Town Denies Automobile Dealer's Request for 40 **Additional Parking Spaces** By Rita Langdon

Robert Chevrolet's proposal to add 40 ad-ditional parking spaces on a residential lot has attional parking spaces on a residential for the been denied by the town as the plan "would be incompatible with the general character of the area," according to town records. In February, the owners of Robert Chevrolet on North Broadway requested a

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change of zone from a "D" residence district to "G" business district (general business) to be used to provide off-street parking for 40 additional cars. Peter Mineo, attorney for the owners of the dealership, said that his client owners of the dealership, said that its offer was requesting the extra spaces to "stop cars from being parked all over the place." He stressed that the new lot, which was to be located on the south side of First Street, a residential area, would not be used to expand the abartments but to provide modifying for the showroom, but to provide parking for employees and customers who leave their automobiles overnight for servicing. Mr. Mineo said that this would eliminate the park-

ing on Broadway. Mr. Mineo said, in a prepared statement last week, "We are disappointed it [the proposal) was denied because we felt it would relieve on-street parking and traffic, which the neighbors have been complaining about, and at large, it would enhance the residen-tial quality of the neighborhood." According to the Town of Oyster Bay records the town bord also denied the

records, the town board also denied the change of zone because the application "would adversely affect residential boundaries and would interfere with the health, peace, quiet and comfortable enjoyment of peace, quiet and connorative enjoymental life and property in the abutting residential area." The town officially announced the denial at last week's board meeting.

Glese Park Civic Association meeting. Glese Park Civic Association members have opposed the car dealership's proposal because they want to preserve the residen-tial quality of the community. "Probably the biggest hue and cry from the residents is the commercialization in the area," Thomas McGovern, the club's president, said last February. "People see buildings and plazas constructed every day which block the vision of existing homes and open green space."He said last Friday, "The decision by the town board to deny the application clearly represents a responsiveness to resident s'con-cerns and the need to protect the quality of life in the residential community of our town." commercialization in the area." A spokesperson for Mr. Mineo said that the owners of Robert Chevrolet, Robert R. Brown and Robert J. Brown, have not decided whether they will go to court against the town to pursue their proposal.

Postponement on Spiegel Associates' Hearing

Spiegel Associates' proposal to construct an office building in Hicksville will not go before the town board until after the developer has time to draft an alternative plan. The Town of Oyster Bay granted the developer an extension at last week's board

In a letter to town clerk Carl Marcellino, William Cohn, Spiegel's attorney, asked that the hearing scheduled for July 12 be postponed so "we can conduct future meetings [with residents] in order to determine whether an agreeable plan can be devised for the (continued on page 2)

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School Budget Revote Set for August 10

By a vote of 4 – 2, the newly reorganized Hicksville School Board voted to resubmit its budget to taxpayers on August 10. The budget had previously been set at \$44 million and was narrowly defeated by 17 votes on May 25. The budget has been lowered by \$50,000 and now stands at \$43,950,000.

Election Results The Reorganization Meeting of the Board of Education was held on July 13, prior to the regular monthly Board of Education meeting. Jo Ann Miltenberg was elected president for 1988-89. Mrs. Miltenberg had previously served as trustee for one year. Daniel Arena will

Former Fire Chief Sam Weiss Dies

Stanford (Sam) Weiss, a former Hicksville fire chief and fire commissioner, passed away last week.

Mr. Weiss joined Emergency Co. 5 in 1930 and served as lieutenant and captain. He also served as assistant chief and was chief of the department from 1950-52. He served as fire commissioner from 1959-64 and was honored by Charles Wagner American Legion Post as the 1984 Fireman of the Year. Mr. Weiss was also the Labor Day chairman for two years. Medard Ofenloch, a former Hicksville fire

chief, said, "Sam was definitely a dedicated civil servant for the welfare of the residents of Hicksville; the town he was born in and the town he loved." In addition to Mr. Weiss's many years of

active service with the fire department, he was also involved in local clubs. He was a member of the Hicksville Lions Club, the Republican Committeemen Club of the Town of Oyster Bay and he was a member of the electric board of the town. Mr. Weiss, a retired Hicksville Water Commissioner, owned and operated Ultra Electric Company.

Mr. Weiss is survived by his wife, Kitty, his son, Harvey, and his daughter, Mirtam Law. He is also survived by grandchildren and great-granchildren.

tains statements that senior citizens' activities are part of the Continuing Education Pro-gram. She noted that the program is self supporting and allowed to continue under the contingency budget. Mr. Guercio was sympathetic to the plight of the senior citizens, whose bus trip had been cancelled that day and who faced future trip cancelled inst. However, he stressed that "this was not a matter of choice...on an austerity budget you cannot have recreational ac-tivities" tivities.

