Protest Against Parkway Bridge Growing Arrive Amendola and Kramer Parade Elected At Bethpage

Memorial Day Committee Issues Invitation To Local Groups
Hicksville Veterans Memorial Day Committee at a meeting held at the Legion club house last night nearly completed plans for its annual parade and service at both the Flatbush Cemetery and at the Hicksville high school. Every organization in Hicksville has been invited to participate in the parade.

Results of the elections were: Amendola 217, Harry Belsha 90, Chris Christensen 74, Kramer 189, and Simmons 167. There were 139 votes cast to set a new record in the district. Blanks totaled 210. Voters worked three hours after polls closed deciding winners.

Chlimaxing one of the most hotly contested school elections in the history of Bethpage, Raymond J. Amendola and Fred Kramer were elected to the school board Wednesday after a recount of ballots was necessary. Kramer was elected by one vote margin over Frank Simmons (unofficial term). Amendola, former member, was elected to replace William Aherm who was not a candidate. Voters were not able to give results until nearly midnight because a recount was called.

It was announced that Otto Reiburg has been appointed to the unexpired term caused by the resignation of Joseph P. Lebkuecher as trustee.

Jericho School district voters cast 49 ballots to unanimously re-elect James A. Hewlett as trustee. A budget of \$34,000 was adopted showing a reduction of about \$2,600 as compared with last year's estimate for the district.

State Structure Seen Big Menace To Safe Driving, Car Operation
Civic-conscious and safety-minded Hicksville residents are rapidly joining forces with Hicksville organizations today in an effort to speed the completion of the Old Country road bridge near Carman avenue, the Centre Island News was informed this morning.

A petition of automobile driving residents is being prepared. It was disclosed, for presentation to the Long Island State Park commission. The bridge on Old Country road over the proposed \$4,600,000 Northern-Wantagh Parkway when will pass on the West side of Hickville is labeled "serious menace" to highway traffic.

Bridge Not Finished
Engineers at the Park Commission office in Babylon, in reply to a query of the News, state the bridge is not completed to its present condition. Single traffic lanes on each side of the dividing lane will be enlarged to double widths before the contractor has finished with the job.

The island in the highway was installed to provide easy cross traffic for those traveling from the entrance drive on Old Country road, to Duffy lane and the other way around. To facility this, "waiting lanes" are provided.

Carman avenue will also serve as the entrance drive into the parkway when it is finished.

Scene of Accidents
While the bridge has been the scene of several accidents, police officers are not greatly concerned since it has been revealed that single traffic lanes will be made double width. Approaches to the bridge may be widened also. The bridge leads to a three lane road on the east approach and two lane roads on the west approach.

Small metal signs indicating one-way traffic were recently installed at each end of the bridge island. Legal residents want signs to illuminate the scene at night.

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DR. STILLGER ISSUES HEALTH WARNING
Medical Inspector of Schools Gives Whooping Cough Instructions
A number of whooping cough cases has developed among school and pre-school children Dr. Walter F. Stillger, Medical Inspector of Hicksville schools said today. The physician, formerly health officer of the Town of Oyster Bay, has issued the following warning to the parents of Hicksville and surrounding territory:

Whooping cough, called in medical language pertussis, is a highly infectious and communicable disease causing more deaths in children than the much dreaded scarlet fever. It is most fatal to children under three years of age. It is often said: "Whooping cough does not kill," but the complication of pneumonia which frequently follows it does cause a considerable number of deaths in infants.

In a statistical study made by the State Department of Health some years ago 15 per cent. of infants under one year old contracting whooping cough died of the disease. The disease was fatal to 6 per cent. of children 1 year old, and almost 2 per cent. fatal to children 2 years old. Less than 2 per cent. of the children from 3 years to 15 years old died of the disease.

As the disease is spread by contact, children who have never had whooping cough should be kept on their own premises away from other children. They may be protected by giving them a series of injections of vaccine which brings about an immunity to the disease.

Children who have the disease, or are suspected of having the disease will not be allowed to come to school. Children who have had the disease will be allowed to attend school.

The recognition of whooping cough is not always easy. It begins as an ordinary "cold on the chest". The cough gets worse and continues about two weeks. The child develops a spasmodic cough with a characteristic "whoop," often followed by vomiting. There are some cases in which whooping and vomiting do not develop. The disease is most contagious in its early stage and therefore all children with signs of a "cold" should be suspected of possibly coming down with whooping cough and should be isolated from other children.

**Prohibit Sale Of Parrot Family**

ALBANY—An extension of the effective date to June 1 of a new regulation in the sanitary code dealing with the prohibition of importation, breeding, or sale of birds of the parrotine or parrot family, was announced today by Dr. Edward S. Godfrey, state commissioner of health.

The Public Health Council passed the regulation to take effect March 1, but in an effort to avoid serious financial loss to persons who have been engaged in the breeding and sale of birds of the parrot family, and who, because of the short interval between the addition of the new regulation and the original effective date, the time has been extended because the Council members felt that the persons affected have not had an opportunity to dispose of their stock.

**Garden Insects**

Most gardeners are familiar with those marauding insects, the

cutworms, which often lay low the succulent tomato, pepper, and cabbage plants at night. They have a wasteful habit of feeding as they gnaw through the stem

of a plant and cut it down. Damage by cutworms can be almost entirely prevented by scattering a poison bait mixture among newly set plants, or by placing small amounts of

the bait near the base of the plants. Since the cutworms do most of their feeding at night, the bait should be scattered about sundown.

To prepare an effective bait, mix thoroughly five pounds of bran with four ounces of paris green and then wet it with a water emulsion of fruit juice mixture. This mixture consists of a pint of cheap molasses, about three

quarts of water and the juice of one lemon or an orange. The water may be needed to moisten the bait, moist but it should be sloppy. This quantity is enough to bait an acre of plants.






