

Library Budget Passes

The \$1,780,014.57 Hicksville Library Budget passed by 54 votes last week with a total of 231 people in favor and 177 opposed.

Board of trustee member, Ruth Aaron, who ran unopposed, received 322 votes.

Five File for Two School Board Seats

Five residents have filed for two seats on the Hicksville School Board. According to district spokesperson, Nera Richards, current school board trustee Daniel Arena will not be running for another three-year term. Thomas J. McGovern, Jay Schwartz and James A. Martillo are running for Mr. Arena's seat.

Another current school board trustee, Carole Wolf, is being opposed by William Collins, for her seat.

The school budget vote on May 10 will include the candidates running for board seat. Voter registration is April 26.

Absentee ballots will be mailed to all voters registered as permanently disabled. Other voters who qualify for absentee ballots must apply to the district clerk at least seven days prior to the vote if the ballot is to be mailed, or by May 9 if the voter will pick up the ballot in person. Absentee ballots must be returned by 5 p.m. on May 10. Call 933-6592, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., for application information.

Hicksville PTA Council Hosts Candidates Forum

The Hicksville Council of PTAs will host a Candidates Forum on Monday, April 24, at 8 p.m. in Cafeteria A of the Hicksville Senior High School. The purpose of the forum is to enable the residents to meet and listen to the persons running for seats on the Hicksville School Board.

At the beginning of the meeting, index cards will be distributed to the members of the audience so that they may write questions directed to the candidates. The candidates will be given time to introduce themselves and to make opening statements. They will then be available to answer the submitted questions. At the end of the program, they will each give a closing statement. Representatives of the Nassau District PTA will be on hand to serve as moderator and timekeeper.

The following candidates are running for election: James Martillo, Thomas McGovern and Jay Schwartz will be vying for the seat of Daniel Arena, who will not be seeking reelection. William Collins will be opposing trustee Carole Wolf for the three-year term.

Those who are not yet registered to vote are urged to do so on Wednesday, April 26 at their regular polling place between the hours of 3 and 8 p.m. Absentee Ballots may be obtained by contacting the Clerk of the Board Janet Ullrich at 933-0692 on Tuesdays or by written request. Requests will be accepted up to 7 days prior to the vote.

The PTA Council sponsors its Candidates Forum to help Hicksville residents become better informed voters. The election for school board positions and for the proposed school budget will take place on Wednesday, May 10. Polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Hicksville School Board Approves Budget

The Hicksville School Board, by a vote of 5-2, approved its proposed 1989-90 school budget of \$46,780,319, at a public hearing last week.

The board cut \$626,200, from the Superintendent's proposed budget while adding an additional \$2,000 for senior citizens' activities. Voters will now be asked to approve a \$46,780,319, budget on May 10. This figure is 6.4% higher than last year's budget (\$43,950,000) and would increase the tax rate by an estimated \$1.90. (The tax rate figure will not be set by the Nassau County Board of Supervisors until August. If Hicksville property values continue to increase as it has done in the past few years, the estimated tax rate increase could be lower.)

Residents Speak on the Budget

During the public session of the budget hearing, residents had the opportunity to question and receive answers regarding budget items, as well as voice their concerns. Several residents spoke regarding the impact of increasing taxes on the community.

Resident Carolyn Kelly, who served on the Ad Hoc Committee on Reorganization for the school district, read a letter urging the closing of two elementary schools and the movement of the sixth grade into the Middle School. She said that "school enrollments have declined steadily for many years now, yet we have stubbornly refused to change." She added that an "austerity budget helps no one, not the taxpayer because the money saved is so small, and certainly not the children."

Neil McCormack, former school board member, spoke on behalf of senior citizens asking to "please give us a break." He added that many seniors are moving out of state. In response to his question regarding teacher salary increases, which are not included in the proposed budget, the school district's attorney indicated that negotiations with the teachers' union were to begin April 13.

Residents Janet Von Bargaen spoke in support of the passage of the school budget. Mrs. Von Bargaen sympathized with the plight of

seniors and agreed that increases in taxes were difficult for all, but she said she was voting for the budget because "I believe in education and I want my children to have the finest education that this school district can provide."

Other residents suggested that the superintendent's salary be capped, citing as an example, the capping of federal judges salaries at \$89,500; that the district look into handling some of the BOCES' supplied services since BOCES' costs have risen; and that the district learn to economize and cut down on waste.

