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

Bruno Suppression Case Near Completion

The case of School Board Trustee William Bruno, Jr. vs. Supt. of Schools of Hicksville Donald F. Abt is now in the hands of the Commissioner of Education.

Attorney for Bruno, Harry H. Goebel this week filed a 16 page brief outlining Bruno's claims against the superintendent. These claims involve the non-answering of various requests for information made by Bruno.

Mr. Abt's attorney, School District Attorney, Joseph Catalano claimed that Bruno was not entitled to the information without board majority approval. Goebel for the trustee says that Bruno cannot possibly do his elected job without information on the school district. To back up his argument, Goebel has cited several recent cases in which school board members were upheld in requests for information. It is expected that a decision will be handed down in about a month.

Supporting P.R. Students

Mrs. Blanche Tisman, President of Study, Incorporated, announced today that because of insufficient funds, the organization has altered its plans for 1964, and will assist a group of Hicksville students to study in Puerto Rico, rather than attempt to finance trips to Spain and France.

Although Study, Incorporated, sponsored a successful affair to which the Community gave its whole-hearted support, the amount of money needed to finance students who required monetary aid on the French and Spanish trips was greater than could be raised in the limited time available, said Mrs. Tisman.

"Accordingly," she continued, "The Executive Board has taken the practical alternative and will assist Hicksville students who will study at the University of Mayaguez. Hopefully, Study, Inc. will as a result of concentrating on fund raising in the year ahead, be in a better position for the summer of 1965."

THINKING IT OVER

A weird letter appeared in the Long Island Daily Press of Tuesday. It was from the Commissioner of Education, James Allen, thanking the paper for having recommended the passage of ALL school budgets in Nassau County and further citing that this propaganda effort had been successful as shown in the fact that only seven school budgets were voted down in Long Island.

It is absolutely amazing that the Commissioner of Education should stump for ALL school budgets to be passed. He has not the time to read and go over every school budget in every district -- nor has the Long Island Press. To assume that all school budgets, simply because they are school budgets, are good and represent the best interests of all communities is utter folly. The fact is that school boards vary, some are good and it follows necessarily, that some are bad.

The crime involved in trying to blanketly say that all school budgets should be passed regardless of how good or bad they are is that when the budgets are bad they take money away from education -- they do not help it.

In the last few years there has grown a cult of state bureaucrats, namby-pamby newspapers and PTA worshippers who have done more to hurt education than anyone else. But, they are cited regularly as "Friends of Education." It is a shame that someone in the position of Commissioner of Education should have such clouded vision that he believes money spent on education is always right regardless of what is being called education.

It is little wonder with men such as the Commissioner at the head of the Education Department that many families are finding that all of their money has been spent on supporting lower education that they do not have enough money for college. Perhaps Commissioner Allen, who came to us during the Gov. Harriman administration, should be sent along his merry way with the Ex-Gov.

Shoeless Natives Have Healthy Feet

MEDITORIAL: I have spoken about the hard and soft corn in the last two columns. Now I will describe another painful type, the blood corn. The blood corn is a hard corn with blood vessels imbedded in it. It forms as a result of injury which extends into the deeper layer of the skin. They are located on the marginal surfaces of the foot where the plantar skin joins the skin on top of the foot. They are also seen as circumscribed masses of skin in which the elongated blood capillary loops lie. They appear as sharply defined black spots and can be confused with the diffused discoloration caused by bruising. Pain is characteristic of the blood corn. The patient complains of burning and pain over the area, even at rest and with the shoes off.

Some undetermined injury permits a few isolated blood vessels to become imbedded in the hard corn, and like all types of corns, women are more susceptible. The reason for this is women's weakness for stylish shoes. God intended us to walk barefooted and on flexible terrain. Through civilization came the highheeled, pointed shoe and the hard, rigid, concrete walking surfaces. The foot is squeezed, distorted and brutalized in this type of shoe and on this type of hard surface. Shoes should fit the foot and not the eye.

Surveys show that 78 per cent of our population have foot problems and only 5 per cent of the African natives, who go shoeless, have foot problems. Getting away from nature by using high heels and hard walking surfaces has made this a nation of foot sufferers.

Who Loathes Spiders And Worms?

ACCORDING TO DAVID HUME, the origins of our moral convictions are unknowable. I suppose it is equally true that we cannot penetrate to the sources of our aversions. Why do many of us fear snakes, spiders, and worms?

A recent column of mine about earthworms (which I abominate) turned out to be one of the most popular bits of writing I ever executed. Among the many gentle readers who commented on my observations were a number of spider-dreaders.

For my part, I rather like the spider, perhaps because of the lesson it taught the Scottish patriot Bruce. But my stepmother, Mrs. Avilda (Billy) Kirk, entertains other sentiments. She used to go into hysterics when one of those beasties intruded itself into her presence.

Her worst experience occurred abruptly when she started to go up the steps of her house, and found her way barred by the most monstrously tremendous of all spiders. It was raining; her arms were full of parcels; but she dared not pass the dreadful creature on the step. The spider glowered upon her as she shook with terror.

At this awful moment, a small colored boy happened to stroll along the sidewalk. "Are you afraid of spiders?" called out Billy, piteously. "No, ma'm!" replied our hero. When duty whispers low, "Thou must!" the youth replies, "I can!" Rising to grandeur, the little boy advanced at Billy's exhortation to slay the monster.

But when he was brought face to face with the belligerent horror, the little boy's courage failed him. Awed, he gazed for some time upon this eight-legged behemoth. "No, he's jus' too big for me, ma'm," said the boy, regretfully -- and went his way.

Billy was rescued soon after by a neighbor lady, fearless as a Roman matron, who swatted the dreadful creature with a board, all unconcerned. Bring on your spiders! say I. I defy them to do their worst. But when it comes to earthworms.....

The most shocking experience of my variegated career took place at the ruined castle of Cessford, on the Scottish border. My friend Steve and I, on a long walking-tour, scrambled through a broken window, down into that roofless wreck of a keep. Great mounds of loose earth filled most of its interior.

And then, to my utter consternation, I found the worst of my nightmares realized. For that loose earth was the abode of hundreds of thousands -- perhaps millions -- of crawly, nasty angleworms. Can it be that they were reared here, for bait? O the horror of that moment!

Before I recognized my peril, I had slid down to the bottom of the ruin; so my only means of escape was to paw my frantic way up through the earthworm-mass to the shattered wall. That did I, pallid, breathless, and praying for deliverance from this hell -- in nothing flat. But the memory of that torment will haunt me to my dying day. I don't even want to know how I acquired this prejudice: just let those frights keep at their useful labors, well under the sod.

Allstate Grants For Driver Ed.