Other speakers also addressed the board regarding these activities and asked for board action in establishing a summer budget re-vote in order to salvage programs scheduled for August and September. Carolyn Kelly ask ed if there were any monies left over from ed if there were any monies left over from last year's Continuing Education Program, which isself supporting. If so, she wondered if that money could be used for the senior-citizers, William Hall, assistant superinten-dent for business services, advised that any surplus funds go into a general fund on June 30. This surplus is used to reduce taxes and cannot be transferred, he added.

Time-Frame for Budget Re-Vote Trustee William Bennett motioned that a budget re-vote be held on August 10, the earliest date he believed feasible, since 14 days notice must be given to the public before such a vote.





Wolf and trustee Mark Cardella. Mrs. Rooney and board president, Mrs. Miltenberg, voted nay. A budget re-vote including registration will cost the district \$7,000.

Mr. Bennett then proposed a budget reduction of \$50,000, which was approved by

a 5-1 vote, Mr. Cardella voting no. Duing the public session, resident Norma Goerke asked how much the district would save from July 1 to August 10 while on austeri-ty. Mr. Hall said that there were no savings because all items affected were held in abevance.

sident Larry Wolfson, a former Hicksville School Board trustee, then questioned the monies set aside for summer curriculum writing and was told that this curriculum writing would take place during the school year if the budget was approved on August 10. Mr. Wolfson said that the board has a responsibility to the public and asked that meetings start on time. The evening's meeting began at 9 p.m., instead of the scheduled 8:30 p.m. He also asked that board members help publicize the budget in any personal way possible. School boards are legally prevented from spending money to urge voter approval of a budget, but they are allowed to use their own energies to promote passage of the budget, according to Nora Richards, spokesperson for the school district.

Summer Driver's Education

At the June 22 board meeting, the board had authorized a summer driver education had autorized a summer driver education program on legal counsel's recommendation that such a program was considered part of the basic educational program because not enough time was available during the school year to offer it to all interested students. Residents had questioned the existence of such a program and School Superintendent Dr. Catherine Fenton was to look into the matter.

Dr. Fenton advised the board that the residents were indeed correct. No such pro-gram is currently available in Hicksville. The inclusion of Summer Driver Education on the Contingency Budget was an error.

Polymyalgia Rheumatica - A Disease Which Mimics Arthritis

Polymyalgia rheumatica, (PMR), is an illness which causes severe muscle pain, aching, and stiffness. This disorder usually affects women over the age of 50 years. Although the cause of PMR is not known, some rheumatologists (specialists in disorders of the muscles and joints) think that the illness may be inherited.-

Patients with PMR suffer severe pain in the muscles of the neck, shoulders, arms, lower back, hips and thighs. Occasionally swelling of the joints may occur, mimicking certain forms of arthritis. The pain is worse in the morning and often makes getting out of bed a very difficult task.

By the time I see a patient with PMR, they are usually very depressed from being in so much pain for a long period of time. These patients may have led very active lives prior to their illness, and often feel frustrated at not being able to accomplish previously simple tasks. The diagnosis of PMR requires a complete history and physical examination.

Often, several blood tests are required to aid in the diagnosis. One test, called the erythrocyte sedimentation rate, can be very helpful in confirming the diagnosis.

Closely associated with PMR is a disorder called Temporal Arteritis. This illness, which affects a percentage of patients with PMR, results from inflamed blood vessels. This inflammation may produce headaches or even visual problems.

Treatment for polymyalgia rheumatica centers around the use of medications which are able to reduce inflammation, and often begin to give signficant relief within 24 to 48 hours.

Should you suspect that you have any of the above symptoms, you should consult your physician or rheumatologist.

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

What the Politicians are Saying...

From CONGRESSMAN NORMAN LENT (R-Long Island): Landmark legislation that will protect Medicare's 32 million beneficiaries from financial disaster resulting from catastrophic medical expenses has been signed into law. For the first time, there will be a cap limiting beneficiares' out-of-pocket expenses for Medicare-covered hospital, physician, and other services. The program will be paid for by the beneficiaries who will be charged an additional 14 monthly premium plus an income-based surtax. Some of the bill's highlights: provides unlimited coverage, currently only 60 days; limits hospital costs to a single annual deductible of 1564 per year; pays up to 50 percent for prescription medicine bills; expands long-term care protection with a new respite care benefit and an extension of home health and nursing home benefits. It also provides against spousal impoverishment for Medicaid long-term care patients.

CONGRESSMAN JAMES H. SCHEUER recently released a study he requested from the Federal Office of Technology Assessment titled "The Quality of Medical Care; Information for Consumers" which outlines indicators which can be used to determine the quality of care given by health care providers.

