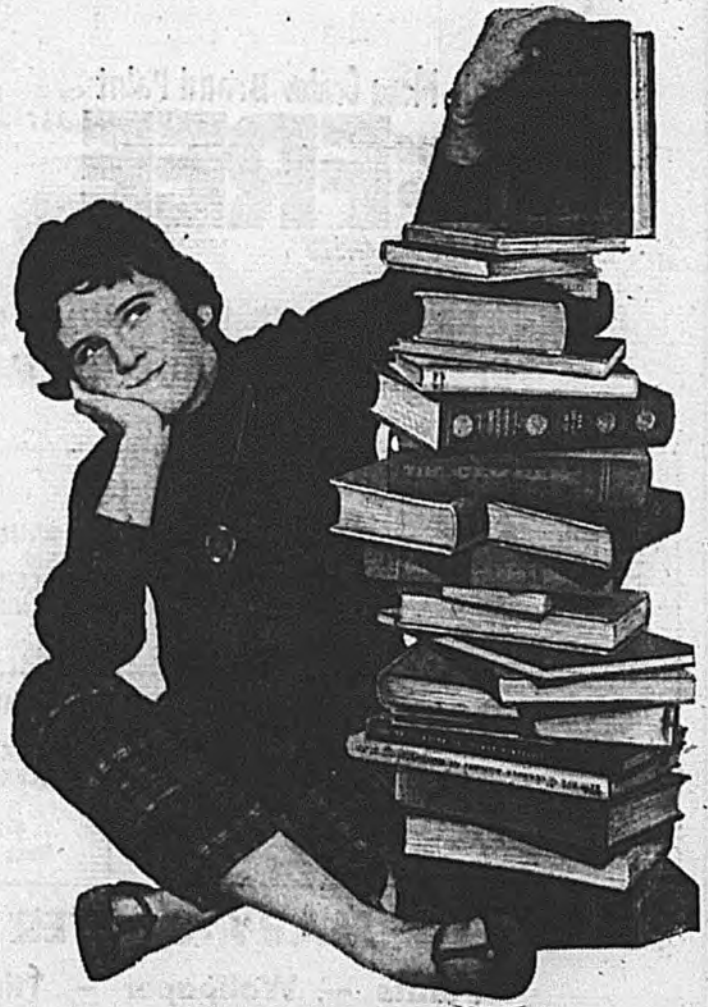

Hicksville Streets To Be Resurfaced

Highway Superintendent Norman T. Wolf has ordered Lizza & Sons Inc. to proceed with the blacktopping of Lenox Ave. and vicinity in Hicksville.

The contract calls for completion in 45 days from the actual starting day. Lizza was low among four bidders when bids were received at Town Hall. The bid was \$16,933.

Councilman A. Carl Grunewald and Edmund A. A. Ocker advocated the project on the Town Board. Drainage was installed in the area last year. Included in the project are the blacktopping of Lenox Avenue, William Place, Thorman Avenue, Notre Dame Avenue, Emmett, Ormond and Desmond Places, comprising about 6500 linear feet of surfacing.

Thurs. Sept. 5 Is Election Day

Thursday, September 5 is Election Day for Registered Republicans of the Township of Oyster Bay. On that day three office nominations for the Town Board will be contested by insurgent Republicans. Childbirth May Cause Tearing

(Q) "I have a chronic infection and laceration of the cervix. Please explain." Mrs. P.E.

(A) The cervix (opening of the womb) has to open up quite far during childbirth and often a tear or laceration results. Chronic infection in or around this tear is common. The treatment varies with the degree of infection. Hospitalization is advised in severe cases.

MEDITORIAL: During the summer months there is an increase in athlete's foot, which is basically a fungus infection. Since fungi grow best in warm, moist surroundings, it is easy to see why the added warmth and perspiration of the feet in the summer contribute to its growth.

Another important factor in the beginning of athlete's foot is a break in the skin for the fungus to enter. Sunburn contributes to this through increase in outdoor activity. Blisters, callouses and cracks in the skin all serve as possible entry points.

The fungus which causes athlete's foot is present on the skin of the feet most of the time. Several conditions are necessary for the fungus to start its growth, not all of which are known.

The best way to prevent athlete's foot is to take proper care of the feet. Daily washing and careful drying, especially between the toes, is very important. Powdering the feet with any good foot powder is helpful. However, try to avoid putting powder in the socks or shoes as this only plugs up the pores of the shoes and — — — — — them less absorbent.

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Anti-Communism Weak-Willed

The American Bar Association is interested, as it ought to be, in opposing communism. With this objective, the Bar Association has sponsored a new book prepared by the Institute of International Studies at the University of South Carolina. It is called "Democracy and Communism in World Affairs: Syllabus and Guide for Teacher Workshops and Seminars."

But the mountain has labored, and produced a mouse. It is difficult to conceive of a more timid work than this intended guide for anti-Communist "workshops." Rightly observing that some people have opposed Communism unintelligently and frantically, the authors of this volume fall into the opposite pit of a feeble "objectivity." Sometimes they seem more afraid of vigorous anti-Communists than of Communists.

The Bibliography, for instance, contains some good books, along with some pedantic and some popular ones. But it altogether ignores some of the most accurate and important and readable writers on communism — apparently because they dislike communism too much. Although the radical C. Wright Mills' "The Marxists" is mentioned, there is no reference to Clinton Rossiter's superior "Marxism: the View from America." Whittaker Chambers and all others who fell away from communism are conspicuous by their absence. The books of David Dallin and William Henry Chamberlain on the Soviet Union are not to be found. James Burnham and Gerhart Niemeyer are omitted in this bibliography. That effective and courageous "democratic socialist" Sidney Hook is not recommended. Only one of Bertram D. Wolfe's books appears.

