

Board Investigates Bus Transportation

A special Hicksville Board of Education meeting was held on Nov 8 for the purpose of holding a Transportation Workshop, which included preliminary estimates of costs involved should the District decide to purchase its own school buses. Notice of the special board meeting was posted on the outside doors of the Administration Building.

The meeting was chaired by Board Secretary James Martillo in the absence of President Mark Cardella and Vice President Daniel MacBride. Trustees William Bennett, William Collins, Jo Ann Miltenberg and Patricia Rooney were present. While campaigning for the Board, Mr. Martillo spoke of his desire to see the District investigate purchasing school buses.

William Hall presented the Transportation Workshop. As Assistant Superintendent for Business, Mr. Hall has direct responsibility for the district's buses, as well as its financial affairs. Mary Lippman, the assistant supervisor of transportation census was introduced.

District Safety Officer

Wendy Mosca, new Safety Officer for the District was introduced. One of Ms. Mosca's responsibilities will be to work with the district to spot check bus routes, a service which Harran had provided in the past. Mr. Hall said, "Hopefully that will help us to correct some of the bus problems we have in the District." Ms. Mosca reports to Thomas Shaw, director of Facilities and operations, and will coordinate the safety committee for the district.

Bus Concerns

Superintendent Catherine Fenton indicated that parallel records for bus drivers are now being kept by the District. Under section 19-a of the Motor Vehicle Law, driver applicants' fingerprints and driving records for at least three years are checked, drug testing is done and references are given before a recommendation is made by the Superintendent of Schools to hire the driver.

Under the District's revised operating procedures, the bus companies must provide the District with copies of complaints. In the past, the bus company did not always do this. Adeline Rudin, a former school board member, questioned where the permanent identification decals are that Harran was told to affix to its buses. The temporary signs which were taped to the buses in early September are still being used.

Another resident asked that matrons be assigned to all K-6 buses. The District has not yet been successful in hiring matrons for its Kindergarten—only bus runs. Resident Joe Visconti suggested that matrons be used for other jobs within the district when they are not needed on the buses, giving as an example schoolyard monitor. Mr. Martillo said that would have to be looked into. According to Mr. Hall, the district has interviewed more than 40 applicants with no "volunteers" to work both jobs.

Mrs. Miltenberg said that the district hiring its own matrons might not be feasible. When matrons are contracted for directly with the Bus Company, the cost is approximately \$11,000 annually.

Bus Routes

Computers are used by the district to help establish bus routes. Available software can pinpoint the location of stop signs, one-way streets, etc., as well as do enrollment analysis and print bus passes and labels. A separate list is maintained for each street in Hicksville which indicates addresses and students residing on each street. The district census is used to keep this list updated.

Bus drivers are given no student names, addresses or telephone numbers. A map with bus stops only is given. Questions were raised by residents regarding bus drivers familiarizing themselves with routes prior to the start of school. A resident suggested that each bus be furnished with a map with its route highlighted in red. Mr. Hall agreed.

Another question was raised regarding the time necessary to complete routes. While the computer controls the initial timing, routes are usually adjusted during the first few weeks of school by the bus driver. A resident commented on buses waiting on side streets when they were "too early." According to Mr.

Republicans Returned to Run Town Hall

Town of Oyster Bay voters have found a way to save money: return incumbents and save the cost of new nameplates on the town board, not to mention the signs which dot the town's landscape.

Straight across the line, Republican incumbents were shown overwhelming support by the town's voters. Supervisor Angelo Delligatti, a resident of Massapequa, was returned to his post for a second term defeating Frank Goban of Hicksville.

During the campaign, Goban charged that the "Republican Machine" was responsible for rising tax rates and environmental problems in the township and county. Goban, who ran unsuccessfully against Congressman Norman Lent last year, vowed to lower taxes

by 5 to 10 percent if he was elected. Goban also said the town's solid waste plan was poorly conceived and suggested the establishment of "total recycling plants."

Delligatti, on the other hand, pointed to the recently adopted budget, which had no increase, as indicative of his tax responsibility. Saying he knew no one who was "more committed to recycling" than himself, Delligatti stood by the proposed resource recovery facility as an integral part of the solid waste solution.

According to unofficial tallies, Delligatti secured more than 39,000 votes to Goban's approximately 22,000. Hicksville residents, according to the area's Republican Club, follow-

ed the townwide trend, supporting Delligatti over Goban, 6,802 to 3,438.

