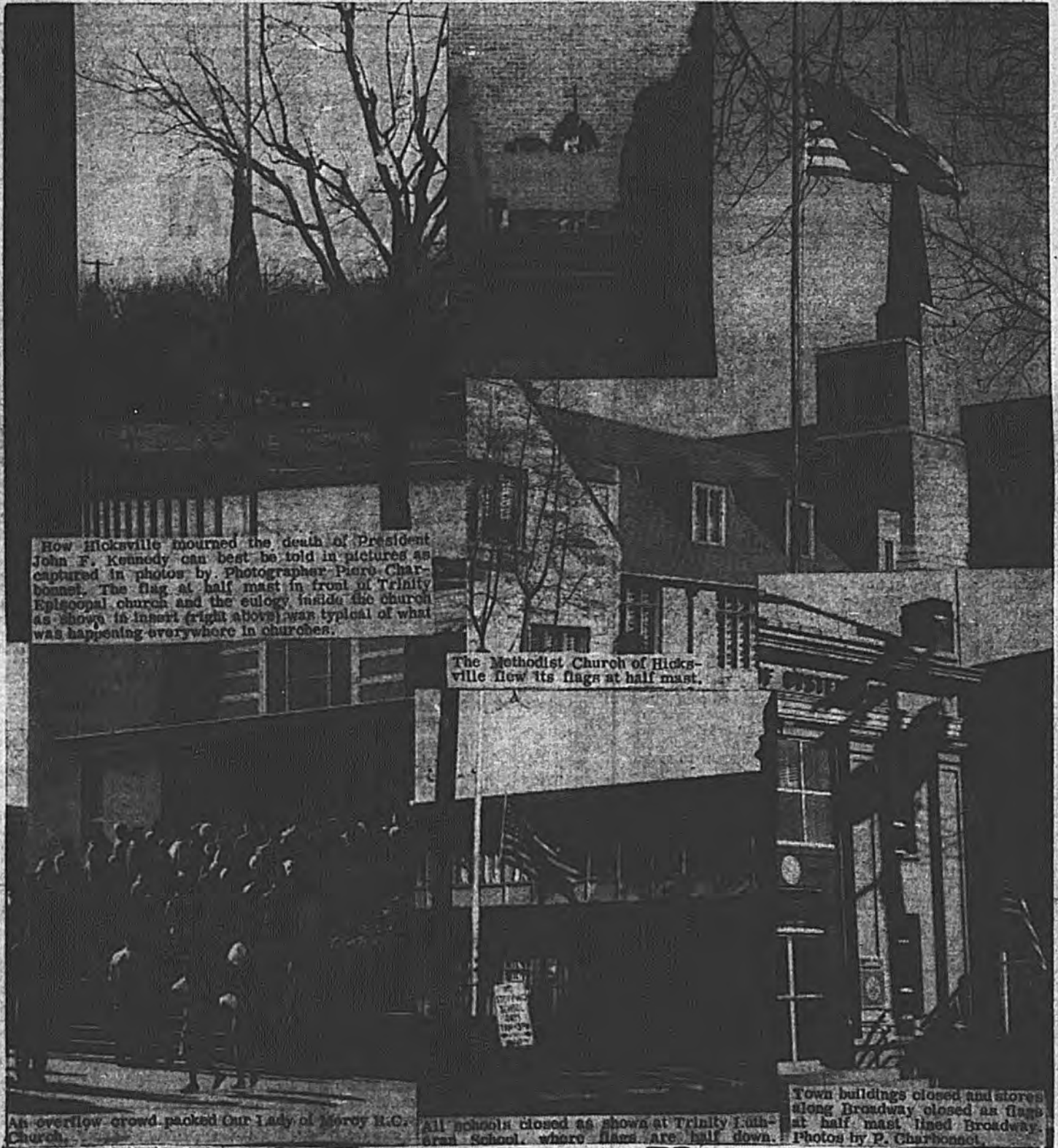

Letters

To the Editor:

If you will grant me the privilege, I would like to give your readers my opinion of last week's "My Opinion."

The article which dripped from the pen of your star reporter was indeed a revelation. I refer particularly to his comments on the "Grievance" committee.

