## Biggest Labor Day Parade

The 36th Annual Labor Day Parade, Tournament & Drill will be again held at Mid Island Plaza's spacious parking fields on Monday, September 7, Labor Day. Parade will get underway from the Main Firehouse, on East Marie Street at 9:30 AM (Rain or Shine) proceed North on Broadway and enter the southwest corner of the Plaza. The marchers will parade east to west past the Gertz Department Store under the Arch and disband at northwest corner of field.

Medard Ofenloch, Parade Chairman tells us that more than 46 Fire Departments and 33 marching bands will participate for the biggest year ever. In addition Fire Commissioner Scott of N.Y.C. ## First County Pool In Hicksville

County Executive Eugene H. Nickerson today announced that he has approved plans for construction of the first County-operated swimming pool to be located at Cantiaque Park in Hicksville. The 127 acre park on Cantiaque Road near Northern State Parkway is now in the first stage of development in which a nine hole golf course, driving range, parking fields, athletic and playground facilities and a picnic area are being built.

The swimming pool complex will consist of a 25 by 50 meter Olympic-size pool (82 feet wide by 165 feet long), a separate diving pool measuring 45 by 50 feet equipped with 1 meter and 3 meter diving boards, a 36 foot by 75 foot instructional pool designed for the teaching of beginners and novices, a children's spray pool, showers and locker room facilities.

Adjoining this complex will be a circular structure 210 feet in diameter enclosed by a concrete dome which is 48 feet high at its apex. Depending upon the season, the building can be used as an ice skating or hockey rink through utilizing its artificial freezing facilities, for roller skating or court games or as a thea-

tre-in-the-round. Indoor and outdoor eating facilities will be provided.

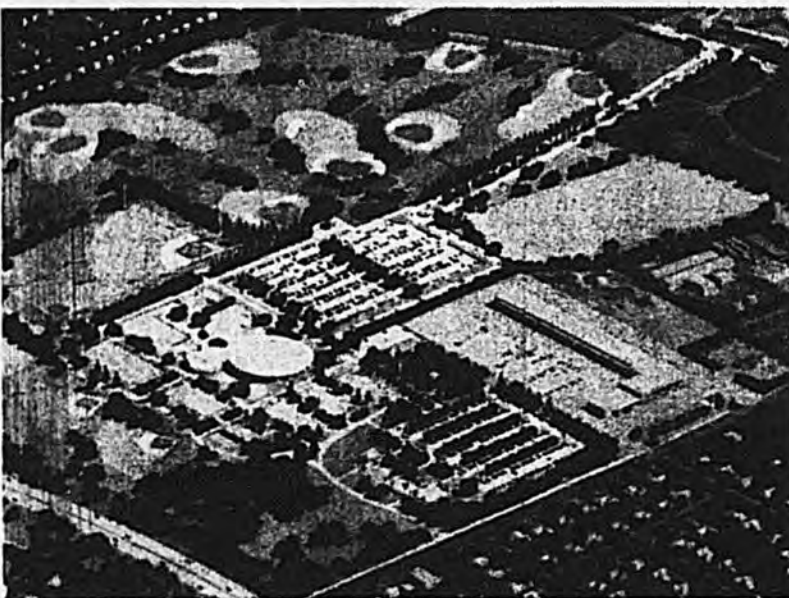
If approved by the Board of Supervisors, construction is expected to begin this fall with an anticipated opening of the pool in the summer of 1965. Estimated construction cost is \$1,750,000.

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## Meadowbrook Bank Begins Local Opinion Poll

Does the metropolitan New York-Long Island population favor Johnson or Goldwater?

A preview answer is being determined with the inauguration of the Meadow Brook National Bank Community Opinion Poll. Special ballot boxes have been installed in the bank's local office.

Other queries on the September poll ballot called for opinions on the proposed Long Island to New England Bridge, pay television and community recreation facilities.

Results of initial balloting conducted in August will be announced shortly. Topics voted on were: the presidential race, lowering the voting age to 18, year-round Daylight Savings Time and an extension of the nine-month school year.

