Parola Announces Budget Appropriation For Hicksville Library

The Hicksville Public Library will receive an \$11,000 legislative grant in the new state budget for its local history project as a result of the efforts of Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh).

"Since 1976, the Hicksville Library has collected and organized items of local history. This grant will help the library to continue to gather material, index its collection of local documents and newspapers, and house the considerable amount of research material presented to the library by local historian, Richard Evers," Mr. Parola said.

According to Hicksville Library Director Kenneth Barnes, the library currently possesses several thousand photos, documents, newspaper items and memorabilia pieces regarding local history.

In addition, nearly 60 long-time area residents have been interviewed on video tape, and tapes have also been made of local town and school board meetings and community activities. These tapes will be preserved on video cassettes through this appropriation.

Mr. Parola stated that the library's collection will be merged with the work of Richard Evers, who has taught Hicksville history in local schools and lectured in colleges for over 30 years. Mr. Evers will soon complete a revision of his "History of Hicksville," first published in 1961 and then plans to turn his research materials over to the library.

"The entire community, including our local school students, will benefit from this local history project. As Long Island grows older and our residents become more interested in their local heritage, this project will become an invaluable source of information on the history of the Hicksville community," Mr. Parola concluded.

Civic Groups Protest Infectious Waste Site

Members of local civic groups will band together in a "human barricade" to protest the storage of infectious waste material at the

American Medical Waste Systems unless a number of state and local health codes are met, according to Kathy Del Rosso, president of the Duffy Park Civic Association.

At a recent meeting of the Duffy Park Civic, Mrs. Del Rosso presented pictures and a video which revealed potentially infectious hospital waste products at the AMWS site at 344 Duffy Ave., Hicksville, formerly V & J Rubbish Removal, Inc., which she said poses a threat to local residents. Members of other local civic groups including Glese Park, Northwest and Midland were also concerned over the evidence that Mrs. Del Rosso presented.

Mrs. Del Rosso said that AMWS temporarily stores and transports such things as red plastic bags containing intravenous containers, tubes, and other related material. She also claims that the wastes are being handled improperly and in an unsafe manner. Mrs. Del Rosso said that the residents are concerned about "airborne viruses" which could also pose a threat to students at Old Country Road and Burns Avenue Elementary Schools as well as visitors of Cantigue Park. She also mentioned that employees handling the wastes were not wearing protective gear. AMWS has made no visible effort to alleviate the resident's concern, Mrs. Del Rosso said. Civic members will block the entrances and prohibit trucks containing infectious wastes from entering the premises unless AMWS does something she added. "We address the quality of human life. The issue of infectious medical wastes must be solved. It must be done with legitimate integrity and supreme regard for human existence," Mrs. Del Rosso also said that AMWS has shown disregard for violations with the Nassau County Health Department and the Department of Environmental Conservation for lack of applying for permits for the type of business they are conducting.

However AMWS general manager, Larry Lawrence, said that his company is "trying to be a good neighbor." He also said he is attempting to relocate but at this time he is still "trying to find property." His main concern, he said, is keeping good community relations. In a letter addressed to Mrs. Del Rosso, he proposed to the community's civic leaders "that on or about Nov. 1, 1987, all business relating to the handling and transportation of infectious wastes will be removed from the premises." He continued, "This will undoubtedly cause us considerable economic hardship and much additional work in our effort to relocate to say nothing of the burden placed on our employees and their families." He also said, "This was a difficult decision for us to reach but tender it to you for the sole purpose of seeking your cooperation and help in allowing us to remain viable and out of bankruptcy."

Perhaps most noteworthy is the fact that AMWS is in the "incorrect zone for the type of business they are conducting," said Phyllis Souther spokesperson from the public information office of the Town of Oyster Bay.

AMWS is currently located in an area zoned for what is termed as "light industry" when it should be in an area zoned for "heavy industry."

In addition to the concerns voiced by the civic groups, AMWS is also obligated to respond to violations brought forth by the Nassau County Board of Health.

According to Marlena Hamann, enforcement officer for the Board of Land Resources Management of the Nassau County Board of Health, AMWS was using leased trailers to

His dedication to his students was recognized by the Oyster Bay Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution who honored him for his fine work in helping immigrants to learn English and become American citizens.