The three incumbent Republican Town Councilmen were given similar support throughout the township. Howard Hogan, Jr. and Douglas Hynes each received approximately 35,000 votes with Leonard Symons garnering more than 33,000. Although Symons is a member of the Town Board, this marks his first win as he was appointed after the resignation of Kenneth Diamond.

Challenging the incumbents were Democrats David Sidikman, Thomas Stabile and Patricia Coniglio. According to unofficial figures, each of the challengers received slightly more than 22,000 votes.

In the final Town of Oyster Bay contest, incumbent Republican Carl Marcellino of Syosset received 35,000 votes to Democrat challenger Maureen Arecco's 23,000, a Hicksville resident.

The Republican sweep in the Town of Oyster Bay was almost completely mirrored throughout the county. Benjamin Zwirn's defeat of North Hempstead Supervisor John Kiernan was the only loss suffered by an incumbent Republican.

County Executive Thomas Gulotta hardly defeated Democrat challenger Richard Korn. Korn, like Goban, campaigned against the Republican monopoly and high taxes. Although Gulotta was elected to his seat, he will serve his first complete term with this victory. Hicksville residents cast 6,559 votes for Gulotta and 4,244 votes for Korn.

Other winners in Nassau County were Denis Dillon for District Attorney and Peter King for County Comptroller.

Broadway Mall Drops MSBA Buses from Premises

Bus Stop Remains in Front of Nathan's

Bus riders will no longer be able to transfer at the Broadway Mall as of this Sunday because the existing lease arrangement with Nassau County has been terminated by mall management.

However, the current N20 drop-off in front of Nathan's on Broadway will remain, according to mall officials. Passengers wanting to get to the mall from the new transfer station at the railroad will have to wait for the N20 to pick them up.

"Despite Nassau County's efforts to retain space in the mall, the owners have ordered the removal of MSBA's operations from its premises," Metropolitan Suburban Bus Authority officials said in a statement.

Broadway Mall spokesperson Alice Rosen said, "People can still come to the mall if they're using public transportation. There's a legitimate stop in front of Nathan's. We are not turning away any shoppers." She added, "We are not a transfer station or bus depot and we never have been."

The mall's bus stop will be replaced by park-

ing for its new furniture store, Ikea.

The MSBA bus stops will be moved from the present location at the northeast section of the Broadway Mall parking lot to the Hicksville Long Island Rail Road Station on Newbridge Road between Duffy Avenue and Barclay Street. There will be departure time adjustments. All previous transfers at Broadway Mall can now be made at the Hicksville LIRR station. Passengers who would like to travel north to Broadway Mall can take Route N20 (Hicksville-Flushing) to the Hicksville LIRR station from Routes N22, N48/49, N50, N73/74, N78/79 and N80/81.

MSBA officials said that during the week of Nov. 19, MSBA will assign additional supervisory and staff personnel to the new Hicksville LIRR station bus stops to provide assistance to passengers.

The following MSBA bus routes will longer stop at Broadway Mall: N22 Jamaica-Hicksville, N48/49 Hempstead-Hicksville, N50 Bellmore-Hicksville, N73/74 Wantagh-Hicksville, N78 Mineola-Plainview, N79 Mineola-

Two Die in Jerusalem Avenue Car Accident



A man and a woman were killed Nov. 8 after their 1986 Chevrolet collided with a 1987 Ford van driven by a 33-year-old Levittown resident. The male victim, John Keane, 81, of Hicksville, was driving westbound on Ninth Street and the van was traveling northbound on Jerusalem Avenue when the accident occurred at 10:50 a.m., police said. The Levittown man was taken to Nassau County Medical Center where he was treated and released for contusions. Keane, and his wife, Cecelia, 78, were both taken to the medical center suffering from severe body trauma. They later died of their injuries. Both vehicles were impounded for tests and the Eighth Precinct is investigating.

Hicksville Firemen Respond to Chemical Spill

Hicksville firefighters responded to a chemical spill on Route 135 of the Long Island Expressway Monday after a tanker truck rolled over on its side spilling some of its methylene chloride on the roadway.

At about 1 p.m., Nassau County police and Syosset Fire Department responded to the initial alarm.

Assistant chief Johnson of the Syosset F.D. requested assistance from the Nassau County Fire Marshall Hazardous Materials unit, the Plainview F.D. and the Hicksville F.D. Foam Support Unit.

