

Group Home Planned

The Association for the Help of Retarded Children plans to establish a community residence for 10 adults at 21 Country Court north of Hicksville off Newbridge Road, according to a town commissioner.

The home will accommodate mentally retarded and developmentally disabled adults. Planning and Development Commissioner Richard Blankfein said in a letter to local civic associations.

The facility will be licensed by the State of New York Office of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities.

The Town of Oyster Bay has 40 days to comment on the proposal. Under the Mental Hygiene Law, the town can object to the proposed site only on the grounds that the immediate area is "saturated" with similar facilities; the town could also propose alternate sites in the community, based upon recommendations from the citizens.

There are three similar group homes in the community.

The State of New York Office of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities has ultimate jurisdiction to approve or deny the location as a community residence facility.

Mr. Blankfein noted that Hicksville residents "should be aware that the town has no zoning control over the site selection of facilities for the mentally disabled." He added, "The State of New York has exclusive jurisdiction in this regard."

The Town has until July 5 to submit its comments on the proposed facility.

Mr. Blankfein also noted that a representative from the Association for the Help of Retarded Children (AHRC) and the Town of Oyster Bay is available to discuss the proposed program at public meetings.

The town acts as a liaison for the residents and AHRC.

Developer Says He'll Decrease Building Size Original Building Too 'Bulky' Say Residents

A local developer interested in constructing an office building at West John and Strong Streets now says he's prepared to construct a much smaller office, his attorney said last week.

Spiegel Associates' original plan, which was presented to the public last year, was considered too "bulky" by a special Northwest Civic Association steering committee which acts as a liaison between the developer and area residents, William S. Cohn said at the civic association's meeting. The building size was cut in half to better blend in with the area's architecture.

Spiegel's plan includes demolition of the three existing residential structures which are in a dilapidated condition. Currently, Spiegel's application to construct the building and re-zone the land is pending with the Town of Oyster Bay.

One of the most unattractive elements of the proposal, residents said, was the proposed exit on Strong Street, adjacent to a fire house. Last year, residents said that the increased traffic could cause a delay

in the response time of the firefighters.

Although Spiegel Associates will consider eliminating the exit on Strong Street, Mr. Cohn noted that they will then have to put two exits and entrances on West John Street.

Residents also said the building would block the view of motorists exiting Strong Street onto West John. The building's architect, Peter Shelton of Shelton, Mindel and Associates, New York City, said that the building is set back 20 feet which is even further than the existing homes.

One resident asked why Spiegel Associates is constructing another office building when other buildings owned by developer Jerry Spiegel are not even occupied.

Mr. Cohn said, "I know it's a tough market today, but by the time this building gets constructed, hopefully the market will be better."

Residents also asked for reassurance that there will be no structural additions after the office is completed. Mr. Cohn said that the town requires a certain number of park-

ing spaces per square foot of a building; the way Spiegel's building is designed leaves no room for further expansion, he added.

The land is approximately 54,000 square feet or 1.25 acres. The building will be located in the southeast corner of the property so "passersby will sense the open space," said Mr. Shelton. "If the building were in the center, it would command the most attention," he noted. The plan also calls for 90 parking spaces. The building will be 32 feet, not much higher than a two-story house with a gable roof which runs approximately 27 to 28 feet in height, Mr. Shelton said.

The building's exterior will be similar to residential style homes, said Mr. Shelton who indicated that he took into consideration the decor of area homes.

Before Spiegel Associates may proceed with its plans, a public hearing must be held on the application. However, a town spokesperson said that as of Monday a final application for a hearing has not yet been filed.

Budget Misconceptions

To The Editor:
I am writing this letter to clear up some misconceptions that have been written about Hicksville School Board elections. It concerns me that a board member could write such nonsense. The comments about the HCT [Hicksville Congress of Teachers] and CSEA [Civil Service Employees Association] are unfounded.
I, myself, like other concerned residents who are fed up with the present school board, have contributed their time and money to [newly elected school board trustees William Collins and James Martillo]. Like many others, I do not stand to directly gain from them sitting on the board. I am not a member of the HCT or CSEA, nor do I work for the school system in any way.
In the *Illustrated's* May 18 issue, school board trustee William Bennett stated he has reason to believe that eight to 10 thousand dollars was funneled into the campaign. The Investor's Corner

The Market Today

As this column is being written, the market is going through a euphoria that reminds me of July, 1987. It continues its upward climb

June, the end of the quarter. Between now and the end of the month you will see heavy buying by the funds. At month's end, we should see some profit taking. My guess is that the market will continue upward for the balance of the month, a rocky road upward with fits and starts, but generally upward. At month's end, sometime close to the 27th or 28th, it should become the victim of profit taking. July should bring us another round of in-

vestment and another upward trend. It is the kind of market in which to be very wary. Nothing on Wall Street has changed significantly to ward off another October 19. Program trading is alive and well.