To begin with, our committee is not properly termed a "Grievance" committee. The real title is Liaison committee. It was established as a means of coordinating the thinking of the Board, administrators, and teachers in coping with our educational problems. Actually, it is a cooperative effort to foster a better understanding of each group's objectives. One of the first problems dealt with by this committee was the difficult task of establishing a grievance procedure for our educational staff. We put in many long hours - during hot summer evenings - to whip the proposal into shape. It was finally completed and adopted as Board policy at our September meeting.

Curiously, your reporter did not attend one of those meetings. Seemingly, he is always "too busy" (apparently writing newspaper articles) to roll up his sleeves to tackle the hard, tedious,

but necessary work of the Board.

Our second problem - and perhaps the most complicated - is that of salaries. Any Board of Directors - whether business or educational - is constantly faced with the problem of reviewing salary scales for their employees. The solution is not always found in the negative approach. It takes a lot of positive, pragmatic, and painful thinking to work up a plan that will attract and hold professional people and still fall within the confines of a proposed budget.

One gets awfully tired of listening to and reading Mr. Bruno's charges of "secrecy" in everything the Board attempts to do. It is certainly no secret to him that the Liaison Committee is functioning. In fact, he has gotten official notice of all our meetings - well in advance - and appended to each notice was a copy of the minutes of the prior meeting. Yet - though he always manages to make some satirical contributions in his weekly articles on how the Board should function - he never comes to our meetings to give us the benefit of his knowledge.

The people of Hicksville, fortunately, have always had a good grasp of things. They may give a Nine-dollar bill some circulation, but it has never been

known they were prone to believe it had any real value.

Ultimately, I'm sure, the gentleman who persists in crying "Wolf!" will no longer be heeded. In the meantime, I sincerely hope he will realize that it is always easier to criticize than it is to be correct.

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Nassau Vetoed Help For Handicapped Child

If tenacity of purpose or prodigiousness of effort paid dividends, Mrs. Robert Larsen of Levittown would long ago have obtained auditory training help for her 13-year-old son, Tommy, afflicted apparently from birth with deafness and cerebral palsy. Perhaps Mrs. Larsen's own words best tell the story of the frustrations, the anguish, the despair of a mother seeking help for her handicapped child: "Tommy first went to Cleary's School for the Deaf in Ronkonkoma, L.I.," says Mrs. Larsen. "They sent him home saying St. Charles in Port Jefferson had classified him a cerebral palsied child. I brought him to Roosevelt Cerebral Palsy in Roosevelt. They gave him nursery school two times a week, but no auditory training. They told me he was retarded and they did not handle retarded cerebral palsy kids."

"I went to Dr. Winthrop Phelps in Baltimore, Maryland. He is supposed to be the biggest in the world on C-P. He did all kinds of tests on Tommy. He said he was deaf and cerebral palsied."

Parenthetically, Mr. and Mrs. Larsen even sold their former house in Levittown to raise moneys to take Tommy to the Baltimore specialist, who eventually referred them to another specialist in New York.

Mr. Larsen is a Plainview Post Office employee. Mrs. Larsen is a housewife, most of whose time is taken up with ministering to Tommy's needs. The Larsens have two other children, Michael, 19, now in college, and Robert, 16, a high school junior.

Nor has Levittown School District 5 offered to provide any help for Tommy over the years. Not only was he refused admission to kindergarten years back; the district even refused to enroll Tommy in special speech and hearing classes, according to Mrs. Larsen.

So it was that despairing of receiving help for this unfortunately handicapped child, Mr. and Mrs. Larsen took the advice -- not without misgivings -- of several agencies and voluntarily put Tommy in Creedmoor State Hospital, hoping against hope that there, at least, he would receive some special training.

The result, in Mrs. Larsen's own words: "Tommy was badly beaten there. His eyes were completely closed. So I removed him."

Was an investigation launched into this alleged beating? Mrs. Larsen was asked. "No," she replied. "They said he fell."

While this reporter was interviewing Mr. and

Mrs. Larsen in their living room at 32 Violet Lane, Levittown, Tommy had been bouncing a balloon toward the ceiling and watching it wait its way floorward. At first

shyly aloof, he came toward this reporter finally and laid his hand on my arm as though to say "Thanks for your help." As he walked about the room, his gait was steady, his eyes bright. I looked from Tommy to the bright new hearing aid glistening from the incandescent glow of a lamp on a nearby table.

Noticing my interest, Mr. Larsen spoke up. "This hearing aid," he said, "is useless to Tommy unless he receives special auditory training."

