## Town Studies Traffic Control

The Town Board is awaiting a complete town-wide traffic control re-survey to determine whether its 18 existing ordinances require revision, it was announced by Councilman Edward J. Poulos, board majority leader.

Tow Clerk William B. O'Keefe requested the Nassau County Police Dept. to undertake the survey. The first section, covering Hicksville, is now before the Bd. for study, including detailed recommendations by the Traffic Control Bureau of the N.C.P.D.

The re-survey will cover areas now controlled by parking ordinances. These are:

Bethpage, East Norwich, Glen Cove - Roslyn Shore Road, Clock Blvd., West Amityville; Glen Head, Glenwood Landing, Greenvale, Jericho, Locust Valley, Massapequa, Oyster Bay, Plainview, South Oyster Bay Road, Bethpage Fire House Parking, South Farmingdale, Syosset and Woodbury.

The Town's program for traffic control requires all parking, and other matters within its jurisdiction to be referred to the Nassau County Police Department for its survey and recommendations. This work is done by the N.C. Traffic Control Bureau and, according to Councilman Poulos, has been of great service to the town

administration and to the public. Among other things, it tends to sustain the state's statutes for uniformity in traffic control devices.

### Teacher Talks To DAR

Mr. Robert Goudino, social studies teacher at the Hicksville Junior High School, and instructor of the Naturalization classes in the Adult Education Program, will address the Oyster Bay Chapter, DAR on Friday, March 19 at Raynham Hall, Oyster Bay. Mr. Goudino's topic will be 'Molding Future Americans,' and he will recount his experiences in classes in which aliens are instructed in the necessary preliminaries before becoming naturalized citizens. Since 1919 the DAR has been actively interested in the proper instruction of the foreign born who become American citizens, and in 1920 published the 'Manual for Citizenship' which is used extensively throughout the country in class-

es working with the foreign born. A copy is also presented to each new American at naturalization court in each local community. The Manual contains the text and Preamble of the Declaration of Independence; the Constitution of the United States; the Bill of Rights; the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag; and historical information with which every citizen should be well versed.

# THINKING IT OVER

One of the most boring subjects that has become fashionable these days is long discussion on what is called "extremism". The innocent word extreme which started out as an adjective is now used as a noun to describe practically any opinion which does not agree with the person using the word.

College professor are exercising their usual wordy research projects to prove nebulous points that wouldn't have to be proved if they would go back to the basic English language and use nouns as nouns and not dig up adjectives that could mean almost anything to anyone. The "extremism" cult got its biggest boost at the GOP National Convention when a disappointed Rocky used the "extremist" theme to describe the opponent who had bested him for the nomination. From then on it was in the spotlight.

Now we see local PTAs taking up the chant against people who do a variety of things. If PTA's would stick to complaining about exactly what is bothering them they would be a great deal better off.

For instance, if the Woodland Ave. PTA dislikes remarks made by School Trustee Bruno it should say so. If it deplors the circulation of printed messages depicting

the school board as Communists it should say so but all of this exhibitionism over "extremists" leads us to believe that the Woodland Ave. PTA really is out to stifle criticism of the school board.

And in this case it is trying to save an unusually incompetent group from criticism that it has earned.

Supporting our theory of the above is the fact that when the school board used what might be termed the "most extreme" action ever used against the press last year when this newspaper criticized the board for holding a referendum on the day of mourning after the President was assassinated, no protest at all came over the curtailment of advertising, from the local Woodland Ave. P.T.A. But now the cries are loud and clear when the same Board is attacked.

As a sidelight to the matter it was a bit humorous to find a messenger from the Woodland Ave.

PTA delivering a 16 page script on "extremism" to this newspaper, this week, two hours before our deadline with the instructions that it should be printed in the newspaper. (It would have filled six pages.) It looks like some of the anti-extremists are extremely extreme in denouncing extremists.

# This 'Eldercare' Bill

Congress is considering three separate bills to provide medical assistance to the elderly: the "care" scheme, another plan drawn up by the Republican opposition, and the "Eldercare" bill sponsored by Democratic Representative Herlong and Republican Representative Thomas Curtis. The public does not seem to understand the differences among these several proposals.

"Medicare" did not seem to contribute substantially to the Democratic victories in 1952 and 1953. Democratic politicians themselves have been divided on the Medicare proposal. In the Michigan elections of 1952, for instance, Democratic Governor Swainson endorsed Medicare, and Democratic Lieutenant-Governor Lesinski forthrightly opposed it - from the same platform! Swainson was defeated, but Lesinski was re-elected. Public-opinion polls have indicated that nearly 80 per cent of American citizens do not understand the provisions of the Medicare bill. "Eldercare" is endorsed by the

American Medical Association. The plan would be administered by the state governments, with assistance from the Federal treasury. It would provide liberal medical benefits to elderly people in need doctors' care, surgical costs, drugs, hospital and home nursing expenses, diagnosis, laboratory charges, and the like. The well-to-do would not receive these benefits.

