## Local Group Monitors School Board Actions

Angry and frustrated by continuing turmoil in the school district, about 75 residents have joined together to watch over school board actions and to nominate people who they feel would be the best candidates for the May election.

Organized in November after the resignations of then school board president Jo Ann Miltenberg and vice-president Patricia Rooney, the Concerned Citizens of Hicksville, which the group is calling itself, met to discuss the future of the seven member board. "We were shocked at the resignations of two child advocates," said Joe Visconti, one of the club's vice-presidents. In their joint letter of resignation, Miltenberg

New York State Education Department Commissioner to investigate the board's actions.

In an interview last Thursday, board member James Martillo said, "They're asking for our resignations, [but] they're not saying why? I didn't do anything wrong." He added, "It's becoming a big political to do gearing up for the big election. They should channel their energies other places to benefit the district!"

He said that the board has been working "much better," although, at times, it may not appear that way to the public.

"Internally . . . the board has been working very well together," he said. He added that he will remain on the board until the end of

and Rooney said they did not want to be associated with board members who are motivated by politics, self interest and hatred. The board is currently operating with five members.

"Our community has been divided," said Bob Pape, club president, referring to school closing controversies, the sex abuse case against school bus driver Robert Izzo and board politics. "We have a fractioned board," said Pape. "We've bottomed out. Let's pick ourselves up and move forth with the children in mind." He added that there is too much "bickering" on the board which distracts from other important issues. Fiscal responsibility is also a concern of the group.

Pape said that the Concerned Citizens of Hicksville is a "broad-based coalition" consisting of members with children in the district, some without children in the schools and senior citizens. "We're a cross section of Hicksville. One thing we agree about is our children's future which is at stake with our current board," said Visconti.

"We're opposed to any special interests groups who might try to gain control of the board," he said.

Since December the group has been circulating petitions demanding the resignations of trustees William Collins, James Martillo and Arlene Rudin.

By the end of this month, the club is expected to send those petitions and ask the

his term in June 1992.

Trustee Arlene Rudin said Friday that the coalition has a right to send petitions around "if that's what they feel," but she added that with last week's news of proposed cuts in school aid, residents should focus their energies elsewhere.

"I don't see it being a productive effort. There's so many pressing things. I really wish we would get on with the business of the district!"

Referring to another petition already filed with the State Commissioner of Education that asks for the removal of the entire board, Rudin said that the ultimate decision would be the commissioner's.

William Collins could not be reached for comment by deadline.

The coalition has also been discussing possible candidates for the May election. At the club's February meeting, tentatively scheduled for Feb. 19, the coalition members will have the opportunity to pose questions to candidates who have nominated by the Concerned Citizens of Hicksville.

At its March meeting, all club members will vote on a secret ballot and nominate three candidates. Those three residents will be sponsored by the club in the school board race in May.

Seats open in the May election are Rooney's and William Bennett's for a three-year term, and Miltenberg for the balance of her term.

## LIRR Tells Riders: Buy Now Or Pay Later

Come spring, Long Island Rail Road commuters will be charged a penalty for bypassing ticket vending machines and later purchasing fares on the train.

Riders now pay a \$2 penalty if they ignore the manned ticket windows and buy their tickets from conductors on the train. But later this year, the penalty fare will also apply to commuters who do not purchase tickets from the available vending machines when the manned ticket windows are closed.

The decision for the penalty was made by the Metropolitan Transportation Authority board and will take effect sometime after April of this year, although no exact date has been set, according to

Susan McGowan, LIRR spokesperson. "We'll have some public education going on before the change," she said, adding that LIRR personnel and literature will be available to explain how the machines operate. "They're really no different than using a bank card machine," McGowan said.

Currently 34 ticket vending machines are used within the LIRR system. The Hicksville branch currently has one machine. An additional 46 machines are on order, said McGowan.

"It takes 12 times as long buying from conductors . . . who have other responsibilities," said McGowan. "The machines will improve the efficiency of our process."

# East Street Magazine Recognizes A + Work

"Throughout the formative years of a young person's life, outstanding and exceptionally excellent work often emerges from the creative mind."—Dr. Leo J. Kanawada, Jr.