Local Man Charged in Stabbing is Hit by Car

A Hicksville man was arrested and charged with second-degree assault after he allegedly stabbed a Westbury man Friday night in a dispute over a cassette tape, Nassau County Police said.

Jose Alfaro, 22, of West John Street, allegedly stabbed Pedro Alvarez, 25, of Linden Avenue, at 11:30 p.m. with a pocket knife near Mr. Alvarez's house. He then fled the scene and was hit by a car at 11:38 p.m. at Maple Avenue and School Street, where he was arrested. Mr. Alfaro was taken to Nassau County Medical Center in East Meadow suffering

from a dislocated hip. Police said he will be arraigned when his medical condition permits.

Sgt. Ronald Mueller, of the Third Precinct, said Mr. Alfaro and Mr. Alvarez were "known to each other" before the stabbing. Mr. Alvarez was also taken to NCMC and was listed in stable condition in the intensive care unit.

The car which hit Mr. Alfaro, a red sedan, according to Sgt. Mueller, left the scene of the accident and is being sought by police.

carry infectious wastes. These trailers are often used by both commercial and private customers and may "change hands" several times within the course of a month according to Garry Hansen, vice president of Duffy Park Civic. Ms. Hamann said that to her knowledge the trailers are no longer being used.

When asked where infectious wastes were

coming from Ms. Hamann said the "list of customers is confidential."

"Let's just pray to God that we are not too late to do something about this," Mrs. Del Rosso said. "Residents of Duffy Park must be willing to shake the ground where apathy and blind trust have slept. We have got to wake up and face this threat to our community."

Other Violations

V & J Rubbish Removal, Inc., presently named American Medical Waste Systems, has violated many ordinances for almost a year. Some are included in the following: *V & J was cited in 1986 on five counts of violating the provisions of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay by Chief Zoning Inspector, Alexander Pankoff.

COUNT I

The conduct of the rental of refuse containers, the temporary storage of refuse-laden trucks is not permitted in an "H" Light Industry Zone except when granted a special exception by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, after a public hearing and as required by law.

COUNT II

A steel framework, corrugated roof structure was being erected from the floor of the former sand pit, without first having plans approved or a building permit issued by the Division of Building of the Town of Oyster Bay, as required by law.

COUNT III

The steel framework mentioned in the previous Count, was erected without first having its plans approved by the Division of Building of the Town of Oyster Bay, as required by law.

COUNT IV

V & J Rubbish Removal, Inc., was observed by Pankoff conducting the business of rubbish removal, temporary storage of rubbish, leasing of refuse dumpsters and roll-offs, without first filing for, or obtaining a proper Certificate of Occupancy from the Division of Building, as required by law.

COUNT V

Several hundred linear feet of six foot high stockade and slatted chain-link fencing were erected without first filing for, or obtaining a fence permit with the Division of Building, as required by law.

*Other apparent violations currently under litigation include failure to report a spill, operating without a Nassau County Board of Health Permit and using unlabelled containers.

*According to the DEC, AMWVS had previously operated a compactor on the grounds in violation of proper health codes. AMSWV paid the necessary fines for this and according to Ms. Hamman, enforcement officer of the Board of Land Resource Management of the Nassau County Board of Health, the unit was "dismantled" and is "not available for use."

Resource Recovery Plant Outlook

By 1990-1991, the hoped for target date, the Town of Oyster Bay should have its own resource recovery plant, according to Marlene Kastelman, a Town spokeswoman. To join the list of communities that have solved the garbage crisis is no small accomplishment. However, this still leaves the Old Bethpage site to be reckoned with, a steadily ticking threat to the fresh water supply of Plainview, Massapequa, Scaford, Farmingdale and Amityville. But a solution seems to be in the making.

There were two resource recovery plant builders in the running for the contract for the Town of Oyster Bay, American Ref-Fuel of Houston, Texas and Ogden Martin of New Jersey. On advice from the selection committee further negotiations are being held between the Town and American Ref-Fuel.

As part of the plans being considered for the work is the possibility of pumping water from beneath the old dump site. The recycling plant will be built on a parcel of land at the Old Bethpage landfill area that was never used for dumping.

The pumping of water from beneath the dump, will have the double effect of creating a check on the outflow of aquifer pollutants while at the same time utilizing the water to cool the plant.

Using non-potable water will also create less of a drain on existing water supplies.