Budget Cuts and Additions

The board unanimously approved cutting a total of \$71,600 from the original proposed budget (\$45,600 from School Library and Audio-Visual; \$5,600 from Board of Education Travel/Conferences and \$60,000 from Code 2330 which was to have been allocated to a proposed summer school program for elementary students." Community input via a survey conducted by the PTA indicates that not enough students would be interested in attending and the program could not be self-sustaining).

Board trustee Mark Cardella made a motion to delete \$12,000, from Code 1621, which is to be used for the purchase of a MiniVan to replace a 1978 station wagon. The motion was defeated 4-3. (Trustee William Bennett, Cardella, and trustee Daniel MacBride voted to delete.)

Mr. Cardella then made a motion to delete \$58,900, from Code 2630 which is to be used for Computer Assistant Instruction. The motion was defeated 4-3. (Cardella, MacBride, trustee Patricia Rooney voted to delete.)

Board president Jo Ann Miltenberg made a motion to cut \$20,000, from travel and conference expenditures for district employees. Mr. Cardella made an amended motion to further cut travel expenditures; however, it was defeated.

The main motion made by Mrs. Miltenberg was approved 5-2 (Cardella and MacBride voting no) and \$20,000, was deleted from the budget.

The budget was then established at \$46,780,319, and approved by the board 5-2; Mr. Cardella and Mr. MacBride voting no.

Asbestos Plans

The school board heard the summary of the Asbestos (AHERA) inspection and management plan for the Hicksville District, which had been presented at the board's facilities committee meeting on April 5. Environmental Compliance, Inc. (ECI), the district's outside consultants, have recommended a three-year time frame, on a priority basis, to remove asbestos from the district's buildings at an estimated cost of \$6,572,380. New York State regulations (SASA - School Asbestos Safety Act) require that all friable asbestos in schools be removed, encapsulated or enclosed as soon as possible.

ECI recommends that approximately \$910,000, be spent during the summer of 1989 to remove asbestos from portions of all schools excluding the senior high, the administration building, and the district's maintenance garage.

In response to Mrs. Miltenberg's question, it was learned that the school district would not save asbestos removal costs by closing a school because any asbestos in such school would have to be removed first.

The school board established an Asbestos Fund of \$400,000, at its September 28, 1988 meeting. In order to fund the additional costs

for this summer's asbestos abatement of \$50,000., the board voted to authorize an expenditures freeze for the next six months with release of funds for emergencies to be authorized by the superintendent of schools. ECI's proposed management plan must be filed with the State Education Department in May. The State then has 30 days to approve the plan.

ECI has recommended that all work be done in the summer in order not to close schools. According to ECI, contracts for asbestos removal contain penalty clauses to ensure that work is completed during a specified time span.

Latch Key Proposals Defeated

At the board's April 5 facilities committee meeting, four latch-key (before and after school day care) proposals were made by the Hicksville Congress of Teachers (HCT), the Hicksville Youth Council, the YMCA (Y) and Wee Care. A revised proposal was presented to the board during the April 12 meeting by HCT president Bob Zaleski. Mr. Zaleski said that the HCT had reconsidered their proposal and would now offer the program without it being a part of the HCT contract, not subject to grievance and with the HCT being responsible for hiring, collecting funds, and paperwork. They would still ask the District to assume responsibility for the payroll.

Several motions were made by board members as debate ensued over the agency to be chosen to provide the latch-key program.

Board trustee William Bennett first motioned that the Hicksville Youth Council be considered. He said that the "amended 11th hour" offer by the HCT was too late and should have been put forth on April 5. Mrs. Rooney asked that the board consider tabling the decision on this program because the last two public meetings on the program did not have the full attendance of the board. Mr. Bennett was insistent that the matter be brought to closure at this time because the board had been considering the matter for many months. A vote was then taken to accept the Youth Council and was defeated 5-2 (Mr. Bennett and Mrs. Carole Wolf in favor).

Mrs. Miltenberg then made a motion to consider the Y as the agency to offer latch key

services and this motion was also defeated 4-3 (Mr. Daniel Arena, Mr. Bennett, and Mrs. Miltenberg in favor).

Board trustee Daniel MacBride then made the motion to accept the HCT's proposal and it was defeated 5-2 (Mr. Cardella and Mr. MacBride in favor).

Other Action

Various financial reports were accepted and bids were awarded in the amount of \$39,770.90.

