took over the business and have remained here since... My name is Milt Levitt.

(Editor's Note: Mr. Ben Levitt was a highly respected and endearing man to all those who recall him in Hicksville. His son, Milton, told this charming story—and it is even better in the telling—at a small party following the Hicksville Alumni Spring Brunch. The assembled so enjoyed it, Milton was entreated to set it on paper.

It truly relates the nature of the times, when men forged the character of the community with mutual regard and assistance. And it is a gift of friendship and concern that so many of us have treasured over the years, as continued by Mr. Ben Levitt's son.)

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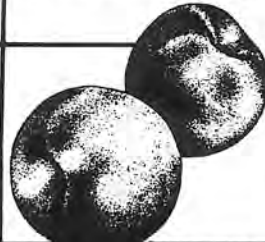

A Letter from Lulabelle...

Today I want to talk about a time earlier than mine—about when my Mother was a young girl in a tiny Long Island town. She left school after graduating from the eighth grade in a school with four rooms, two grades to a room—(when I was explaining to her about one of the recent educational theories about the open classroom and kids moving from one subject to another as they could, she said, "Oh, that's just how it was in my school—I always did the reading with the grade ahead.")—and then she went to work as a bookbinder in a local publishing company. She rode to work on a trolley and one of the big concerns was, would the trolley drop them off in front of the publishing company for their nickel fare, or would they have to get out a block earlier, which was the end of the nickel zone. . . . After what sounds like an early "sit-in," the trolley decided to extend the zone to the front of the publishing company. . . . But what I remember most from my Mother's stories is the importance of dancing in the social life of these little town young people. . . . Apparently there was dancing in some hall a couple of times a week and the fee was 2¢ which included the coffee and cake. . . . and there seems to have been some sort of live music most of the time—usually by talented members of the community. . . . Everyone came, not just the young, and babies were put to sleep on chairs around the dance floor—dancing was not just for the unmarried either. . . . Many people have told me that my five foot tall ninety-eight pound Mother was the best dancer in the village, and it sounds as if she was very popular as a partner and teacher of some of the farm boys from the nearby potato farms. . . . When they went to dances in towns which were several miles away, they always walked home because the last trolley stopped much too early and they were unafraid. . . . My Mother and Father actually met at one of these little village dances. . . . There was a marathon dance and my Father and the girl he was dancing with won first prize and my Mother and her fellow won second prize, and the judges suggested that they change partners. . . . and they danced away and right on to the altar. . . . so you can see how important dancing was in those days!!

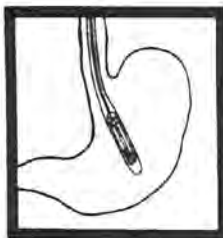

To the Editor:

Giese Park Property

On Friday, September 5th, I attended the general membership of the Hicksville American Soccer Club which was held at the Hicksville High School. At this meeting the club president, Kevin Reardon, spoke to the members on the status of the Giese Park Property. As stated by Mr. Reardon, "this property is a vacant piece of land which I feel the local residents want to stay that way. They don't even want a children's play area or senior citizen housing."

I hope, Mr. Reardon, that you made this statement because you are uninformed on the issue and not for any other reasons. I also hope the following will both clarify and update the issue for you and the members of HASC as well as other interested parties.

On April 13th, 1986, residents of the Hicksville community met at Giese Park and widely accepted plans to develop the park. These plans included a soccer field, a children's play area, a leisure area and an off street parking facility. At this time it was completely feasible that such a park could have been constructed without any opposition from the community. It was only when the Town of Oyster Bay officials were adamant, for reasons unknown, about constructing an overdeveloped soccer complex that the residents united to protect

their interests.

At subsequent civic association meetings, viable alternatives for the development of the property have been discussed and reported on in local newspapers. Among these alternatives is senior citizen housing. Be advised that at the current time I am awaiting contact from officials of the Rockville Centre Diocese to discuss a senior citizen housing project for the site.

In closing I would like to add that at your meeting it was stated that the opposition to the kind of park you would like to see developed was coming from only about 30 people in the area and that because the membership of the HASC was higher that they should be able to get the kind of park that they wanted. Be advised that in no way can the membership of the Giese Park Civic Association match that of the HASC, which includes members from outside the Hicksville community. Currently the GPCA has a membership of over 80 families, families like your own and your members who only wish to create a better community and to peacefully coexist with our neighbors. It just so happens, Mr. Reardon, that Giese Park is the neighbor to many families and as you can see it is our sincerest desire to see this property developed with the best interests of the Hicksville community.

