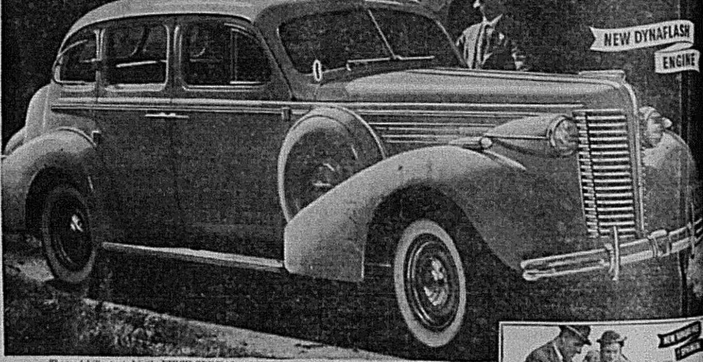

With Reveals True Sex of Former and Butler at Oyster Bay