Sometimes this exceptional work is confined to the four walls of a classroom. But the teachers at East Street School want everyone in their school community to know of outstanding student achievements and through their magazine, "From The Little Red School House," they are able to do just that.

"From The Little Red School House," published about three times during the school year, recognizes excellence in the arts, science, math and English, according to Dr. Leo V. Kanawada, Jr., editor of the magazine. Almost every student in the school receives a copy which is filled with their creative writing assignments, drawings, math and science projects.

"Exemplary work coming from projects, classwork or from 'originals' (imaginative, creative work accomplished by students due to a teacher's motivational techniques or from student self-motivation) will always

find a place here to be shared and remembered by the good friends who grew up together and studied side by side at this school," Dr. Kanawada says in the opening remarks of the book.

He said that the magazine can be used as a "teaching tool," so pupils can see how other students approach a particular topic.

"We try to give the kids the opportunity to publish something a few times a year," Dr. Kanawada said. "They can't wait to get it, to see if their name is in there." Each child in grades first through sixth received a copy of the magazine which has been published at the school for the past four years. About 220 copies are made.

The contents of the pages are decided by the school's teachers who chose works from regular classroom assignments. In some cases, students take it upon themselves to submit a work they produced on their own. In the latest edition, put out in fall 1990, the students included stories about the crisis in the Middle East.

"If I were Hussein, I would leave the people in Kuwait alone and look at a map, because either he needs glasses or he has in-

vaded a country that really isn't his," wrote Ian Rasmussen, a sixth grader in a story entitled "What Should America Do?"

On other pages, sixth graders Jeremiah Singer and John Zaitos described the importance of democracy. After writing about freedom, Jeremiah concluded, "I guess I always thought democracy was no big deal, but by the time I finished writing this, my mind has been changed completely."

The younger students' masterpieces included "The Middle of the Sandwich... as seen by second graders."

According to Matthew Luyster, "The middle of the sandwich is the best because it is sweet. I like ham and cheese in the middle the best. I bug my mom for ham and cheese. My mom makes the best sandwiches."

Antoinette Rosolino writes, "The middle of the sandwich is the best because it is tasty and fantastic and yummy. I like peanut butter and jelly because it is tasty."

The middle of Kristi Kalin's sandwich was a real money-maker. She wrote that she made her own sandwich which was "so big I could not eat it." So I said, "All you can eat for twenty-five cents. After an hour, I made

\$99,999,999 just from that big sandwich!"

Also included in the magazine is artwork. Some of East Street's "artists" included in the first edition of the school year were David Fabrizio, Tommy Bobnick, Katerina Kallergis, Joseph Pinto, Josh Bergen and Cindy Murphy.

Also included in the book's pages are puzzles, comic strips, geometric shapes created in math class.

The classes at East Street currently participating in the program are first grade class—Lori Simon, Joan Sparr; second grade—Francie Carley, Marlene Kreditor; third grade—Mary Gagliardo, Carol Schwartz; fourth grade—Denise Mingin, Elmore Saxon; fifth grade—Wendy Cataldo, Steven Tomaini; sixth grade—Robert Hilsky, Leo Kanawada.

The school's next edition is tentatively due out at the end of March.

# Hicksville's Hometown Heroes In Mid-East

This story is another installment in the *Illustrated's* ongoing coverage of the Persian Gulf war and how it affects Hicksville's hometown.

Since news of the Persian Gulf war outbreak hit the airwaves, much of America's radios and television sets have been tuned to the news.

At the Renneisen home in Hicksville, it's no different.

"We watch TV all the time. We always have CNN on," said JoAnne Renneisen, whose son, John, 20, is currently stationed in Saudi Arabia.

John, a 1989 Hicksville High School graduate and member of the 2nd Armor Regiment Division, is believed to be only 50 miles from the Kuwait border. John called his mother a few days before war was announced.

"When he called, I was so thrilled to hear from him," JoAnne said. The most recent contact from John came last week when he phoned his girlfriend, Sue Andreas of Hicksville. He could only talk for about five minutes, said JoAnne, who added, "He said he's scared, but he's hanging in there. And that things are really tense over there. I was glad he at least got to talk to somebody."