The board adopted a 183 school day calendar for 1989-90. School will open for students on September 6 and close on June 22. Winter recess will be February 10-23, spring recess will be April 9-17, and school will be closed two days for Memorial Day (May 28-29).

The board accepted the resignation of Dr. Robert Greenberg, Director of Special Education/Pupil Personnel Services. Dr. Greenberg has accepted an Assistant Superintendent position in White Plains.

Mrs. Wolf thanked Thomas Shaw, Director of Facilities and Operations, his men and all the community volunteers who worked so hard at the Dutch Lane Fields on April 8. "It was an excellent community effort and I applaud everyone for it," said Mrs. Wolf.

Other Public Concerns

A resident addressed the board regarding vandals and the difficulty encountered when trying to report such actions. He stated that when he called the District's security number he got a recording and that when he called the police, they took 40 minutes to respond.

A resident of Center Street reported on East Street School parents' concerns with a lot located next to the School which had been dedicated to a former Principal of East Street—Nina Plantz—and which is currently being used as a "hangout." Residents would like a fenced-in park in this area with playground equipment and in this regard will be sending letters to Town Supervisor Delligatti and Nassau County Executive Gulotta, as well as the school board.

The annual budget vote will be held on May 10 from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. The board's committee meetings are scheduled for May 17 and the next board of education meeting is scheduled for 8:15 on May 24 in the Administration Building.

*Clarification: In last week's issue we reported that the district's agenda indicated that, at the April 12 board meeting, superintendent of schools, Dr. Catherine Fenton, would be recommending that the board select the YMCA as the organization for pro-

viding a Latch Key Program.

However, in a revised copy of the agenda, it stated that Dr. Fenton would recommend that the board of education select the YMCA as the organization for providing a Latch Key Program.

A 40-Year Walk and Ride

Our congratulations are going to **Jimmy Valentine**, an old friend who I went all through high school with. He has just completed 40 years of being a mailman in Levittown. He's spent 40 years walking and riding . . . first with a residential route and then a commercial one. He's kept himself in good shape and is still playing softball with all the 20-and-30-year-olds. He married his high school sweetheart—**Bernice Lehman**. The best to you, Jimmy.

It's A Small World . . .

Was talking to **Mimi Gallagher** the other day and she told me a story about her daughter **Ellyn (Gallagher) Lihani**.

Ellyn is a graduate of Annapolis and is now Director of Speaker Support Systems for the Department of the Navy. She is a civilian employee and works out of the Pentagon. Her last assignment was that she be flown to the aircraft carrier *U.S.S. John F. Kennedy* which was in the Atlantic off Bermuda. She was flown to Bermuda where she had a short visit with her husband who was deployed with his squadron—and then she was taken aboard the mail plane and flown out to the *U.S.S. Kennedy*.

Mimi said, "She donned the usual helmet and flight suit and was on her way."

The mail plane takes 20 passengers but there were only a few on board that day. The flight was uneventful—but the landing was another story. Touchdown wasn't bad—but, Ellyn said, "the rubber-band effect (that stops the plane when it lands on the carrier) is a side-splitter. I thought my body was broken in two." Aircraft carriers are not allowed to have women on board as they (aircraft carriers) are always combat-ready. Evidently, the Navy grapevine had passed the word that the mail plane was bringing more than the mail.

When Ellyn got off the plane, in full gear, she heard a gentle roar in the background. She looked up and all she could see was the large welcoming committee who had come out to "greet the lady." The carrier carries a crew of about 5,000 sailors. She was the only woman on board—so, they assigned her to the Admiral's quarters (which had the only private bathroom on the ship) and gave her Marines guarding her door for 24 hours. She had a wonderful time (who wouldn't wish 5,000 sailors adoring you!) After a day or two at sea she was taken off the ship by helicopter.

The day she arrived another Navy man from Hicksville left on the mail plane that Ellyn had arrived on. (Ellyn didn't know it at the time). Mimi found out from the mother of that young man that it was **Lieutenant J.g. Robert Rupp**, who had been stationed on the *Kennedy* and was leaving for another assignment.

Lt. Rupp, a graduate of Annapolis, is the son of **Marge** and **Bob Rupp**, longtime Hicksville residents. Marge and Bob did a wonderful job raising their children. Their oldest **Dave**, is a 1976 graduate of West Point. Another son, **Capt. 