Despite the repeated articles and experts who say that program trading was not the cause of the "crash," I am extremely worried that they are wrong. You can tell me all you want how the program trading gets unhinged at a drop (or rise) of 50 points on the Dow. If the selling generated by the programs catches hold, as it might with a scared bunch of managers doing the investing, you will have a very sharp drop in the market averages.

That would be a very good time to step in and buy some quality issues. The bargains will abound. Now the bargains are getting harder and harder to find. Look at the number of quality mutual fund managers who have closed their books to new customers within the last two weeks. Three of them were favorites on my personal list of mutual funds. They cannot find enough places to invest the money in quality bargains. Now I have to look for other very good ones to replace them—easier said than done.

Do not expect the FED to reduce the interest rates quickly. They have started down as this column said they would about a month ago. They should continue down, but very, very slowly. Mr. Greenspan, the Fed chairman, is a conservative thinker. If he makes an error, expect it to be on the side of caution. The Fed always balances economic growth with inflation fears. In a crunch, the fight

against inflation wins over economic expansion.

Right now, the inflation front has not been faring too well. Producer prices were up very sharply in MAY. The trend (and that is all that really counts, not one month of data) has been up for this index. That eventually comes down to our level in the form of higher prices. How fast and how much is a function of competition. It has been a long time since I have seen most prices fall. The inflation rate is a modest 5 percent (modest, that's a joke. Remember—Nixon imposed wage and price controls in 1972 when the index reached three percent).

All that this means is that we must be careful. As the market advances to higher ground, it continues to become overheated. The more overheated, the greater the possibility that a sharp reversal will come.

What generally happens is that the trader, the person on the street, starts to get out as the little guy sucker comes in. There have been increasing signs that the little guy has started backing into the market. We are getting awed by the price rises. Be careful because October, 1987, could be repeated in 1989 if we forget the lesson so many of us learned.

My concern is that, if we get burned again, a whole generation of investors will disappear.

Direct Line

Does the Congress have a severe case of ethics? Will Billy Graham's next "crusade" be held in the House Chamber? With Democrats Jim Wright and Tony Coelho disgraced by economic self-dealing, many people are beginning to wonder even more about the depth of corruption in the Congress. John Tower seems almost like a choir boy — when compared to the recent antics of members of Congress.



Where are we going? And, what are the underlying issues driving this ethics resurgence. It is too simple to say greed alone has caused the economic shenanigans. It is probably a combination of greed, relatively low pay, cumbersome regulations, and voters who are fed up with an imperial incumbency. Greed has been with us forever, and because of human nature, sadly, will really not change. But, a higher standard of ethics can and should be expected from elected officials.

As for the relatively low pay, it really depends on the region. Even with the need to maintain two houses, a member of Congress from a rural district can live on far less than someone from a metropolitan area. Please do not underestimate the economic sacrifices — not to speak of the time commitment — made by members of Congress. True, there seems to be a great deal of glory. But eighty five thousand five hundred dollars, benefits, and glory do not go very far in meeting the economic demands on a metropolitan area member of Congress with a family. Most people, with a comparable set of responsibilities in the private sector, would earn far more and have a much better quality of life.

Adding to the cost for members is the expense involved in filing the various ethics forms required by the rules of the House and Senate. Any member undertaking the completion of these forms without high quality accounting advice does so at tremendous risk — particularly in this period of greater scrutiny. The line between an honest administrative error and an effort to deceive is tenuous at best.

As for the "imperial incumbency," the national electorate tends to send a negative message about the win rate of incumbents and expresses upsetment with corruption in the Congress. Yet, the residents of a particular district do not seem prepared to apply the harshness of the general moral standard to "their" member or feel that he or she has been elected too often. For example, even with a corruption conviction, Mario Biaggi, of the Bronx, was still re-elected with open arms in his district and by friends outside of the Bronx. Support in Dallas — Forth Worth remains steadfast for Jim Wright. Grassroots political views normally take on a different life and contrast vividly with national public opinion.

Making an effort to turn public opinion, some Democrats, in the House, are now crying that the ethics investigation will "...destroy the institution." They call for a return to "policy debate." These are some of the same partisan politicians who were crying for the scalp of Ed Meese, Robert Bork, John Tower, and any other Republican whose character they could assassinate. Now that the spotlight is on Democrats, it is "partisan politics" and will destroy the "institution." If there is one bit of decay in the Congress, it should be removed. There must be no deals on ethics.

After all the finger pointing, it is clear that members of Congress should probably be paid more. That would take some of the pressure off of those good and decent members struggling to keep family, homes and soul together. Even though the mystique of having "citizen legislators" has appeal, unless a member is paid well, only the rich will have the financial resources to serve. Paying members of Congress more than a survival wage would remove some temptation. However, more pay or rewriting the rules should never be a substitute for honesty — the paramount issue. Wine-making often runs in families. Sometimes it's in the family winery; for instance, the son of Robert Mondavi has taken over as the winemaker.

