Letters

Next Monday, June 14, we pay special tribute to the Flag of the United States - the Stars and Stripes of the United States that retains its strength of character through our loyalty.

When we express love for the flag of our country we are honoring the men who fought in defense of the God-given rights upon which American democracy was founded - the freedoms which our flag represents. So let us rededicate ourselves on this day to the principles set forth in the Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution and the Bill of Rights. The flag of our nation symbolizes those principles - the freedom to live, speak, worship and to progress according to our own wills and abilities.

For more than a century and a half before our flag's birthday, the American colonies shared Britain's flag, the Union and the red Meteor banners which were a familiar sight along their coastal harbors. During the early days of the Revolutionary war different colonies used different flags with various arrangements and mottoes.

On January 1, 1776 the formation of the Continental Army was proclaimed at Washington's headquarters in Cambridge, Massachusetts. It was here on this day that the Grand Union Flag was raised. It was the first striped flag of our country, resembling the Meteor Flag of England with six horizontal white stripes drawn across the red field. It was referred to by many names, some of them were: the Continental Flag, the Union Flag, the Congress Flag and the Colours of the United Colonies.

It was on June 14, 1777 that the Continental Congress resolved; "That the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Through the years the flag was altered somewhat in design but the ideals it represented in 1777 remains the same today. We see

the red in our nation's flag more brilliantly by the heroism of our fighting men; the white becomes more stably pure because of the high motives which impelled them; and the blue in the starry field of banner is made more beautiful by the services which our veterans performed to keep intact for all of us the American way of life.

So it is on this Flag Day, June 14, the members of the William M. Goussie Jr. Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Ladies Aux-

iliary ask each patriotic community to stand beside them as they salute the Flag of the United States on its birthday and by displaying it proudly on that day.

Legion Convention Brings Crowds

The Forty-Seventh Annual Convention of The Nassau County American Legion at Hicksville was climaxed Sunday afternoon, when over 800 delegates and alternates unanimously elected their new County Cmdr., Joseph J. Devine of Hempstead, a Past Commander of The Cathedral Post No. 1087, West Hempstead.

Commander Devine served several years on the County, elected staff as Treasurer, Adjutant, Membership Chairman and County Vice Commander. In 1963 - 1964 while serving as County Membership Officer he was responsible for establishing a "new second" all time high membership in the forty-seven year history of the county organization. Devine is a disabled veteran of World War II, participated in the initial invasion of North Africa, Battle of Kasserine Pass, and several other major combat engagements in North Africa and Europe with the famed Ninth Infantry Division.

When he was asked what action may be taken by the County Legion in regard to the recent plans to close down a number of Veterans Hospitals, Commander Devine stated that the Nassau County American Legion has taken a firm stand against the closing of the eleven hospitals and the 4 domiciliaries, but during the past few months its membership of over

10,000 Legionnaires supported by their families and friends played an important part in the over-all picture, through their efforts the President of the United States appointed a special committee to take a second look at the situation. To date this special Presidential committee has recommended that the Veterans Administration keep open five of the eleven hospitals it planned to close, also recommended keeping open two of the four Veterans Administration domiciliaries tagged for closing.

The Veterans Hospitals at Bath, N.Y. and Castle Point, N.Y. are among the five hospitals recommended to keep open. Meanwhile the House has added \$23.5 million to a Veteran Administration money bill to finance possible operation of any or all the hospitals now scheduled for closing on July 1. However, even if the Senate goes along with the House, the funds would not have to be spent since the legislation is permissive rather than a directive. But it gives the President leeway if he decides to keep the facilities open.

In addition to our firm stand against the closing of a number of Veterans Hospitals, we of The Nassau County American Legion since 1961 have initiated and spearheaded the need of both a Medical College in Nassau County with the added possibility of materializing the Veterans Hospital designated for Long Island. Surveys and statistics taken in 1961 definitely indicated the need for a Veterans Hospital on Long Island, and certainly that need is much grater today than ever.

County Commander Devine was officially installed last night at the Charles Wagner Post No. 421, Hicksville by installing officer J. Arthur Petty, Past New York State American Legion Commander. The Installation ceremony was followed by The American Legion County Commanders Ball which was well attended by many dignitaries and County officers of other Veterans organization.

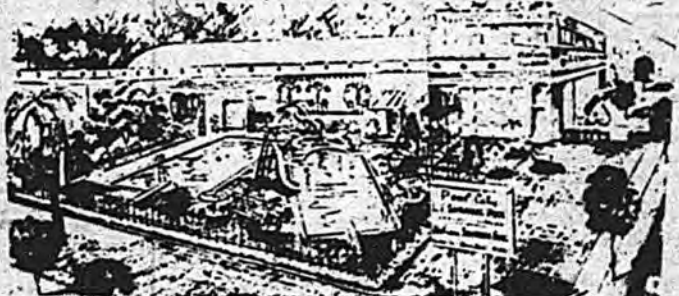

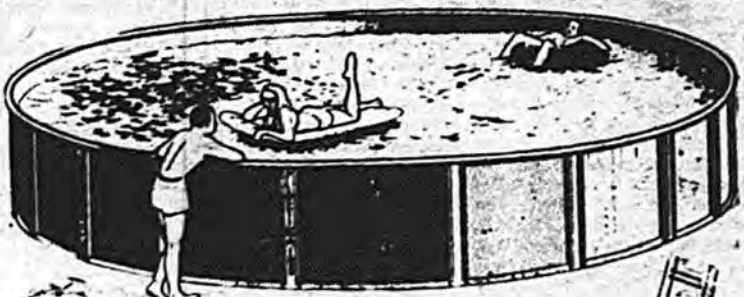

To the Editor:

I would like to correct the statements in the Letter to the Editor signed by a Mr. Wesley H. Tietges, appearing in the June 3 issue.

Mr. Tietges stated that the Band Directors, Assistants, and Vocal Director were paid various sums of money totaling \$775.00 or appearing in the Memorial Day Parade. This is not true. No one performing in the parade was paid. The fact is that the Board set the policy for the next school year 65 - 66. It also set the policy for the other extra curricular activities as pointed out by Mr. Tietges for the 65 - 66 school year.

Mr. Tietges apparently did not hear the discussion before the vote. By giving all the teachers who participate in the extra areas of activities such as football basket ball, track, music bands, etc., a full teaching load of five periods, we have actually saved money by reducing the number of teachers in certain areas such as phys ed, and others.

By taking this means, two direct benefits occur. First, the children benefit by additional teaching periods available to them. Secondly, the district actually saves money as the lower number of teachers needed with full teaching loads more than pays for the extra activities remuneration. By reducing the number of teachers by 3 - 5 people at an average salary of \$7000.00 per annum, we save from \$21,000 to \$35,000. This sum far exceeds the amount paid to person-

nel for extra classroom activities. I respectfully urge Mr. Tietges or any other persons writing to the editor to give true facts and equally as important, all the acts. Respectfully,