Winners of the Empire State and Regents Scholarships

The New York State Education Department announced the name of high school seniors who have won Empire State Scholarships of Excellence and Regents College Scholarships. These scholarship awards are effective as of the 1989-90 academic year. Each Empire State Scholarship of Excellence entitled the recipient to an award of \$2,000 a year for up to five years of study at an approved program in New York State. The Empire State Scholarship of Excellence may be held concurrently with the Regents College Scholarships.

The winners of these scholarships are the candidates who earned the highest rankings in each county. The ranking for each candidate was obtained by combining the can-

didate's grade point average and highest score on either the American College Testing Program (ACT) Assessment or the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). Each criterion was given equal weight when a candidate's ranking was determined. Approximately 95,000 candidates in 1,200 high schools in New York State were entered in the scholarship competitions.

"HOPE"

In the seven years refusenik Shimon Borovinsky and his family waited for exit visas to leave the Soviet Union they had to give up a lot. First, Shimon was fired from his job. Then, after refusing to testify against his Hebrew teacher, he was arrested and sentenced to five months of menial labor. Finally, to protect them from reprisals, the Borovinskys stopped seeing many of their friends. They did hold onto one thing though - their hope.

It was this hope that gave the Borovinskys courage to wait for that special day last July when a new life in Israel was finally theirs.

Today, Shimon, Natalia and their two young daughters, Zoya and Julia, live in an immigrant

absorption center in Jerusalem. They have their own apartment. They are getting help in finding jobs. The girls have begun school and are making new friends. They are free to live as Jews.

The Borovinskys are just one family. This year some 40,000 Jews will be permitted to leave the Soviet Union and begin new lives in Israel and New York. They will be helped by UJA-Federation agencies at home and overseas, and through the special Passage to Freedom campaign for Soviet Jewish emigres.

Library Services

To The Editor:

The public library has recently been criticized in letters to the press for the alleged neglect of children's services. We do not believe this charge is true.

Our children's library is improving as the book collection, one of the largest in a public library in Nassau, has grown and new audiovisual services introduced. In spite of a drastic drop in the number of children residing in the community (more than 13,000 school age children in 1968, about 4,500 today) we have not diminished staff, services nor programs. Indeed we have offered more.

The annual staff report of the Children's Librarian lists several pages of special programs presented during 1988, far too many to be included in this letter. Included were arts and crafts programs, films, musical presentations, six story hours a week, a bedtime story hour for tiny tots and a whole summer of non-stop activities.

We believe in special activities. Musical programs, films, magic shows, theater and others play a most important part in attracting youngsters to the library and making it a fun place to visit.

However, the most important function of a children's library, introducing the young to books, showing them the infinite joy of reading and, perhaps, even developing a genuine intellectual curiosity lasting into adulthood can only be accomplished by a dedicated professional staff and a strong book collection. We believe the Hicksville Public Library serves the community well in this regard, and the board of trustees and staff are determined to offer a library that keeps these goals in mind.

Condolences

The library board of trustees and staff was greatly saddened to hear of the death of Mr. Peter DeNinno on April 15. Mr. DeNinno served as a library trustee for 12 years and his loss will be keenly felt by his fellow colleagues and the Hicksville community. Mr. DeNinno, a long-time resident of Hicksville served as a teacher in the Plainview-Old Bethpage school system for many years, and he brought his dedication and educational expertise to the Library Board. His good humor, his fondness for the staff and his total support for progressive library service will always be remembered by all of us who worked with him.

Freemasons to Salute Washington's 1st Inauguration

New York's 124,000 Freemasons, members of the world's oldest and largest fraternal order, have a special reason for commemorating the Bicentennial of George Washington's first inauguration next Sunday, according to Roswell T. Swits, of Schenectady, Grand Master of Masons in New York. "It was virtually an all-Masonic ceremony," he said, "and it took place at Federal Hall in New York City, then the fledgling nation's capital."

What was unique, according to Swits, was not that Washington was a Freemason (many of the Founding Fathers, including 13 signers of the Constitution, belonged to the ancient order), it was that the oath of office was administered by Chancellor Robert R. Livingston, then Grand Master of Masons in New York, on a Bible borrowed by Major Jacob Morton, a Washington aide and the Worshipful Master (presiding officer) of St. John's Lodge No. 1, located, then, around the corner from the scene.

