Resident Takes A Stand Against Graffiti

*Four Nabbed
For Spraying Graffiti*

The Hicksville community has recently been banding together to try to stop the flood of unwanted graffiti that has been popping up throughout the area. Residents have complained of graffiti that spells out the word "Dren" on various buildings and walls throughout the area.

On the night of Oct. 24, a member of the Duffy Park Civic Association's Neighborhood Watch Team was jogging past the J.C. Penney property on Duffy Ave. at about 9:55 p.m. when he observed four young men spray painting the Penney building and the trucks that were parked near it.

He immediately went to a phone and called 911 to alert the police to the situation at hand.

He continued to watch the young men and when they all got into a car, he followed them down the street until he saw a police squad car and flagged it down, pointing out the suspects to the police officer.

The four young men, Brian Flynn, age 22, Eugene Hundertmark, age 17, David Mak, age 17, and a minor whose name was withheld by the police were arrested and charged with Criminal Mischief Third Degree. All are residents of Hicksville.

The witness of the crime said that there were about twenty cans of spray paint in the young men's car and that when police went back to the Penney property, they found that the paint on the building and trucks was still wet.

Police said that there is about \$3,000 worth of damages. A representative from J.C. Penney's pressed charges against the four young men, said police.

"The arrest of these individuals is especially gratifying to us because we are extremely proud of our neighborhood watch program and because it will now make people aware of the extent of the graffiti problem in all of Hicksville," said Dave Staton, President of the Duffy Park Civic Association.

"We hope that the vandals are punished appropriately," he added.

The Duffy Park Civic Association is one of only two civic groups in the area that have formed a neighborhood watch program.

A coalition of different civic groups and organizations from within the community has been meeting to see if they can jointly

Protestors Demand Research

The crowd of over 300 was filled with angry and frightened people. Many wore signs around their necks with labels, "Mother", "Sister", "Friend", "Daughter" and "Wife". Clusters of women wore signs saying "Survivor." A sign hung from a baby carriage which read, "Our mother has breast cancer please find a cure."

The emotional rally was held on the steps of the Supreme Court in Mineola on October 23rd. The event was organized by a group called "One in Nine," a grass roots political action group founded by Marie Quinn and Francine Kritehek. The group has several hundred members including survivors and their families and friends. They believe that women should not be satisfied

with treatment that essentially has not changed in twenty years.

Quinn's opening remark was, "Welcome to Long Island the Breast Cancer Capital of the world!" The crowd roared their confirmation of her statement and began to chant "What do we want? A cure. When do we want it? Now!"

Speakers implored all levels of government to get involved. They spoke of the devastation of families. They spoke of their need for help. Breast cancer was categorized as an epidemic and yet there has clearly been no published research indicating a search for a cure.

Pat Hoehl of Plainview is a cancer survivor and she is angry. "Research is being done on cancer in men and a blood test was

recently formulated to test for prostate cancer. Women are told, "Have a mammogram every year, dear." This is a test not a prevention and not a cure." She said that no one is prepared for the diagnosis, "You don't get sick, there is no pain."

Sue Goldman, also from Plainview said that it was very difficult for her to be at the rally. She recently lost her mother to cancer and had a scare herself last year when she required surgery to remove a benign tumor.

The rally was one of a series of events planned by health advocates to mark October as Breast Cancer Awareness Month on Long Island. Adelphi University held a forum for breast-cancer survivors and North Shore University scheduled breast self-exam-

Businesses Weather Tough Times

Local Shop Owners Able To Stay Afloat

At a time when recession has gripped a majority of the country, business people in Hicksville are trying to keep residents shopping locally by maintaining a high quality product and service and by offering many sales to entice people to enter the stores.

"Last year we held a business expo, made up of local shop owners, in the Broadway Mall to introduce people to the various businesses in the area. We will be doing that again in the spring," said Beth Dalton, president of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce.

Dalton can see an end to the recession. "There certainly has been an easing in the recession. Last year there was a type of doom and gloom among business people—now things appear more hopeful," she said.

