
State 4-H Award To Scott J. O'Callaghan



It would seem that the Assembly lines jump around quite

often and that is what we referred to.

Submitted below are the particular limited sections of Hick-

sville represented by Dan Frisa.

The bulk of Mr. Frisa's constituency is in Westbury and central Nassau. As a historical, geographical point, Salisbury is a development of homes whose residents wanted a distinctive name


Salisbury is almost directly across from Holy Rood Cemetery. The area's identity has gone from Westbury, to South Westbury and now to Salisbury. Most of it is really in East Meadow. It is in the East Meadow School District.

Mr. Yevoli has a chunk of Hicksville; but the main body of his concern is Glen Cove to Old Bethpage, including the bulk of his strength in Plainview.

There is no confusion also that this campaign to rejuvenate

The map depicts the part of Hicksville Carle Place and New Castle. When added to the chunk taken from for part of the Plainview-Glen Cove Assembly District, the claim of deliberate weakening of Hicksville political power is not minimal.

Hicksville is represented by three Assemblymen, not four as you indicated. My two colleagues who represent part of Hicksville are Dan Frisa from Salisbury (not Westbury) and Lewis Yevoli from Old Bethpage (not Glen Cove). There are no legislators from Levittown or Seaford representing Hicksville. Your confusion results from the fact that I live in Wantagh and my district office is in Levittown.

While this configuration might seem to "artfully" shortchange Hicksville to utilize your language, it is noteworthy that I represent roughly 90% of Hicksville and Senator Marino represents virtually 100% of the community. This is not "carving" as you indicated in your release.

I can only state that I try to represent and work for Hicksville's residents as if they were my home town neighbors. The "visual pollution" disturbs me deeply as do the state cutbacks in personnel by Albany, each of which has contributed to the problem on our roadways.

The attached letter to the Regional Director of the Department of Transportation is not my first effort to clean-up 107. I have written every year for better maintenance. Last year, we prevented the state from taking residential property on Nevada Street at Routh 106. Furthermore, the State hafinally agreed to replace shrubbery-greenery along Newbridge Road.

Quite obviously, much more needs to be done! I hope that you will continue to work for the community.

Having just completed my annual walk to every residence in Hicksville for the tenth time, I recognize the justified concern of my constituents and I assure you they have given me a host of problems to pursue.

In the 18 Sept. 86 issue the picture of the Hicksville football team sitting next to Dr. Stillger is Domminic Sabatello whose family had a candy store on Nichali Street across from the theatre and next to the Masonic Temple. Also noted #18 supporting a shiner that he received in a brawl in a game against Valley Stream. He was hit in the eye with a water bucket a few games earlier. Although I'm not in the picture it just happens that Leo Ruggiero and I were the water boys for the team. The Pony Express as they were called consisted of Dick Rennie, Harold Mayer, and Pete Dehmorg (that isn't the correct spelling) who lived in the section of town called Hollywood south of the High School now called the Junior High School.

This club was later sponsored by The Hicksville Fire Department. When the war started all clubs were disbanded. That is World War II.

Many of those pictured went to war and never returned and I made a promise to myself that I would dedicate a memorial to those who were less fortunate. The memorial trophy was given to Miss Mabel R. Farley to be awarded to the outstanding student. It didn't necessarily have to be a graduating senior and the student body elected whose name would appear. The person had to be a scholar as well as an athlete. That was in the June class of 1946. Now whatever happen to the award? This award was a tradition for a very long time and over the years lost contact with those in town.

Howard I remember when you came to live in Hicksville you carried your school books like the Statue of Liberty.

If someone wanted to subscribe to your fish wrapper nowhere in the paper does it say what it costs.

When you go back into the history of Hicksville the Professional Bldg. was the tallest building in town and was built by "Red" Hicks the contractor. He also was the contractor who put the tower or steeple on St. Ignatius Church. The school by the church was built by donation and it was fully paid for when the last stone was in place. The Allen family had the most kids in school at one time (10).







declarer must guess whether to play the queen or the nine from dummy.

If he thinks West has the ten, South plays the nine, if he thinks West has the ace, South plays the queen. Many players think that the card which declarer should play from dummy in this situation is an out-and-out guess. However, this is not

Without going into the mathematical details of why the right play is the queen, the fact is that in a long series of cases where declarer's play matters—assuming there are no clues to indicate otherwise—the queen plays is successful approximately twice as often as the nine play.

