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News Briefs

Group Home Discussed

Residents will be able to respond to the proposed group home at 2 Lehigh Lane at a meeting on Wednesday, March 25.

Sponsored by Assemblyman Fred Parola, the representatives from the following offices have been invited to the meeting: Nassau Center for the Developmentally Disabled, which plans to establish the home, the Office of Mental Retardation and Development Disabilities, and Town of Oyster Bay officials.

The meeting will be at 8 p.m. in the Hicksville Middle School, Jerusalem Avenue.

Carvel Robber Arrested

Nassau County Police arrested a Queens man April 11 and charged him with three robberies, including one at a Hicksville Carvel store in February.

According to police, Thomas Armour, 27, was charged with three counts of robbery, first degree, following an investigation. Armour had been arrested March 13 for an attempted robbery at a Carvel in Baldwin.

Armour allegedly robbed the Carvel at 40-42 Newbridge Road Feb. 24 of \$100 after displaying a handgun to the counter person. No injuries were reported in the robbery. Armour is also believed to have robbed a Massapequa Carvel earlier that same night, police said.

Cleanup This Saturday

The Duffy Park and Northwest Civic Association's trash cleanup will be held this Saturday, April 21. Anyone interested can meet at West John Street and Kuhl Avenue at 9 a.m. or at the end of Frank Road at 8:45 a.m. Streets that will be cleaned up include West John Street, Frank Road, Henrietta Street and Charlotte Avenue.

Car Wash Permit

A special use permit is being sought to construct a car wash facility as an addition to an existing new car dealership in a "G" business district (general business) and an "H" Industrial District (Light Industry). The property is located approximately 100 feet east of the southeast intersection of Broadway and Old Country Road, also known as 15 Old Country Road.

A public hearing will be held on Tuesday, June 19, at 10 a.m. in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Change in Parking

A change in parking regulations in Hicksville parking field H-9 will be the subject of a Tuesday, May 22 public hearing by the Oyster Bay Town Board.

It has been approximately one year since the Town Board converted the meters in the municipal fields between East Marie Street and Nicholai Street to 25 cents for four hours with no Town parking permit required to accommodate the needs of the commercial area parking. The Town's continuous surveys have indicated that a section of field H-9, which is off East Nicholai Street, is not being used. Pursuant to this survey data and the recommendation of the Department of Public Works Highway Division, the proposed modifications in parking regulations for field H-9 would change 61 of the 141 stalls to 12-hour meters requiring Town parking permits and charging 25 cents for each six-hour period.

The meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Further Development Sought for West John Street

Residents in Hicksville's northwest section may have to prepare for more commercial activity as another developer is seeking to build

two office warehouses on West John Street. Landmark Builders Contractor has applied to the Town of Oyster Bay for a building per-

mit for an ancillary office building to be used as a warehouse on West John Street, 340 feet west of Engel Street, according to a town spokesperson.

However, at a recent Northwest Civic Association meeting, a site plan obtained by the group from the developer showed two structures but only one building has been applied for with the town.

Northwest's president Mary Ann Ferrando said that Landmark intends to demolish the existing home on the property. Another home that was located on the site was recently leveled. Landmark's president could not be reached for comment.

Over the past few weeks, there have been signs of work at the site as some of the debris has been cleared away.

No public hearing is necessary to build the structure as it is located in an "H" light industrial zone. The building permit request, which was applied for in July 1989, and must be approved by the building division of the Town's Department of Planning and Development, is being considered.

2-Story Office Sought

In another West John Street project Peter DeJana has applied for a special use permit to construct a two-story industrial building in the lot next to the West End Pub on West John Street.

The property which is approximately 100.72 feet west of the intersection of West John Street and Kuhl Avenue, will be used for the outdoor storage and repair of vehicles in connection with municipal services such as street sweeping, catch basin cleaning, leaf collection and snow removal.

The proposal may be met by community opposition as residents have indicated that the company's operation will cause noise and pollution to neighbors whose homes abut the property. Also surrounding the site is the Nassau County Recharge basin and the Canterbury Park golf course.

Residents who have fought nearby Twin County Recycling Corporation on West John claiming that the plant emits noxious fumes, said that DeJana's operation will add to their plight. In addition, increased traffic is a concern.

