Library Budget Turned Down Again

Hicksville voters turned down the District Library budget for a second time Wednesday evening. This

time by a wider margin than the four vote loss of May 5. The yes votes totalled 1257 and the no votes totalled 1308. The turned down budget would have been for \$282,938.57

The previous budget was \$247,326.80. The Library board of trustees resubmitted the budget after the May 5 defeat without change.

THINKING IT OVER

The current cry among politicians to increase the minimum wage in the nation to \$1.50 and even beyond is dire proof that politicians and particularly politicians who are directed by labor unions will do more harm than good to the country even though their motives will appear to be the loftiest.

Statements that you cannot expect a man to live on a \$1.25 per hour wage are logical and true. But the statement is just as logical and true when you substitute the figure \$1.50 or more. The only difference is that the upward spiral has caused harm in the form of eliminating jobs and putting some marginal employers out of business.

The fight for a high minimum wage is actually a fight to take more jobs away from teenagers and others who do not want to support families but need spending money or a chance to learn a trade or just something to do during a

vacation.

Now if the proponents of the higher minimum wage were really interested in humanity they would take these things into consideration. They would make certain requirements for the minimum wage to take effect such as a time limit at a certain job an exception for trainees and apprentices and an exception for part time work that will always be unskilled. If the labor unions work the politicians and get what they are after in the form of a blanket minimum wage increase they will make it more worthwhile for employers to get more machines to eliminate any unskilled job that today can be performed without amortizing an expensive machine. If the politicians want to be humanitarians let them do some pondering before speaking. A lot of students would like jobs each summer.

Poorly Fitted Shoes Cause Foot Woes

(Q) "I have been bothered with my feet for a long time. They are flat and this is part of my problem but I think shoes are also to blame." J. W.

(A) Shoes have been blamed for a lot of foot problems and they are the source of some foot woes. However, it is more precise to blame the foot rather than the shoe itself. Improperly fitted, tight shoes may cause callouses, bunions and painful feet. They probably don't cause fallen arches or flat feet.

New shoes should fill two requirements. First, the shoe should be long enough and second, the shoe should be wide enough to be comfortable. Any other consideration,

such as color, style and type of material is unimportant.

(Q) "It seems as though when on it. This disgusts me since I every ailment she has is blamed ever a woman reaches menopause feel sure that most symptoms during this period of life are not due to the menopause." Mrs. D. F.

(A) I agree that too many aches and pains are blamed on the menopause. Very often this is used as a catch-all for any problem a woman in this age group has. Actually, only a few symptoms are a direct result of the menopause. Most complaints attributed to it can be readily explained by tension (anxiety) and other causes.

Those School Dropouts Again

Rather to my surprise, I find that most readers agree with my remarks on school "drop-outs." Let them drop out, for the sake of the teachers and the sake of their fellows who want to learn something, say I.

One friendly letter comes from Dr. John P. Densford, professor of education at East Central State College, Ada, Oklahoma. Professor Densford's observations are well worth quoting here.

"If education is to be meaningful to young people, teachers must be so eager, so contagious, and so alive that they can dangle knowledge before students like carrots before a hungry donkey," writes Dr. Densford, "leading ever leading, until the walls of ignorance and apathy are breached."

"How can we get such teachers? My proposal has two steps, the first step with alternatives.

"(1) Either abolish compulsory attendance laws after the ninth grade; let students who want to quit, quit; reduce enrollments so that good teachers can have room

to operate

"Or - - if such a procedure is distasteful - - instead of bemoaning the drop-out situation and codding the unfit, require either school attendance or else service in the Domestic Peace Corps.

"In either case, make school attendance a reward for those who want it and will work at it, not a punishment which all must endure.

"(2) Raise teaching standards and reward the capable teacher commensurately. Raise teachers' salaries drastically - - double would not be too much - - and weed out so you get the best teachers. Merit cannot do the kind of teaching called for above.

"Moeny is no problem; the reduction in enrollments and teaching staff will permit present funds to go further.

"Let's renovate our teaching so drastically that the word 'drop-out' will really refer to someone who dropped out - - voluntarily not to some poor soul who was run out by lackluster, uninspired, Mickey Mouse teachers."