Both firms are reputable builders. American Ref-Fuel is to build a resource recovery plant for the Town of Hempstead and Ogden Martin is scheduled to build one for Babylon, Long Island. They are using systems adapted from European models, and as Ms. Kastelman pointed out, the systems are not to be confused with the old-fashioned incinerators.

The Consultants

The Town has hired several consultants to insure an informed decision, among them Smith Barney, Inc. for the financial aspect and Lockwood, Kessler and Bartlett for the engineering view. Engineer Ralph Cuomo, contacted at Lockwood, Kessler and Bartlett pointed out that his firm's role is purely advisory,

and that the final decision rests with the town. He further pointed out that the State has mandated only that the Old Bethpage site be closed. It is up to the Town to take any measures calculated to stop the spread of water pollution.

Independent confirmation of the soundness of the Town project was obtained by placing a call to California toxicologist Dr. R. Von Burg, who recognized pumping as standard containment procedure. He has had extensive experience cleaning up contaminated sites for the Chevron Oil Co.

The Process

The Town, which has restructured the financing package of the resource recovery project to meet the 1990-91 possible target date, must now go through the permitting process, which could cause further delay in an enterprise that depends on speed for its effectiveness. Charles W. Powers, a contributor to the book, "Protecting Water Quality" (Gary E. McCuen Publications, 1986) observes that "While legitimate disagreements occur concerning the migration of chemicals into the groundwater at some sites, the fact is that inaction will only exacerbate problems." However, there has been movement.

The Current Project

A pilot recycling project has been instituted by the Town of Oyster Bay involving 6,000 homes in Plainview. Ms. Kastelman reports a 90% compliance and a 10% reduction in waste. When the program is evaluated, a decision will be made regarding a Town-wide implementation. While such recycling is not always profitable, the benefit is usually a reduction in waste and pollution.

Recycling and resource recovery are not cure-alls, because the recycling may, for instance, flood the glass market, and the resource recovery does have an ash by-product. However, steps can be taken to remedy these situations.

The Town of Islip garbage barge, more than anything else in recent history, has brought home to Long Islanders the priority that solving our garbage and pollution problems should have in our lives.

Carpal Tunnel Syndrome - A Common Cause Of Hand Discomfort

Carpal Tunnel Syndrome (CTS) results from entrapment of the nerves which go from the wrists into the hands. The wrist contains many structures in close proximity, all of which pass through a very narrow area, not unlike a tunnel. When crowding of this tunnel occurs, the structures become compressed, and damage to the nerves occurs.

The median nerve is most commonly involved. This nerve begins in the neck, runs through the arm, and into the hand. It supplies movement and feeling for the thumb, the index finger, and part of the middle finger.

Burning, tingling, and numbness of the fingers, often at night or early morning, are the usual symptoms of CTS. This discomfort may initially be relieved by shaking or exercising the hand. Some patients also find that the numbness radiates up the arm. If left untreated for long periods of time, weakness and loss of muscle mass in the hand can occur.

Inflammation or swelling of the structures within the wrist often produce this syndrome. The more common causes include: arthritis, tendonitis, thyroid disease, injury to the wrist, and even fluid retention associated with pregnancy. Due to the frequent association of carpal tunnel syndrome with arthritis and inflammation, people with this disorder are often treated by rheumatologists.

Once the diagnosis has been established, the initial treatment is often conservative. Included in the treatment is the use of anti-inflammatory medications and splinting of the wrist at night. If these measures should fail, an injection of medication into the area is often helpful. In the non-responsive forms of the disorder, surgery may be a consideration.



. . . About Penny Candy Stores, etc.

. . . from Ed and Alice

We received a phone call from Venice, Florida from Edward and Alice Grether. They commented on how much they really enjoy reading the *Hicksville Illustrated's* nostalgia of their hometown's 'past.'

Ed remarked that "Patten's"—one of the most famous candy stores of all—was located on the corner of East Barclay Street and Broadway.

Ed also stated that a trip to Laurelton Beach was operated during the summer months and that Henry Brengel Sr. furnished the moving van used to transport people to and from the all day trip to the beach. The chairs that were used in the van were borrowed from Archie Mowen who operated Mowen's Funeral Parlor on East Barclay Street. The round trip fare charged by the van to go to Laurelton was 75¢. The people without cars eagerly looked forward to the weekly trips.