ASSEMBLYMAN DANIEL FRISA (D-Westbury) has announced that the NY State Department of Social Services is providing \$300,000 for programs to increase the availability of guality late afternoon child care for school-age children of working parents. Prospective applicants may contact Mr. Frisa at 338-4660.

SENATOR DANIEL PATRICK MOYNIHAN (D-NY) has urged passage of the Fair Housing Amendments Act which would strengthen the enforcement mechanism of the Fair Housing Act of 1968. The legislation is a compromise reached between civil rights groups, realtors and legislators to add effective enforcement provisions to the law banning housing discrimination and would also extend protection to disabled persons and to families with children.

NASSAU COUNTY EXECUTIVE THOMAS S. GULOTTA has announced that the county will hire 100 new correction officers for the Nassau County jail to enable the county to substantially reduce the number of officers assigned overtime, thereby actually saving close to \$1 million annually.

NASSAU COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY DENIS DILLON has announced that figures released by the NY State Division of Criminal Justice Services show that Nassau County has one of the lowest crime rates in the state: 33-5 per one thousand people. DA Dillon said his office would continue to work with local people in undercover "sting" operations to remove criminals from the area and to deter others who conemplate criminal acts.

A Letter from Lulubelle... ...Do You remember WW II and life on the home front in those days?...Nothing like the horrors endured by our boys, of course...but we were all part of the war like the horrors endured by our boys, of course...but we were all part of the bar effort...There was the blackout and all of us here on Long Island close to the ship ping lanes and the enemy submarines had dark shades and all the street lights were either turned off or very slightly lit... and there was rationing... Red stamps for meat and butter, etc., and blue stamps for canned goods, and, stamps for (was it really only three??) pairs of shoes a year....fresh produce and bottled milk didn't require stamps and that's when all of us who had always used evaporated milk turned to fresh...and even when one had stamps, getting butter was nearly impossible—we would stand in line for any length of time to be allowed to pur-chase one quarter pound of butter...and the meat was all so scarce, but we didn't mind because we knew it was going to the guys in the service...we could obtain more red stamps by turning in used fats, so we all had a tall can into which we strained our fats, refrigerated them, and took them to the butcher.. and do you remember how we would cut the tops and bottoms from the cans, wash them carefully, step on them, put the two ends inside and keep them in a box to be turned in... I guess that's what we're still doing in recycling, and meat was so scarce that we learned to like fried baloney—did you know that the edges curl up when you fry it and it becomes a sort of "cup"?...And then, of course, we all did volunteer work...My husband was an auxiliary fireman who went out on Sunday mornings and was trained by our local volunteer firemen...the government provided helmets. arm bands, portable fire extinguishers and a whistle—I think we still have them in the attic., And when we had blackout drills, the block wardens would go up and down the street whistling at those whose lights showed through...We also volunteered one night a week to sit at the Air Watch Center—it was over a local barroom and there was a long desk with many telephones...remember this was long before all this sophisticated early warming systems and radar and computers and all such things. this was really primitive...the idea was that a watcher on the shore or on a boat at sea would radio to the Coast Guard, who would call us at our station and we would immediately start calling the list taped to the desk and many other volunteers would come in and soon the whole of the Civilian Defense Corps would know that we were under attack....it never happened and, as we sat there week after week, we would almost wish they would have a test so we could learn if we were really doing our job...And, to return to rationing, do you remember that when you finally found a lamb chop for the baby and he picked at it and didn't eat all the meat you had carefully minced for him, you gobbled up the leftover bits and chewed on the bonem ... Lots of people went to the black market, but I never did... I don't know that I was so especially patriotic that it seemed wrong—the truth is, I don't remember that I knew any black markets!!...But I wrong-the truth is wouldn't, would I??

The 498 cabanas were taken over by Nassau County more than 25 years ago ind for years were assigned on a waiting list system. It was not unusual to hear from someone who had been "on the list" for many years without getting a cabana. In june, the Parks Department decided to initiate a lottery system for assignment of only at then-available cabanas, but not for all 498. The apparent absence of detailed rules made the june 17 lottery somewhat confusing to many, but the "winners" won cabana assignments—for a period of only three years, after which, they are again to be awarded hub latters.

The county followed that by announcing July 1 what it called a 17.5 million "comprehen-sive improvement plan" for the Lido Beach facility, which included renovation of the swimming pools, establishment of plenic areas and unspecified "modifications" to the cabanas. The work is to begin at the end of this year's beach season. Less than a week later, published reports quoted Comptroller Peter King as saying that a lagging sales tax revenue will result in Nassau County ending the fiscal year with a deficit of the search and the search and the search season.
