## NYIT-Anton Newspaper Scholarship Deadline Set For Mon., April 20

All entries for the \$5000-4 year scholarships being offered by New York Institute of Technology and each of the Anton Community Newspapers must be postmarked no later than April 20, 1987.

The scholarships made available by NYIT are offered to any June 1987 graduate in any community serviced by one of the Anton papers. The criteria for awarding the scholar-ships are high academic achievement and school and community service including service to church or temple. All of those selected must meet the requirements for admis-

vice to church or temple. An or those selected must meet the requirements for admis-sion to NYIT. They must be planning to attent as full-time day students. NYIT offers more than 80 programs of study ranging from communication arts to science and engineering technologies. The scholarships do not apply to the medical program of Osteopathic Medicine, to the Chiropractic College, or to the culinary arts program.

The judges for the scholarships will be Richard Ornauer, president of Nassau BOCES since its organization and also vice-president of the New York State School Boards Association: Grace Anton, education editor for Anton Community Newspapers; and for each community, the editor for the paper serving that area.

Hicksville taxpayers since on balance it represents a shifting of past activities. Hicksville taxpayers and citizens have always supported a sound competitive

athletic program. Parents who have experienced that college and university scholarship awards go to students whose good academics are backed up by athletic competition as well as other leadership qualities, are pleased with the program advanced.

This is a personal letter from a graduate of an independent college. It is also a letter from a father of two sons whose college tuitions cost one-third of his salary. In many ways, it is a letter of indignation and retaliation against our national Secretary of Education, William Bennett who asks members of congress, senators, state legislators, governors and all public policy makers, if you will, to make public policy judgments about the worth of independent colleges and the students who attend them based on anecdotal stories about kids vacationing in Florida, buying stereos and cars, and simultaneously griping about the cuts in student financial aid. This is a rebuttal to him, and to all who insist in the face of facts and evidence to the contrary that government grant aid to students results in higher tuition and who discount the value of education by comparing it to the cost of consumable goods which are savored and consumed a short time after being purchased.

Yes, college tuitions are increasing again. Yes, tuitions are again rising above the Consumer Price Index. But, what does this really mean?

A college education is not a consumable good such as a candy bar, a stereo or a car. It is an investment in one's life and one's worth. It is the most durable good we can purchase, and, if we must compare the cost of education with the cost of any other durable good, be assured that college is a bargain.

In 1961, I bought three things: a car, a television and a year at Syracuse University's Maxwell School. I paid 1100 for my television, 11,200 for my car and and 11,000 for my year at Maxwell. In 1980 I purchased the same three items. My car cost \$15,000 (1150% more than in 1961), my television 4600 (500% more than in 1961) and one of my son's tuition at the University of Rochester, \$10,500 (550% more than in 1961). Tuition costs appear to hold their own.

A fair comparison? In Secretary Bennett's terms, yes. In my terms, no. One very crucial observation is missing. The car I purchased in 1061 was junked 4 years later. My television set did not survive the numerous moves my family and I made over the years. In fact, I have purchased seven cars and eight television sets since toot. The college education, however, is still with me, and it has enabled me to increase my economic worth every year since 1061 and give the gift of college to my children.

My college experience made it possible for me to change occupations when opportunities arose, assess public policy intelligently, analyze the state budget, enjoy music and ballet, and understand the impact that education can have on people who are today in the same situations as I was then. Each day my college education rewards me either monetarily through my job or esoterically through my ability to understand and create an enriched environment for myself and my children. So, when I think of those three things I purchased in 1961; my car, my television and my college education, I realize only one-my education-continues to impact and add value to my life 25 years later.

Mr. Bennett has been very successful in diverting all of us from looking at the critical public policy issue of making college affordable and accessible to our citizens. He has also successfully raised questions in many citizens' minds as to the worth of a college education. He has used anecdotes to support his case, as I have today, and he has dissuaded too many young people, parents and elected officials from viewing a college education as their most important life-time investment. More importantly, he has made us doubt the need for government funded student financial aid programs. This move appalls me.

So, I, a relatively successful man who could not have gone to college without the help of the Korean GI Bill, ask you to pause and think about a college eduation in terms of its present costs versus the lifetime payback to individuals and society. I ask you, would you give up your college education and the influence and impact those years have had on your lifet If you were unable to attend college, would you have gone if the opportunity had been available? Finally, would you, as a public policy maker, devise state and federal programs which deny your children the opportunity to attend college so they are equipped for a lifetime of rewarding work?

The point is that, the cost of college cannot be compared to candy bars, stereos, televisions or cars. The latter are all consumable goods. A college education is a durable good with worth and value that increases throughout one's lifetime. Colleges are the lifeblood of our society and the engines powering our economy. They are the places we learn to think about ourselves, our goals, our values and our relationship with society. Colleges are the places we develop not just the business, cultural and social leaders of tomorrow, but the human resources that will enable all citizens who partake to reap the rewards that come from meaningful and productive work. Whether public or independent, colleges and universities and the students they serve deserve the financial and moral support of our government.