Ed went on to say that in the old days whenever anyone would have a party or a gathering they would go to any one of the funeral parlors in town and borrow chairs for the day.

. . . who remember that the dry goods store next to Patten's was owned and operated by Mrs. Jablonski and that after Patten's was sold a shoemaker moved into the store. The shoemaker would put the shoes into brown paper bags, then put them into the empty rounded glass showcases awaiting their pick up. Directly across the street from East Barclay Street (going south) was Parmigiani's Italian Delicatessen, Lum's Chinese Laundry, Onginia's Diner, and Manilla's Ice Cream Parlor. Leo remembers that the ice cream parlor had a tile floor, marble counter and a big fan in the ceiling. (It later became Manilla's Tavern and after that Bill Manilla opened a real estate office.)

Minnie Sipf's Real Estate office was located next to Manilla's. Minnie had a sign in her window that read: 'If you lived here—you'd be home.' Next to Minnie's was the railroad water tank that supplied water to the locomotives. George said that there were loads of pigeons hanging around the tank and that many of the kids used to take a swim in it—as it was long before the time of backyard pools.

'Jimmy the Greek,' a burly type man, had a little truck which he would park every night in front of the Hicksville Playhouse on West Marie Street. He sold candy, cracker-jacks, peanuts and cigarettes—as they hadn't started selling refreshments in the movies yet. Across from the movies was the Hub Diner where hamburgers cost 10¢ and soda was a nickel. The diner also sold the best beef stew for 25¢ with two seeded rolls. In fact, all of the main entrees were served with two seeded rolls.

Pat's Texaco Service Station on Plainview Road and Park Avenue was also a penny candy store that sold ice cream. They remember with delight the luscious 3¢ fudgicles!

George Neder had glass greenhouses in the back of his home on East Marie Street. Behind the greenhouses in the springtime he had a field of pansies growing—from East Marie Street right through to Heitz Place. They remember Mr. Neder as a fine looking gentleman with gray hair and a matching handlebar mustache. He was an ex-chief of the Hicksville Fire Department. Louden's Penny Candy Store was located near the courthouse on the short Bay Avenue. They sold ices: lemon, orange and pineapple—so delicious that the taste is still remembered today. On the corner of Woodbury Road and Bay Avenue was a candy store operated by Mrs. Brigandi.

They also mentioned that across from Brigandi's on Woodbury Road there had been an ice cream factory (in the early 1900's) owned and operated by Walter (Shorty) Fricke's grandfather and then in the '30's Matuza's Meat Market and later Mike's Meat Market occupied the building.

They remembered when Seaman, Talifero and Eisemann was located upstairs above the Sweet Shop (corner of Broadway and West Marie Street). After Seaman & Eisemann moved to their present location the store became Arthur Murray's Dance School. It then became Howard Fleske's accounting office—and employed there was a great girl—Madeline (Petrie) Small.

They said that the original Hicksville Fire House, was moved in 1937 and is now known as "Peppercorns" and that many a wedding was held in the upstairs room. The present fire house was then built on the vacated property.

They talked and laughed a lot about when they were in high school in the early 40's. They said they would all 'hang out' on Unverhau's corner (East Marie Street and Broadway). When television first came out Mr. Unverhau had a TV in the window and the boys watched many a Joe Louis fight. . . besides watching the girls walk by. All the fellows would meet there: Jerry Kiesel, Eddie Coleman, Charlie VanWickler, Ernie Naso, Charlie Arnone, Ray Halleran, Howard Finnegan, and Bobby Quinlan—they would all squeeze into Leo's V8 Ford with a rumble seat and take off for a ball game or the Huntington or Hempstead movies.

They talked about riding their bikes or hiking or hitching up to Jericho to their friend Ray Halleran's home which was located on Jericho Turnpike. Ray's uncle, Marty and his father, Lott Halleran owned and operated a garage and gas station (right behind where the Milleridge is now). They had a sign in front of their establishment which read: 'Free Spring Water—All You Want.' People traveling out from the city on weekends would stop, get gas and fill their jugs with water. The Hallerans owned the gas station, post office, antique shop and the general store. (Mrs. Lott Halleran was the Postmistress for many years.) Traffic on Sundays, on Jericho Turnpike, would be backed up for 3 miles in both directions—from Westbury to Syosset as it was the only main road going east or west on the north shore.