"We expect as many as 30,000 persons to vote each month when the poll is in full swing. The results should be a valuable asset in measuring public attitudes in New York City, Nassau and Suffolk Counties," Van

der Waag said.

"In turn, we feel this poll will be an aid in decision-making by community leaders."

Tabulation will be by a needle-sort operation created by the data processing division of Royal McBee Corporation.

Balloting will end at the last evening banking hours of each month and results will be reported on the second Thursday of each month.

Voting is open to any adult visiting a Meadow Brook banking office.

## THINKING IT OVER

We are not happy about events of the Water District election in Hicksville. We are not unhappy because of the outcome of the election. This newspaper did not take sides on the candidates and was the only newspaper anywhere that gave information about both candidates.

What we are unhappy about is the apparent intervention of the local GOP in the race. Now it isn't that we are against the GOP, we've favored the party more times than not, but we are unhappy that the local old time GOPers are fooling with the party and actually hurting its overall cause.

The Monday night water district election is a case in point. Not everyone who voted against the incumbent was a Democrat. The group of nearly 400 was made up of voters of various parties, many of them Republicans, but they were people who had what they thought was a legitimate gripe against the water commissioners and the erection of a water tower. So they decided to vote against a water commissioner. They were stampeded two to one by the oldtime GOP machine at the polls. But the GOP will have to come back in November to ask some of the same people to get out and vote for candidates the Republicans at that time will be legitimately backing. The whole point is that if a group of oldtime Republicans in Hicksville is going to back every candidate who wants to keep the status quo then the party will suffer on the overall vote and dwindle in size when big tests come.

The political interfering in local district elections must stop. We hope that it will not show up next spring in the school elections where another of the party faithful will be fighting to hold onto a board position many people think he has already forfeited through immaturity.

## Waxy Ears Aren't Caused By Smoking

(Q) "Does smoking increase the production of ear wax?" J.Z.

(A) Smoking has been blamed for many things but not for excessive wax formation in the ear. I know of no such relationship.

**MEDITORIAL:** In the past year many letters have asked about head noises or noises in the ear. This is a very common and annoying symptom so I thought a little discussion again would be in order.

The sensation of noise within the ears is called tinnitus. In most cases, it results from stimulation of the middle or inner ear. Dizziness and loss of hearing may also be present. There are many known causes for this but in a certain percentage of cases the cause defies detection.

Tinnitus may be in one or both ears. It may be heard as a buzz, hiss, roar, humor or whistle. It can be either continuous or intermittent. In general it can take many forms but one thing is constant -- it is best heard when external noises are at a minimum. This symptom can also lead to anxiety and nervousness.

Some of the common causes of this symptom are: Meniere's disease, ear infection, wax in the ear canal, Eustachian tube disease, hardening of the small bones in the ear and arteriosclerosis (hardening of the arteries). In some cases no cause can be found.

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## What Is Fascism?

CERTAIN VEHEMENT POLITICIANS, and even a few of my columnar colleagues, have been playing recklessly, of late, with the label "Fascism." In particular, they have hinted, or said outright, that there is something Fascist about Senator Goldwater's Presidential candidacy. I take it that these gentlemen have forgotten what the political term "Fascism" means -- or else never knew.

Fascism is not identical with Nazism, although the Nazis obtained some of their ideas from the Italian Fascists. In theory, Fascism relied heavily on the sociological writings of Vilfredo Pareto. In practice Fascism never was long entrenched anywhere but Italy (the Spanish regime of General Franco being only partially Fascist, even at its inception); and even in Italy, Fascist theory never was fully applied.

At the heart of Fascist politics is the concept of the "corporate state." To put this matter briefly, Fascists maintain that society ought to be reorganized, in the interest of harmony and efficiency. In the "corporate state," parliamentary government, based upon geographic constituencies, would be supplanted by a "corporate" government, founded on economic groups: the various industries, occupations, professions, and trades would be formed into national corporations, whose representatives would make the national political decisions, as well as the national economic decisions.