These odds presuppose that West is a first-rate defender who would not go up with the ace if he originally held Axx, Axxx, or Axxxx of spades. He would follow low to give declarer a chance to go wrong. He would also follow low each time if his spades were headed by the king instead of the ace.

Actually, the only pertinent cases are those where East holds the A-10, K-10, or A-8 of spades. The first two cases together occur twice as often as the last case, and that is why the odds are 2-to-1 in favor of playing the queen on the second round of the suit.

A Letter from Lulubelle ...

whenever I think of studying history in the lower grades of kindergarten, first, and second grade, I think of Indians...Indians were very important to us and we really spent time learning about their lives...As early as the kindergarten, in the classroom sandbox, we made Indian villages...I can remember making tepees from a half circle of construction paper-we covered the paper with what we understood to be Indian representations of lighting (jagged lines), the sun (a circle with rays), and rivers (several wavy lines)...We fastened them with glue and had small sticks protruding from the tops...We made rivers, and many canoes, and whole forests for our one-dimensionally drawn Indians to hunt in...Of course they had bows made from sticks and arrows from toothpicks...and every kid in the class had an Indian war bonnet—a headband sprouting feathers of paper carefully crayoned in many colors... In our class, we were all chiefs and had a full war bonnet of feathers...We read books about Indians and drew many pictures, and we made Indian pots of clay which we dried on the classroom windows in the sun, and then we painted them in real "Indian" fashion...We read stories about Indians and we were all properly astounded at their ability to track animals—and people—and we even learned to make Indian jewelry from tiny beads and thin wire—I still remember how to do it!...We probably had a rosily painted picture of life among Indians because I remember when I read Mackinlay Kantor's "Spirit Lake" as an adult, I was still rather astonished to read that the Indians were often dirty and smelly and cruel to prisoners...! had remembered only that they were brave and fierce—and badly treated by the white man... Quit-Claim Deed

Dear Edith: My wife's parents sold us a house with a quit-claim deed and we never understood just what it means, it never understood just what it means, it all seemed too easy, considering we were actually buying a house. We would feel ungrateful questioning them in any way on this, but I have looked up quitchin deads in legal reference books at the library and all seem to advise against buying with them.

Do my in-laws get an advantage from seiling us the house this way? If we got a divorce, or one of us died, would it make for a problem? Could her purents re-claim the house, or interfere? These questions have bothered us for quite some time.—Mr. A.A.

A quit-claim deed transfers to you whatever ownership your in-laws had. If they were clear owners of the property, you now are yourselves. They didn't retain any claim to ownership, now or in the future.

It's customary for transfers between family members to use a quit-claim deed. The process is simple and uncomplicated, and there's no reason to suspect anything out of the or-

Buying from strangers, you'd want a differ-ent deed, containing all sorts of promises and guarantees about the seller's complete ownership of the property.

Brothers Selling Homestead

Dear Edith: I recently sold my con-dominism and plan to take advantage of the one-time tax enemption. I am over 55 and owned the place the required number of years.

. My hunther and I inherited a house several years ago, which he resides in.

When we sell that house, will be be allowed to take that over-55 exemption on his half of the profit? I know a spouse can lose the exemption even if they never used it; does this apply to relatives also?-Mr. D.E.

No, it doesn't.

Spouses sign joint tax returns; you and your brother don't. The fact that you used the onetime tax exemption won't affect your brother's right to it.

The IRS will treat the sale of that homestead as if it were two separate transactions. You'll owe tax on your share of the profit. On his half, your brother can use the senior citizen's special home seller's tax ex-








As a result of the county sewer project. many of the lovely trees on Newbridge Road were removed in August 1982 At that time Assemblyman Parola, joining with civic leaders of Hicksville and Phyllis Garvin of Levit town, was able to cease the destruction and save six of the trees which remain to this day.

The impasse to the restoration of greenery has been the state regulation that trees may no longer be planted on medians due to the fact that as they mature, any vehicle strikeing them will receive maximum destruction since trees on impact do not "give"

Under the agreement, the state will spend 15,000 for large tree-like bushes consisting of California Privet, Welgela, Red Stern Dogwood and Viburnum. They will be planted at locations which will not interfere with visibility but will restore "greenery" to our endangered suburban environment

The work will commence in the planting season next year and be completed by the




