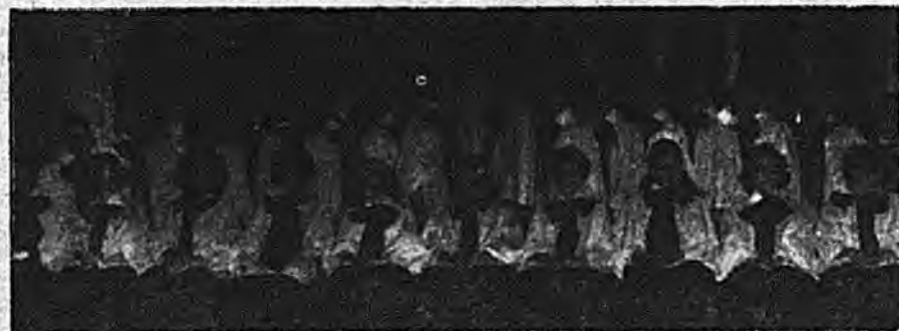

THINKING IT OVER

In the past few months most of the talk about Medicare has centered around whether the program is needed or not and what it will provide in the form of medical benefits.

But if this approach is followed a main issue of the program is forgotten and left undiscussed.

While some form of medical care for those who cannot provide it for themselves is obviously a necessity in a land that has plenty, the government entering the insurance business is not a necessary conclusion.

We have never been overly fond of many forms of insurance and the practices of some insurance companies but we cannot let this blind us to the fact that insurance companies can run the insurance business far better than the government can.

Insurance companies are often able to hand out benefits which far exceed premiums many times, because they re-invest the funds given to them at a profit. This re-investment is a sound part of the economy because it keeps funds working in all sorts of endeavors. This works the same as money

put in the bank, which is reinvested and is still flowing in the economy, in the form of loans to businesses and mortgages.

But when the government acts as an insurance company it does it in a far different manner. It does not re-invest the money to make a profit. It does not have a program set up to use the money to loan out to segments of the free economy. It simply keeps collecting more and more premiums or taxes and handing out benefits which are often influenced by pressure groups in our society, rather than by actual need. The net result is that the premiums paid do not grow and the only increase in benefits can come from an increase in taxes or premiums.

Perhaps there is need for Medicare, perhaps the benefits up for consideration now are sound. But why does a democratic country it is trying to spread throughout have so little faith in the system the world that it solves its problems by government ownership when the program might be more efficient and more productive if privately administered?

Diabetics Should Avoid Excess Sweets, Sugar

(Q) "Is it possible to get sugar diabetes from eating too many sweets and sugar? My grandmothers have it and tell me I'm asking for trouble by eating candy, cakes and pies quite often." R. J.

(A) Too much sugar will not cause diabetes. However, since the diabetic can't handle sugar properly, any excess will always cause trouble and aggravate the disease. From the standpoint of good nutrition, too much sugar is not good, since a proper balance of fat, protein and carbohydrate (which includes sugar) are necessary for a good diet. This would be most important to you since you have such a strong family background for diabetes.

(Q) "My grandmother has been taking nitroglycerine for years and seems to get good results from this inexpensive medicine. She is past

85 now and has taken it for poor circulation. I have the same thing, and wonder if it would harm me." Mrs. L. S. D.

(A) I think you should be more interested in whether or not this drug would help you. Your grandmother's experience readily attests to the usefulness and safety of this drug, when taken properly. If you had the type of circulatory trouble nitroglycerine would help, then it should be used. You must have an examination to determine this.

(Q) "I like to eat lemons with salt on them. My friends have good and bad comments about this practice. Are there any harmful effects that you know of?" J.T.C.

(A) You can continue indulging yourself to some degree. A few lemons a day, with a little salt, could be taken without concern of damage.

Morgenthau Vs. Bundy

The Johnson Administration's Viet Nam policy has its most able opponent in Professor Hans Morgenthau, who gave Mr. McGeorge Bundy, Presidential assistant, a hard time in a recent television exchange. Though in the matter of Viet Nam, this commentator agrees more with Dr. Bundy than with Dr. Morgenthau, still your servant has in general a very high opinion of the realist authority on foreign policy from the University of Chicago.

It is somewhat amusing to find Dr. Morgenthau associated in the Viet Nam debate with various muddle-headed sentimentalists, pacifists, and pro-Communist zealots. For Hans Morgenthau has only contempt for such gentry. Learned, sardonic, candid, and practical, Professor Morgenthau has done much to restore some sense of reality to American foreign policy, and everyone seriously interested in diplomacy ought to read Morgenthau's books. Though this commentator sometimes disagrees with Morgenthau's particular recommendations concerning present policies, more often he agrees; and he has learned a great deal from Morgenthau's enunciation of general principles.

But even Hans Morgenthau can

err. Shortly before last November's election, I debated with Mr. Morgenthau in Chicago; our subject was the approaching contest between Mr. Johnson and Mr. Goldwater. We dealt at some length with the "trigger-happy" issue. A pollster had been asking citizens this lively question: if Johnson and Goldwater were out hunting deer, which gentleman would be the more liable to fire at the first movement in the brush?

I remarked that Johnson and Goldwater, confronted with crisis in Viet Nam, would behave precisely the same: neither candidate was timid, nor yet trigger-happy. But Professor Morgenthau replied that Goldwater indeed might fire rashly; while Johnson's fault, he added, was that Johnson "would try to shake hands with the deer."

Events - if I may be indulged while patting myself on the back - have justified this commentator, not Dr. Morgenthau. President Johnson, re-elected, has behaved in Viet Nam precisely as Mr. Goldwater would have behaved, had Goldwater been sent to the White House. He hasn't shaken hands with the Communist deer - emphatically not.