"Medicare" would offer far more restricted benefits to the needy, although it would be more costly to the Treasury, and would include benefits to everyone, regardless of need. It would cover only about 25 per cent of the average medical expenses of the aged. Only some 1,500 of the 25,000 nursing-homes in the nation would be qualified for receiving payment under the Medicare plan. As part of the Social Security system, Medicare would be paid for by greatly increased Social Security payroll taxes, falling heavily upon the average wage-earner as upon the rich.

ance in medical care of the aged. It would encourage and subsidize the development of private health-insurance systems. Participation would be voluntary, in contrast with compulsory Medicare.

Directed toward the people who really need assistance, Eldercare appears to be more genuinely charitable, and more efficient, than the somewhat doctrinaire Medicare approach. Medicare, indeed, employs a gigantic centralized apparatus to administer aid to the comparatively small proportion of the population unable to provide adequate years.

President Johnson probably cannot ram through the Medicare monster, if he is so determined - though some members of his Administration are uneasy at eventual costs. But perhaps the Johnson Administration will have the care actually could accomplish more for less money. son Administration will have the good sense to perceive that Eldercare actually could accomplish more for less money.

# Correcting Problem Noses Is Common And Advised

(Q) "I would like some information on having some unwanted cartilage removed from the inner wall of the nose to decrease its size. Also what type of doctor would one go to in order to have this operation done?" Miss J.R.

(A) The name for plastic operations of the nose is rhinoplasty, which is very common now. Whether the nose is crooked, large depressed or mall, it can be made to look almost perfect. Operations where the nose is too big and some cartilage has to be removed are more successful than those where cartilage has to be added or built up.

In some hospitals cartilage banks have been set up, similar to blood banks, from which pieces of preserved cartilage can be taken for use in nasal surgery. Skin grafts are also used occasionally for these operations.

In most cases I advise nose operations for relief of breathing

difficulties and also for improvement in appearance. This is especially true in cases where young ladies are the victim. It doesn't seem right to spend hundreds of dollars for aids to beauty (cosmetics, hair dressings, etc.) and ignore an obvious deformity of the nose that can be corrected.

Plastic surgeons and ear, nose and throat specialists do rhinoplasty. Calling their office for an appointment to discuss the results, length of stay in the hospital etc., is advised.

(Q) "I have diabetes but do not take insulin. For six months I have been unable to get my sugar down and suffer continuously from irritation and intense itching. What should I do?" Mr. T.R.

(A) You will have to be treated for your diabetes by either a strict diet, insulin by injection or otherwise serious complications will arise. See your doctor at once.

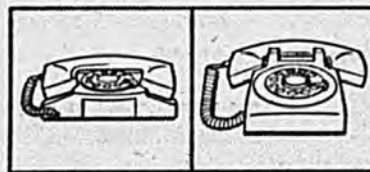

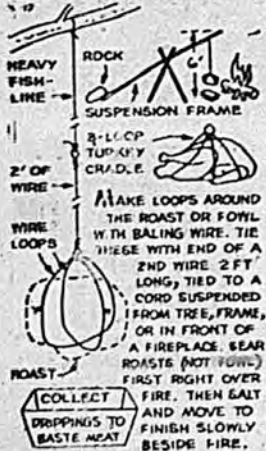

To be known as "Freedom in Education Day," this unique project will be sponsored as an annual program by the Nassau - Suffolk Chapter of Citizen for Educational Freedom (CEF). Its prime purpose, will be "To enlighten the public on the fundamental importance of protecting the basic right of parents to choose their children's education."

Invitations will be going out to all nonpublic schools of all denominations, as well as to various civic and parent groups throughout New York State in a sustained effort to arouse public support and sympathy for the nonpublic schools.

In addition to the basic two hour presentations, each of the 4 participating groups will maintain their own separate information booths through which they will dispense literature, answer specific questions, and in general serve to enlighten all attending on the nature of their schools and subsequent contribution to the community.

A general registration fee of 50 cents will be charged to enable CEF to cover expenses and provide means for further growth on Long Island.

To the Editor:

It seems the Downgrade-American Cult grows in strength, while Americans display an astonishing reluctance to fight back. At the March 5 Hicksville School Board meeting, Supt. If I am to be adjudged guilty of keeping faith with those sleeping under white crosses in far away lands. Then I plead guilty, and may I remain so until the day I die.

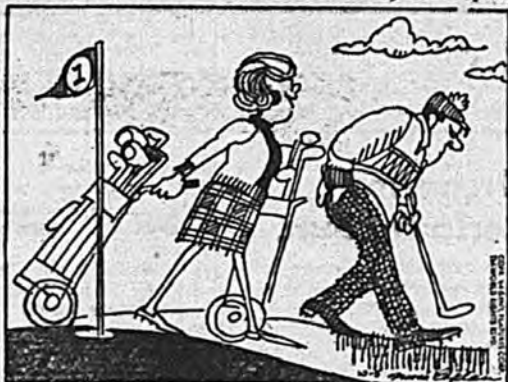