All traffic was diverted off the expressway between Old Country Road and Jericho Turnpike.

The truck driver was injured in the accident and was taken to the hospital.

Firefighters waited until the toxic fumes dispersed before clean up and removal operations began early Monday evening.

Other Incidents

In other fire department news, Hicksville's F.D. ambulance was called to the scene of a Northern State van accident Nov. 8 where seven people were killed.

At about 6 a.m., the van carrying 15 workers from the city went out of control on the parkway just west of the Oyster Bay Road exit.

The van, after leaving the roadway, continued for 200 feet, struck a large oak tree and caught fire. Several of the occupants died on impact. One or two people were burned to death trapped in the van. The driver survived.

The Syosset Fire Department was first on the scene with two ambulances and an engine company, followed by ambulances from the Nassau County Police, Jericho, Hicksville and Plainview fire departments. The injured were taken to Syosset and Mid Island Hospitals and Nassau County Medical Center.

New York State Police are investigating the cause of the accident.

At Press Time

Monday night at the Northwest Civic Association meeting, residents expressed concern that the bus stop would end up permanently in the rear of the mall where it abuts Burns Avenue School, as the Newbridge Road transfer station is temporary. Town of Oyster Bay Supervisor Angelo Dell'Agata, the meeting's guest speaker, said that would not happen as the mall had originally "offered them [MSBA] the area by the school, but told them that would be unacceptable."

Mr. Dell'Agata also said that there would be no bus terminal in Hicksville. "I can assure you that," he added.

Shaarei Zedek Seminar





The Investor's Corner

A Garbage Investment

There are few things that are predictable in this world with any degree of certitude. The garbage crisis is not one of those things.

We pile up the stuff at unprecedented rates. The average New York city resident generates more than 4 pounds every day. That is 30,000 tons every day. We are not alone or the worst. The residents of Los Angeles

produce more than 6 pounds and Philadelphia 5 pounds every day. It is really an unsavory mess.

When I was looking for a doctoral dissertation topic in 1975, I thought of the idea of writing about the problem of garbage in the USA. My solution was to ship the garbage to the midwest by train to the abandoned coal strip mines. Each train would return with coal to help solve the energy crisis. This would solve two problems by getting rid of the garbage and turning devastated land into verdant fields. I decided that it was impractical.

It was easy to know that garbage was a growing problem, even then. I used to drive to Brooklyn College in those days along the southern pky. The route went past Starrett City, which is built on garbage. Going west, the land on your right is flat. On the left, water side, is a mountain 75 feet high that used to be flat. All garbage. NYC was even then, running out of space for its refuse. Staten Island will be closed in a few years or the garbage will be 80 feet high.

We have belatedly started to tackle the problem on a local level.

Thank God we are now required to recycle our junk, a small start toward a solution. All solutions are expensive and politically unpopular. Yet the problem must be attacked

...Did you fight with your brothers and sisters when you were a kid?...Are you saying, "Of course—everyone fights with his brothers and sisters"...and that's what's so strange...I have absolutely no recollection of ever having fought with my little brother—and I don't believe that I did....Since everyone does fight, I have been sure that I am putting fighting out of my mind, but just to make sure, I have consulted with my few surviving relatives old enough to remember that long ago time and they assure me that we did not fight...Now why should that be?...I remember so many things about him and growing up—He is two years younger and should have been that impossible thing, a "little brother", but he was never a pest...He was always part of my group, as kids or teenagers and no one ever seemed to consider him a nuisance...We built huts together and shared a rabbit named Snoopy and he had four pigeons, who had a cage outside and a house inside our garage and we had a real mutt of a dog named Ginger, but Ginger liked him better than me...and he never wrecked my beloved dolls and I never disturbed his toy soldiers...and we both helped our Father make newspaper boats to sail into the fire in the fireplace...and we played monopoly and parchesi and tiddly-winks and I even played marbles with him...and we walked to school together and home for lunch and pushed silver around under the tablecloth through the holes and pretended to have a submarine war...and we always knew that Mallomars have nine cookies in each box and we always each had four and a half...and I honestly don't think we ever fought...and how did our parents manage that?...I never could...my kids fought, lots...but I know that we never did...It must be that he was just a super kid and wasn't the usual "pain-in-the-neck"—and that's why I never fought with him!...I hope you had a brother—or sister like that.

now. The eastern part of the USA is almost out of landfill area. Recently, Pennsylvania closed our access to their landfills in a couple of years.