It would not be fair to say that Tommy has received no help from any agency in Nassau County. Besides the limited help offered by the Cerebral Palsy Center in Roosevelt, other help has been proffered by the Association for the Help of Retarded Children in Brookville. Tommy now attends the AHRC facility there once a week for three hours.

Significantly, though, neither agency apparently can do much about Tommy's deafness.

But other agencies, unlike Tommy, blessed with the gift of hearing, have turned deaf ear to Mrs. Larsen's pleas for help.

The County-run Special Services School at Westbury turned the Larsens away saying it could not accept Tommy because he has had "no pre-school training," says Mrs. Larsen.

And when she sought auditory training for Tommy at Meadowbrook Hospital's speech and hearing clinic, Mrs. Larsen said she was gruffly told Tommy had to be an

"inpatient before he could become an outpatient."

What do the Larsens seek? To have Tommy receive a little education within the limits of his conceded less-than-normal abilities and to receive auditory training with the hearing aid, so that he may learn to understand human speech and to know, understand, and appreciate something of the world about him. That's all; nothing more.

Perhaps the greatest blow yet administered to parents frustrated to the point of anguish in their attempts to receive even a modicum of help for their handicapped child was dealt Tommy and his parents by the County of Nassau, that great, flourishing County which you and this reporter's taxes support.

Last April County Health Commissioner Joseph H. Kinnaman commiserated with Mrs. Larsen in a letter in which he said: "It is, indeed, very hard for a mother of a handicapped child such as yours to search for answers and services THAT ARE NOT READILY FORTHCOMING." (Underlining mine.) "We are very much concerned for children like Tommy and families like yours."

Soothing words, those. But has the County Health Dept. ever offered to help provide a tutor for Tommy? "No," says Mrs. Larsen. Has School District 5 or any agency in Nassau made such an offer? "No," says Mrs. Larsen emphatically.

Acting on the advice of District Court Judge Beatrice Burstein, Mrs. Larsen applied to the Nassau

County Family Court asking that court to direct the County to pay \$1,750 a year tuition to put Tommy in a special school, called the Rugby School in Brooklyn.

Mrs. Larsen says she subsequently received word from Family Court Judge Alexander Berman that her application had been "regretfully denied."

Why was this application denied? Apparently because the State of New York would not pay half the cost of this tuition.

Very significantly, while Mrs. Larsen was receiving "red carpet" treatment from the Nassau County Attorney's office, that very office did not tell her that it was objecting to her application for help for her handicapped child because, presumably, special help for Tommy would "impose" an undue burden on the County.

Even more significantly, on the same day Mrs. Larsen learned Judge Berman had denied her request, she received a letter from County Executive Eugene Nickerson thanking her for thanking him for the courteous treatment she received at the hands of the County Attorney's office.

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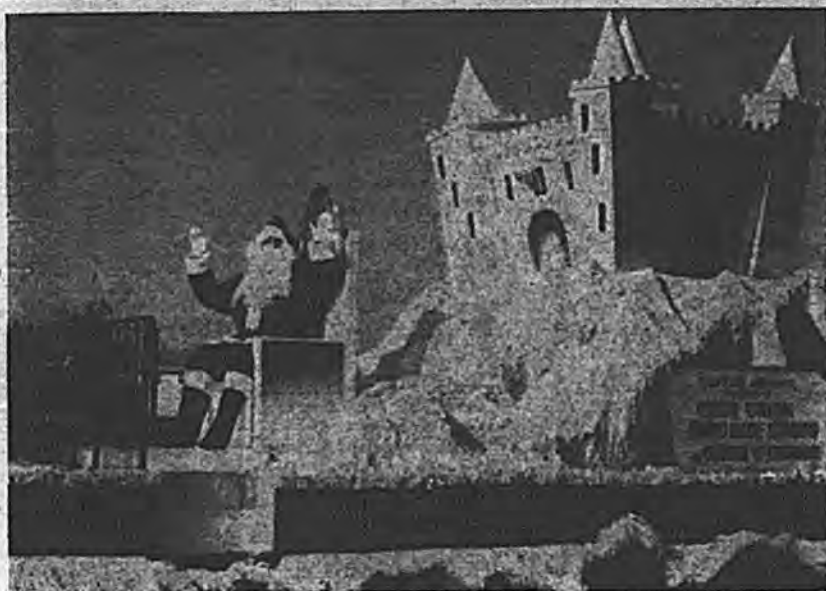