Rep. Lent is married to the former Barbara Morris of Troy, New York. He has three children: Norman III, Barbara Anne and Thomas.

Opening lead — ten of hearts

Guess situations perplex, confound and bewilder many a bridge player, but anyone you know who guesses right a high percentage of the time is not just being lucky. If you see this happening repeatedly, it's dollars to doughnuts the player knows what he's doing.

Here is a typical case. South is in five diamonds and West leads a heart. The contract is unsound, since there are three losers, but far from hopeless once a heart is led.

South wins with the jack and draws two rounds of trumps. Then he cashes the A-K of hearts, after which he plays a spade to force the opponents to lead clubs.

Let's say East wins the first spade with the jack and the second one with the king. He has to lead a club now; otherwise, declarer will obtain a ruff and discard and make the contract. So he leads the three of clubs.

South now has a crucial decision to make. He must guess whether to play the ten or the queen. If he guesses right, he makes the contract; if not, he goes down.

If he thinks East has the jack and West the king, he plays the ten. If he thinks East has the king and West the jack, he plays the queen. (Of course, he realizes that if either defender has both honors, his play makes no difference.) The situation is not really a guess if South gives the matter proper consideration. He should play the ten.

The reasoning is fairly simple. South assumes that if East had the king of clubs, the defenders would have arranged for West to win the second spade and lead a club.

But since they failed to do this, it follows that West has the king. Once declarer arrives at this conclusion, he cannot gain by playing the queen. Only the ten play gives him a chance to make the contract.

House Calls

Seller Paying Points

Dear Edith: We are putting our house on the market and our real estate agent was vague about who pays what. I realize that anything can be negotiated, but if the buyer gets an FHA mortgage, does the seller have to pay all the points? — Mrs. C.P.

Years ago, both the VA and the FHA stipulated that the borrower (buyer) could be charged only one point. Any other points were to be paid by someone else, usually the seller.

Today, the VA still sticks to that regulation. The FHA, though, has changed its policy. With an FHA loan, the question of who pays what points may be freely negotiated by buyer and seller along with the sale price.

Checking The Bank's Figures

Dear Edith: When the bank adjusts my interest rate on November 1, my papers say the interest rate will be calculated by adding two percentage points to an index. The index is "the weekly average yield on United States Treasury Securities adjusted to a constant maturity of one year as made available by the Federal Reserve Board". Where do I find the index value as of that date so that I can calculate and check the bank's figures? — Mr. H.S.

The figure you want is published in the business section of many newspapers. Look for "One-year T-bills".

Banks have been known to make mistakes, and you are wise to plan on checking the interest rate adjustment yourself.

Family Joint Ownership

Dear Edith: I would like to buy a building with my parents who are in their 60s. Is there a tax break for family joint ownership? If the building was purchased in my name would I have to reside there? — Ms. N.M.

The IRS has no special tax treatment for family members who buy real estate together. Owner occupancy is a requirement for a few types of mortgage loans, but not for others.

Off To London

Dear Edith: We may be transferred to London soon. We would sell our home and would like to postpone payment of capital gains tax. In a few years we could be back here buying another home. I know the time limit for buying a replacement residence is two years. Does that apply if we are living out of the country? — Mrs. T.W.

IRS publication #523, "Tax Information on Selling Your Home," is free for the asking. Call 1-800-424-1040 and ask for a copy to be sent to you.

The pamphlet says the two-year replacement period can be extended as much as another two years while you have your tax home (place where you live and work) outside the United States.

Financing Her Building

Dear Edith: I have a parcel of land that cost \$15,000, paid for in full. I want to build a house estimated to cost \$85,000 on this property, and I will put \$40,000 cash into the building. I have contacted a few banks and savings & loans about borrowing the rest and have had no luck. Please advise. — Ms. W. O'M.

It can be next to impossible to have a bank finance construction unless you are working through a recognized contractor. If you are, the builder should be able to help arrange financing.

Some self-contractors have solved the problem by establishing as many credit card lines of credit as possible, and borrowing to the hilt on them. You'll pay a high rate of interest, but when the house is completed and okayed for occupancy you can apply for a regular mortgage loan and pay off the other debts.