In this Bicentennial year, President George Bush took his oath of office as our 41st President on that same Bible, still in the possession of the Lodge, on January 20 in Washington, D.C. Three other American Presidents, Warren G. Harding, Dwight D. Eisenhower and Jimmy Carter, have done likewise, although only Harding was a Freemason. All told, 14 presidents have been Freemasons, the latest being Gerald Ford. Two of these, Andrew Jackson and Harry Truman, served as Grand Masters in their states.

During April and especially this week, New York lodges will pay special tribute to their renowned brother by holding special observances, participating in public ceremonies and otherwise taking note of this historic date and event. All will recall Washington's service as Master of his lodge in Alexandria when he was President and his 46 years as a Freemason, said Swits.



...These days, all the politicians are initiating legislation to ban the use of "styrofoam" products in the future—cups and plates and all the fast food packaging....And I have learned from my publisher that this is not a proper use of the word "styrofoam"....He has been advised by the company that makes—and holds a patent and trademark—styrofoam that it is never used for cups and plates, etc....It is used for such things as insulation...Now, we all know that "styrofoam" has become generic for any plastic foam product we use—but we must stop!....Remember, no cups and plates are "styrofoam", and that reminded me about how many names have become generic....We use them whether we are speaking of the product manufactured by the owner of the name or some other product with another name....For example, "Jello"...I never say gelatine dessert even if I use a product not made by the Jello Company...and then there's "q-tips"...Do you say "cotton swabs"?...And how about "scotch tape"...lots of companies make sticky tape, but to me, it's all scotch tape....And all small paper cups are automatically, in my vocabulary, "dixie cups"...(and somehow, that's a rather endearing nostalgic word, since it brings back happy memories of those little covered cups, half vanilla and half chocolate, which so delighted us when we were small)...and then there's "Kleenex", which is what all soft paper tissues just are....And that reminds me of a charming story about the small son, youngest of nine, who carefully made his Mother a present...He found a piece of white cloth; cut it into a square; and neatly folded and wrapped it. Then he said, "Mommy, I have made you a special present—a cloth kleenex!"...Little fellow had never heard of a handkerchief.

The Investor's Corner

The Slippery Slope

Thirty years ago as the United States about to embark into the "Camelot" years, we were the recognized leader for technology in the world. More than 50 percent of the spending in the world on research and development was spent by this country. Today that figure stands at about 30 percent and our percentage is falling.

Note that the figure is in percentages. The dollar figures have risen, but nowhere near the increase in the rate of inflation. This is to me very, very ominous. To me it means that, while we still spend more on research than

any other country, our technology lead is slipping. Some will argue that we still are way out ahead, so why worry. There are plenty of reasons to worry. It bodes ill for this country. In the not too distant past, the United States produced almost all of the Nobel prize winners in the research-oriented categories. Today, more and more winners are from the developed countries of the world, other than the United States. Since most Nobel winners did their work about 25 years ago, it is a manifestation of our slipping dominance in the economic world. If you will remember, research leads to development and development leads to a robust economy that produces jobs and exports and all of those good things. We are and have been losing our dominance in many fields. Computer chip technology, one of the huge growth areas of the future and the present, has been lost to Japan. There are many other areas where we lag badly.

The problem is complex. In the educational field, we produce just about as many mathematicians and engineers as does Japan. Most of theirs go into research and development of consumer goods. Half of ours go into weapons and war research. While I admit that we have to protect ourselves, the growth of an economy does not depend on war weapons, it depends on providing consumer goods, a better life for the citizenry. Investments in war are very sterile. Once you

are past the protection stage, it destroys wealth, rather than creates it. It does provide jobs so some good does come out of it. The loss in the economic race because of the lack of engineers, etc. is a great one.

Another cause of our falling research investment is also educational. Our business schools, especially the graduate schools, have preached attention to the bottom line, profits. Managers focus on today's profits. Their incomes depend on them. The price of their stock options depend on them. As investors we depend on them to make our investment rise in value. We are no longer content to take the long view in most parts of our financial and work life. We want it now, and the sooner the better. This retards the investment in research because it does not produce immediate results. Yet, research and then development is what creates wealth and economic growth.

Japan was famous for being copiers of other people's technology and products. What scares me is the fact that Japanese companies are investing almost as much as the United States in research, almost all in consumer research. When you couple this fact with the ability of Japanese companies to produce quality products cheaply, I worry about the future.

