## Scouts Get Land From County

As reported in the *Hicksville Illustrated News* in the April 2 edition the Hicksville Association of Girl Scouts' were searching for land to use as part of their "Caring For The Earth" project. The front page article explained the Scouts' gardening project and requested anyone who could donate land to be used to contact the Girl Scouts.

Upon reading the article County Executive Thomas S. Gulotta contacted Scout Representative Mary Ellen Carr and discussed the association's requirements for the project. They came to an agreement to use land located in Caenique Park, a county owned park.

As part of the project the Girl Scouts will plant vegetables and donate the harvest to local organizations that could use the fresh food.

Community gardening is not a new idea. Many towns across the country have had such programs for many years.

All during the month of May, the Historical Society of the Hicksville-Gregory Museum has sponsored an exhibit in the library dedicated to Hicksville's veterans. Included in the display is the Roll Call of veterans who gave their lives for our country; photographs (courtesy of Ed Bady) of most of the veterans on the Roll Call; newspaper articles; poems, such as "In Flanders Field," commemorating Memorial Day; and programs from the dedications of the War Memorials in Hicksville and from other Memorial Day events.

Hicksville has been very supportive of its veterans. According to Hicksville Historian Richard Evers, Hicksville is unusual because of the number of Veterans Monuments that it has. In all, there are six monuments in memory of Hicksville veterans. The World War I Monument, originally at the rail road station, is now at the Memorial Mall at the middle school. Four other monuments are located at the middle school. In 1986, the Korean and the Vietnam Monuments joined the WWI and WWJI Monuments at the Middle School. The last monument to be placed at the Memorial Mall was a Veterans Memorial in 1990, in memory of all veterans who have made the supreme sacrifice.

Another memorial is located at John F. Kennedy Memorial Park at the intersection of Broadway and Jerusalem. It was placed there in 1965. Engraved on it are the names

of Hicksville's veterans who lost their lives up to 1965. Efforts are being made by the Combined Veterans Organizations to have the rest of Hicksville's war dead engraved on

it. The clock tower over the middle school is also a memorial dedicated to the cause of peace.

## Twentieth Anniversary At Central Nassau

### Community Residence Program Dedicated

Central Nassau Guidance and Counseling Services, Inc. kicked off their 20th year, on May 13, with an open house reception and dedication program in honor of the late Neal Millman, executive director of the agency from 1987 to 1992.

Central Nassau Guidance and Counseling Services, formerly East Plains Mental Health Services, provides substance abuse counseling, mental health services, and has a community residence program for Hicksville residents and residents of nearby communities.

The 20th anniversary kickoff celebration was a happy occasion to look back at Central Nassau's proud history. Originally part of The Family Services Association, East Plains became independent just five years after its founding. Located at 35 Broadway in Hicksville, the agency temporarily moved

to 111 Old Country Rd. before finally finding its current home at 246 Old Country Rd., behind Antun's.

Not only has Central Nassau undergone structural changes, but changes are also evident in how far mental health and counseling services have progressed. Back in 1972, treatment was limited; now all the needs of a patient are carefully taken into consideration. Choices are not limited, so patients are given a say in their type of treatment. Today, case managers deal with the concrete needs of the patients such as help with vocational training and finding housing.

One of the focal points of the kickoff celebration was the dedication of the Community Residence Program in the name of Neal Millman, who was instrumental in starting the program. Millman began working with Central Nassau at its inception in 1972. He started as a staff social worker, and was promoted to chief social worker in 1982. Then in 1987 he was named executive director of Central Nassau. Under his leadership the agency expanded its drug abuse services,

opened two community residences for the mentally ill who are also substance abusers, and fine tuned its mental health services in order to provide quality care for the seriously mentally ill as well as crisis intervention services.

Millman also taught at Adelphi University and the Long Island Institute for Psychotherapeutic Studies.

The goal of the community residence program is to assist individuals in learning to live as independently as possible in the community. The residences are staffed with social workers, activity counselors, and support staff. Residence staff is available 24 hours a day. Some of the services provided at the community residences are activities of daily living training, socialization training, medication management, crisis management, educational support groups, and programmed activities. There are presently two community residence programs run by Central Nassau.


On hand for this special event were the board of directors, staff, community

residents, program participants, and Dr. Robert Blume, chief deputy commissioner of Nassau County Department of Mental Health. Blume presented the agency with a special citation for its outstanding work.