Boos' Flowers has been trying to beat the recession by offering sales on roses and other items. They charge \$19.99 for 12 roses and at that price, they have been able to draw people in. Much of their business, however, is on recommendation by other residents who were satisfied with the product that they received at Boos'.

Mr. Electric, owned by Marc Ramirez, has not been hit that hard by the recession.

"The recession has not hit me that much. We are a service-oriented company and have been able to bring to the customer honest and dependable service. We care about our

customers and that is what keeps them coming back," he said.

When asked what the local homeowners should do to make sure they are getting quality, he said, "The local homeowner should be very careful and watch out for contractors who try and make you think you are getting quality service when you are not. Homeowners should ask to see a contractor's license before letting them do any work. There are some people who pretend to be licensed contractors and are really not."

Beth Dalton also wants to remind residents that it is the local business person who helps support many of the local organizations either by sponsoring teams for the children or by donating objects to be raffled off. "In order for the local business person to keep supporting those organizations, they need the help from the community," she said.

Residents have said that they have been shopping locally. Some feel that it is the local business owner who gives them the highest quality.

While many are still feeling the pinch of the tough times, some in Hicksville feel that the worst is over and that better times are ahead.

Oyster Bay Town Adopts 1992 Budget

At a recent meeting of the Oyster Bay Town Board, the 1992 town budget was adopted.

The budget summary, plus supporting information and data is available for public inspection during normal business hours at the Town Clerk's office, Oyster Bay. Where feasible, the Town Clerk shall also make available additional copies of the budget in additional places where residents can inspect it.

The budget calls for a .15 cent reduction in the tax rate per every \$100 of assessed valuation. The total tax decrease will be approximately \$10.50 for the average homeowner in the Town of Oyster Bay.

Public Hearing For Fire Zone At Motor Vehicle

Authorization for the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles to establish a fire zone in its Hicksville district office parking field will be the subject of a public hearing by the Oyster Bay Town Board on Tuesday, Nov. 26.

"The Regional Director of the State Department of Motor Vehicles has requested the town board to authorize the creation of a fire zone in its Hicksville district office parking field," said Town Councilman Thomas Clark.

"In a letter to the town, the director noted that customers visiting the office have been parking along the lot's only driveway, creating a serious hazard as fire department vehicles do not have sufficient room to access the parking lot in the event of a fire or other emergency," he added.

The Department of Motor Vehicles has to obtain the town's permission for the fire zone because the creation of such designations falls within the purview of the local municipality.

The meeting is scheduled for 10 a.m. in the hearing room at Town Hall East, Audrey Ave., Oyster Bay.

Cops Call Tinted Glass A No-No

If the Nassau County Police Department has its way, tinted windows on automobiles will go the way of the dodo.

Tinting of windows—which police consider a "dangerous fashion statement"—poses safety threats, to the occupants of the car, to drivers of other cars, and to police officers who stop cars with tinted windows.

Police aren't concerned with the tinting installed by automobile manufacturers, which is designed to aid an auto's air conditioning system. The top few inches of most windshields are also tinted, to minimize the effect of sun glare into a driver's eyes.

The degree of tinting that bothers the police makes it almost impossible to see into an auto, and conversely, makes it harder for the driver to see, especially at night. "It definitely makes for reduced visibility," said Insp. Kenneth McGoff, commanding officer of the Highway Patrol Bureau.

While police have no statistics about the number of cars that have an illegal degree of tinting, Insp. McGoff believes "it is definitely a problem. There are a significant number of cars out there with window tinting."

A certain amount of tinting is permissible. The state's vehicle traffic law provisions on this subject, last amended in 1982, bar tinting or covering with any material "which when tested has a total light reflectance of more than 35 percent or a light transmittance of less than 35 percent."

Affected by the law are the windshield, front side windows and rear window (unless the auto has mirrors on both sides) "so adjusted that the driver shall have a clear and full view of the road and condition of traffic behind" the vehicle.

On Jan. 1, 1992, Insp. McGoff said, the law changes to require that 70 percent of the light must pass through a window. That means that the reflectance factor drops from 35 to 30 percent.

The problem until now has been: how does a police officer accurately determine whether the amount of tinting exceeds what

the law permits.