On January 30, the Renneisens received a letter from him and a roll film dated Dec. 27, 1990.

"After rushing to 24 minute photo to have it developed, I cried for hours," JoAnne said. "He looks good but my heart still aches to think of what he is mentally going through. It was extremely difficult getting through work."

John is a heavy equipment mechanic who received his training in the BOCES Nassau Tech Aviation program before joining the army.

While John was a senior at Hicksville

High, he won the New York State VICA (Vocational Industrial Clubs of America) Conference award. John's award was for occupational safety scrapbooks which includes reports on four projects to promote good safety habits in the classroom and on the job.

Said JoAnne, "Anything that John ever attempted to do he always excelled at. All he ever wanted was to join the military." She added, "He's a very good son."

John, also the son of John Renneisen, has two brothers, Jude, 25, and Joseph, 17, and a sister, Kathleen, 23.

## Kevin Baldwin Heads For Persian Gulf

U.S.N. Lt. Kevin W. Baldwin will be following in his father's footsteps as he makes his way to the Mid-East to serve on the U.S.S. Orion. (AS-18) Submarine Tender.

Thirty-eight years ago in January of 1953, Kevin's dad, Artie Baldwin, also served on the U.S.S. Orion during the Korean Campaign.

"Who would ever have thought that this many years later, I would again be writing to the Orion," said Artie Baldwin, Jr. "Only this time to my son!"

Before Kevin left for duty on January 20, he flew to Hicksville from San Diego, California, to spend the weekend with his mother and father, Blanche and Artie Baldwin. Kevin's wife, Tina, and daughters Ashley and Becky will remain in San Diego.

"We had a wonderful family dinner and get together on Saturday and it was terrific to have him home, even for such a short time," said Artie. "We all enjoyed watching the video tape he made of his family during Christmas."

As first lieutenant, Kevin's duties will include the operation of eight small boats, ships cranes and ships ground tackle (mooring lines). The Orion has more than 52,000

parts and supplies on board and is attached to the Sixth Fleet.

The Baldwin's other son, U.S.N. FTG Chief Brian T. Baldwin also made a visit home. He recently returned from a six month submarine cruise aboard the U.S.S. Whale. During this cruise, the boat spent 75 straight days submerged.

He arrived home just in time to spend Christmas with his wife, Debbie, and three daughters, Brianne, Kelly and Katelynn. They all came home to Hicksville for New

Year's. Since Brian's enlistment in 1977, he has resided in Mystic, Connecticut.

Brian will now be attached to Sub Squadron 10, New London, Connecticut. His duties will include trouble shooting and instruction aboard the submarines attached to the Squadron.

Said Artie and Blanche, "We are proud of both our servicemen sons and we hope and pray for all the service personnel now on duty in the Mid-East to be brought home safely and swiftly."

## GULF UPDATE

—Week Ending Feb. 4—

The ground war begins with Iraqi troops crossing into Saudi Arabia. Allies responded with an air bombardment of Iraqi armored units. **Iraqi planes**, estimated at 90, fly into Iran, seeking refuge. **The massive oil spill** in the Persian Gulf stalls before it reaches a desalting plant in Saudi Arabia and clean-up efforts intensify. **Iraq continues to launch Scuds** against Saudi Arabia and Israel, but the missiles fall short of their targets. **Pres. Bush declares** Feb. 3 National Day of Prayer, which is marked by rallies of support for American troops. **For the first time**, a B-52 bomber is lost by the US. Three of its crew members were rescued and three others were reported missing. **The deaths of seven Marines** are confirmed to have been caused by "friendly fire;" a missile from a plane hit their vehicle during close combat at the Saudi border.

## TO YOUR HEALTH

### Muscle Weakness and Inflammation

Most of my readers are now aware that arthritis is inflammation of the joints. They also recognize that rheumatologists treat these inflammatory disorders. A group of inflammatory disorders which affect the muscles is called myositis.

This illness is caused by muscle inflammation which results in weakness. The cause of this muscle abnormality, which affects women more than men, is not known.