Otherwise, however, in our Chicago debate, Dr. Morgenthau was accurate in his assessing of Mr.

Johnson's character. The President, said Morgenthau, is immensely shrewd, vastly conceited, and hungry for power. (Also Morgenthau observed that though he has no respect for Mr. Goldwater's intellect, the man from Arizona is a fine human being - generous, honest, warm-hearted.)

Like his Presidential boss, Dr. Bundy is a self-esteeming gentleman, with a canine appetite for personal power. As man and as thinker, Dr. Morgenthau is far preferable. Yet in the Viet Nam debate, Bundy is right - more or less. He is right in the sense that America cannot now withdraw from South Viet Nam without awful injury to ourselves and our allies; we have to fight because our diplomacy has failed.

For all that, Mr. Bundy, is a poor architect of policy. He supported the Bay of Pigs landing - apparently without understanding how it must fail, lacking strong military support. He devised the present stalemate in Santo Domingo, which aids the Communists there, despite Bundy's own anti-Communism. He seems to have little notion of what to do in Viet Nam, except to drop bigger bombs. Would that Dr. Morgenthau - but with different ideas about Southeast Asia - were Johnson's special assistant!

East-West Aves. To Be Resurfaced

Councilman Edward J. Poulos, Board Majority Leader, said the Town Board approved a work schedule for resurfacing the East-West Avenues area of Hicksville ending on or before July 16.

Tufano Construction Corp. of Roslyn is proceeding with the work at its low competitive bid price of \$20,257. Upward of 17,000 linear feet of roadway are included in the project. Surfacing will be black-top.

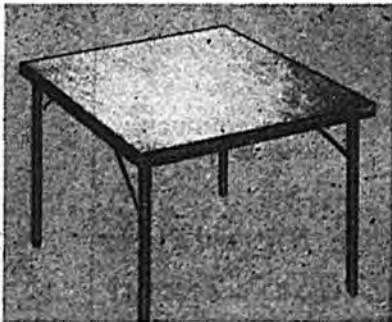

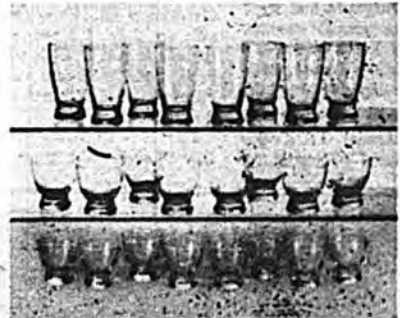

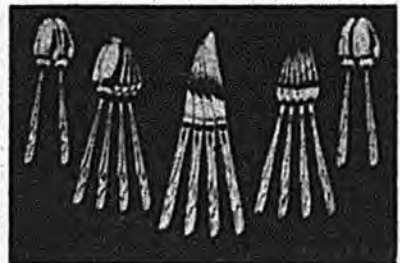

A local company the E-J Plastics Co. of 233 Robbins Lane, Syosset, is currently marketing an invention that could promise to be as popular as the hula hoop a few years ago.

The invention is called Kick-A-Loop and in addition to being a form of entertainment for the youngsters is a means of developing coordination.

Simple in design it consists of a ball-shaped plastic sphere with a looped handle. The child puts one foot through the looped handle and

must develop coordination to jump over the stem with the free foot. Then to develop coordination with the other foot a reverse rotation can be used.

The Plainview School system was the first to order the Kick A Loop and it has had it in use in gym classes in four or five of its schools for many months. Other school systems have been quick to snap it up such as the Massapequa Park district, Island Trees, Oyster Bay, Hauppauge and to some extent in

the Hicksville School System.

The company plans to market Kick A Loop on a national basis and will use TV, national magazine advertising and other methods.

In addition to its use by normal school children, Kick A Loop has been utilized as an instructional item for retarded children.

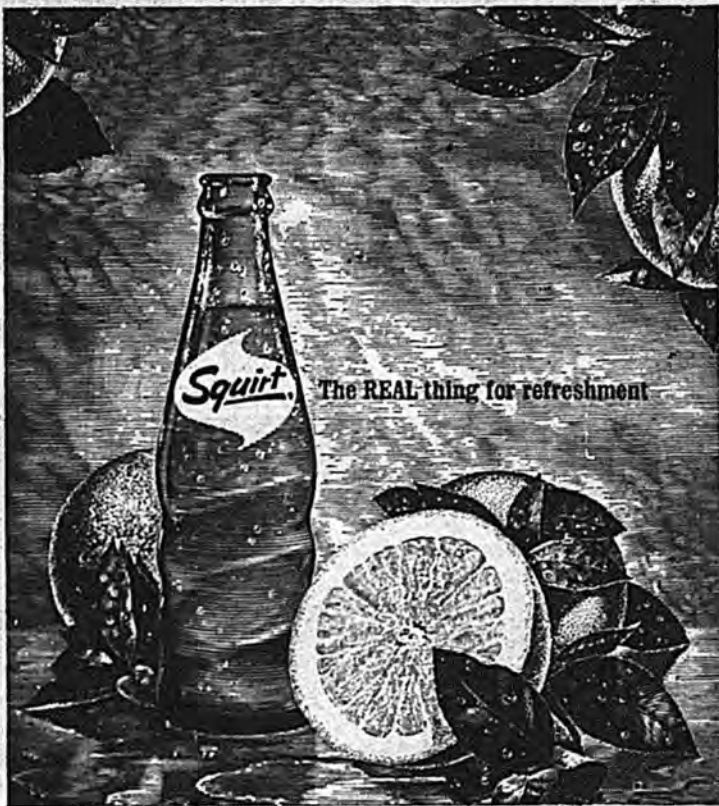