Jack Dempsey of Hicksville made jelly apples in his home, and sold them for a nickel, on Jericho Turnpike and other local roads. He gave many youths the opportunity to earn spending money.

They both agreed that they may not have had as much as youngsters have today—but they had the best of everything—laughter, friends and fun. . . and what else did they need.

Capitol Days Honor Constitution

Governor Mario M. Cuomo has announced the designation of July 25-28 as Capitol Days, a celebration of the continuing restoration of the State Capitol in Albany with a special focus on the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution.

"New York State's Capitol is a beautiful, historic, and educational treasure," Governor Cuomo said. "This is a great opportunity to display and share it with the people of the State as we celebrate the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution."

Opening ceremonies will take place Saturday, July 25, at 10 a.m. at the "Roads to Liberty" mobile exhibit.

The public is invited to a special ceremony Tuesday, July 28, at 4 p.m. hosted by the Chief Judge of the State of New York, Sol Wachtler, who chairs the New York State Bicentennial Commission.

"Roads to Liberty" Will Tour

The Capitol Days celebration will be held in conjunction with the "Roads to Liberty: Magna Carta to the Constitution" national celebration and touring exhibit sponsored by The U.S. Commission on the Bicentennial of the Constitution, the U.S. Constitution Council and American Express.

An 18th century-style fair, complete with craft demonstrations and a period costume contest, a petting zoo, street entertainers and food, will be set up as part of the celebration around the Capitol.

The New York State Archives will display some of the State's foundation documents, including New York's first State Constitution. Other items to be exhibited include the 1657 demand for religious freedom known as the "Flushing Remonstrance," the minutes of New York's first colonial legislature dating from 1691, and the journal of the New York convention that met in Poughkeepsie in 1788 to ratify the Federal Constitution.

"The New York State Constitution of 1777 was a landmark on the road to the Federal Constitution and American liberty," Governor Cuomo said.

The New York State Bicentennial Commis-

sion has designed a special exhibit for the "Roads to Liberty" mobile unit showing how New York State helped bridge the gap between the Magna Carta and the Bill of Rights.

Capitol to be "Open House"

An open house at the Capitol will include self-guided tours, an audio-visual presentation on the Constitution, debates on Constitutional issues, an exhibit on the buildings in which the U.S. Constitution was ratified, and a display showing the Capitol's place in the history of the State and the nation.

The public will be able to walk through all the main floors of the State Capitol from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, July 25-26. Regular tours will operate on the weekdays. Visitors can see the splendor of the Senate and Assembly Chambers, view the magnificent Executive Chamber, and see the Great Western Staircase, the most elaborate of the three interior staircases. The faces of many famous New Yorkers are carved in stone on the sides of the staircase. Intricate interior lobbies further illustrate the Capitol's unique architectural design.

Visitors will have the opportunity to sit in the seats of Assembly members and debate issues according to parliamentary procedures during a "speak out" in the Assembly Chamber. The "session" will convene from noon - 4 p.m. each of the Capitol Days and all participants will receive a special Assembly citation. The public may also sit in the Assembly galleries to watch the "debates" in the Chamber. Visitors may sign up in advance in the Assembly Chamber for the time and issues they want to debate.

"Roads to Liberty" is a mobile exhibit of rare historical documents and artifacts, including the Magna Carta signed by England's King John in 1215; the Pierce Butler draft of the Constitution; the Declaration of Independence; and one of the original Emancipation Proclamations. The exhibit is traveling to 25 states, including the 13 original states that ratified the Constitution. It will be in Albany July 25-28, move on to Niagara Falls July 29-31, and visit New York City Sept. 6-11.

special cancellation and commemorative card of the signing of the U.S. Constitution. They will be hand stamped at a special Postal Service truck located near the "Roads to Liberty" exhibit. The card is a representation of a mural painted in 1938 by Gerald Foster which hangs in the U.S. Post Office in Poughkeepsie, depicting the moment in July 26, 1788 when New York agreed to unconditional ratification of the Constitution.

Free passes to the "Roads to Liberty" mobile unit with differing time periods will be issued to the public at the exhibit.