Usually the hips and shoulders are involved. When left untreated, the weakness is usually progressive. Patients can have trouble combing their hair or raising their arms. When myositis affects the hips, getting out of a chair, a bathtub, or even climbing stairs may be exhausting. When other muscles are involved, problems may develop which

make breathing, swallowing, or even raising the head from a pillow difficult.


Patients can have a rash on their face, elbows or knuckles. Other symptoms of this disorder include fever, muscle pain, joint pain, and weight loss.

A prompt diagnosis is important. Other illnesses can mimic the symptoms of myositis. The rheumatologist will work closely with a neurologist to make certain these other illnesses are not present. Once a diagnosis of myositis is made, treatment should begin. Medications which reduce the inflammation are very successful. Additionally, physical therapy and rest are important.

## Visit Nassau County's Museums and Preserves

### Part I

Just because there's a winter nip in the air doesn't mean residents have to remain indoors until summer arrives.

Nassau County's museums and preserves open a treasure chest full of adventure every day of the year.

Travel back to a simpler time when horses and buggies were the only form of transportation.

Marvel at the architecture, furnishing and land use at the North Shore's famous Gold Coast mansions.

Discover the secrets of the animal kingdom and the phenomena of the life sciences.

"Our museums offer an incredible diversity of programming that is put together and presented by some of the most knowledgeable experts in their fields," said John B. Kiernan, commissioner of Nassau County Department of Recreation and Parks.

"It's important to us to do things a little out of the ordinary in our museum divisions and to try to gear the activities to appeal to a wide age range," said Kiernan. He added that the county has organized events as diverse as a life-like dinosaur exhibit and a Medieval Festival at Sands Point Preserve; the Long Island Fair and Civil War Encampment at Old Bethpage Village Restoration, and live animal demonstrations at Tackapausha Museum and Preserve.

The following is an overview of some of the various museums and preserves that grace Nassau County.

#### Garvies Point Museum

The Garvies Point Museum and Preserve, located on Barry Drive, Glen Cove (671-0300) has a permanent exhibit devoted to regional geology and Indian archaeology. In addition, changeable exhibits covering a variety of natural history subjects are presented in a special gallery.

Also at the museum, geology exhibits illustrate Long Island's glacial history and explain the formation of today's land features. Dramatic post-glacial changes in climate and sea levels are detailed in dioramas to show the evolution of Long Island's landscape during the past 20,000 years. Visitors will also find local leaf fossils and concretions ("Indian paint-pots") on display.

Garvies' preserve was formerly part of the Garvie estate. Dr. Thomas Garvie, a physician, and founder of this prominent Long Island family, emigrated from Scotland to Glen Cove in the early nineteenth century.

The preserve consists of 62 acres of glacial moraine covered by forests, thickets and meadows. There are about five miles of marked nature trails. Wooded areas, which

exhibit various stages of succession, contain 48 species of trees as well as numerous shrubs, vines and wildflowers. High cliffs along the shoreline exhibit erosional features such as alluvial fans, talus slopes and slumping caused by ancient multi-colored clays oozing from the beach.

The museum is open every day from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., except holidays. General admission is 25 cents.

#### Tackapausha Museum

Visitors of the Tackapausha Museum and Preserve on Washington Avenue in Seaford, will enjoy the 80-acre tract of glacial outwash

Hempstead House (1910-12), designed by Hunt & Hunt as the estate's main residence, incorporates the style characteristics of a Tudor-period English castle.

Visitors can tour *Falaise*, an elegant Normandy-style manor house located on the premises and built by the late Captain Harry F. Guggenheim.

Visitors are also invited to tour the 216-acre preserve in a passive-use outdoor recreation area which offers a fine setting for observation and study of the area's natural features. Glacial boulders and sandy cliffs represent geological deposits of the last ice

plaint, maintained in its natural state as a wildlife sanctuary and devoted to nature recreation and education.

The Preserve consists of wet, deciduous woods, swamps, streams and ponds, and a small well-drained grassy area reminiscent of the Hempstead Plains. One of the last remaining stands of Atlantic White Cedar on Long Island is located in one of Tackapausha's swampy areas. Small mammals and more than 40 species of birds breed at the preserve and spring and fall migrants regularly stop by.