That problem has been solved with a new enforcement tool, small and light enough to be carried by every officer, called a Tint-O-Meter. Measuring about three by seven by two inches, and weighing less than six ounces, the "Model 100 Auto Calibrator," as it is called by its Massachusetts-based manufacturer, can measure the amount of tinting within two seconds, with a two percent margin of error permitted.

To utilize the equipment, an officer, who can be trained in its use within one hour, places the unit over a side window. Since the glass must pass through a slot in the unit to measure its reflectance, this machine can't test windshields.

"But we're more concerned with the side

windows," McGoff said. That's where a police officer stands after he stops a car, and while he's out there, he's a target for whatever's in the auto—and he can't even see what is inside.

A test plate, measuring 26 percent reflectance, comes with the unit. To insure an accurate reading, the officer first inserts the test plate. The machine, which is battery operated, will next be passed over the glass of the car in question to determine whether the auto is in violation of the law.

"We've had three of the units since June, for evaluation purposes," said Insp. McGoff. "In a 30 day period, we issued about 40 summonses" to drivers whose autos violated the law.

TOB Saves By Selling Newspapers

Old Papers Will Bring In Revenue To Town

The Town of Oyster Bay has entered into an agreement with Garden State Paper Company for the sale of old newspapers for \$21 per ton. If the town did not recycle the material, they would have to pay \$117 to have it hauled away.

The Town will provide from 150-200 tons per month of grade No. 8, high quality, old newspaper from the Town.

"Because the Town of Oyster Bay is a member of the Long Island Town's Recycling Cooperative, we have access to recycling market contracts awarded by the Cooperative," said Oyster Bay Town Supervisor Angelo Delligatti.

It is hoped, in the future, Garden State Paper will expand its facilities and be in a position to accept more of the 1,200 tons of old newspaper that the Town of Oyster Bay's S.O.R.T. program collects monthly with its curbside collection program.

"This agreement allows us to close the recycling loop while saving the Town a substantial sum of money," said Supervisor Delligatti. He called the plan "a perfect example of government and business working together for the betterment of the entire community."

Garden State Paper supplies *Newsday* with paper on a regular contractual basis. Trucks leaving *Newsday's* facility in Melville

generally return to New Jersey empty.

Now, because of the agreement recently signed with Garden State Paper, the truckers will drop off an empty trailer at the Bethpage facility, allow the Town time to fill it with high quality old newspaper and then haul it back to New Jersey for processing at absolutely no cost to the Town for transport.

The Town of Islip holds the primary con-

tract with Garden State Paper, but through the Long Island Town's Recycling Cooperative, the Town of Oyster Bay has been able to ensure their ability to have its mills working at capacity.

"This venture has historical significance because it marks the first time that two Towns, Oyster Bay, in Nassau and Islip, in

FIRE REPORT

The Hicksville Fire Department responded to a mutual aid request from the Syosset Fire Department on Oct. 15 at 1:40 a.m. for a ladder truck and engine to the scene of a store fire in the Village of Syosset.

Also on Oct. 15, Hicksville firefighters and Haz Mat Team members plugged a leak in a 2500 gallon propane truck at the Fairhaven Garden and Supply on N. Broadway. It appeared that the operator of the vehicle was not qualified to operate it and his actions created a leak that required stopping all traffic in the area and the evacuation of residents in the area.

The alarm came in at 11:08 a.m. Within 15 minutes Haz Mat Team members capped off the leak.

The Jericho Fire Department was called to assist in case of a large scale evacuation or

fire fighting had to be carried out. County Fire/Haz Mat Personnel are investigating.

A major fire in the central part of town at 81 Broadway was averted when occupants reported that they smelled smoke. After a 40 minute search, a smoldering electrical fire was discovered in the ceiling in a light fixture.

Firefighters from Hicksville, with the help of a unit from Jericho, disconnected the light fixture with only minor damage reported.

A house on Field Ave. suffered \$18,000 in damage when a fire destroyed one room and its contents.

The fire occurred on Oct. 23 at 11:17 p.m. with thick fog covering the area. Under Chief Wigdzinsk, 65 firefighters and eight units were called.