But there's "cross-fertilization," too. Frederick Frank, grandson of the legendary Konstantin Frank who pioneered vinifera grapes in the eastern United States, now makes Long Island wines for Banfi. And Christian Mouetx, of the family that owns the famous Chateaux Petrus, makes Dominus in the style of Bordeaux in California.

Wine appellations in Bordeaux are usually apportioned by soil, in California by weather. One of the newest in California is Stags Leap. A sub-region within the Napa Valley, it consists of just 2,700 acres.

Among the natural byproducts of fermentation is a small amount of sulfites; this is increased slightly when vintners add a small amount of sodium dioxide as a necessary preservative.

These preservatives have been used for centuries. Quite recently there's been a furore over sulfites because of the reactions of a few sensitive people. That's why your wine label carries the "contains sulfites" warning.

Unlike other "collectibles," fine wine will improve with age only so long. After that it's more a curiosity than wine. That's probably why some collectors arrange special tastings of their treasures.

DNA testing, also called "genetic fingerprinting," produces a photographic image of the DNA in a sample of blood, skin and other cellular material.

"Fun with DNA" workshop was the first time that elementary aged children were involved in this new aspect of genetic engineering. Ms. Niceforo was selected to be on the program's advisory committee.

The Elementary Academic Enrichment Students learned about DNA in the unit of study Ms. Niceforo and Mrs. Ann Gladstone developed, "Genetics: Unravelling the Double Helix." During this unit, all of the students had the opportunity to visit the DNA Learning Center and Smithsonian Exhibition in Cold Spring Harbor and to engage in question and answer periods with the scientists.

To introduce the new Legacy compact sedan and station wagon to its dealers, Subaru went all out. At North Coast Subaru of Glen Cove, dealer Angelo Santoro and manager Loretta Moraglia were part of the 800-nation-wide Subaru dealer team that spent three days in Lafayette, Indiana seeing the new factory. It will be on line by late '89.

The Legacy launch is the coming of age for Subaru, said Loretta. Many of the dealers drove their Legacy's home from Indiana.

They came back thrilled with the demonstrations. Angelo wouldn't let the new Legacy out of his sight.

It was a great trip, and a wonderful way to appreciate the way the Legacy is built. The factory is State-Of-The-Art. It is the size of 37 football fields. It is worked by robotics, with some manual input. The painting is done entirely by robots.

One machine can stamp out 900 parts in one hour. One can change a die in three minutes. Every wire in the new cars are encased with protection sheathing. The advertising for the Legacy will be using a comparison with its competitors approach. It will

compete with the Toyota Camry, Honda Accord and Hyundai Sonata.

"People are going to shop around. Nowadays, we have an educated consumer, so why not tell them up front how good the car is," said Loretta.

The LS is the top of the line with 4 wheel drive, antilock brakes, 4-cylinder, 16 valve, Multi-Point Fuel Injected, 2.2L Overhead Cam engine.

The Legacy has a new design, horizontally-opposed 4-cylinder engine. This 4-valve per cylinder, single-overhead-camshaft engine puts out 130 horsepower with an equally impressive 1.37 lb. ft. of torque. There is minimal noise and vibration because of a crankshaft that is only 10 inches long. There is a multi-point fuel injection and distributorless ignition run by the Subaru Electronic Engine Management System.

To let the public know how good the new Legacy is, Subaru held a full day demonstration at the Meadowlands for sales people. Loretta said its aim was to generate better customer information about the car. Why keep it under the hat... or should I say hood.



The Indirect Approach

The bidding:

 Opening lead — king of diamonds.

It isn't difficult to make four spades on this deal — assuming you know where the jack of clubs is located. If West has the jack you lead low to dummy's Q-10 and finesse the ten; if East has the jack you lead low from dummy to your K-9 and finesse the nine.

You seldom know in such situations where the missing jack is located, so the question that arises is how to go about finding out which opponent is more likely to have it.

Unfortunately, there is no magic rule that guides declarer to the correct solution in all cases, and the chief reason for this is that the circumstances are different in every case.

Declarer's best method of play here, after ruffing the diamond lead high, is to enter dummy with a spade to the eight, ruff another diamond, play a spade to the nine, and ruff dummy's last diamond. The object of all these plays is to clear dummy of diamonds and thus pave the way to resolving the club problem.

South then plays the ace and another heart. As it happens, West wins the second heart (it doesn't help him to unblock the king under the ace) and must yield the contract whether he returns a club or a diamond. Note that the outcome would be exactly the same if the hearts were divided 3-3.

In effect, South solves the jack of clubs problem indirectly — by first eliminating dummy's diamonds. The suggested method of play is not 100 percent certain to succeed; the East-West cards may be so divided that South will still have to guess the location of the jack of clubs later on. But the recommended method of play is nevertheless far more reliable than depending entirely on one's occult powers.