Beginning April 13, 6,000 homes in the Plainview-Old Bethpage area of the Town will have an opportunity to make a significant impact on our environmental future. They are the residents who will pave the way

for a future town-wide recycling program. Recycling is the official policy of New York State Department of Environmental Conser vation and is strongly endorsed within the Town by R.A.G.E., a Plainview-Old Bethpage civic association. Over the last few months that organization has met with Town per-sonnel to assist in the development of guidelines for implementation of the pilot recycling program in their area. As a key element in our solid waste

disposal plan, the program will remove glass bottles, metal cans and newspapers from the waste stream. While there are various figures being cir-

culated on how much of the waste stream can actually be recycled—from the data col-lected in the Town of Islip's program which found a reduction of as low as 3% to a 50% goal by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation—the Town's program will give us a true, accurate picture since its data will be from a typical Oyster Bay neighborhood community. Garbage statistics are mind-boggling. Ac-

cording to the United States Environmental Protection Agency we throw away 200 million tons of garbage every day, or about 5 pounds per person per day. Each year, Americans dispose of approximately 60 billion cans, 28 billion bottles, 4 million tons of plastic, 40 million tons of paper, 100 million tires and 3 million cars.

A reduction in the waste stream through recycling can help to conserve natural

resources; because recycling is a labor intensive activity, it can maintain or create jobs.


The United States is dependent on many foreign countries for raw materials. Tin, aluminum, wood pulp and oil are just a few. The only domestic source of tin that we have is the tin can, so the more tin cans we can recycle the less we need to import.

Oyster Bay's pilot recycling program, being conducted in a highly motivated com-munity, will give us a factual picture of what we can hope to accomplish when we in-

## Town Board Tells State They Approve Additional Firefighter Coverage

The Oyster Bay Town Board unanimously voted to authorize a home rule message to be sent to the New York State Legislature in support of legislation which would grant additional insurance coverage with respect to death and/or dismemberment for local firefighters.

Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Joseph Colby said, "this bill will provide added insurance for members, officers and employees of cor-porations who are injured or killed in the line of duty.

## Gratitude To Men

Colby expressed strong sentiments in ex-plaining that, "this is a golden opportunity for the Town, on behalf of its residents, to demonstrate its gratitude to those men and women who give so much of their time and who constantly place their lives in jeopardy for the sake of others. It also means an added measure of financial security for their families."

The adoption of a home rule message is required by the town as a first step toward state passage of the bill since municipalities are not empowered to authorize supplement insurance coverage without an act of the New York State Legislature.



## The Investor's Corner

#### **The Retirement Annuity**

These products are not new. They have been around as long as the insurance companies have been in existence. They are called by many names we will call it the single premium immediate annuity to distinguish it from types we will discuss in subsequent articles. They are used to provide retirement income.

articles. They are used to provide retirement income. The demand for these products will increase as we get older and retire earlier. Simply, this product is purchased by giving the life insurance company a lump sum in return for an assured monthly payment. The payoff depends on which options you choose. When people retire, they no longer have steady wages. You may have a pension, social security and savings. The house is paid for or has a manageable mortgage. You probably will have a huge equity in it if you were fortunate enough to have purhased it when you were young. Clearly, at this stage in our life, we do not need life insurance, we need in-come structure. come assurance.

Social security will provide a modest income, but not much more than a life of genteel

proverty. For the majority, our retirement income will come from a company pension plan. This will be supplemented by or IRAs, CDs, stocks and other investments. Company retirement plans usually offer two options - a lump sum payoff or a set pay-ment (annuity). The decision can be a difficult one. What you do is a personal decision.

It depends upon your wealth, health and your spouse. With a lump sum settlement, you can pay the taxes up front and invest the net proeeds. You can also roll your payment into an IRA and defer the taxes. This will then follow all the IRA rules, exactly the same as your \$2000 annual payment. When the time comes for that decision, an accountant or tax advisor is very helpful.

If you worked for the company a short time, the payoff will be small, the effect on your income minimal. If you have worked for a long time, the payoff can be extremely large. The prospect of the lump sum is less attractive, even with income averaging. You will probably seek some type of tax-favored source of income, usually an annuity with an immediate payment.

If you are a knowledgeable investor, you are fortunate. If you have a well-informed, honest broker or investment advisor, you are blessed. This provides an alternative to the employer-provided pension annuity

In making your decision between the pension annuity and a lump sum rollover into an annuity, compare the monthly income to be provided. Company plan options are usually ilmited. Insurance company plans usually provide more favorable options and a greater payoff. A ten percent (10%) difference is not unusual. One feature you must look forward to is some protection from inflation; some index-ne to an inflation force. There are hard to find inflation is for a file to be an index-

ing to an inflation factor. These are hard to find. Inflation is a fact of life. It is not licked. It probably will get worse. What may be a very substantial retirement income, may only provide a modest standard of living if you live a long time. This happened to my father who lived for more than 20 years after he retired.

The lump sum rollover into an annuity may be the preferred alternative. Check your options and decide. Discuss it with your accountant, broker and investment advisor. Check with your spouse and then decide.

The number of high tech nonmanufactur-ing employees in New York has nearly dou-bled since 1980, to about 10,700 workers in 1985, Computer programming and softwared firms account for 84 percent of this expan-sion, adding 6,500 jobs, chiefly in New York City and on Long Island.





The long basketball season is history and all that is left is to add up the vic tories and total the points scored. A young woman from Roosevelt-Hyde Park High School named Karen O'Connor scored 48 points in consecutive tournament games to complete a four year varsity career with over 2,600 points, more than any boy or girl ever scored in New York scholastic history.

O'Connor is a 5'9" guard with great ball handling and shooting ability. "She's the best basket ball player in the state," said her coach Bob Holmes. "I have the best one-man fast break in New York. Karen shoots over 60 percent and