Fire Marshals are still investigating.

ination seminars.

In 1960 the national statistic for women diagnosed with breast cancer was 1 in 20. The figure for women in 1991 is 1 in 9. A total of 44,500 women nationwide are dying each year from this disease. Many in the crowd insisted that a new study be done to try and isolate the reasons for the high rate of the disease on Long Island, especially in Nassau County.

Phyllis Newman spoke as the Honorary Chairperson of the Long Island Coalition. She told of the good news, that she was healthy, happy and cancer free after two mastectomies in 1983 and 1984 but she added that, "As a Long Island taxpayer for the past 25 years, I demand that more money go for research."

Elementary schoolteacher Jill Fischer took time off from her first grade class in Jamaica Avenue School to help raise money for 1 in 9. She had been operated on last year for breast cancer.

Stan Melnick of Queens emotionally described his family's ordeal after learning of his wife's breast cancer. "No one was prepared for it... It was a surprise, you don't get sick, there is no pain. It is an insidious disease and the only thing that will work is a cure."

Babara Balaban who heads the Breast Cancer Program at Adelphi University thanked a long list of politicians, many of whom attended or sent representatives. She announced that Senator Levy had just obtained a grant for the 1 in 9 organization. She spoke of the need for better studies, better research and better legislation. 





"None of the drivers, to our knowledge, have pleaded not guilty, and we've had no court tests of the machine," said Insp. McGoff.

A driver who gets a ticket may not even have to go to court at all, McGoff added. The law provides that the driver may correct the tinting within 30 days, and then to the Motor Vehicle Department—by appointment—with the summons, and have the glass rechecked. If it passes, the ticket will be dismissed, and the fine—a maximum of \$50—need not be paid.

Many of the illegally tinted windows are "do it yourself" projects, using kits that can be purchased over the counter at auto supply stores. The tinting can be installed in minutes. Police find that younger drivers most often violate the law.

Whether the new meters see widespread use will be up to Police Commissioner Samuel Rozzi, after a further evaluation. How long that will be is not known.

But one other police agency, the Port Washington Police Department, appears happy with the tint-o-meters, according to Capt. William M. Kilfoil, whose department purchased two of the \$175 machines earlier this year, and has been issuing summonses based on their readings.

Port Washington Police had no immediately-available record of the number issued. "If an officer makes a traffic stop, and sees a heavily tinted window, he'll make a reading, and issue a summons if necessary," Capt. Kilfoil said. The Port Washington Police haven't mounted a campaign against tinted windows, and Kilfoil said that usually a driver won't be stopped only for that violation.

The day of the illegally tinted window may be at an end, police hope.

Suffolk, will be using the same recycling vendor under the LITC contract," said Mr. Delligatti.

Previously the Town was paying to have its old newspapers hauled away for recycling. This past week, the Town paid \$25 a ton to P & P Papers. They had received both the high quality No. 8 paper, which contains newspapers printed black on white, and the lower grade No. 6, a lesser grade newspaper that includes colored supplements and inserts.

The No. 6 paper must be bleached before it can be used and is therefore less valuable to a recycler.

Town Public Information Officer Phyllis Barry said the P & P Paper Co. is paid the market value of the newspaper minus \$15. The Town receives a better price than when the arrangements for recycling newspapers began several years ago. Then the Town paid the market value. At first the Town was being paid for the material, later, when the supply exceeded the demand, the Town had to pay for the material to be taken away.

If the Town was not recycling the newspapers, they would have fallen into the category of being part of the disposable solid waste stream being hauled off-Island at \$117 per ton.

The reason the Town has been successful in dealing with the Garden State Paper Company, said Phyllis Barry, is because they are a newspaper mill and need the material for their process.



The Key To Remodeling Success

Remodeling can turn an ordinary home into an extraordinary one. And what's more, projects need not be extensive or expensive. But, before you begin giving your house a makeover, give careful thought to remodeling plans, and decide whether you have the skills to do the work or if you should hire a contractor.

A successful start to any remodeling project is putting your plans on paper. You'll probably need the help of a professional architect or designer, especially if your project involves moving walls or redesigning space.