More than 100 residents signed a petition requesting that the town hold a night hearing. That request was granted and a hearing has been scheduled for May 8 at 8 p.m. in the hearing room of Town Hall East, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay.

Landscaping for West John

The Northwest Civic Association is attempting to spruce up West John Street by planting flowers and trees in the area.

The civic association recently requested that Nassau County plant trees at both ends of West John Street traffic islands, between Broadway and Newbridge Road. These islands are presently covered with black top. The association has also requested that a flower box be installed on the West John Street traffic island immediately west of Newbridge Road. The association intends to provide the plantings and necessary maintenance for this flower box.

West John Street is a county road.

mind all residents of a few important facts:
• Open burning is prohibited on Long Island. You can be fined up to \$500 for open burning in addition to any costs if your fire sets another person's property on fire, or a firefighter is injured responding.

• The Town of Oyster Bay's STOP program is starting up again. Aerosol, paint cans and other waste should be disposed of properly. Throwing it out with your rubbish could injure sanitation workers who come in contact with it. Drop off the waste on April 26 at Burns Park in Massapequa.

• During the last few weeks, firefighters arriving at several fire scenes have been confronted with cars blocking fire hydrants. This practice is widespread and poses a danger to everyone. Please keep the hydrants clear.

• The Nassau County 911 System is a helpful system IF you need the police. However, it is increasingly being used to call the Hicksville Fire Department. Every year, the Hicksville F.D. distributes phone stickers with the direct line number to the Hicksville Fire Dispatchers. A direct call saves time.

A 911 fire call goes to Mineola through a police operator who then transfers the call to the county fire communications center who then decides which of the 71 fire departments gets the call—this takes a great deal of time.

For the fire department the number is 931-0026. For police requests call 911.

• The Hicksville firefighters have once again turned to Assemblyman Fred Parola for help in getting the New York State Department of Transportation (DOT) to repair the timing of the traffic signal at Broadway and Marie Street (East and West). According to a fire department spokesperson, repairs have been promised for almost

two years and still the light jams traffic up in front of fire headquarters, preventing members getting in and apparatus getting out.

The fire department advises drivers to write to the DOT if they have been held up by this light. Write to: James Kuzloski, regional director, New York State Department of Transportation, N.Y.S. Office Building, Veterans Memorial Highway, Hauppauge, NY 11787.

• The Town of Oyster Bay will be conducting a plastics recycling collection at its Old Bethpage Solid Waste Complex. Residents may bring plastic discards of all kinds to the complex off of Round Swamp Road April 21 and 22 between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

The collection is being held in conjunction with Earth Day 1990.

• Residents in the Massapequa Park area have joined the Town of Oyster Bay Separate Oyster Bay's Recyclables Today (SORT) program.

Recently, the town board approved the addition of 8,000 homes in Massapequa Park, Nassau Shores and Harbor Green to its regular recycling effort. Nearly all of the homes in the town are now involved in SORT.

• Registration forms for the Town of Oyster Bay's walking program will be accepted through April 27 and are available at all Town Hall and community park facilities as well as local libraries.

The seven-week program is free to town residents. Participants may choose a daytime course at Syosset-Woodbury Community Park on Jericho Turnpike Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10 and 11:30 a.m. An evening course, from 7 to 8:30 p.m., will be offered on the same days at Marjorie Post Community Park on Unqua Road in Massapequa. Classes begin May 1 and conclude June 14.

• The 200th anniversary of president George Washington's visit to Oyster Bay will be commemorated in a number of ways throughout the township.

A program will be held April 23 at the Vernon Middle School in East Norwich and is presented by the town's Bicentennial Historical Commission. Music and dramatic readings will be featured as well as an address by John B. Dawson as George Washington, re-enacting the president's address to school children 200 years ago.



The happy couple will be residing in Hicksville after they return from their honeymoon which will include skiing in Colorado and then on to Jamaica to bask in the sun.



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

Dear Friends,

We are writing to keep you advised of problems which come to our attention in the course of our law, real estate and insurance businesses. Many homeowners run into difficulty because they do not have Certificates of Occupancy and Certificates of Completion. These are required by the town for construction or alteration of a home, garage, deck, pool, awning, patio, etc. When you sell your home, the lack of a CO can create expense and delay.