Other 20th anniversary events planned for this year is a dinner-dance in early November and seminars and workshops for the public. Some of the topics for the workshops will include stress management, eating disorders, and substance abuse.

Central Nassau Guidance and Counseling Services is a non-profit service for children and adults of all ages. It is a funded agency of the Nassau County Department of Mental Health, Mental Retardation and Development Disabilities, and Department of Drug and Alcohol Addiction and the New York State Office of Mental Health and Division of Substance Abuse Services. It is governed by a board of directors made up of community leaders. Central Nassau's phone number is 681-2320. Hours are 9-5 Monday-Friday, 9-1 Saturday, with late hours on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday.

For the last four years the junior class has held their prom in the school gymnasium. For three days prior to the affair, juniors and other students, under the direction of junior class advisor Mrs. Atkinson, transformed the lined hardwood floors and basketball hoops into a grand ballroom.

Atkinson praised this year's junior class for their hard work in changing the gym into a paradise. "This junior class is wonderful. The amount of work they have done in three days is amazing," said Atkinson. Although preparations for the prom started months ago the actual decorating started on the Thursday before the prom. John Flynn, junior class treasurer said this year's plans got bigger than they imagined. "We might have gone past ourselves, but the parents helped us out a lot!" The theme of the prom was "Heaven." ## Trees Beautify Downtown Area

Traveling through the downtown Hicksville area you may have noticed the numerous trees that line the sidewalks and the cherry blossoms along the dividers on Newbridge and Broadway. Although more needs to be done to improve the downtown area, everyone agrees that the tree plantings are a definite improvement.

Since 1991 the Town of Oyster Bay has planted over 400 trees in Hicksville. Ninety-two trees were planted along the 3/4 mile stretch from Old Country Rd. north on Broadway to Sears. The trees, Red Spire Pears and Cleveland Select Pears, cost \$139 each. This past year Speigal Associates donated planters, that were put along the dividers on Newbridge Rd. and Broadway.

Speigal Associates coordinated their efforts with the Northwest Civic Association. According to Art Sanders of Speigal Associates, "We felt that if there was something we could do to beautify the downtown area, we would do our share." Councilman Tom Clark commented that although there will be no massive planting in Hicksville this year, there will be spot maintenance of existing trees and replacement of trees that have not survived. He added that the trees are "a big improvement. They are making Hicksville look great!"

Reaction to the plantings has been positive throughout the community. Chamber of Commerce President Beth Dalton, was very happy with the town's effort. "From a business standpoint we have been greatly encouraged by the town's receptiveness to our needs to beautify Hicksville," she said. The

chamber has also been involved with beautification of the downtown area. Past president of the chamber, Mark Ramirez of Mr. Electric, was instrumental in getting garbage cans placed along Broadway. The chamber donated the cans and the town has agreed to empty them. According to Dalton, Ramirez worked three years to finalize the plans for placement of the garbage cans.

Don LeCompte, of Antun's Hicksville commends the efforts by Speigal and the town under the Deligatti administration. "Everybody is trying to pitch in," Gary, of Gary's Florist on Broadway, said. "Anything they do to make it look more like a village is an improvement." When the Speigal planters were in front of his store he would plant (continued on page 18)

### Osteoporosis - A Common Cause of Bone Fractures

Osteoporosis is caused by the loss of calcium and bone substance from the body. Recent estimates suggest 25 percent of women over the age of 65 years will suffer a fracture of the spine due to osteoporosis. Over the age of 80 years, 50 percent of women will be affected. This disorder can also strike one out of every six men.

The loss of bone usually affects the spine, hips, ribs, and wrists. When enough bone is lost, fractures may occur. Estimates as high as one million fractures annually occur in women over the age of 45 years. By the elimination of osteoporosis, 350,000 of these fractures may be prevented. Women who are at a high risk for osteoporosis are those who are post-menopausal, who smoke cigarettes, lack exercise, or are of small build.

Treatment of this common problem

is based on its prevention. Patients are encouraged to eat foods high in calcium. This would include foods such as milk or cheese. Unfortunately, most patients are not able to take enough calcium in their diet and must begin supplemental calcium pills. Currently, many over-the-counter pills are available. However, not all can be absorbed by the body. Additionally, some patients may have a tendency to develop kidney stones while taking calcium.