You should consider quality. If the finished product isn't consistent with the rest of the home, the money saved will not be money earned when you consider the house as a long-term investment.

Here are three questions to consider when deciding whether to do it yourself or hire a pro:

- Do you have the time to do the job right?
- Do you have the skills required?
- Will the quality of the project be consistent with the existing house construction?

If you can't answer "yes" to all of these questions, then you'll probably be better off hiring a pro to get the most from your investment.

The next step is choosing a contractor. Making the right selection can pay big

dividends in time, hassle and headaches saved. To begin that process, develop a list of contractors who are recommended by friends or associations like the National Association of the Remodeling Industry or the National Association of Home Builders.

You should follow certain criteria when screening contractors:

- Get rough estimates. Use your plan to describe what you want and to find a realistic price range.
- Establish credentials. Contact the Better Business Bureau and see if the contractor is bonded and has protection for worker's compensation and personal liability.
- Ask for references. They are critical to determine the contractor's workmanship and business ethics. And, past projects are a contractor's best sales pitch.
- Get a firm bid by submitting a working blueprint to several of the best candidates. Make sure contractors are using the same information on products used and work done.

Once you're satisfied with a single contractor, get a written contract that outlines details of the project and each individual's obligations. This should include costs, payment schedules and penalties, if any. Most payment schedules require money down, an amount when the project is half done and the balance upon completion. Never pay total costs in advance and make sure you are completely satisfied before making a payment.







America's Great Landscapes Come To L.I.

Exhibit Opens Sunday*

If you are one of those Long Islanders who seeks the rough rocky forest vistas of upstate New York, the cascading waterfalls of the American West, or the desert landscapes of New Mexico, in the next few months you won't have to pay a single bridge toll or drive on an interstate to do so.

As the saying goes, "The Mountain Has Come To Mohammed." And in this case, Mohammed means us.

To be exact, we're talking about American landscape art, not mountains. And Mohammed? Try Roslyn's Nassau County Museum of Art. Because an exhibition at the museum, located just off 25A in Roslyn, will feature the landscapes of America from November 10 through February 9, 1992.

The show is called "Landscapes of America: The Hudson River School to Abstract Expressionism," and has as its theme the grandeur, luminosity and atmospheric vistas which characterize the varied pictorial formats of this period.

What's more, on Saturday Nov. 9 the museum will hold a gala Black Tie Benefit for the opening of the new exhibition.

To add to the fun for those who attend the Black Tie Gala, the museum is also throwing in a pretty impressive musical offering. Award-winning Big Band veteran Al "Fab" Grey, trombonist, trumpeter, composer and arranger, will perform at the museum

November 9 from 5-7 p.m. for the opening. Grey is said to be "notorious" for his style, described in such unusual terms as "low-down bubbly" and "bellowing grovels."

Some biographical notes on Al may be in order here. Born in Aldie, Virginia, Grey grew up the "musical hard way" by sharpening his rich tones with the greatest Big Band virtuosos in the land. Don't believe it? Try asking Count Basie, Benny Carter, Jimmy Lunceford and Lionel Hampton:

During his two decades with the Count, his fellow musicians nicknamed him "Fab" for (you guessed it) fabulous.

Among his musical credits, Al played alongside Benny Goodman, Bing Crosby, Sammy Davis Jr., and Dizzy Gillespie.

More recently, Al Grey performed for the 1991 100th anniversary celebration at Carnegie Hall.

In his dedication of this remarkable book of photographs, John Loengard says: "This book is dedicated to the photographers whose understanding of the human face illuminates the printed page." There follows a list of 92 photographers whose work appeared in *Life* magazine over a period of 55 years and an alphabetical list of their subjects ranging from Louis Armstrong to Orson Welles.

Mr. Loengard, who was photo editor of the magazine, says that more than half a million faces were shown in *Life* so choosing the ones he would include in the book required some criteria. "Primarily I looked for an expression on the face that conveys the subject's feelings at the moment the photograph was taken. Or if the subject's feelings remain a mystery, I looked for a face that had been caught in a fresh or revealing light...Most of the pictures are candid in their description of a person. Few were made in a studio. Most show people doing things that were more important than having their pictures taken."

