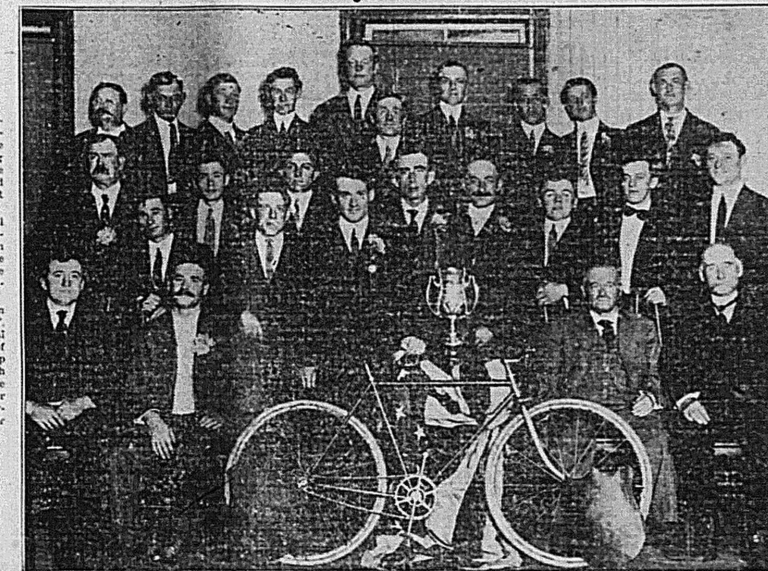

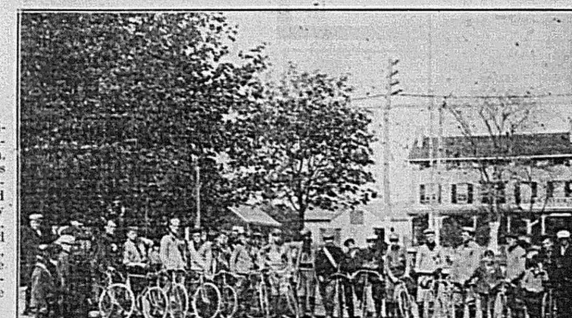

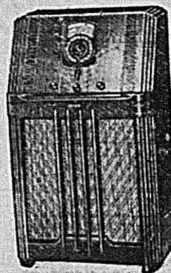

Corn Borer Due To Make Appearance as Dahlia Pest

County Agent Issues Warning To Nassau Growers of Arrival Of Pest Around August 15 And Reveals Best Combat Method

By H. H. CAMPBELL, County Agricultural Agent

The European corn borer is a serious pest of dahlias on Long Island. Larvae of the second generation infest the plants during August and September causing great damage to the plants and stems, thus preventing formation of normal blossoms.

This infestation first noticed about August 15, shows as spots of dead tissue in buds and groups of small leaves. Larvae are readily found at this time feeding between leaves. All dahlia varieties are susceptible to damage. The most rapidly growing plants are most heavily infested. Pompons, minatures, singles and decorative types are badly injured.

Start Control Now
Experiments indicate that corn borer infestation in dahlias can be greatly reduced so that normal flowers will develop. Use one of the following materials:
(1) Dual-flood dust containing 4 percent nicotine.
(2) 1 percent rotenone spray.
(3) Rotenone spray with dust.

Rotenone Spray
Ground derris 4 percent rotenone pound
Grass seed spreader (formerly 25-35)
Water 25 gallons

Dust of Application
Dusting or spraying for borer control should begin about August 5, applying the treatments every 4 or 5 days until 5 or 6 treatments have been made. Apply dusts or spray so that all of the growing tips, buds, and leaf axils are thoroughly covered.

WARN NASSAU PEOPLE TO BATTLE SKEETERS

A warning to all residents of Nassau county that they exert extra care around their homes lest a hoard of mosquitoes emerge during the next few weeks is issued by the Nassau County Mosquito Extermination Commission.

Arthur D. Jaques, M. D., Treasurer of the Commission, calls attention to the extreme rainy season Nassau county has experienced this year and states that while one or twice in a normal year mosquito control will experience "peak load" conditions, due to the heavy rains of May, June and July, the mosquito commission has been working under "peak load" conditions almost constantly and all indications are that August and September will be much worse.

Heaviest Breeding Seen
The mosquito breeding this year has already been the heaviest in many years and if predictions prove true it may be the heaviest since the commission began operations twenty-two years ago, in 1916. The Commission has been employing every advancement in scientific knowledge and equipment to cope with the salt marsh breeding mosquitoes and fresh water-upland mosquitoes. Pointing out that the salt marshes may be the prevailing winds for as far as forty miles, the inspectors of the mosquito commission has inspected the marshes daily. All the permanent listed villages on the upland, which include village sewer beds, dumps, swamps, wet areas and similar places where the mosquito breeders have been inspected daily since the first of March.

The county is divided into areas which are assigned to inspectors who make their rounds one a week. As breeding is reported it is handed to spraying crews and power spray trucks control the breeding by the following day. There has been a slight emergency of salt marsh and fresh water upland species in some sections of the county, but these have been kept to a minimum.

Work On Control
Hampered in every way by the rain, as soon as the weather permits every available means of control at the command of the commission will be employed "all available hours" on control. Much damage has been done to the ditch control system both the ten million feet on the salt marshes and over one million feet of upland stream, by the extreme high water with the resulting washouts and debris.

WALKING TODAY WITH TRAFFIC IS AN ART

Walking under modern traffic conditions has become an art. So much so that Greater New York Safety Council is distributing over 150,000 "Safe Walker's Memo Booklets" on how to weave your way through New York's complicated traffic and still be alive.

Two thirds of those killed on the streets of New York last year were adult pedestrians, the Council claims. Just two unsafe habits:

1. Crossing in the middle of the block.
2. Crossing against the traffic light caused nearly one half of these deaths.

Part of the pamphlet is devoted to charts which graphically show what gets in a jam the pedestrian gets into when he crosses the unsafe way, and how he keeps out of trouble by observing traffic regulations.

Space is also provided in the book for recording personal notes and memoranda.

If you can answer NO to these questions, you may consider yourself a safe walker.

1. Step out carefully from behind parked cars or obstructions?
2. Try to weave through traffic?
3. Cross streets diagonally?
4. Get off and on vehicles in moving traffic?
5. Cross streets without observing traffic?
6. Cross at intersections against the light?
7. Stand in the street?
8. Allow your child to play in the streets?
9. Walk with, instead of against, traffic on the road or highway?
10. Fail to use particular care at night?
