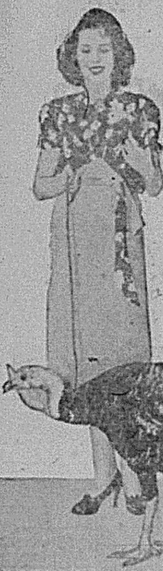


# Thanksgiving Turkeys Ready for Big Day, Average Quality Better than Last Year

## Getting Down To COLD TURKEY

**TURKEY SHORTCAKE**  
Make a rich white sauce by melting 1/4 cup butter, adding 1/2 cup flour and stirring in 2 cups rich milk. Season with salt, pepper, paprika and a pinch of nutmeg. Add 2 cups cold sliced turkey and let heat. Serve between large buttered baking powder biscuits which have been split.

**TURKEY SOUFFLE**  
Mix 5 tablespoons of flour with 5 tablespoons melted butter. Add 1 cup evaporated milk mixed with 1 cup of water. Stir until thick and smooth. Add 1/2 cup bread crumbs and season with salt and pepper. Cool and add 1 1/2 cups chopped cold turkey and the beaten yolks of 3 eggs. Add 1 tablespoon chopped parsley and fold in 3 stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into buttered casserole and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven.

**TURKEY HASH**  
Cut cold turkey fine and add to a white sauce made from 2 1/2 cups milk thickened with 5 tablespoons flour and seasoned with flour, pepper and 1 tablespoon each chopped pimento and parsley. Heat well and serve.

**CASSEROLE OF TURKEY**  
Place alternate layers of diced cooked turkey, boiled rice and potatoes in a greased casserole. Add a little cream, turkey stock or leftover turkey gravy. Serve with cranberry sauce or jelly and a crisp lettuce salad made with Roquefort cheese dressing.

But the automobiles have given rise to many new problems and one of them is parking.

Certain sections, foreseeing this problem, have made provisions by way of planning and arranging public parking lots.

Now, while Hicksville is still at its dawn of real growth, is the time to solve this parking bugaboo for all times.

In line with this, a parking ordinance has been adopted by the Oyster Bay town board at the recommendation of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce and other local civic and fraternal organizations.

Everyone knows that the parking ordinance is a good, but far from miserably in its principal object—in its adoption was thought to be the needed indicator for the necessity of creating parking facilities near the business district by the setting of a parking limit along certain streets.

The latest consideration in the parking puzzle is the substitution of parallel parking on the one side of Broadway for two blocks in place of diagonal parking.

We are in hopes of some day seeing Hicksville realize the necessity for united action and the formation of the public parking area before it is too late and all the good sites within the community are taken up by developments and construction.

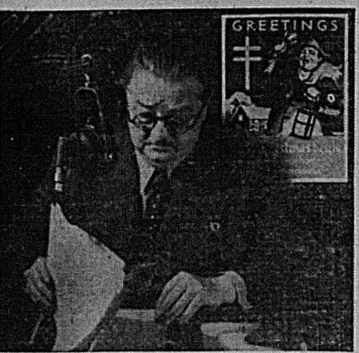

The Empire State - - - and Its People

As to Church Membership

Prepared for the News, by Eugene H. Gaisman, Assistant Director, Division of State Planning.

DEPIKERS AFTER ALL, cities are not so wicked as they have been pictured at times in order books to lend thrills to drama. It now appears that in the matter of church association at least, urban dwellers have something on their country cousins.

According to the report of the Urbanism Committee to the National Resources Committee, approximately 60 per cent of urban adults are church members as compared with only 20 per cent of the non-urban adult population. This leads the Committee to say:

"Religion, it has been generally assumed, does not thrive in cities, which have been described by their critics as hotbeds of materialism, rationalism, and skepticism. But in so far as the facts about churches give us a clue to religious life, this view must be modified.

The older cities have consistently high church membership rates. The more rapidly growing cities and those with a high proportion of non-natives have low membership rates. The average annual percentage of church members among the total population of the country, however, decreases with city size.

Although only one-seventh of the 211,000 church editors in the United States are located in urban places, they represent more than half of the four billion dollars invested in church building.