The pictures are not all of famous people. One wonderful shot by Alfred Eisenstaedt shows children at a puppet show on a street in Paris. Eisenstaedt says of it: "In the Parc de Montsouris I discovered an outdoor puppet show, and then I found a little niche under the miniature stage, in front of where the prompter's box might have been. It was wonderful watching the children's faces at the moment the bad dragon was slain. I shot almost two rolls." At 92 Eisenstaedt admits, "I have never made a better picture of expressions on the human face."

There is a beautiful full color shot of Britain's Princess Di by photographer Michael Brennan. She is shown giving a ride in her Rolls Royce to an African-American child who lives in a home for children with AIDS. "I'm not a great lover of the royals," Mr. Brennan says, "still the woman broke completely with formality. It was a mother's instinct, wasn't it? She took the time to do this for that child. It makes all the royals look good."

In a large black-and-white photograph of a group of unemployed people waiting at an employment office, a photographer shows emotions ranging from despair to a faintly smiling hope. Today's unemployment figures make the 1942 photograph especially poignant.

Another wonderful group photograph was taken in a bar during the World Series between the New York Yankees and the Brooklyn Dodgers. Quoting from the caption: "For seven days, the midday life of some 70 million Americans was disrupted." Employers are probably grateful that now the games are played at night.

Speaking of baseball, there is a wonderful smiling photograph of Joe DiMaggio taken in 1949. In the dugout just before the All-Star game at Ebbets Field, Hy Peskin photographed the centerfielder for his second *Life* cover. Statistics being what they are in baseball, the book notes, it may be important to note that the time between DiMaggio's two covers was exactly 10 years, three months and no days.

The cover photograph of *Faces* was well chosen. It shows that great mime, Charlie Chaplin, making himself up for his 81st movie, *Limelight*.

As a gift for anyone interested in photography, this could hardly be improved upon. It would adorn anyone's coffee table and keep guests amused for a few minutes or a number of hours.

The Yale Glee Club Returns Nov. 8

"Boola, Boola! Oh! Yale, Eli, Yale!" For the second consecutive year, sounds of the exuberant Yale Glee Club will be heard at the Congregational Church of Manhasset on Friday, Nov. 8 at 8 p.m. Last year was the Glee Club's first appearance at the Congregational Church and they sang to a full house. The 100-member Yale Glee Club will be opening their 131st season with this concert, their only Long Island appearance. The Yale Glee Club soon became synonymous with male chorus singing at its finest. Mr. Bartholomew's retirement in 1953 brought Fenno Heath to the directorship of the club as it continued to grow and evolve into the large chorus it is today. The tradition and enjoyment of singing and traveling with friends unite the Glee Club members now as they have for over a century.

The Glee Club has sung in every principal city in the United States, taking annual winter tours and frequent summer tours in Europe and Latin America. They also keep busy at home, singing for community benefits and for events at the University.

Since becoming Director of the Yale Glee Club in 1953, Fenno Heath has established himself as a widely recognized conductor, choral composer and arranger. The Glee Club's thriving state is largely due to his expert direction and leadership. Ably suited to carry on the great traditions of the Glee Club, Mr. Heath was an undergraduate at Yale, Class of '50, and completed his Master of Music degree at Yale where he was a student of Paul Hindemith. Mr. Heath has composed and arranged many works specifically for this chorus, many of which are published. Enormously popular with the students, last year several students showed up wearing "I Love Fenno" buttons! This will be Mr. Heath's last appearance with the Glee Club at our church, as he is retiring after this academic year.



A Page From Howard Olsen's Scrap Book

The following Hicksville memories sent to us by Howard Olsen were inspired by an article entitled "A Page From Joe Murray's Scrapbook" which was printed in the Hicksville Illustrated on Oct. 12, 1989.

We ran a photo of Joe Murray's grandfather's horse and buggy on the northwest corner of Broadway and Old Country Road in front of a Hupmobile service station.