If you fall into one of the high risk groups, you should consider seeking medical advice. Your physician can then determine if calcium is right for you, or if you are in need of additional therapy.

### Hicksville Fire And Accident Report

#### Serious Accidents

A two car collision between a suspected DWI driver and a van on Jerusalem Ave. and Dante Ave. has left three injured and the van driver in critical condition. The accident was reported on April 8 at 5:40 p.m. Hicksville firefighters and county police worked to free a trapped female driver. The Levittown Fire Department assisted by transporting two of the injured to the hospital. The van driver was airlifted by police helicopters to North Shore University Hospital. County police are investigating. As of April 29, the van driver, a female, was in stable condition. One of the vehicles caught fire, but was quickly extinguished by firefighters.

A two car accident at Plainview Rd. and Elm St. on April 27 at 7:28 a.m. left three people injured, while fire destroyed one vehicle. The intersection is the scene of many accidents and a new traffic signal at East St. has not helped any.

Again on April 27 at 1:42 p.m. a two car accident left one driver with a head injury and two broken arms. His vehicle struck a commercial van making a left turn. The seriously injured driver had to be extricated by firefighters.

#### Hicksville Fires

An April Lane resident is lucky to have escaped injury when he used gasoline to fire up his barbecue. When the fire flared up the startled person tossed the burning gas can into his shed. Hicksville fire units arrived minutes later, but the owners had extinguished the fire. Fire Chief Patrick Scanlon cautions all residents never to use gasoline to

start a grill. If you are using propane - check for leaks before you light the fire or you could receive serious burns.

A fire believed to have started from an unattended religious candle spread throughout the kitchen area of a Levitt style home on Link Lane and caused moderate damage. Chief Scanlon said that the fire had burned for a period of time before being reported. The fire was reported via 911 by neighbors. First arriving firefighter (in private cars) extinguished the fire before fire apparatus arrived. Firefighters managed to rescue and revive several animals including a dog, a cat, and a rabbit. The owner, although covered with soot, refused assistance. No smoke detector was present which would have prevented most of the damage. They are required by New York State Law, which firefighters hope will one day be enforced. Each year 5,000 people die from mostly preventable fires. That should be good enough for government leaders to enact teeth in the law now on the books.

Once again the Hicksville Fire Officials wish to remind Hicksville residents that Hicksville, as well as Nassau County, has their own dispatchers on duty. 
Poetry is an excellent way for children to express feelings. They have used it as an appreciation of beauty and to record their personal feelings.





## Letters

### On School Closing

The refusal by Mr. Black, Mrs. Lafferty, and Mr. Pfaender to take the recommendations of the consulting firm of Bishop and Evans — a report costing the taxpayers \$9,500 — regarding school closings and consolidation has not only wasted taxpayer dollars, but has left this district in an educational "limbo." At the Oct. 2 Board of Ed Meeting this board voted 6 in favor and 1 against the hiring of Bishop and Evans and for Bishop and Evans to identify the building or buildings to be closed. The recommendation of an outside consultant that the board majority requested would have kept the politics out of the decision making process. Their refusal to take the recommendation leads me and this community to believe that any future school-closing decision that is not based on these and other requested "pieces of pie" totaling over \$65,000 will be very arbitrary and heavily laden with politics.

As a result of the board's stalemate on the school-closing issue this problem looms over Hicksville like a dark cloud. Parents, children, teachers, and others who staff the elementary building still do not know when, where and for how long they will have their jobs or schools.

I am angered that Mr. Black has put words in my mouth in his last letter to this paper and raises a question in my faith in the teachers of our district. As a PTA member for the last seven years and as this year's PTA President, I have been very fortunate to work closely with the teachers in my building and through PTA programs and committees I have worked with teachers in various buildings in our district. I know full well what assets these teachers are for our children. I am confident that they can also attest to my dedication to the education of the children in Hicksville. And just for the record, Mr. Black, I spend double the time working for PTA, our school district, and for passage of the budget than I do for our school board elections. It was most unfair for you to state otherwise! Ask anyone who has spent a year or two being a PTA president—countless hours of time spent away from one's family for the children of our district comes with the territory. Mr. Black uses doubletalk and throws daggers in his letters and then he asks that we should "forgive and forget" and go on with business as usual.