Much space is devoted to proving the uneasy thesis that "democratic" socialism is different from communism, and may resist Soviet power. But the apology for a free economy is scant and lame.

Still odder, there is next to no reference to the struggle between religion and communism. At heart, that is the crux of the matter: the Judeo-Christian understanding of man against the Marxist reduction of mankind to producing-and-consuming units. So far as one might gather from this work, the struggle in our world is merely between two rival economic and political structures, each with its faults. Therefore, apparently, the editors do not deign to mention such important studies as Father D'Arcy's "Christianity and Communism," or Dr. C.W. Lowry's "Christ and Communism."

The editors of this volume are well-meaning people, sincerely opposed to communism; and they are reasonably competent scholars, with some penetrating things to say. Yet they put one in mind of the lines of William Butler Yeats:

"The best lack all conviction, while the worst
Are full of passionate intensity."

This manual scarcely will hearten teachers to resist the power of Communist ideology. On some points, it is even inaccurate. For instance, we are told that the decline of the Communist Party continues throughout Europe. What about Italy, with the ominous recent Communist gains?

Some of the foundations that subsidized this work must be disappointed, and some of the people mentioned as advisers must be embarrassed. As for the American Bar Association — why, I know half a dozen lawyers who could write an analysis of communism and democracy far superior to this fumbling manual.

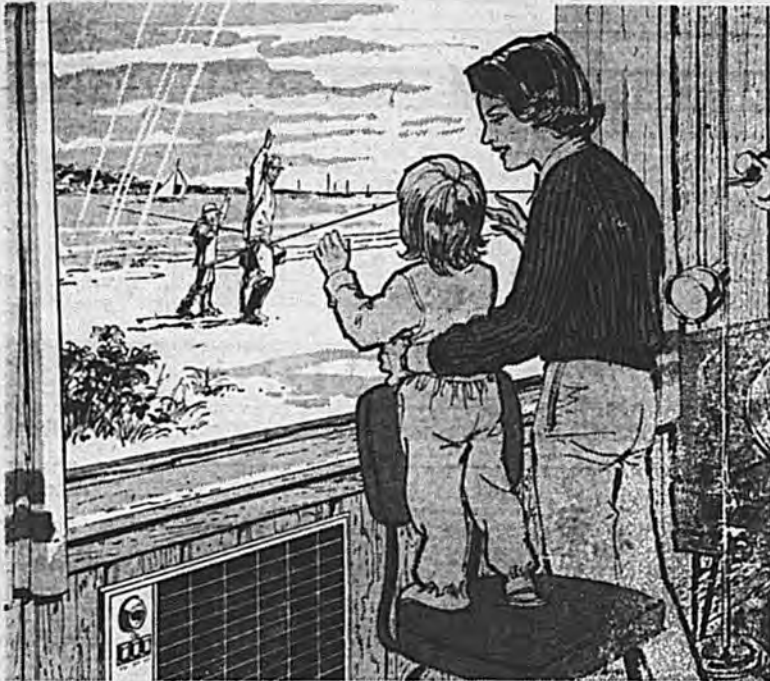

'New Look' In Scouting

This fall when our Mid-Island Council Girl Scouts resume their troop activities they, like their sister Scouts all across the country, will be starting out with a new design in Girl Scout program.

There are two major changes which will be most apparent at first: the four new age-levels into which troops will now be divided and their new names. Brownie Girl Scouts are 7 and 8 year olds; Junior Girl Scouts are 9, 10, and 11; Cadette Girl Scouts 12, 13 and 14; Senior Girl Scouts 15, 16 and 17. Each girl will wear the new distinctive uniform of her own age level and will use the new Girl Scout Handbook especially designed for her group.

The new look in Girl Scouting represents a recognition of the changing needs of young people in a changing world. It aims to bring a richer and more meaningful Scouting experience to a larger number of girls more aware of themselves as individuals; they begin to examine values, to seek their own identity through wider social relationships and expanded interests. Senior Scouts, on the threshold of womanhood, are ready to assume respon-

sibility as citizens of the community, while thinking serious thought about the future -- higher education, career, marriage.

Throughout its history, the spiritual force behind Girl Scouting has given life and meaning to its program. The Girl Scout organization affirms that belief in God and acknowledgment of one's responsibility to God are basic to the development of good character and sound citizenship. As a good citizen of her community, a Girl Scout is encouraged to become an interested and active member of her own religious group. As a Scout she is required to while it keeps intact the fundamental principles on which the Girl Scout movement was founded more than 50 years ago.

The various swimming events were held throughout the day, and over 20 youngsters participated. The entire program was under the direction of the Town of Oyster Bay Park Department and the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay. First, second and third place medals were awarded for the winners of each event, and were presented by Councilman Ocker.

The swimming events, commencing at 10 A.M. consisted of the "Sponge Dive" and "Push Ball" for ages 7 and 8; the 25

yard free style ages 7 and 8; the 50 yard free style and breast stroke ages 9 and 10; the 50 yard free style and breast stroke ages 11 and 12; the 100 meter free style, breast stroke, back stroke and butterfly, ages 13 and 14; the 100 meter free style, breast stroke, back stroke and butterfly, ages 16 and 17; the 100 meter free style - all ages; and the diving contest open to all ages, requiring five dives in each category of 100 forward, 200 back, 300 reverse and 400 inward, 500 forward with half twist or one optional dive. All contestants were limited to two events each, and entry blanks had been distributed through the courtesy of the Park District to residents in Plainview - Old Bethpage.