Well, it turns out that Howard Olsen's aunt and uncle rented that building out in the late twenties possibly thirties and Howard sent us his memories of that building:

I never had the pleasure of knowing Joe Murray, but I do remember hearing of his Uncle Karl Gellweiler. I also remember very well the building on the northwest corner of Broadway and Old Country Road that Joe

wrote about.

My Aunt and Uncle (Elsie and John (Jack) Soffel) rented that building, possibly in the late twenties, but definitely in the thirties. My uncle ran a gas station and auto repair shop. He sold Tydol Gas and Veedol Oil. Later, on the southwest corner in an old wooden building, Henry McIntoch opened a Sinclair station. On the northeast corner, Bohack opened a grocery store and a gas station, and on the southeast corner was an open field. The memories that follow are of these specific times, the thirties.

First let me describe the building. The large white stucco type building had two large garage doors, one facing Broadway and one facing Old Country Road. It was possible to drive in one door through the shop and

You may wonder how declarer lost a trump trick in this deal and went down one in five hearts. However, it all came about in a perfectly natural way.

The hand was played in New Orleans in the 1978 World Open Pair Championship. North, Ahmed Hussein, partnered by Omar Sharif and representing Egypt, opened the bidding with one club.

East, Leon Tintner, partnered by Nadine Cohen and representing France, overcalled with two spades

This was theoretically a weak jump overall, indicating a strong six-card suit in a hand of less than opening strength.

Omar Sharif now boldly bid three hearts despite his 5 high-card points and dreadful heart suit. Obviously, he could not bring himself to pass, but this action ultimately came back to haunt him.

West jump-raised her partner to four spades, and North, not knowing whether his side could make five hearts or whether the opponents could make four spades, decided to cater to both possibilities by bidding five hearts. That closed the bidding, and West led the king of clubs and continued with the ace.

Now, resisting the temptation to lead a spade, Cohen returned a low club. This proved to be the straw that broke the camel's back. Tintner ruffed dummy's nine of clubs with the jack of hearts, and Sharif was down one before he could even get started.

Declarer easily won the rest of the tricks. He ruffed the spade return, cashed the A-K of trumps and A-K of diamonds, then ruffed a diamond in dummy, establishing his remaining diamonds. However, this was little consolation for someone who had lost a trump trick even though he had started with a total of nine trumps headed by the A-K-Q.

out the other door. On the north side of the Broadway shop door was a showroom which was used for storage.

The office was in the front corner where there was a service counter with a door behind it which led to a vestibule, a small front door and the upstairs apartment. This is where Aunt Elsie and Uncle Jack lived. Outside, in the sidewalk near the curb on the Old Country Road side, there were two gas pumps. Each pump had a handle on the side which had to be turned around by hand to pump gas into the customer's tank.

On the other side of the building and close to it was the gas pump that I liked best. This pump had a large glass cylinder on top. The

drain from the cylinder into the car's gas tank. This type of pump was soon replaced by the type of pump I first mentioned above.

Sometimes when my uncle was busy, he would let me wait on customers. This work was fun. I enjoyed helping Uncle Jack. (Helping? Well as much as a 7 to 12 year old kid could help.) This fun job soon ended when some guy invented the electric gas pump. Oh yes, the price of gas - well, I can remember pumping 10 gallons for a dollar.

Here is a little something which may help someone remember my aunt and uncle; They had a small black fox terrier dog whose name was Jackie. He would take money from the customers, or anyone, in his mouth, run into the office, stand by the cash register and wait for my aunt or uncle. However, Jackie never would take coins and by no means would he ever take money back to the customer. It was just one way with him.

Sometimes for helping, but most times for no reason at all, Aunt Elsie would give me a nickel or a dime. I would usually go next door to Lindermand's Ice Cream Parlor and buy a Mello-Roll. A Mello-Roll was a piece of ice cream approximately 2 inches in diameter and 3 inches long, wrapped in paper and placed in a specially designed type of cone. That was a good treat for five cents.

In the late thirties, my aunt and uncle moved from there to another gas station on the other side of town on the corner of Broadway and Willoughby Ave. When World War II caused the supply of gasoline to become short, my aunt and uncle closed shop. They both went to work for Grumman. Uncle Jack worked in the shop and Aunt Elsie was a guard. I remember her proudly saying that she was the first woman guard in Grumman.

