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

Local Dems Hold Huddle

A proposed tax study, the sale of Mississippi bonds and a slate of officers for 1965 set off sparks at the regular meeting of the Levittown Democratic Club last Thursday at Levittown Hall.

Warmth which greeted guest speaker, County comptroller-elect Peter Rocchio quickly changed as nominations were opened to the floor by club president Frank Schwartz following presentation of the official slate. Disqualification of his nomination of blind veteran Democrat Ken Bruning brought charges of "railroading" from Commit-

tee man Irving Gold, perennial thorn in the side of Democratic leaders here.

Gold also derided a resolution advising assemblyman-elect Herbert Sachs to sponsor a non-partisan study of the overall tax structure, denouncing it as "window-dressing, political inaction and contrary to the 'ability-to-pay' tax platform upon which Democrats were elected."

A resolution "deploring" First National City Bank's purchase of Mississippi state bonds as "condonement of lawless violence and racism" made by Gold was defeated by a motion to table it for future consideration.

Not to be outdone, com-

mitteeman Gold placed his own name in nomination for club executive board member-at-large. It was seconded without challenge.


Over 250 were present at this annual affair which is traditionally attended by both students and faculty.

500 Protest Apartment Bid

A bid to build 80 one and two bedroom apartments on a five acre plot east of Broadway Hicksville at Bethpage Road was met with protests by 60 people who presented the Town Board with a petition signed by 500 names Tuesday. The group represented the Midland Civic Association.

Some Hicksville Senior Citizens appeared in favor of the project and said that facilities for the aged are badly needed.

If the Town Board granted the request of Spiegel it would have to down zone the land from residence to garden apartment use. Spiegel also wants a general business zoning so he can build from three to seven stores.

The Midland Civic Assn. says the change would downgrade the neighborhood and increase the traffic in the area.

Pulmonary Emphysema Doesn't Require Operation

(Q) "I have been informed that I have a mild case of pulmonary emphysema. Is this condition progressive? Will an operation eventually be necessary? I tire and become short of breath easily."

Mrs. T.H.

(A) Pulmonary emphysema is a progressive disease in most cases. As I have mentioned before, all smoking must be stopped. Operations are not part of the treatment, but breathing exercises and the use of positive pressure breathing machines are often effective in helping patients to "hold their own." A specialist in the treatment of this disease should be consulted.

MEDITORIAL: A reader recently sent me a copy of a label from a bottle of sodium fluoride (the ingredient used in fluoridation of public water supplies). In addition to the usual warning found on bottled chemicals which can be poisonous in large enough doses was this admonition: "Do you wish to drink some of this deadly poison with every glass of water? If you don't, fight against fluoridation..." "How about this?" the reader asks.

Such labels are used to frighten people unfamiliar with the facts. To imply that water becomes poisonous with the recommended amount (one part per million) of sodium fluoride is ridiculous and untrue. Fluorides are normally present in the drinking water of most parts of the country. Some areas have water containing fluoride levels of two, three or more parts per million and residents do not suffer from any ill health or disease.

To say that drinking some water with sodium fluoride in it is like taking poison is the same as saying taking aspirin is like taking poison. Millions of aspirin tablets are taken daily and everyone knows that aspirin can act as a poison only when taken in too large a dose. The same applies to sleeping pills. The recommended dosage never hurts anyone, but an overdose results in death.

Socialism Must Pay Its Way

"The Labor Government of Britain necessarily is becoming the least socialist of Socialist administrations. No sooner had he assumed the post of prime minister than Mr. Harold Wilson discovered that he cannot deviate markedly from Tory policies.

Although Mr. Wilson says he will proceed with a gradual and partial nationalization of the steel industry, already he has been compelled to give up the scheme of meddling with the oil industry. We will hear little more about nationalizing land. In foreign policy, no break with Conservative measures is yet discernible.

What gave the Labor cabinet a rude shock was the perilous situation of the pound sterling less than a month after he had won the general election. The pound was saved from devaluation only by the help of foreign governments and foreign bankers. Labor's grandiose talk of vast new "welfare" expenditures, and its dubious budget, promptly undermined confidence in sterling's stability. For socialism, like every other form of political organization, must pay its way; and if government expenditure produces inflation of currency, no one will trust that government's bonds and money.

Devaluation of the pound would inflict great injury, in the long run, upon British capital; and it would be a confession that the Labor government cannot manage the economy effectively. With Mr. Wilson's tiny majority in Parliament, devaluation might bring a new general election -- and a Labor defeat -- within months.

So the Wilson cabinet is likely to refrain from measures and language which would alarm investors and the great middle class which really dominates British society. Mr. Wilson already is finding it necessary to repress the doctrinaire "left" within his own party. Despite the support he has enjoyed from that left, his government will not be more radical than the sort of socialism represented by the late Hugh Gaitskell.

Yet despite Mr. Wilson's involuntary moderation, probably the pound will have to be devalued before many months are out. Inflation of wages and prices has been proceeding for years, and Wilson inherits the economic difficulties which the Macmillan and Home governments tried to check. This commentator writes from London, where the cost of food and lodging and nearly everything has risen drastically over the past five years. Clearly, the pound is not really worth the \$2.78 which is its nominal exchange-value; compared with the Swiss franc, the French franc, and the German mark, sterling is a "soft" currency. To compete in the foreign trade which is Britain's life-blood, eventually -- and probably soon -- the pound will have to sink to a realistic ratio -- \$2.50 in dollar exchange, or even lower.

In the days of the Attlee government, doctrinaire Socialists proclaimed that their government could follow whatever fiscal policies it might fancy, and that the United States would be compelled to underwrite the British economy, willy-nilly. They soon were taught their error. The United States and other governments will not repeat the subsidizing of sterling which they volunteered a few weeks ago. And it is most improbable that any abrupt Labor program of governmental economy and emphasis upon "hard work" will be developed to decrease costs and prices, and so prevent devaluation.

Thus socialism, after all, is governed by certain iron laws of economics. A socialist government cannot lift itself by its own bootstraps, nor interfere radically with the modern industrial system. Wilson finds himself confronting the dilemma which overwhelmed Attlee and Bevan in the post-war years.