I and the parents of East Street School speak out for the children who attend there. Mr. Black, East Street is not just a building as you indicated in your letter. East Street School represents 280 children who must not be forced to attend schools across town just because of board politics and power struggles. Any person with a conscience who will close East Street School — a school that has been beautifully maintained, is structurally sound, and does not even have the most dollar cost repair

schedule for the district—does not have the children's best interest in mind. And that's what it is all about, our children and their safety and well-being.

I resent the fact that Mr. Black ties my interest in the board of election race with the school closing issue. The safety and well-being of the children in the school I represent as PTA President is what motivates me to speak out on behalf of these children. No matter who wins the school board elections, the fact remains that East Street School is necessary to keep open to provide the geographical balance of elementary schools in the district. I will continue to fight against closing this school as I believe it is for the welfare of the children.

### Cancer Screening

The Nassau County Medical Center, in cooperation with the Long Island Dermatological Society, will hold its seventh annual free skin cancer screening on Saturday, May 30.

The one-day program, designed to encourage early detection and teach prevention of skin cancer, will be conducted in Area 27 of the Medical Center's Dynamic Care Building from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The screening is part of a nationwide skin cancer checkup being observed during National Skin Cancer Detection and Prevention Month. In 1991, more than 98,000 Americans were screened, with more than 200 of those at the Medical Center.

Each year, more than 600,000 Americans contract skin cancer and an estimated 6,700 deaths will be attributed to the disease this year. But if detected and treated early, skin cancer is curable.

Participants in the Medical Center screening will be given a diagnostic skin checkup by dermatologists from the Medical Center's Section of Dermatology, joined by other dermatologists from throughout Long Island. If a suspicious lesion is found on the patient's skin, referral will be made to the Medical Center's dermatology clinic or it will be recommended that the participant have a follow-up evaluation with a private dermatologist.

If you are interested in participating in the free skin screening, you should arrange for an appointment by calling the Medical Center's Department of Medicine at 542-3642, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Space is limited.

### Centennial Mark

Helen Keller Services for the Blind (HKSB), incorporated in 1893 as the Industrial Home for the Blind, is making preparations for a year-long celebration of its 100th anniversary in 1993. It is the oldest rehabilitation agency in the United States which serves blind and deaf-blind adults and children.

Today the agency serves over 3,000 people of all ages in 19 separate program areas in Brooklyn, Queens, Nassau and Suffolk counties. Clients are served in community based sites as well as their homes. In addition, through a prevention of blindness program called Pre-School Vision Screening, 35,000 youngsters are screened yearly for amblyopia or "lazy eye." Current services include Low Vision Clinics, Senior Day Centers, a Parent-Infant Program, Braille Library for blind students, Summer Day Camp, Vocational Training and Job Placement, Day Treatment Facility, Home Management, Counseling, and Mobility Training.

In addition, the Helen Keller National Center for Deaf-Blind Youth and Adults opened in Sands Point, New York in 1967. Established through an Act of Congress and advocated for by Helen Keller, this is the only residential rehabilitation center for persons who are deaf-blind in the United States and serves individuals from across the country.

During its centennial year, HKSb plans a variety of events educating the community about individuals who are blind and deaf-blind and the agency's unique role in the history of this country's development of charitable organizations. Daily challenges facing today's adults can range from financial difficulties to family matters. A psychotherapist specializing in adult behavior, Solomon will discuss techniques for dealing with the loss of employment, a spouse, children and financial stability. The lecture will be held on Saturday, May 16 in Hutton House on Long Island University's C.W. Post Campus, Brookville. Her presentation is free and open to adults age 50 and over.

Solomon will suggest ways to "find the positive" in the aging process and how to effectively negotiate the many changes that accompany aging.



# Quilting: The Renewed American Art

Quilting, an American art form, is being pushed to new levels by the fabric artists of today.

A juried show, *Innovative Traditions 1992: New Expressions in Contemporary Quiltmaking*, showcases 34 quilts made by these artists, across the United States. The exhibit runs through June 7 at the Margaret Melville Blackwell History Museum.

The show shows the free spirit of today's quilters. Across the road, at the Art Museum, was *Emiko Toda Loeb: A Retrospective, 1983-1991*. It closed May 10. With all the recent controversy about the work ethic of America and Japan, it made for interesting comparisons, ones in which neither side lost.

Ms. Loeb, who works 13 hours a day at her machine quilting, is currently working on a series, (12 so far in the group), of reversible Log Cabin quilts. She was inspired by an American book titled *Reversible Log Cabin Quilts*. Her expansion on the idea is to use Japanese fabrics, and some American fabrics, and to create two entirely different quilts tied together only by their method of construction.