In order to get the gas up into the cylinder, it had to be pumped by a handle on the side of the pump. This pump had a long hose in order to reach the customer's car which was parked at curbside. Islanders Get An 'A' For Effort

You've got to say this for the Islanders: they're trying hard.

In the week just past, the Uniondale team played three games, two at home, taking on the division-leading Washington Capitals (10-3-0 going into the game) and the San Jose Sharks (who have dropped 13 of the 14 games they've played this year).

The Islanders also traveled to Chicago Oct. 31, losing 4-3 when the Blackhawks' Steve Larmier scored with 1:14 to go in the third period.

That the Islanders are trying can be seen from the Oct. 29 match against the new Sharks, when the home team scored four goals in the third period to send the Sharks away, 8-4.

The score might have been 10-4, but referee Dave Jackson disallowed two first period goals by Captain Patrick Flatley, instead penalizing the Islanders for interference in the goal crease. Ray Ferraro and Derek King, both top scorers for the Islanders, were assessed the respective penalties.

King came back to score goals in the first and second periods. Other Islander goals were scored by Dave McLlwain, Adam Creighton, Benoit Hogue, Steve Thomas, David Chyzowski, and with 45 seconds left in the game, the new 22-year-old center Pierre Turgeon, who has demonstrated remarkable speed and skill on the ice.

The Islanders out-shot the Sharks, 34-28, with Glenn Healy stopping 24 of the Sharks' shots, while Jeff Hackett, a former Islander goaltender, took the loss for the visitors.

That game's attendance, set at 7,327 by the Coliseum security staff, was topped by the 8,000 who came Nov. 2 to see the season's first visit by the Washington Capitals. It also marked the 100th time that the two teams have played, with the Islanders holding the advantage with a record of 56-35-8.

The 1990-91 season saw the Caps sweep the Islanders, 7-0, and while the Islanders hoped for a decisive victory last Saturday, it was not to be. But the 7-4 loss was no picnic for Washington.

The Caps were ahead at the end of the first period, 4-1, and 6-2 after the second,

Although third period goals by Tom Kurvers at 3:36 and Adam Creighton at 6:38 - the second of the night for each - brought the score within two goals with more than 11 minutes to play, the Islanders were unable to get anything past Caps' goaltender Don Beaupre, and a Caps' goal by Peter Bondra at 18:11, nine seconds after he came off a two minute interference penalty, sealed the home team's fate.

Islander Goaltender Glenn Healy, who had turned aside so many good shots and made so many excellent saves of late, seemed to have an off night against the Caps, and was pulled at 4:05 of the second period, to be replaced by Steve Weeks, playing in his first NHL game. Weeks was the Islanders' goaltender in the exhibition game Oct. 24 against Team USA, with the Islanders shutting out the visitors, 3-0.

The Islanders scored first in their Oct. 31 road trip to Chicago, with Benoit Hogue getting the only first period goal at 16:53. The Blackhawks scored twice in the second and three times in the third. Other Islander goals were by Hogue in the second and Joe Reekie - his first of the season - in the third.

Five of the Blackhawks who played in that game were former Islanders, including Captain Brent Sutter. The others are John Tonelli, Brad Lauer, Greg Gilbert and Steve Konroyd, who, assisted by Gilbert, scored the first goal of the third period at 11:52.

The Islanders' schedule this week includes a visit by Boston Mon., Nov. 4, and visits to the Edmonton Oilers Nov. 6, San Jose Sharks Nov. 9, and the Canucks Nov. 10. Only three other home games will be played in November: the Rangers visit on the 16th, Boston on the 27th and the Capitals make their second visit Nov. 30, the day after the Islanders play at Washington in game two of a scheduled seven series this year.

Going in to the Nov. 2 game, the Caps were leading the Patrick division with a 10-3 record.

Season and individual tickets for Islanders are still available by calling 794-4100. Home games are televised on cable television channels and aired on several AM radio stations. Many away games are also aired, both on radio and television.
