No Opposition To New Town Tax Budget

Special to Centre Island News
No opposition is expected when the Oyster Bay town board holds a public hearing on the tentative town budget for 1939 next Tuesday morning at the town hall in Oyster Bay.

Residents face a tax rate of four cents on the general levy and 12 cents on the highway fund, lowest rate in several years.

The Non-Partisan Civic Association of Oyster Bay this week issued a report to all its members relative to the town budget. Endorsement of the budget is found in the report: "As has been the custom the officers and town committee of the association met with the town board prior to the adoption of the tentative budget at which time each item was discussed in several instances reductions from tentative estimates were secured. It is our opinion," the report states, "the budget reflects a careful consideration for the interests of the taxpayers of the township as well as economical administration of the town department."

Howard C. Smith, former councilman, is chairman of the town committee.

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No Balloting On Leases Says Tappen

Oyster Bay town residents will not be asked to vote on a proposal for the leasing of town lands at Tobay beach on the Atlantic ocean to create a residential area for ousted High Hill beach residents. Supervisor Harry Tappen said today.

Miss News in 1939
Owners of summer homes on High Hill beach, adjacent of Jones Beach state park, may move on or before March 1, 1939. Their application to the town of Oyster Bay for the right to lease several acres of property along Ocean boulevard is under consideration of town fathers.

At first the town board believed it would have to submit the leasing proposition to a public referendum. Charles I. Wood, town counsel has ruled it would be illegal for the town board to conduct a balloting on the proposition, Mr. Tappen revealed.

Instead the town board plans to hold a public hearing at the Oyster Bay town hall next time expressions of public opinion will be received. The leasing of the property may be decided on the basis of the hearing. Its results will not necessarily influence the board.

Councilman John W. Anderson of Manhasset, who has been conducting an investigation made in behalf of the summer residents by the High Hill Beach Civic association.

Dr. Elwood A. Curtis of Hicksville, champion of townfolk in previous beach development controversies and a member of the civic committee, said he has outlined a comprehensive plan for the leasing of lands at Tobay.

It is understood the town board members have held several conferences with officials and engineers of the Long Island State Park commission relative to the proposed leasing of town beach lands.

A precedent is found in the town's leasing of 40-foot lots at Centre Island beach, Bayville. Mr. Tappen says the leasing of town beach property at the north shore of the township has not involved the town in "a dollar's expense" during the several terms he has held office.

No public disapproval of the proposition has been filed with either the town board or Councilman Anderson it was learned today.

20,000 GREET DEWEY AT COUNTY GOP RALLY

Observers Change Pre-Election Predictions
Political observers throughout Nassau county have revised election predictions upwards today following a record-breaking rousing reception to state and local G. O. P. candidates and leaders at the Mineola Fair Grounds, Wednesday night.

Unbridled enthusiasm greeted Dewey, Alf Landon, E. Dewey, Republican standard bearer, and County Executive J. Russell Sprague, Nassau County leader, as Nassau's traditional campaign climaxing demonstration.

Upward of 20,000 wildly cheering paraders and participants

with banners, and fire, decorated cars and trucks headed Mr. Dewey during the mobilization of Republican and independent supporters from every village in the county, indicating a new record of enthusiasm in this area for the party candidates who will be on the ballot November 8.

Nearly 5,000 bedecked cars and trucks converged in the vicinity of the fair grounds. Moving into the grounds in accordance with a plan worked out by Hamilton Gaddis, campaign manager and the club presidents and committeemen, passengers left their cars and crowded behind them, half way around the track, in front of the reviewing stand, and grand stand.

Fail Chamber Projects Start

Curtis Invites Members, Public To Attend Session at Firehouse And Hear 'G-Man' on Counterfeit Money—Plan Open Discussions

Dr. Elwood A. Curtis, president of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, today invited members and residents of Hicksville to attend the first fall meeting of the Chamber set for Monday night, October 31, at the firehouse. A member of the United States Secret Service department will give a special address on counterfeiting as an educational feature of the program.

A large attendance of business men is expected since the "G-Man" will give valuable tips for merchants on detecting counterfeit notes and the ways of counterfeiters.

The meeting will consider several local topics of interest to Hicksville residents, including plans for the repair and maintenance of street signs, the Oyster Bay town budget, Hicksville's participation in the World's Fair next year, and perhaps the chamber's plan for control of fireworks the Fourth of July.

The entertaining program starts at 8:30 p. m. It is open to the general public.

New Highways In Township Cost \$185,000

Two new highways totaling four and a half miles in length and representing an expenditure of approximately \$185,000 have been constructed near Hicksville by the county during the past year.

Oyster Bay newspapers were taken on a tour of the new highways and other projects by Supervisor Harry Tappen Friday afternoon. The roads are, three miles of South Oyster Bay road (between Hicksville and Bethpage) and \$115,000, and Old Country road (running east from Plainville to the county line) for a distance of 1 1/2 miles at a cost of \$70,000.

The county has also constructed extensive drainage projects in Hicksville and Bethpage. The bulk of the work has been on sidewalk construction, however. During the year nine miles of sidewalk were built, more than a third above the 25 miles of sidewalk already in use.

Discussion on the committee's report will be held at the session next Wednesday. Other recommendations for office include: Charles Masak, first vice president; Morris Rockman, second vice president; D. B. Purdie, treasurer; Leon Galloway, secretary; Jay Schwartz, recording secretary; and William DeFano, sergeant at arms.

The program will consist of selections by the Charles Wagner Post and vocal selections by the Choral Society.

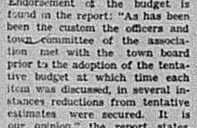
The speaker of the evening will be the Rev. Charles Trexler, D. D., who from his experience in the service will be an interesting speaker.

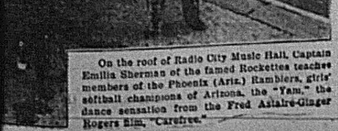

Spring Potatoes

Y. Hardenburg
The potatoes successfully first a crop of tubers and store quality. Only sound, dry, well matured tubers store well. Spring potatoes tend to hold their shape in the storage cellar, and promotes rot organisms. Also tends to cause heating in center of the pile, which causes respiration, shrinkage, premature sprouting. Because of bad weather, only tubers to be dug, should be held in crates in well aerated place until the dries and the skin sets. This is especially important in a high humidity as this, because of drying of the tubers will be the danger of spread of blight organism in the storage. 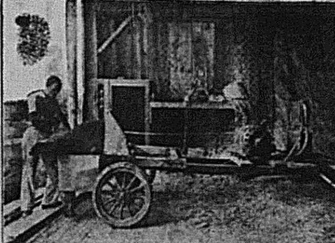