Long Island Rail Road Commuters Survey Results

For the 10th straight year, Assemblyman Fred Parola (R-C, Wantagh) and his volunteers greeted commuters in the 14th Assembly District and surveyed their opinions on the performance of the Long Island Rail Road. In June, questionnaires were distributed to commuters at the Wantagh, Seaford, Bethpage, Hicksville and Bellmore stations between the hours of 5:45 a.m. and 8:30 a.m.

According to this year's survey results, the on-time performance of commuter trains has improved, but cleanliness and parking continue to be in need of improvement.

"I'm pleased to report that local commuters say they have experienced a definite improvement regarding the trains running on time. This year 40 percent of the respondents rated on-time performances as 'good', up from only 10 percent last year," Parola said.

Parola reported that the most necessary areas of improvement cited include commuter car cleanliness, air conditioning and heating maintenance and parking availability. In fact, 64 percent of those surveyed said parking at their local station is always a problem.

"Our local governments are working to increase parking at a number of stations, with

planning for additional spaces already under way at the Wantagh and Seaford stations," Parola said. "A marked improvement should be realized within a few months."

Other survey results reveal that 24 percent of the commuters rated the cleanliness of commuter cars as poor and two-thirds found that public service messages to announce delays and cancellations are inadequate on both the trains and platforms.

Parola said the survey results have been sent to LIRR management, and he will monitor future service improvements.

"Conditions such as poor communications and lack of cleanliness, however, will end only when the LIRR's management makes the commuter the top priority and it increases the productivity of its employees," Parola said.

"I thank all of the commuters who took part in this survey and will continue to work for improved conditions to make the daily LIRR commuter 'experience' more reliable and comfortable," Parola said.





The Bidding Tells the Tale

West dealer.

Opening lead — ten of diamonds.

As the play progresses, declarer's picture of how the unseen cards are distributed becomes steadily clearer. Sometimes he gains all the information he seeks early in the play, and sometimes he must wait until much later.

Take this deal where declarer, at trick one, learns essentially all he needs to know about West's hand. Let's say East wins the diamond lead with the king and returns a diamond to dummy's ace.

It is not difficult for declarer to conclude that West must have the K-Q of spades, K-Q of hearts and

queen of clubs for his opening bid. Only 12 high-card points are missing after East produces the king of diamonds at trick one, and West must have them all.

Accordingly, declarer plays a club from dummy at trick three and finesesses the jack, knowing the finesse will lose. West wins and returns a diamond to the jack, whereupon South cashes the A-K-10 of clubs and queen of diamonds.

On the fourth diamond, West — now down to six cards — must discard a spade or a heart. Let's say he discards a spade, in which case dummy also discards a spade. South thereupon plays the ace and another spade. West wins and is forced to lead a heart from the K-Q-4.

If he leads the king, South has an easy time making a second heart trick, so let's assume he plays the four instead. Ordinarily, declarer would play the eight from dummy in the hope that West had the K-10-4 or Q-10-4, but here, with the knowledge accumulated earlier from the bidding and play, South goes up with the jack to score his ninth trick.

It is a sad fact that many experienced declarers would fail to draw the automatic inference at trick one about the nature of West's hand. Such an omission is attributable to sheer laziness. East's king of diamonds played screamed out loud that West has the five other missing high cards, and South should shape all his later plays to fit that assumption.

You Auto Know

By D.F. KARPPI

Now that many of us have joined the self service lines at gas stations, it is important to remember the little details ourselves. No one has asked me for a few years, can I check your water Miss... as they wipe my windows, front and back clean, check my oil and fill the tank.

The Automobile Club of New York has a few suggestions to offer your friendly mechanic. I hope you still have one.

They suggest you follow the manufacturer's recommendations for draining and flushing the radiator. The newer all-temperature, all-weather coolants may reduce this requirement to only once every

two years. (The reason is that the same coolant that keeps the water from freezing in winter keeps it from boiling over in summer.)

They suggest inspecting the radiator for leaks and to check the fluid level. (O.K. but you know the leak always develops after you have had a checkup.)

They say to test the thermostat for proper operation. If it does not open at the proper temperature, overheating could occur. (It opens and lets the coolant to flow between the hot engine block and the radiator cap. Then do it very slowly and carefully with the help of a towel or thick rag—and your face turned away from the radiator.)

Most radiator caps are tricky to get off anyway. They usually have a spring that you have to push down and then twist to get them off. Another point to remember is to be sure

you have the correct cap if you're having a problem. They can allow some steam to get out if they are the proper pressure for your car. The wrong cap can make the car build up too much pressure.