She doesn't sell her quilts and calls them her children..

Ms. Loeb visualizes the entire work before she starts the first stitch.

The work of Emiko Toda Loeb and that of her students will be on view May 18 - 29 at the Fuji Bank & Trust Company, 345 Park Avenue, New York (between 51 and 52 Street) Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The juried art show currently at the Stony Brook Museum represents a selection from over one hundred entries in this second biennial show. There is a freedom of expression, form and techniques in the American work. Jurors Rhoda Cohen and Carol Gersen called the work celebratory and exuberant of artists who "have mastered the techniques of their art: piecing, applique, painting, dying, printing, stenciling, ornamenting, quilting and finishing, (with) a skilled handling of the elements of color, design and content."

Although the fabric artists are from Berkeley, California to East Marion, on the tip of Long Island. Several of those exhibited

come from this area: Jeanne Lyons Butler of Huntington created *Celebration: The Freedom Quilt*; Miriam Cassell of Sea Cliff created *War and Piece*; Margot Cohen of Cedarhurst created *Cathedral Windows*; Alexandra Capadalis Dupre of Long Beach created *Chintz Cascades*; Paula Lederkramer of Levittown created *Stripe Up The Band*; Joyce Murrin of East Marion created *Fruit of the Vine and Baskets, Baskets with her sister Jean Evans of Medina, Ohio*; and Margaret Pohlman Zipkin of Bay Shore who created *Monolithic Memories*.

Miss Butler's method of working is to start with a white sheet and to add fabric pieces as her inspiration demands. She adds material, paint and trims to enhance her creation as it grows under her fingers. The piece on exhibit celebrates the release of Nelson Mandela.

Ms. Butler never knows where her piece will take her.

Margot Cohen's *Cathedral Windows* is a traditional design, usually done in white, here done in black. "Cathedral windows are formed by folded fabric to which silk tie fabric is added. They create the stained glass effect.

Alex Dupre's *Chintz Cascades* uses the Fibonacci math series (1-1-2-3-5) as a design exploration. Machine pieced and machine quilted with gold metallic thread, this modern quilt designer adds to the dimension of her work with satin ribbon in blending pastel colors cascading from the work.

The interest in quilting has created a need for groups where fabric artists can share their interests and sponsor further education in this blossoming art.

One such group is The Long Island Quilters' Society. The group holds their meetings at the Cathedral house in Garden City. For information please call Margot Cohen, president, at 295-0694.

## Dress Up Your Deck

A series of stepped cedar decks can greatly improve the usability and enjoyment of a sloping lot, whether the property features uphill terrain from the back of the house or a lot that slopes downhill. Either way, stepped decks will give homeowners more space for outdoor entertaining and will widen and enhance the view of the surrounding area.

Imaginative design and placement of steps between levels of the deck, into the house or down to the yard will lend a distinctive look to the decked area, add additional seating or plant display space and aid the traffic flow throughout the house and garden.

Wide, dramatically angled steps can help to carry traffic from one deck level to another, and they will lift a deck design out of the ordinary category and make it exciting.

An architect designed one-series of western red cedar decks to flow down a sloping yard. For privacy from neighbors, the decks are set off by tall open-lattice cedar screens. The lower deck is surrounded by a low railing of lattice screening, with an opening to an extra-wide set of five right-angled steps that lead to the lower part of the garden.

These long steps each are built of four cedar 2 X 4s laid flat, so they also offer a convenient "bench." The steps also offer extra seating for spill-over crowds of friends enjoying an alfresco meal, or another place for displaying colorful rows of potted, sun-loving flowers.

The open latticework of the railings allows free air circulation over the deck area, and the cedar lattice screens provide natural tones and textures as a backdrop

for climbing vines as well as sound and privacy buffers from neighbors.

The "grown-in" preservatives of western red cedar lumber make it a natural for outdoor projects. Cedar decks, benches, screens and other structures can be sealed and left to weather naturally or can be painted or stained to complement the house and landscaping.



FIVE ANGLED steps built with 2x4-inch western red cedar supported on 4x4 cedar posts lead up to lower level of large deck, which greatly improves usage of a sloping lot. Low railing of cedar lattice surrounds lower level, and larger lattice screens add privacy to upper deck. Potted plants, vines add color and texture.