Does a landlord have the right to enter the tenant's apartment? Nassau Sports Review

The Executive Directors of Nassau and Suffolk High School athletics, Bernie O'Brien and Catherine Gallagher, have requested that the New York State Public High School Athletic Association consider a restructuring which would make Long Island a "Region" in state playoffs. Currently, the Southeast Region includes Nassau, Suffolk and Westchester. This means that a "Long Island Championship"—a goal of officials from both counties—is not played in all sports each year.

Suffolk has threatened to withdraw from state tournaments and is expected to make a final determination on that issue later this year. There has been considerable criticism of the effect that state tournaments have on regular season play. Seasons are begun earlier and end early for many teams while lengthy playoffs are held for a few talented teams. There is also the feeling that county championships are losing the considerable importance and attention they once commanded. Last year one upstate high school refused to enter the state basketball tournament after winning its sectional title. The team decided it didn't want to end its season on a losing note since its goal was to win its sectional crown.

There is no doubt that Nassau and Long Island championship games would take on added interest if they were once again the culmination of a season. Football officials are hopeful that within a short time Nassau and Suffolk will have a similar league structure which will allow the first Long Island Championships in football.

State officials desperately want Nassau and Suffolk to remain in the inter-sectional tournaments. They have placed the restructuring proposal on the agenda of the next Executive Committee meeting scheduled for October 24, 25. Let's hope that they will follow public opinion and make Long Island Championships an annual event in all sports. That compromise could keep Sections Eight and Eleven in the state tournaments.

Year 1937 Sports Talk

Credit Hicksville High School with another football victory, its fourth this season against three setbacks. Also charge Baldwin's Blue and Gold gridiron juggernaut with a defeat, its only loss of the campaign in five starts. Why? Referee Larry Lobaugh has finally spoken and, as all close followers of the pigskin game know, a referee's decision is final.

After a month's discussions pro and con among fans, players, coaches, officials and writers, the ill-fated game of September 25 between Hicksville and Baldwin got a final airing Monday night at a meeting of the Long Island Association of Football Officials. Lobaugh, who refereed the contest, was not present, but Wallace S. Girling, president of the organization, had a letter of full explanation on hand.

As most everyone knows by this time, Baldwin left the field of play against Hicksville, but agreed to resume sometime later. The officials had forfeited the contest to the Orange and Black, but continued the game nevertheless. Newspapermen, given no official statement on the game, ran it as a 25 to 2 decision for Baldwin, which has since captured four in a row and is one of the three teams in advantageous position for the coveted Bacon trophy.

Strong opposition to the action of the official in charge of the game arose in some quarters, with the result that individuals started investigations and then demanded a showdown on whether the contest should go as a 1 to 0 victory for Hicksville, or a 25-2 win for Baldwin. The matter was dropped in the lap of the Association of Football Officials, which asked Lobaugh to make a statement.

Lobaugh's letter, although not read in the presence of newspapermen and coaches present at Monday night's meeting of officials, was read by a member of the Nassau County Sports Writers' Association and was in part made known publicly by Duke Wellington, secretary-treasurer of the officials' group.

In his letter Lobaugh expressed the opinion that the game should be forfeited to Hicksville, 1 to 0, since the rules definitely state that a forfeit game cannot be continued and counted as a regularly played contest. He also stated that he had forfeited the game to Hicksville and that the only reason he agreed to continue after the delay of one hour was to avoid possible embarrassment for the coaches involved.

All of this means that Hicksville, no matter how distasteful this new victory may be, must accept it, for the referee's decision, don't forget, is final. It also means that Baldwin must change its record book, or should, at least, along with the statisticians on the county's newspapers, and all other journals involved.

Should Baldwin be in the Bacon trophy discussion set for after Thanksgiving Day, it will be interesting to note how the committee members will react to the 1 to 0 defeat. The only way Baldwin can figure is to down Hempstead and Lawrence. In that event, however, all will still have defeat. The big question now is: "Will the committee hold the forfeiture against Baldwin?" And, of course, the trophy goes to the most outstanding team.

Never Accepted

Hicksville High School Athletic Director and Football Coach, Mr. E. Parker Yutzler, never accepted the 1937 forfeit victory awarded to the Orange and Black. It has been carried on the Hicksville record as a loss, and he directed Baldwin to record it in the victory column.

It was the code of a gentleman of the game who went into the Baldwin locker room and convinced Coach George Craig to retake the field. Craig had pulled his players after a blow-up with the referee. Yutzler implored Craig not to hurt the championship chances of the Baldwin players and not to ruin a football afternoon for the 2,000 fans in the stands.