- The basic procedure where additions or alterations are made is:
1. File building plans and obtain a permit from the town.
 2. Have the building inspector make inspections as required.
 3. Upon completion of the work, arrange for a final inspection by the building inspector, and an electrical inspection by the New York Board of Fire Underwriters. (Any plumbing may also require an inspection).
 4. When all certificates have been obtained for plumbing and electrical work and all town inspections are completed, you may apply for the CO. (In some cases the town may insist on a new survey as well).

Since the entire process may take 8-12 weeks, it is best to be sure that you have all the necessary COs well in advance of your closing date. If you have any questions in this regard, the staff at the Real Estate office will be glad to go over this with you before you list your home for sale. 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
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At the Library

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

THE INFANT JESUS OF PRAGUE

The statue is nineteen inches tall, made of wood and wax. It represents the Infant Jesus dressed in royal robes and wearing a crown. In 1637 it stood in a place of honor in the chapel of the Carmelites in Prague.

Fr. Cyril prayed before the statue. He was filled with wonder as he contemplated the God who became a child out of love for his people. Suddenly the statue spoke to the stunned Carmelite:

HAVE MERCY ON ME AND I WILL HAVE MERCY ON YOU. GIVE ME HANDS AND I WILL GIVE YOU PEACE. THE MORE YOU HONOR ME, THE MORE I WILL BLESS YOU.

For almost four centuries this promise has inspired devotion and love of the Infant Jesus. The original statue is preserved in the church of Our Lady of Victory in Prague.

Devotion to the Infant Jesus celebrates the great mystery of Incarnation. We acknowledge the humanity and the divinity of Christ, and we rejoice in God's caring love for us.

Kick Him in the Pants?

I recently received a letter from a reader about his investments. It seems that he has been an investor in American stocks and now he has

to pay regular taxes on his gains. He suggested he was a "good citizen of our U.S. economy" by being an investor. The lament was that against inflation, he has

lost because the stocks have not gone up in value as fast as inflation has risen. While he estimates that he has a current yield on his ORIGINAL investment of about 25% per year, he laments his PRESENT yield is about 4½% before taxes. He believes that the capital gains tax, taken away by the 86 tax law, it should be returned. Finally, he wanted my opinion "even if it is a kick in the pants."

Years ago (1982), I did an audio tape on

Years ago (1982), I did an audio tape on

"managing your money." Part of that tape included comments on buying savings bonds. Then they were a bad investment. My comment was that "patriotism is a lousy reason for investing." Your objective when you invest should be to increase your wealth or to provide income, or some other very selfish reason, even greed. Only invest with or stay with a stock or bond if the company continues to provide what you want. Do not buy or stay with an investment because it is good for the country. Buy what fits your needs.

Our letter writer mentions his 1953 investment in Campbell soup. He paid about \$5 dollars for it, now it is around \$60. You may say that is a very good gain. However, the lament is that regular taxes must be paid, not the capital gains tax. Further, against inflation (purchasing power), the 4% compounded increase in the stock price is miserable. However, dividends were received on a regular basis. The flaw here is that a corporate dividend's current yield is usually less than other competing alternatives. To me this illustrates the disadvantages of investing and holding through thick and thin individual corporate stocks. A better strategy is to buy sound stocks and get rid of them when they falter or no longer produce results. Get out and put your money somewhere else.

If the stock continues to produce as well as others, keep it. When it ceases to be a performer, get rid of it. We can be sure of one thing. There is a time to buy a stock and there is a time to

sell it. The trick is to know when to do either or both.

The average person seems to be stuck in neutral when they know they should be doing something with their money. It is easy to be afraid when the stock market bounces around like a yo-yo, and interest rates are volatile. This is one of the major reasons that I advocate the purchase of mutual funds for the average investor. Let the professionals do the investing. The problem there is that about 80% of the professionals usually do worse than the market as a whole. You can research the track records of the mutual fund managers and the funds. *Forbes*, *Barron's*, *Business Week*, and *Changing Times* all give quarterly results of the funds.

The average person says that if pros cannot do it, how can they? I strongly urge you to read Peter Lynch's book, *One Up On Wall Street*. He is the pro of pros and he did it with a huge fund, a major handicap. It was almost an impossible feat to beat the stock averages so consistently. If I had his book as a young man, I would be much wealthier today. I expect him to make me wealthier now. He shows everyone how to do it.