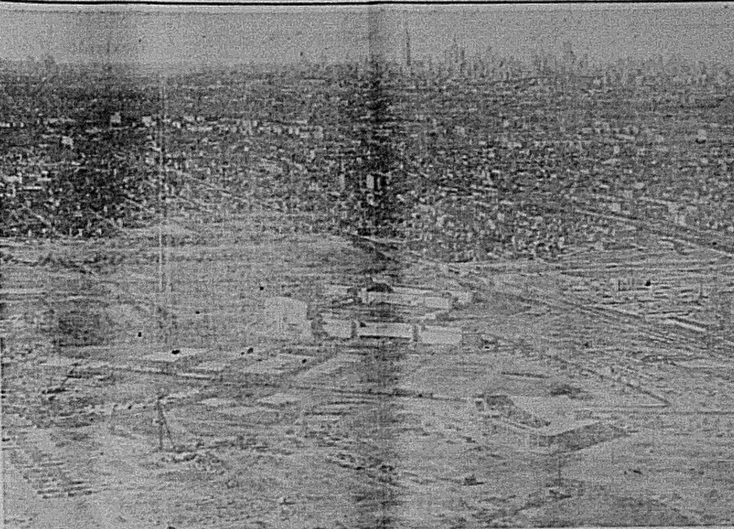

"Fifteen Minutes From Broadway"---New York's Fair



NEW YORK (Special).—If shadows a little longer could be cast by the pinnacles of New York's skyscrapers they would fall across the site of the New York World's Fair of 1939. Only a few miles of the busy Borough of Queens lie between the exposition grounds and the heart of Manhattan. How close they are is illustrated in this aerial photograph taken from a plane winging over the Fair's main exhibit area. In the lower right corner is the Home Center Building in the Welfare Zone. In the center of the picture is the Hall of Communications, reserve completion. Beyond it is the Administration Building, already housing the 600 directors and executives of the Fair and their staffs. On extreme lower left is the steel frame of the Medicine and Public Health Building. Diagonally across the center of the picture is the Long Island Railroad, which has just opened a new World's Fair station. The upper diagonal line marks the elevated tracks of the Interborough Brooklyn Manhattan and Second Avenue subway lines. The background shows the towers of mid-Manhattan, the tallest of them that of the Empire State Building, where the Fair Corporation still maintains several of its executive offices.

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Fund Totals \$328,766.42

Mercy Hospital's Building Fund reached a total of 7082 subscriptions for \$328,766.42 when 224 new subscriptions for \$5,751, obtained by more than 500 volunteer workers, were turned in at their second report meeting this fall in the Police Assembly Hall, Minnea. Elvin N. Edwards of Freeport, former District Attorney of Nassau County and recently candidate for Justice of the Supreme Court, announced that in his 15 years as District Attorney he knew of the splendid work at Mercy Hospital. Word came to him from the hospital's investigators, and patients alike of the courtesy, care and attention there. He declared that the hospital, built by private contributions, was something with a soul and urged the workers to complete the fund to erect this monument to perpetuate their loving care obtainable in no other way.

Encouraged by Word Supreme Court Justice Thomas J. Clark who presided as Campaign Chairman, said he was greatly encouraged by word he had received from community leaders, indicating that reports to date represented only fractional returns and would be followed by more substantial totals when the bulk of contributors are seen.

All present were saddened by news of the sudden death of Mother Marie Emma, the original superior in charge of the hospital, who recently resumed that position after a leave of some years. A commemorative resolution was passed and the possibility was discussed of establishing a memorial to Mother Emma in the new building.

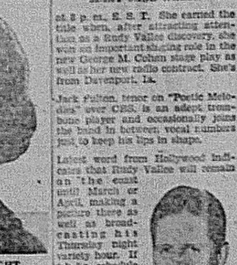
ines In Philippines the Manila Bay Battle

Striking contrasts awaken the interest of the casual visitor. He will find old world culture and modern brevity; senoritas who still cling to the Spanish costumes of centuries ago, and those who adopt the latest Parisian modes; great Filipinos of the upper classes who affect the clothing, food, manner, and American standard of living, and the humble fisherman who sells his catches, cones and submits to a diet of rice and fish.

The endless panorama of native life exhibits a strange mixture of American and Spanish costumes; stately houses and hipa shaka, two-wheeled, horse-drawn carriages and straggling carts; the modern and primitive side by side. One may find almost every nationality in Manila. Sea soldiers who are assigned to duty in the Philippines are stationed either at Cavite, or at Olongapo, some fifty miles north-east of Manila. A few of them are on duty at Manila or at other smaller stations nearby. The Army and the native constabulary, they add a military touch to one of the most cosmopolitan groups of islands in the Pacific.