One way to partially solve the problem, and pay for the high cost, is to make it expensive not to solve the problem. We could raise the per bottle deposit to 50 cents at the supermarket, or a dollar if that does not work. This would cut the volume, immediately. If nothing else, it would help the homeless who use cans and bottles as a source of income. I do not like this suggestion myself, but something has to be done and quickly before we are shipping the stuff to Arizona as I envisioned years ago.

Now! Wherever there is a problem, there is an investment opportunity. Someone will come along with a solution. Some solutions will be good, some will be bad. What we know is that there is opportunity. We can use landfills, recycle and incinerate as partial solutions. What is absolutely predictable is that the costs of all the solutions will go up, and faster than the rate of inflation. This is an ideal investment situation. In good time and in

bad, the companies in the business may present investment opportunities. So what to do?

Obviously, the first thing to do is check out the big companies in the business. They are Waste Management (ticker WMX), Browning Ferris (BEI) and Laidlaw Transport (LDMFB). Others in the business are Chemical Waste MGTE (CHW), and Chambers Dev Class A (CDVA). Smaller companies are Environmental Systems Co (ESC), Kimmins Environmental (KEVN) and Clean Harbors, Inc. (CLHB). Some smaller companies in special niches include Pacific Nuclear Systems, Inc. (PACN), American Ecology Corp. (ECOL) and Advatec Assoc. Inc. (ADTX). There are a score of other companies that can be checked out. Remember, these are not recommendations, investigate before you leap. That's why I gave the ticker symbols. I recently wrote an article on "How to be a super stock picker." If you want a copy write the newspaper. Include a self-addressed stamped business size envelope.

Daniel Ortega is a Marxist. In other words, he is a communist. There is no doubt about his credentials.

Ortega freely advertises his allegiances. He even shows up at political meetings outside of his country, wearing a military uniform. He has been actively supported and encouraged by the Soviet Union — in spite of public relations efforts to portray him as a reformer. In fact, around six hundred and fifty million dollars worth of military aid flows to Nicaragua from the Soviet Union each year. Nicaragua is eight hundred miles from the mainland of the United States and has planes capable of reaching our shores. Who knows what Ortega might do to irritate the United States? His off and on again cease fire with the Contras shows how erratic this rusty dictator can be. If all of this doesn't add up to a situation affecting the national security interests of the United States, then I am out of touch with reality.

Ortega's maneuvers are those of a man feeling the hot breath of change. He has suppressed a free press in his country, and there are no signs of his loosening the grip on civil liberties. He faces an election in February, and reports indicate that his party is not doing so well. What is happening in East Germany, Prague, and even in the Soviet Union, has to be a precursor of change throughout the communist world. Communism has failed.

It is only a matter of time before world events catch up with the "little man" in Nicaragua. Freedom is breaking out, and even the largest army in Central America will not be able to keep Ortega in power once his Russian support evaporates. And the Russians, reports indicate,

are starting to become impatient with him.

It will also be interesting to observe events in Cuba over the next several months. While Castro appears to have a firm hand, information from Havana indicates that there are stirrings of freedom there just as in the tottering European satellites of the Soviet Union. In coming to power, both Castro and Ortega disguised their true politics. Had people realized that they were throwing out one dictator for another with communist stripes, their support for an Ortega or a Castro would not have been as strong. With contagious freedom catching on throughout the world, it is only a matter of time before the two communist military dictators will be looking for new employment. The pattern is clear.

In the meantime, the United States must be more than patient — even though patience, in the wake of world events, will work greatly to our advantage. We must be absolutely certain that no economic advantage of any kind is given to Cuba or Nicaragua. It would be foolhardy for the United States to build up the economies of those countries. We have no alternative until they abandon efforts to destabilize Central and South America.

Next, we must continue to urge our friends in Central America, South America, Mexico, and Europe to isolate both dictators. Some of our friends have cooperated — others have not. The ones who have not must be convinced that it is in their best interests to do so. For after all, it may be their freedom which is next at risk.