The environment receives special attention at the museum, which is open every day from 10 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. except holidays. Exhibits use plants and animals of Long Island to interpret the principles and phenomena of the life sciences.

An opportunity to become familiar with the world at night is provided in the popular exhibit featuring live animals in a reserved day-night cycle.

A small collection of regional live animals is presented using natural settings where possible.

General admission is 25 cents. For museum information call 785-2802.

#### Sands Point Preserve

Sands Point Preserve, the original estate planned by railroad heir Howard Gould at the turn of the century, is an exceptional example of patterns of taste in land use, architecture, and furnishing during one of America's most vigorous periods of economic and social development.

Main buildings reflect the grandeur associated with Long Island's "Gold Coast" building styles. Ireland's Kilkenny castle and the medieval revival in general influenced the design for the massive, turreted, Castle Gould (1902), formerly the equestrian-parade stables and now the site of the visitor reception center.

age. Woodlands give evidence of the fairly unbroken forest here where the first settlers arrived.

Explore five nature trails, three are self-guiding, with tree and shrub labels.

Sand's Point's castles and preserves are located on Middenneck Road, Port Washington. Vehicle admission is \$1, July 4 through Labor Day, \$2. Tour fee for *Falaise* is \$2. Advance reservations encouraged. Call 883-1612.

### Superintendent's Budget

To The Editor:  
Traditionally, school budgets in Hicksville have been prepared by the Superintendent of Schools and presented to the Board of Education for its review. The Board makes suggestions and gives final approval to the budget that will be voted on by Hicksville residents in May. In September, our Board made the decision to change this procedure. They planned to study and vote on each and every line item for their own 1991-92 school budget. For those of you who have never seen a school budget, let me assure you that it is a packet of information approximately 1/2 inch thick. Not only does the Board need to review each item contained in this document, but read and digest the vast amounts of backup materials they requested that will allow them to make educated, knowledgeable decisions about what should and should not be included in a school budget of over \$50 million. Why did the Board choose to take this responsibility from the Superintendent?

Isn't Dr. Fenton the person most qualified to prepare a school budget? Board members have full-time jobs or other responsibilities that require their attention. I believe the preparation of a school budget is a full-time undertaking. It has always been the responsibility of the Superintendent to prepare the school budget. Isn't this one of the things that we are paying Dr. Fenton to do?

Was it the Board's intent to embarrass Dr. Fenton or help the district? In my opinion, they have done neither. At the Board meeting of Jan. 23, the few of us who were left in the audience at 1 a.m. were shocked to discover that the Board was not prepared to discuss the agenda's review of Codes 7000, 8000 and 9000 of the preliminary budget. It is already February and our budget preparations are far behind schedule. Is the Board assuming that they are more qualified than Dr. Fenton to prepare the budget? If so, they place this community in a potentially dangerous situation, both financially and educationally.

### THE INFANT JESUS OF PRAGUE

The statue is nineteen inches tall, made of wood and wax. It represents the Infant Jesus dressed in royal robes and wearing a crown. In 1637 it stood in a place of honor in the chapel of the Carmelites in Prague.

Fr. Cyril prayed before the statue. He was filled with wonder as he contemplated the God who became a child out of love for his people. Suddenly the statue spoke to the stunned Carmelite:

HAVE MERCY ON ME AND I WILL HAVE  
MERCY ON YOU. GIVE ME HANDS AND  
I WILL GIVE YOU PEACE. THE MORE  
YOU HONOR ME, THE MORE I WILL  
BLESS YOU.

For almost four centuries this promise has inspired devotion and love of the Infant Jesus. The original statue is preserved in the church of Our Lady of Victory in Prague.

Devotion to the Infant Jesus celebrates the great mystery of Incarnation. We acknowledge the humanity and the divinity of Christ, and we rejoice in God's caring love for us.







# Drug-Free Hope For Pain Sufferers

Until recently flotation was something found either in research settings or as a fad for those seeking inner peace. Today researchers at universities in the United States and Canada are using Flotation REST to relieve pain. REST stands for Reduced Environmental Stimulation Therapy and refers to an environment that is sublimely peaceful and free from stressors of all kinds.

