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Current Comment

Politics: The year was a favorable one for the Republican organization. The following statement was published by Republican headquarters at Mineola and it aptly expresses the situation, we reprint it in full.

The year 1937 was reasonably favorable to Republican throughout the nation. The party, in the forty-eight years, seemed well on the way towards making a national comeback. The debt of the Republican National Committee somewhat reduced; sons of the GOP became more articulate and hopeful. Republican legislative and campaign work for 1940 and before, began to be formulated, nationally and otherwise.

In the State, the GOP worked an apparently political and gained control of the Constitutional Convention. It increased its majority in the State Assembly, and some of the Republican forces in the sixty-two counties experienced a marked upward swing. A definitely liberal note was heard echoing in Republican campaigns and came seeping out of GOP parades. Peace seems to be in the State Republican organization, and there is a harmony extant in the Democratic camp nationally that is more than in the GOP trenches.

In Nassau County, in the last election, Republicans, by the dynamic leadership of J. Russell Sprague chalked off a historic-making victory, and Nassau County, once so long a large in the political firmament of the State, was continued in the Republican ranks in Nassau, and in its, sweetness, and light. May it continue so.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, political observers declare, lost ground in 1937. Congress refused to be a rubber stamp for the twelve months just coming to a close, and it is likely the existing spirit of Congressional rebellion will be grinning sardonically at these reports, and "the futures," rather than in the present.

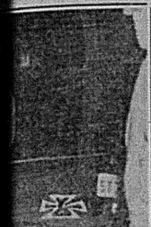

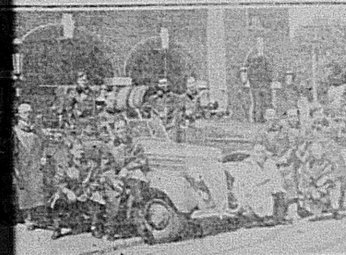

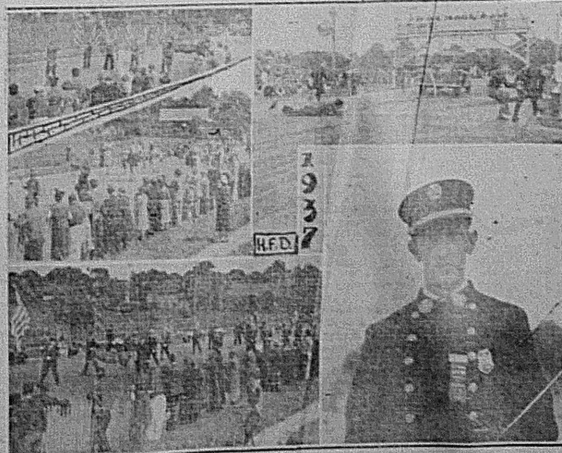