No matter what happens in the short term, time is really on our side. Communism is truly a failed system. Voted out of existence in Hungary, just a little over thirty years after Russian tanks rolled into Budapest, communism has lost its appeal even in third world countries. And as Russia is encircled by freedom, the United States must continue to be cautious. The bear in a corner may become more ferocious. If the Soviet Union is not willing to terminate its support for Nicaragua and Cuba, the United States must no longer be willing to provide any form of further economic assistance to Moscow. Perhaps, when Mikhail Gorbachev and George Bush meet next month, the subject of Cuba and Nicaragua will be on the agenda. It should be. You sometimes get lucky when you're declarer, and when this occurs you should attempt to take full advantage of it. For example, take this deal where West leads a spade against six hearts doubled. When you play the king from dummy, East plays the ace which you ruff.

You may think that this is your lucky day because, with a diamond or trump lead, you would have virtually no chance for the slam. But West did lead a spade, and now you have a

chance to make the key play of a low club to dummy's jack, which wins. Then — backing your judgment that West has been hanging on grimly to four clubs to the K-10 — you lead a diamond from dummy. When East goes up with the ace — which you ruff as West's king falls on the trick — you get further assurance that you have analyzed the defenders' cards correctly.

You lead the queen of clubs next, forcing West to win with the king and return a club from his 10-8 to your A-9. So you make the slam as the result of a fortunate opening lead and extremely careful play, and you say to yourself that bridge is an easy game — provided you play it correctly.

absorption center in Jerusalem. They have their own apartment. They are getting help in finding jobs. The girls have begun school and are making new friends. They are free to live as Jews.

The Borovinskys are just one family. This year some 40,000 Jews will be permitted to leave the Soviet Union and begin new lives in Israel and New York. They will be helped by UJA-Federation agencies at home and overseas, and through the special Passage to Freedom campaign for Soviet Jewish emigres.

Old Gerlich's: A Home Away From Home

When is a neighborhood restaurant not a neighborhood restaurant? When you don't have to be from the neighborhood to feel at home.

Old Gerlich's in Glen Head is just that type of neighborhood restaurant. It's large enough, and has an island-wide reputation to attract a clientele from miles around, yet it is intimate and friendly enough to have maintained good friends in the immediate neighborhood.

While many large restaurants have lost a sense of community in their pursuit of cost efficiency and portion control, Old Gerlich's is intent on maintaining good relations with its neighbors and clientele. Owner Louis Tsourvakas understands that being part of the immediate community is just as important as having a good lunch special. "See that guy over there?" he asks. "I see him at the Glen Head/Glenwood Landing Business Association."

For someone who began his career in the restaurant trade in Manhattan, owning a restaurant on Long Island may as well be a world away. "It was difficult at first," he says. "I was still on a city pace, used to serving hundreds of customers for lunch alone. It took a while to get used to, but now I enjoy it."

"I get a chance to know my customers this way."

When you pull up to the restaurant on Glen Head Road, the sprawling expanse of lawn gives Old Gerlich's a country club look that is somewhat intimidating. Don't let that put you off. Once you walk in, you'll be charmed by the warm intimacy of both the surroundings and the staff.

The restaurant had a reputation of being a German restaurant when it was still Gerlich's. But since Louis and his mother-in-law took over some five years ago, they have retained the name of Old Gerlich's and have



shifted the menu more towards continental cuisine - although Schnitzel and Sauerkraut are still on the menu. You will also find an admonition on the menu that your food is made to order, and that it may take an extra few minutes to prepare.

Patience may be its own reward, according to the old philosopher, but take it from Susi Bahr, at Old Gerlich's at least, the added benefit of a custom prepared meal doesn't hurt either.

"This was a neighborhood restaurant," says Louis. "People used to stop in on their way home from work, and others would come the

same night every week for dinner. I didn't want to walk in and take that away, so keeping the name Old Gerlich's was reassuring to the existing clientele."

"Gradually we've implemented many changes - but we've done it carefully so as not to alienate the old customers, and yet appeal to a broader market."

Old Gerlich's has gained a reputation as the place to go when a special occasion arises. "We're expanding our catering capabilities because the demand is so great," explained Louis. And a weekly event not to be missed is Sunday Brunch, complete with live jazz and

unlimited champagne and salad bar and overall, Tsourvakas prides himself on having a menu which is varied enough to satisfy anybody's appetite.

Whatever the theory, it looks to me like Louis Tsourvakas must be doing something right. Look at it this way - recently, a new person in my office came up to me out of the blue and recommended the place to me. "The music is great," he said. "And everybody knows everybody there."

With recommendations like those, Old Gerlich's is definitely a place anybody on Long Island can call home.

Residents Still Question Fire Truck Move

As time draws closer to the Levittown Parkway Fire House opening, residents are still wary of the fire commissioner's decision to move a hook and ladder truck from the Strong Street fire house to Levittown Parkway.