As it took shape under Mussolini, Fascism became a dictatorial, one-party system; and the Fascist party leaders, rather than the representatives of the corporations, really exercised power. Centralization of all power in the national capital, national economic planning, and grandiose schemes for Italian empire were the most conspicuous characteristics of Italian Fascism.

Now Senator Goldwater's politics are a world away from these Fascist concepts. Far from drawing his ideas from sociological abstraction, Mr. Goldwater relies upon the American Constitutional tradition and upon the great figures in the history of American and British political thought. Far from advocating the "corporate state," Mr. Goldwater is the principal champion of the "forgotten American" and individual enterprise. Far from seeking to increase the powers of the executive, Senator Goldwater has been the most outspoken opponent of the increase of Presidential power at the expense of Congress. Far from desiring concentration of authority in Washington, central economic planning, and imperial expansion, Mr. Goldwater has been the defender of state and local powers and of free enterprise, and the adversary of world-government notions.

So it is even more silly to call Barry Goldwater a Fascist than it was to call Winston Churchill a Fascist: both have fought with all their power against Fascist theory and practice. But the Communists call "Fascist" nearly anyone who is not a rigid party-line Communist; and silly people, not themselves Communists, who yearn for epithets to employ, ape the Communist style of abuse. Paradoxically, some American "liberals" who relish central power and planning are essentially Fascist in mentality -- but endeavor to affix the dread epithet to others.

## Is Uncle Sam Creating Double-Bubble Trouble?

This nation seems to be one great big bust on appropriately named foreign policy.

HAUNT (properly contrite by now): All right, Boss. Besides posing for no more shots, I'll take the bubble-gum cards away from my kids and burn them. The cards, not the kids.

MENGEL: That's mighty big of you. I knew you'd stand tall once I had a little chat with you.

HAUNT: Why not? After all, I used to be a Giant.

Will this sticky bubble-gum card situation lead to the federalization of baseball with the Senators being deposed by Congressmen? Once the physiognomies of the players have been removed by Federal fiat, who can say what's in the cards?

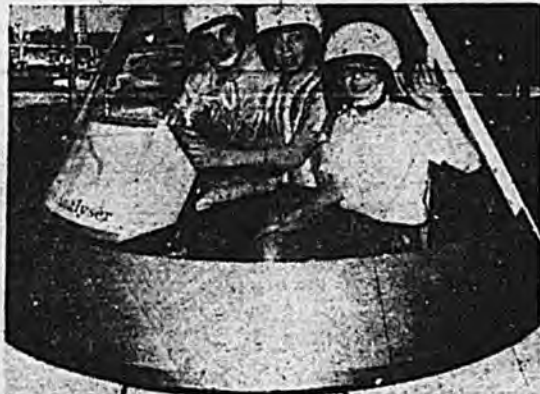

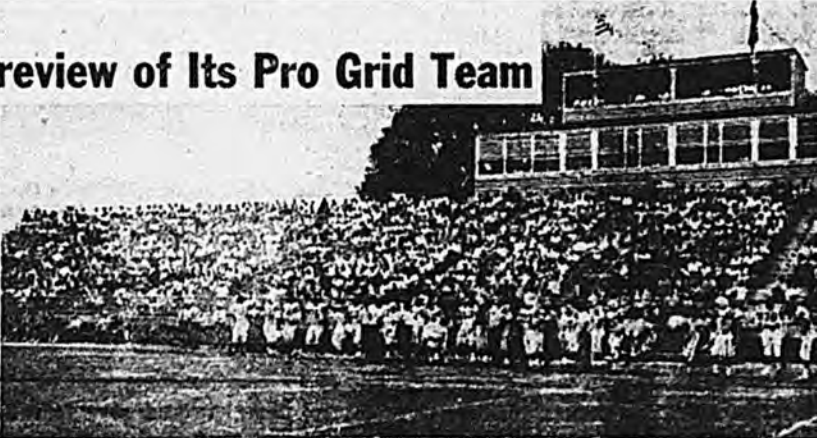