Our letter writer's only mistake was in not selling when the time came to sell. Campbell Soup went through some tough times before it reached its recent highs. Getting out and coming back in when things changed would have been better. Of course, I have 20-20 hindsight. Remember that there are times to buy and times to sell. All stocks go up and down. This takes a little work on your part. That is why there are

advisors.

The letter writer wanted my opinion on the tax reform laws of the 80's. He is strongly for the return of the capital gains tax. I do not agree as an investor or quasi-economist. I DO want it for the time I sell. It will save me a lot of money. I DO NOT want it because I believe it is bad policy. We should invest for sound business reasons. We should sell investments, all investments, for the same reason. To make economic decisions solely because of taxes, or even with taxes being a major consideration, is poor strategy. It is either a good investment that should be kept, or it is not.

If the capital gains tax comes back, it is an almost sure bet that many of the tax reforms will be lost. I do not want a maximum tax of 50% or 40%. I like the max tax at 28%. This is only 8% higher than the capital gains max tax before TRA 86. It is a small price to pay for the benefits to the majority of taxpayers.

Our letter writer decided not to sell his Campbell Soup because of the tax. If he believes that he should sell, he should sell. Only he knows. Any mistakes we make are in the past. We all make them. They cannot be undone. We must not repeat them.

I congratulate this reader for recognizing that, despite the market volatility, quality stocks are the place to be in good times and bad. He deserves no "kick in the pants."

Federal Pay Differential

Representative Raymond McGrath (R/Valley Stream) recently announced that he has co-sponsored legislation, H.R. 3319, which would mandate that the Office of Personnel Management institute a pay system which would provide for salary differentials in federal employee salaries. At the present time, the salary for a federal worker in a certain occupational category is the same regardless of where he or she is employed.

In recent years, the federal government in metropolitan areas such as New York has had trouble recruiting individuals in certain categories because of the high cost of living. This trend is especially prevalent in the health care field, for example, recruiting doctors and nurses for veterans' health care facilities.

Summing up the need for a federal pay differential, McGrath said that "This legislation would make federal pay scales fair for workers in high-cost metropolitan areas. Unless action is taken now, local federal offices will be unable to fill positions with qualified personnel."

Rockefeller For President?

Speaker of the House Tom Foley may have thrown another name into the speculation about who the Democrats will nominate in 1992. When asked by a reporter at his daily press conference recently who were the likely candidates, Foley ran through the list of potential contenders. Along with the usual names: Representative Richard Gephardt (D-Mo.), the House majority leader, Senator Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) and Governor Mario Cuomo (D-N.Y.); Foley entered the name of Senator John D. "Jay" Rockefeller IV (D-W.Va.).

When queried by a reporter about whether Rockefeller deserved to be on the list of potential 1992 candidates for the Democratic nomination, Foley replied that he thought that Rockefeller would be a good candidate if he decided to run and that "he is a very able man and has extensive experience in both legislative and executive branches of government." Rockefeller has been in the news recently for his chairmanship of the bipartisan Pepper Commission on health care.

Rockefeller served as governor of West Virginia from 1977-1985 and since that time he has been the state's junior senator. A member of one of the nation's richest families,



Card play is not always an exact science. Many plays made by a declarer or defender are based on probabilities, not certainties, and some of them rest on assumptions that later prove to be false. Nevertheless, good card play generally pays off. It won't be rewarded in every case, but in the long run it gains points.

Consider West's defense in this deal. He led a club, won in dummy with the king. Declarer finessed the queen of hearts, which lost to the

king, and the question was what to lead next.

West now made the only play to defeat the contract: He shifted to the queen of diamonds! Declarer played dummy's king, drew trumps, and tried a spade finesse. East won and returned a diamond, so South lost two diamond tricks and went down one.

Was the diamond queen just a lucky shot? Of course not. The queen had a very sound foundation. From West's viewpoint, looking at only his hand and dummy, it is clear that if South has the king of spades there is no chance of stopping the contract. West therefore credits East with the king.

However, even this assumption leads to only three tricks for the defense — a spade, a heart and a diamond. A fourth trick is needed, and the only possible source lies in diamonds.

Obviously, that suit must be attacked before East's king of spades is forced out, or only one diamond trick can be won. As soon as West reaches this conclusion, the only problem is which diamond to lead.

To play the ace or a low diamond will prove fatal if South has the jack. Only the queen lead can guard against this possibility — and West therefore leads it.