Although the Hicksville Board of Fire Commissioners has assured residents they will not be without full fire protection in both areas, the Hicksville Coalition of Civics and Area residents are still questioning the fire commissioners' decision. The fire commissioners, who are elected by Hicksville residents, have stood by their decision since it was first announced in April.

The most recent attempt by residents to be reassured came last week when some nearby Levittown Parkway residents and civic association leaders attended a fire commissioners' board meeting, which is usually not a well attended meeting by the public.

It was announced early in the meeting by Commissioner Al Bianculli that due to the community interest the board would recognize the residents and let them make a brief statement.

After the meeting, many of the residents said they felt as if they were intruding and did not ask all the questions they would have liked.

Although the commissioners addressed the public at a Hicksville Community Council meeting in April, the Northwest Civic Association wants the commissioners to speak with the residents of the affected area, particularly Strong Street.

Although no date has been set for the meeting, it will most likely be conducted in early December.

"As soon as we can set a date we will be meeting with them," said Commissioner Bianculli. "Whatever they want to discuss we will discuss."

There were rumors circulated in the past that the Strong Street Fire House would be left with one engine after the move; however, at the commissioners' meeting last week, Commissioner Bianculli said there will "definitely be two pieces" of fire apparatus at that station. There are no plans to close the Strong Street fire station, according to Bianculli.

Although there is a possibility that the hook and ladder truck be removed from East Marie Street instead of Strong Street, either way "you will have protection," Bianculli said. He added that East Marie Street Fire House is less than a mile away from Strong Street and is close enough to service northwest area alarm calls.

After the commissioners' meeting, residents told a *Hicksville Illustrated* reporter that the Levittown Parkway station seemed rather large for the area and asked if they really needed that much protection.

Bianculli said in a telephone interview Friday that the fire district was "thinking of future growth." He also said that at this time there are "quite a few" fire department members in the Levittown Parkway area who can man the fire house.

One resident expressed concern that the fire commissioners will eventually ask for the widening of Levittown Parkway. "That road will stay just the way it is. We are not requesting [any widening]," Bianculli said.

There are four fire stations in Hicksville: Strong Street, Brigg Street, Levittown Parkway and fire headquarters on East Marie Street.

Bianculli said that southeast section has "gone too long without a fire truck." He added, "This is not a spiteful thing we are doing. We feel we are doing the best thing." According to Bianculli, the decision was made in the best interest of the community, by commissioners with 141 years combined fire protection experience.

Hall, this was reported to the district and routes adjusted. It found to have extra time. Ms. Mosca will be randomly checking the timing of routes.

Parents also expressed concern with who to call when a bus is late. Citing her own example, a resident said that when her child was late returning home, she called the school and was told by a custodian that everybody had gone home. Suggestions to call the bus company were unacceptable to the residents present. Resident Tom Voss suggested that a letter regarding emergency procedures be included when bus passes are issued in the future. Mr. Hall was agreeable to that suggestion. Resident Richard Pfleiderer suggested that a district employee be available rather than having to call Harran, and that a rotating schedule be devised in order to have district personnel available after 4 p.m.

Who Receives Bus Transportation

According to State law, the District must provide transportation to any public or private school student within its boundaries who lives more than 2 miles from his or her school. However, the Hicksville School Board has increased the number of students who receive bus transportation by setting the following shorter distances: Grades K-3, more than 1/2 mile from school, Grades 4-6, more than 3/4 mile, Grade 7-8, more than one and 1/2 miles and Grades 7-12, more than two miles. Any change in this Board policy would require a voter referendum. If the District were to go on austerity because of a defeated budget, the New York State distances would be followed.

The State also requires that students be transported for a maximum of 15 miles (handicap up to 50 miles).

Requests for bus transportation for private or parochial schools must be made by April 1 for the following September. Residents who move into the District after April 1 must file within 30 days of residency.

What Do Buses Cost?

While the number of students has declined, the amount Hicksville pays for bus transportation has more than doubled in 10 years because of the rising cost of insurance, gasoline and salaries. For the 1989-90 school year, the district anticipated transportation expenditures of \$2,352,400. Current estimates, however, indicate that the budgeted figure will rise to \$2,321,828. According to Mr. Hall roughly 66 percent of this amount will be funded by State Aid.