Finally, the wave of leveraged buyouts (LBOs) has brought massive debt to many of our largest companies. Cash flow is the end

and the be all for these companies. They need the money to pay down the debt to avoid bankruptcy. Research costs money, research gets short changed in most of them. When you put this added pressure on a bureaucracy, research dies. Survival counts. Future investment becomes secondary. It is one of the worst things about LBOs from the country's point of view.

Unless some of these things change, more engineers in the consumer goods area, the short term orientation of our B-schools and therefore of management, this country will be very hard pressed to maintain our present economic dominance. I wonder whether we are already on the slippery slope. I hope not.

ROBERT R. McMILLAN'S Direct Line

The recent decision by Congressional leaders of both parties and the President to come together on nonmilitary support for the "contras" could herald a new chapter in bipartisan foreign policy. And it is about time! The significant immediate effect is to preserve the anti-communist "contras" while putting pressure on Nicaraguan leaders to live up to their pledges of free elections and freedom of the press. They have talked a great game but have been slow on the follow through. George Bush and his Secretary of State deserve full credit for reaching out to the Congress — just as the President said he would during his Inaugural Address. The Congressional leaders also deserve praise for this spirit



of compromise. The announcement of this agreement, prior to Gorbachev's visit to Cuba, caught the Russians off guard. And, it is interesting that Gorbachev did not visit Nicaragua.

It used to be that partisan politics stopped at the "waters edge." To our friends and enemies overseas, we had always appeared unified as to objectives and methods. The Vietnam War ended that approach, and Central America, until the recent agreement, tore the public and the Congress into factions. The facts are very clear in Central America. Because there was no effort to reach a bipartisan agreement, the facts were always ignored. Each year, for the last several years, the Russians have poured almost one billion dollars of aid into Nicaragua

—more than half of it military aid. To fail to respond to that type of pressure close to our Southern border, has been absurd. That is why a bipartisan approach to the "contras" will end up being in our deepest national interest. The Nicaraguan leaders now know that our nation is together. They are on the spot and will have to live up to their promises.

As I have said before, it is important that Central America and Mexico do not become our Afghanistan. The recent memories of retreating Russians — from a country directly on the southern border of the Soviet Union — are fresh in all of our minds.

The lesson we can learn from the Russian experience is to *not* involve American troops in this Hemisphere — unless all else fails. Instead of troops, we must build better bridges of understanding. We should be helping our neighbors move from per capita incomes of under one thousand dollars to economic dignity. Our bipartisan foreign policy efforts should shift from the "contras" to the people of the entire region. We need to provide intelligent economic aid for better schools, hospitals, roads and business development. We must see to it that there are safeguards to prevent the aid from lining the pockets of government leaders in Central America. The United States, long ago, abandoned "banana boat" diplomacy. But benign neglect is not good enough either.

The aroma of bipartisanship in foreign policy should very well help on another important national issue. There is a pressing need for both parties to come together on the budget deficit. We cannot continue for long with a growing national debt. Just think of what a reduction in the debt would mean on Wall Street and in the strength of the dollar — all of this directly translated to our lives. I am pleased that George Bush has extended his hand to the Democrats in Congress and am equally pleased that they reached back. It can bring nothing but good to our nation. Let us hope it continues.

DELETE: Section 17-63, "Parking of commercial vehicles in prohibited areas or at night" in its entirety and in its place:

ADD: New Section 17-63, "Parking of commercial vehicles in prohibited areas or at night" to read as follows:

It shall be unlawful for any person to park or leave standing at any time any commercial vehicle or bus on any street, road or highway of the town in violation of any regulations where signs or markings giving notice thereof are posted, or to park or leave standing between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., any commercial vehicle on any street, road or highway of the town. This section shall not, however, prohibit any commercial vehicle from making deliveries of merchandise or providing service to the occupants of any premises located on any such street, road or highway.

(a) Commercial vehicle. The words "commercial vehicle" shall include any vehicle bearing a commercial, bus, farm, livery, school, spec commercial, tax, 1 + 1c, tow truck or tractor license plate, or, in the absence of said license plate, any vehicle with a seating capacity greater than nine (9) persons. Contract Bridge By Steve Becker

To play good bridge, certain good habits have to be formed. One of the most important of these is to count your winners when playing a notrump contract.

Consider South's approach to this deal. He won the spade lead with the queen and led a club from dummy, taking East's queen with the ace. Declarer then played another club to West's king, and back came a second spade to dummy's ace.