"A large component of pain management involves the same tools used in stress management: relaxation and coping skills," Borrie adds. The Sensorium Clinic offers Flotation Therapy as part of its pain management program.

**Pediatric Asthma Center At Schneider Children's Hospital**

Seeing a child struggle for breath during an asthma episode can be a frightening experience for parents. Of the nine million Americans who suffer from asthma, three million are children. Despite advances in treatment and research, asthma-related deaths have increased during the past 10 years, particularly among children from 10 to 14 years of age. "There is no one cause for the increase," says David Valacer, MD, director of the Pediatric Allergy and Asthma Center at Schneider Children's Hospital of Long Island Jewish Medical Center, "but we believe that asthma deaths can be reduced by more comprehensive care and improved patient compliance."

The Center's multidisciplinary team of specialists provides long-term care of children with asthma as well as education and support services for their families. Dr. Valacer notes that "many children with asthma are brought to a local emergency room during an asthmatic crisis but then only intermittently seek regular follow-up care. Children with asthma should have a thorough assessment of their disease and need to receive ongoing, follow-up evaluations and management of their illness."

"One of our primary goals at the Pediatric Allergy and Asthma Center is to work with primary care pediatricians in the community to provide comprehensive care for the asthmatic child," says Dr. Valacer. "Rather than responding to acute attacks after they occur, the Center's team of specialists concentrates on the prospective treatment of

allergic and non-allergic precipitants and designs a medical management program that will stabilize the child's airways. Reducing hospital visits and episodes of wheezing in general, maximizes the patient's ability to function normally and minimizes the impact of asthma on the family of the asthmatic child."

Asthma, a complex disease that affects the lungs, is marked by bouts of serious breathing difficulties that can be both frightening and debilitating. An asthma sufferer has "hyperreactive lungs" that are extremely sensitive and react to a variety of agents that trigger asthma episodes, such as allergy, cold dry air, viral infection, or, in some cases, vigorous exercise. Episodes are unpredictable, often disrupting family life and causing parents to become over-anxious and overprotective.

A vital part of the Allergy and Asthma Center's program addresses the psychological needs of asthmatic children. Fear of being unable to breathe may cause asthma sufferers to withdraw from many activities resulting in feelings of depression and low self-esteem. The Center encourages schools and community organizations to utilize its speaker's program to increase public awareness and understanding of asthma and allergies. Greater understanding of asthma amongst teachers, parents and peers facilitates the asthmatic child's participation in age appropriate activities and athletics. Extensive social work services are available to all families attending the Center

to help with financial aid and support services that are often needed when a family is faced with the long-term costs of medical care and medication.

"New treatment options have changed the medical approach from just relieving symptoms of attacks to preventing attacks," states

Dr. Valacer. "The key to improving the long-term outcomes in preventive medicine, anticipatory guidance and education of asthmatic children and their families. We provide care with a broad range of specialists who are at the forefront of asthma care and research."

Referring to recent research treating cerebral palsy, Parkinson's disease and stroke with flotation, Dr. Borrie states, "sometimes it is difficult getting disabled patients into and out of the enclosed tanks. **Rehab Doctors Welcome Float Therapy**

**NONINVASIVE VASCULAR TESTING... WHY? WHEN? WHERE?**

You may be taking your regular walk around the neighborhood when you notice that your legs feel tired and achy. This feeling may recur each time; you may even think you have had a touch of the flu. You may then realize that this sensation has been ongoing for several months—years, maybe.

You're sitting in your favorite chair reading. You suddenly realize that part of the words are missing on one part of the page. It feels like somebody pulled a shade down over your eyes.



## Bicentennial Celebration Set...

# Peter Cooper, 19th Century LI Inventor

Today, the Long Island landscape may have in it plenty in the way of industrial variety. From airframes and electronic components to bio-tech and computer chips, the region is showing off its fair share of technological wizardry.

One of the earliest Long Islanders to make a name for the area when it comes to industrial inventions, however, got his start two hundred years ago.

His name was Peter Cooper, and he was born in 1791 and lived most of his life in Hempstead.

Ever heard of Cooper-Union in New York City? Well, Peter Cooper is the philanthropist who got it started. Donating and supervising the construction for the original building back in 1859, Cooper Union is known today as a tuition-free undergraduate college open to any qualified student.