Hicksville currently contracts for 19 full-time and 11 part-time buses and drivers from Harran Transportation. These buses are used to transport students to 10 public schools, four in-district parochial elementary schools, Holy Trinity High School, Chaminade, Our Lady of Mercy Academy, Lutheran High and St. Dominic's High School. A full-time bus is available for 10 hours from 7 a.m.-5 p.m. and costs \$40,372.10 per year. A part-time bus is used for 7 hours, 7 a.m.-10 a.m. and 2 p.m.-6 p.m. and costs \$18,060.30 per year. The average cost to transport each in-district is \$497.10.

In addition, out-of-district parochial school students are transported by Tomfor (82 students) at an average per child cost of \$2,574 and by We Transport (33) at an average cost of \$6,808 per child. Variations in cost are caused by the travel distances involved.

Special Education students are also transported by Tomfor (172 students) at an average of \$2,008 and We (17) at an average of \$4,048.

Further, 153 students are transported to BOCES classes at an average of \$1,394 per student.

Bus costs are expected to rise approximately \$150,000 to \$200,000 a year.

Mr. Martillo questioned why the district was paying We Transport approximately \$56,000 to bus 17 students currently attending St. Anthony's in South Huntington, more than the cost of one full-time Harran bus. Mr. Hall explained that the District paid a per seat cost and that the contract should be renegotiated to stipulate that the cost should not exceed a certain amount.

Estimates For Buying Buses

If Hicksville were to replace the Harran buses with its own, Mr. Hall presented "conservative" estimates of expenses. He said that new buses would cost \$45,000 each; 19 buses plus one spare for an emergency would total

\$1,350,000. Under state law, the average life of a school bus is 10 years. Therefore, buses could be purchased on bonds lasting only 10 years. The first-year cost would be \$135,000 plus interest of 104,500 for a total of \$229,500, which he assumed eligible for 66 percent state reimbursement. However, as much as 90 percent could be reimbursable from the State pending their approval. Pending its approval of the use of each bus, Mr. Hall said.

Other first-year expenses estimated by Mr. Hall included personnel, figured with a 30 percent benefit package: 20 drivers at \$434,304, mechanics at \$78,000, a dispatcher and clerk at \$52,000. Gasoline and insurance costs were estimated at \$50,000. Total estimated cost for the first year would be \$843,804. After possible state aid of 66 percent, the net cost would be \$286,893. In addition, a garage with at least three bays would be needed. The cost would be approximately \$1,000,000. Resident Donna Martillo asked if the District could rent these facilities. Mr. Hall said, "That's a possibility."

Mrs. Miltenberg inquired as to what would happen with 30 buses if the school district were on austerity and therefore require fewer buses.

Mr. Voss asked, "who wants to own an asset that is eventually worth nothing?" He added that the District's problem is with who drives the bus and asked why the district was looking to purchase instead of leasing buses. Mr. Hall replied that he had been asked to do it by the superintendent of schools at the request of Mr. Martillo.

President Rick Johnson, who is Supervisor of Maintenance for a large bus company, presented his estimate of district expenses for the first year which totaled \$1,500,000 and included new EPA requirements. Again, it was pointed out that Mr. Hall's figures were "very conservative."

Mrs. Rudin said that she was not necessarily interested in purchasing buses, but was looking for alternative ways to save money in the area of busing.

In reply to a question whether the District could state in its bid request to bus companies that it wishes to lease buses without drivers, Mr. Hall indicated that this would be no problem as an alternative in bid specifications. Mr. Bennett said that the employee pool for bus drivers would remain the same if the District or the bus company were to hire drivers.

State Rules and Regulations

According to New York State law, buses must be inspected every six months by the Department of Transportation (DOT). If a bus fails to pass inspection, it may not be used. In addition, Nassau County inspects buses. The DOT has the ultimate authority for regulating the certification of school buses.

Standees are allowed on school buses but are limited to 20 percent of the seating capacity. Emergency bus drills must be conducted at least three times a year.

The bus driver is responsible for maintaining "order" on the school bus. Any problem should be reported to the principal who is responsible for appropriate punishment. It was reported that the complaints were "seldom" made by bus drivers. Examples of misbehavior include foul language, smoking, failure to remain in seats.

All bids for bus contracts and bus purchases must be competitive. Contracts and purchases must also be approved by the Commissioner of Education. Contract renewals can be jointly made by the board and the existing bus companies. Negotiations in the past have been successful in keeping price increases under the cost of living.