Although the clubs were now established, declarer had only eight

tricks he could cash, consisting of four clubs, two spades and two hearts. When he later led a diamond, East took the ace and returned a spade to chalk up a one-trick defeat.

When South's method of play is analyzed, it becomes clear that his approach was sure to lead to down one. He had to lose a club and a diamond before he could score nine tricks, and since he also had to lose at least three spades, after surrendering the lead twice, he was bound to fail.

If declarer realizes this at trick one, he should also appreciate the great advantage of playing a low diamond from dummy at trick two. In the actual case, if East goes up with the ace, declarer acquires four diamond tricks and easily makes the contract. So let's say East plays the nine and South's king wins the trick.

Having "stolen" a diamond trick, declarer can now turn his attention to clubs by playing the ace and another club. West wins with the king and returns a spade to establish his suit, but his cause is already lost. South at this point has nine tricks consisting of four clubs, a diamond, two hearts and two spades.

Of course, if West happens to have the ace of diamonds, this line of play fails. But the diamond lead at trick two at least offers a good chance for the contract, while tackling clubs first offers no chance at all.



Capitol Hill Journal

Rep. Barbara Kennelly (D-CT) has introduced the Infant Mortality Prevention Act which would add \$100 million in supplemental funds to the Title V Maternal and Child Health Block Grant Program. One of the features of this legislation is its focus on outreach and education. In the past, many experts have argued that a lack of education and outreach are major barriers in preventing women from obtaining adequate prenatal care.

Kennelly is quick to point out that in recent years the problem of infant mortality in the United States has gotten worse. The United States currently ranks 21st among the industrial nations in infant mortality. In some parts of the country, the infant mortality rate is as high as it is in many third world nations.

As far as the cost of her legislation is concerned, Kennelly believes that it will actually save the taxpayers money, as numerous studies have shown that prenatal preventive programs are cost effective. She cites statistics which indicate that every \$1 of prenatal care saves \$3.60 in later health care costs.

In an effort to solve the crisis over the federal deficit, Rep. Bill Frenzel (R-Minn.) has introduced the Common Sense Budget Act

of 1989. If enacted into law, this legislation would require that both the Congressional budget committees and the president base their budget plans on actual prior year spending levels as opposed to a current services baseline.

According to Frenzel, it is almost impossible to restrain the federal budget when operating on a current service basis. The central problem with the current service baseline approach, Frenzel believes, is that it assumes growth in all federal programs. Frenzel argues that "a common sense baseline will provide a context for Congress to achieve the deficit reduction which we all know is necessary, but which we seem unable to achieve using the present system."

There is much attention this week focused on the Middle East as both Israeli and Egyptian leaders are in town for official visits. This has led Rep. Henry Hyde (R-IL) to suggest that former President Jimmy Carter be awarded the Noble Peace Prize for his role in producing the historic Camp David accords. As Hyde is a very partisan Republican and was certainly no admirer of Carter when he was in office, his recent remarks came as more than a little surprise to many on Capitol Hill.

The recent plunge of the stock market brought out all the gloom and doom boys. "Panic" screamed one headline. "Crash" bellowed another. "Bust" wailed a third. Joining the cacophony of doomers came the cry from some top rated photographers, that Black and White was on its way out. Color had taken over. The era of Black and White had come to an end.

Manufacturers were devoting more time and money to develop better color film, color printing paper and color developing equipment. More and more sidewalk kiosks were opening up at busy market places, where one can drop off and pick up color prints and slides within a day. More and more small independent color film processing outfits with "one hour service" were springing up all over the environment.

Truly the age of color photography had arrived. Color photography had, in some degree, entered every home that had a camera.

Whether it was a \$39.95 special or an expensive Nikon did not matter. What did matter was the explosion of color photography within such a short time.

Of course, movies and television had the greatest impact in bringing color into the homes and lives of people. Museums, galleries and collectors all jumped on the color bandwagon. It was indeed the "Time of the Rainbow".

Giant corporations invested heavily to decorate corporate headquarters, field offices and workplaces, with color photography. Schools, teaching photography stressed color. Even camera clubs were changing their names to Color Camera Club so and so. Or Color Slide Camera Club, etc.

It seemed that color had dealt Black and White a fatal blow. Such was the pronouncement of the doomsday prophets. It was nice while it lasted - but tempus fugit - Time mar-