If your car has the see-through overflow catch tank, you can assess—and replace—any loss of coolant without having to touch the radiator.

In either case, check the fluid level and, if low, restart the engine while adding cool or warm water as the engine idles. Replace with year-round coolant at the earliest opportunity.

You don't want to be without the special properties of the coolant. It is a blend of alcohol and glycerine that makes it do the job just right.

Ah, the blessings of civilization.



Editorial

Found: A Good Solution

To Robert Kenney, the Section VIII basketball coordinator, we award two giant bottles of Excedrin as a belated cure for the headache he has surely received in trying to organize a boys' program suitable to the coaches and superintendents.

The realignment—which has been the lead story on this page, exclusively for two consecutive weeks, has been thought about, fought over, torn apart and put back together for some time. That an equitable solution may have been found is a tribute to the foresight of the superintendents, who headed off a possible disaster, what with the strongest basketball squads in Nassau bunched together in American League Division 1, and ironically provided a fairer program.

Still, that's only pre-season speculation. Only time, and the decibel levels of American League-1, will tell.

Wanted (Again), A Football Coach

Within the next four weeks, Westbury High School should name its new football coach, the third such person to hold the position in the last three years. Only the people at the head of the school's administration know the candidates for the job, and only they can decide who has the right qualifications for the job.

One thing is for sure, however. Whoever fills the job, he or she will inherit a program that, for all its pride, has fallen on hard times. Attendance at the school's football games is down, a lack of candidates has hurt the school's junior varsity squad and a lack of continuity in the head-coach office has turned the number-two sport at the school into a second-class operation.

It's not because of lack of talented people. Each coach who has taken the position, from John Fasano (resigned after 1984) to Philip Lowe (1985) to Ron Baskind (1986), has had enough credibility to warrant their appearance on the sidelines. The supporting coaches have spirit. And the students who participate in the program have shown the desire to win. So why have the last three Green Dragons squads fielded records of 3-5 (1984), 1-7 (1985) and 2-6 (1986)? From the view of this sportswriter, who has covered the team regularly for three years, the culprit is the fact that the spirit has been individual, not collective.

Does the squad need a father figure? No, just one whom the team can respect. Do the Dragons need a Knute Rockne type? No, just one who can make each player at each position know and understand his job. Does the squad need an Al Davis or John Madden, who might urge Westbury to play chew-'em-up-and-split-'em-out with their North Shore opponents? No, and neither the other North Shore coaches nor the parents of any football kid want to see that on any field. But the next coach of the Green and Gold must instill a football style commensurate with the mental and physical ability of each child.

Whatever else the next Westbury coach has, he or she will need to have the support of the school community. That means encouragement from the Westbury faculty, a prerequisite for survival. That means respect from top administration, from the superintendent's office down to the office of the athletic director. And that means more fans—parents, kids, teachers and administrators—in the seats on those four weekends when Fitzgerald Field sees football action.

The decision-makers reading this will comment that they don't need a spectator from the sidelines making their jobs more difficult. But those who care about their schools—this writer is a Westbury High graduate and proud of it—will not permit a source of pride to be tarnished by neglect. Otherwise, we would be ashamed to utter the school's very name and that's the worst insult an educational institution can bear.

To athletic director George Hull and Principal Pless Dickerson: You know what you want. You know where and how to find it. We're proud of those facts. But we're anxious and impatient. And we're also tired of doing stories on Westbury coaching changes. The ball's in your hands, gentlemen. Now, go score a touchdown!

Hicksville PAL Softball/Baseball News

PAL's baseball/softball season has started. Boys and girls (both youth and teenagers) have begun to come to their practices. The excitement exhibited by these children and teenagers is exhilarating.

Because PAL is an instructional league, these children will not be restricted to one or two positions during the season. PAL's philosophy is that the only way you can learn to play a position is to do it. The emphasis in PAL is not on winning a game, but on helping the children and teenagers build their self-confidence. By emphasizing this aspect, all persons involved in PAL not only realize a short-term reliance, but they realize a long-term confidence in being winners, regardless of whether they win a game or not.

The STRESS of Play-Offs is NOT offered in PAL. Because the emphasis is placed on instruction and self-confidence, the Hicksville PAL does not have Play-Offs.