Parochial and private school transportation is mandatory and must follow public school distance requirements. A district may have a central pick-up point for students attending non-public schools and may not transport students to religious released time classes.

A district can regulate or restrict traffic on its school property.

Board Committees are meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 25 at 8 p.m. Prior to that meeting, the facilities committee will be conducting a tour of Dutch Lane School at 7 p.m. The next regular board of education meeting will be on Tuesday, Nov. 21 at 8:15 p.m. in the Administration Building.



The Grapevine

France's Beaujolais nouveau—the first wine of the year—arrives every year a certain number of days after harvest. Isn't it nice that it usually shows up in time for Thanksgiving?

November is New York Wine and Food Month with special promotions planned. The Motto: "Unearth, New York!"

Time was, it was understood, California Cabernet Sauvignons were big and bold, the French blended the same grape to create a more subtle, complex wine; in recent years, however, many of the California vintners are creating proprietary wines (no longer 100 percent Cabernet, but too good to be called generic reds) closer to the French model—and some French Bourgogne are adopting the California style.

Wine based aperitifs such as Lillet, Kir, and Dubonnet, were originally created to disguise poorly made wine with herbs and other flavorings. Today they're better made and more enjoyable than ever. Sip them on the rocks; they're lighter than hard liquor for cocktails.

When it comes to wine-based drinks, don't forget brandy, to sip in a snifter or mix with soda. Brandy is distilled, as spirits are, but the base is wine, not a mixture of grains.



Consumer Tips**Stop Auto Accidents Before They Happen**

The more experienced we become as drivers, the less attentive we tend to be to the basic rules of highway safety. Instead of concentrating on safe driving, we allow our minds to wander to an upcoming business meeting or what's needed from the grocery store. Lack of attention causes many needless highway deaths and injuries each year. The next time you get into the car, concentrate on these basic rules to assure your trip is a safe one.

1. Be mindful of everything in front of you for at least 100 yards, including other vehicles, signals, signs, crosswalks and roadside activity. Be ready to react to anything that may change the pace of traffic.

2. Look in your rear view mirror every 10 seconds to remain aware of positions and speed of approaching vehicles.

3. Always signal and be sure the lane is clear before changing lanes or making a turn. Watch for other drivers who are turning or changing lanes.

4. When stopped at a red light, keep your eyes on the car in front of you, not on the light. Keep your foot on the brake until the vehicle ahead begins to move.

5. Don't follow another vehicle too closely. The three-second rule is a safe standard to follow. Watch when the car in front of you passes a certain point, then begin counting — one-one thousand, two-one thousand, three-one thousand. If you've already passed the same point, you're following too closely.

6. If it's near dusk or raining, turn on your headlights. Increased visibility means increased safety.

7. Drive at or below the posted speed limit and adjust your speed according to weather and traffic conditions.

Who said statistics don't lie?

Goals by sophomore Chris Doyle and junior Jason Kilmelis provided the offense, as the Comets defeated Baldwin 2-0, to win the county championship.

"To get this far and beat Baldwin with the talent they have was beyond anything I could ever hope for at this point," said a jubilant Ed Moeller, the Comets' head coach.

"We controlled the mid-field," continued Moeller. "We showed a lot of intensity. They [Baldwin] are a great club. They have a lot of weapons. We are just happy to be here."

If the Comets were happy to be in the Nassau final, they must have been ecstatic to be playing for the Long Island crown against Brentwood (17-2-2) at Bethpage State Park Saturday.

The happiness lasted until 2:05 into the second half when Brentwood's Francisco Herrera picked up a loose ball near the Hicksville goal and blasted an 8-yard shot past Comets' goalkeeper John Ortiz. That was the only goal Hicksville allowed in five playoff games. That's all Brentwood needed because the Comets failed to score against a very good Brentwood defense.

"It just seemed like nobody could get a foot on the ball," said Moeller on the Brentwood goal. "They got to the ball before we did. It was a good goal. They took advantage of our one mistake. We played very, very well today."

"I was very pleased with the way the team came around," said Moeller on his team's playoff success after a 10-1 regular season record. "I can't say enough about them. They played with their hearts all year. We took it one game at a time. We tried to give it our best effort every time."

Moeller can't wait until next year's season because only three starters are graduating. The majority of this year's team consisted of juniors and sophomores. "I'm looking forward to the next two to three years," said Moeller. "I think our future looks very bright."
