While every upstate office of the State Employment Service cannot provide many job opportunities for farm workers, we cannot hold out a promise that every applicant will be placed in employment as soon as he registers with us. Registration for a farm job does mean, however, that the applicant will be notified of any job opening for which he is qualified as soon as such an opening is made available in our office.

At every office of the State Employment Service, which makes no charge either to employer or worker, the applicants are carefully classified as to experience and other details. This practice enables the placement staff to give complete information when a job order is received from an employing farmer. Many farmers require workers with special knowledge as dairy men, fruit-men, truck gardening, poultry etc. Others need men who are familiar with the maintenance and repair of machinery including electrical plants. 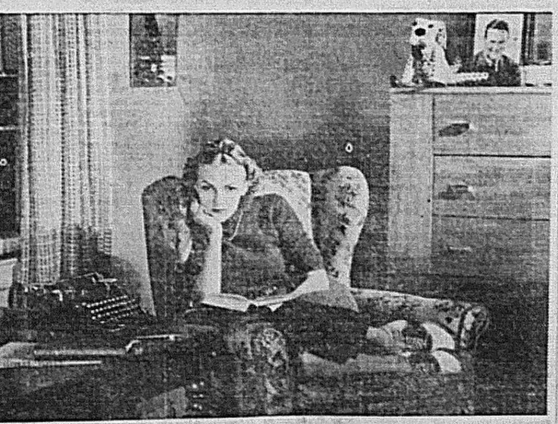

He can be curbed to some extent by up to date traffic laws that are honestly and rigidly enforced. The other cause is dangerous "accident prone" locations; bad intersections, narrow highways without dividing ways, etc. Here the highway engineer must be called to eliminate such needless hazards and thus make it virtually impossible to have an accident.

"Make our town safe" should be a community motto. It is high time, as the New York "Times" says, that we shook off our comparative national indifference to the man-made evil and began safety campaigns in earnest.