Amen to Dr. Densford's recommendations! One may add that, as

an alternative to the Domestic Peace Corps, labor unions and employers ought to develop more elaborate programs of apprenticeship for young people who don't desire to stay in school.

If a good many "students" ought to drop out of high school, a still larger proportion of the boys and girls who enroll in college ought never be permitted to set foot on the campus. Mr. John Keats made this clear in his recent lively book, "The Sheepskin Psychosis" (Lippincott). Already, six out of ten freshmen in college drop out, flunk out, or transfer to a different sort of institution. These unfortunates ought never to have been encouraged to enter a college, for which they are unqualified. We need to recognize and develop alternatives to college attendance of course - - and Mr. Keats suggests some practical ones.

Graduating from high school of college is not a moral imperative; it is not a moral matter at all. It is better far to be a useful drop-out than to linger on as pseudo student nuisance.

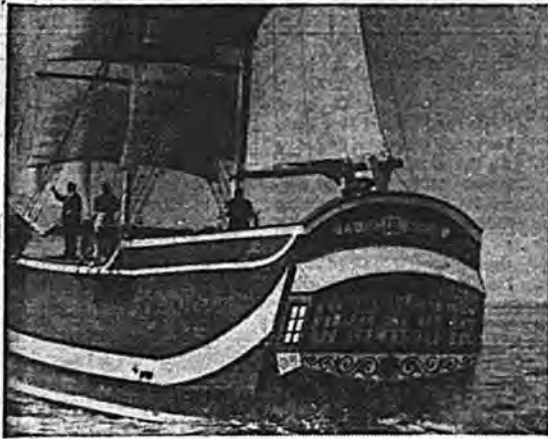

Ginsberg Gets GOP Nomination

Martin Ginsberg, Plainview attorney, was the unanimous choice of the Ninth Assembly District Republican Convention as the party designee for Assemblyman.

Three secret ballots were taken and a fourth was being set up, when with the consent of the opponents, Ginsberg's candidacy was made unanimous. The convention was held in Holiday Manor, Bethpage (Thursday night, June 10).

Clifford B. Daley of Bethpage opened the convention and turned the chair over to John W. Burke of Syosset. Mrs. Louis Mitchell was named permanent secretary. Michael D'Auria of Plainview moved for the secret ballot which was unanimously approved.

Each of the declared candidates was given five minutes to speak to the convention. They were called to the rostrum alphabetically and Mr. Carman opened with a sizeable demonstration including a band, balloons, placards and other novelties.

Mr. Ginsberg in his presentation said he was confident that the district will support the Republican candidates if they are well known and popular with the people. He suggested the best candidates must be those who have had public exposure in fields other than politics.

He cited some of his activities such as past president of the Plainview Republican Club, first vice-president of the Oyster Bay Council of Republican Club Presidents, active in the Plainview Chamber of Commerce, Plainview-Old Bethpage Community Park Committee, Plainview Jewish Center and a member of its law committee, United Jewish Appeal, District Chairman of Cerebral Palsy Drive, Kiwanis Club and cited as Kiwanian for the year 1964.

He also told the convention he felt honored to have participated in various drives and programs of the Heart Fund, Cancer Committee and others.

He said he wished to be frank with the delegates and acknowledged that he had a physical disability stemming from a polio attack when he was one year old. He said he has lived with the restriction but that it has not slowed him in any way excepting in walking—and that, he said, will not impair mobility.

Mr. Ginsberg was valedictorian in his grammar school and high school commencements. He concluded his presentation by saying that he felt he could help to bring about a Republican victory in the district in November.

After his designation was made unanimous Mr. Ginsberg thanked those who had helped him in the convention and he urged unity among all elements. He assured his hearers that he was not presenting himself as a Jewish candidate, a Catholic candidate or a Protestant candidate—but as a hard working sincere Republican candidate who, with the help of everyone could bring about victory in November.

The convention session got under way about 9:00 P.M. and was adjourned at 11:27 P.M.

C. Bruce Pearsall, Town Chairman, who initiated the convention method of choosing designees for assembly was not present.