And to show what kind of foresight Mr. Cooper had, long before women's suffrage, he made special provisions for the education of women.

All in all, Peter Cooper is considered an early forerunner of the philanthropic dispositions of the great industrialists of the late nineteenth century, setting forth the principle that wealth is a public trust.

Now, Hempstead Town Presiding Supervisor Joseph N. Mondello and Supervisor Gregory P. Peterson have announced plans for a gala celebration in commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the birth of Peter Cooper.

"(He) was a noted American inventor, manufacturer and philanthropist who spent much of his life in this part of Long Island," said Mondello.

Ingenious is the word for it, if a paper presented by Paul D. van Wie, Ph.D., of the Town of Hempstead Landmarks Commission is at all an indication. Cooper's career as an inventor began with a lawn mower, which he never marketed, according to Dr. van Wie. "A more successful invention was his celebrated automatic rocking cradle," he writes.

From there, he went on to accumulate fortunes with his industrial enterprise; first in the glue business, but in later years with his famous "Tom Thumb" locomotive, which Dr. van Wie says made Peter Cooper a celebrity.

There's more, of course. He opened an iron works in New Jersey which manufactured the first structural iron beams; supported an underwater telegraph cable connection with Europe; and invented such diverse products as a washing machine, a device for moving barges, and even a new way of producing gelatin.

To celebrate the bicentennial of Cooper's

birth, a representative of the Nassau County Museum is scheduled to show up at the Hempstead Public Library on Monday, February 11, dressed up as the 19th Century inventor. "He will describe his early years residing in the Village of Hempstead, and will focus on some of his major inventions," said a representative from the town.

That will include the mechanical cradle, the I-beam—stilled used in modern construction, cables for suspension bridges, and even "Tom Thumb."

The Village of Hempstead will be getting into the act as well, with plans to erect a historic marker at the original site of Peter Cooper's Hempstead home. In addition, the town's Landmark Preservation Commission is planning to issue a booklet on Cooper's life; and at the traditional June Festival at Old Bethpage Village Restoration, more activities are planned.

The celebrations begin on Feb 11 at 11:00am, at the Hempstead Public Library at 115 Nichols Court in Hempstead.

direction of first assistant chief Pat Scanlon.

The fire was under control within 15 minutes.

Later that day at 9 p.m., a fire broke out in a heating duct in the rear of Hicksville Farms on South Broadway. The cause is undetermined. The fire extended into the roof area and caused damage to an adjacent

vacant store which formally housed a photo factory.

Schweitzer estimated the damage at \$6 to \$8,000. Approximately \$1500 in damage was done to the adjacent store. Firefighters had to make holes in the vacant store's roof to check for fire. More than 75 firefighters were at the scene under the direction of Chief Tony Wigdzinski.

## Contract Bridge By Steve Becker

What is the magic factor that separates the expert from the run-of-the-mill player? In most cases it is simply that the expert, faced with a difficult problem, gives the matter that extra little bit of effort. He has heard that genius is an infinite capacity for taking pains, and he will not allow himself to fall short in this respect.

Observe how our typical expert approaches the play on this deal after he gets a club lead and wins East's ten with the ace. His potential losers

are a trump and two diamonds, but a trump trick can be lost only if the suit is divided 3-0, and even then only if South misguesses whether to cash the king or the ace first.

South's initial problem, therefore, is which way to tackle the trumps. There is nothing to go on in the bidding, and the only clue South has to guide him comes from the opening lead. Noting that West led the deuce of clubs, presumably his fourth-best club, our hero assumes that West has four clubs and East has six.

It follows that if one opponent does have three trumps, West is the one more likely to have them. Declarer therefore cashes the king of spades first and, when East shows out, takes the marked finesse before drawing the third round of trumps.

Now declarer focuses all his attention on the diamond suit. But instead of finessing East immediately for the king, which would be fatal as the cards lie, he takes steps to guard against the possibility that West has that card.

He cashes the A-K-Q of hearts and then leads the queen of clubs from dummy. When East follows low, South discards a diamond, thus saddling West with the lead. Whatever West returns, South has the slam in the bag.
