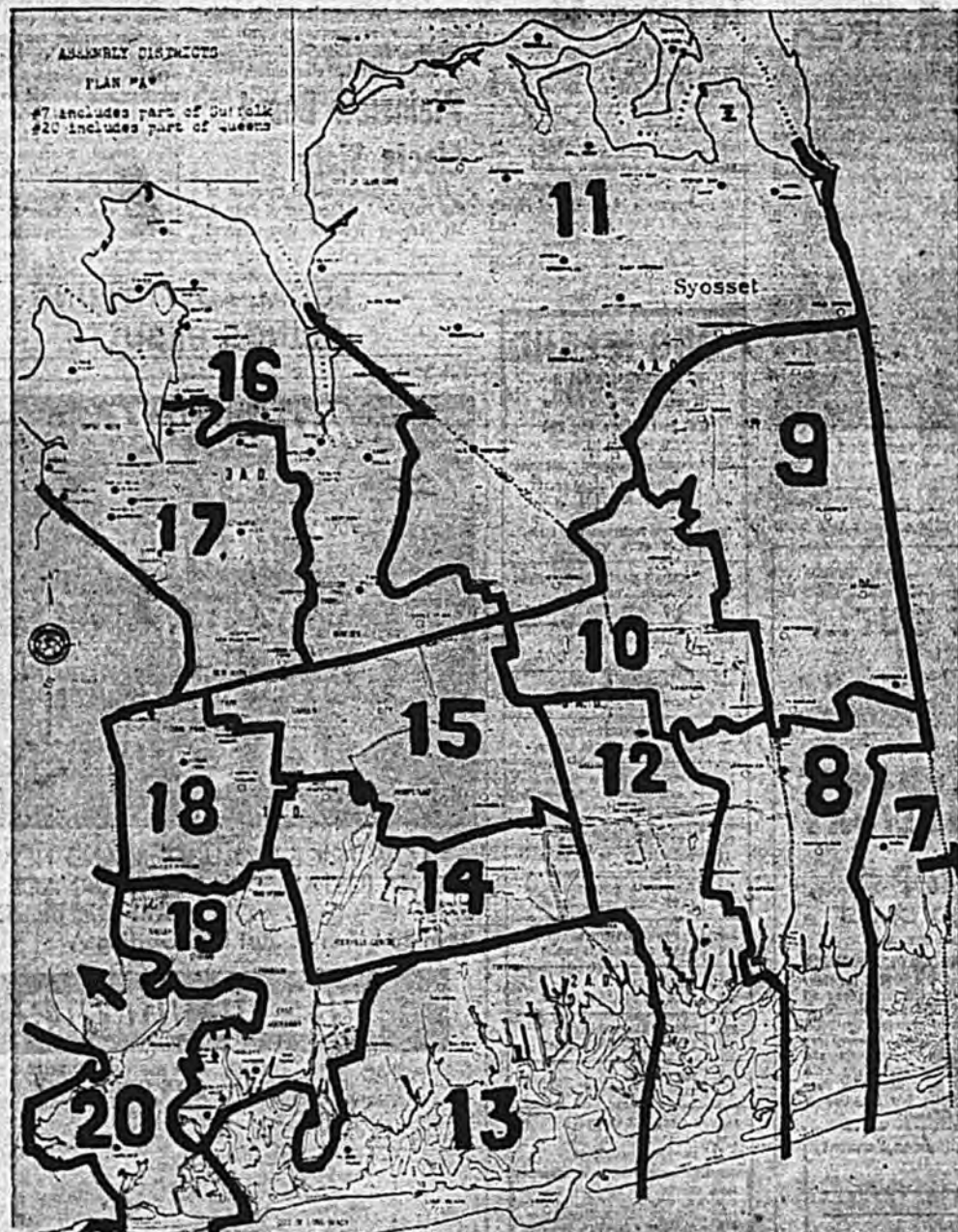

New Districts For Voters



Primary Fight Shapes Up

With the Federal Court putting its full weight behind its order for a special election this year for the State Assembly and Senate, Hicksville voters find themselves in a strange new Assembly Dist. It is called Dist. 10 and straddles Levittown.

The race for District 10 nomination for the Assembly has already begun. The Democrats have nominated Stanley Harwood of Levittown, the GOP has nominated Julius Schwartz of Hicksville.

Supporters of William A. Bruno, Jr. were seen in the area this week gathering the required 250 names to fill out a nominating petition to put him in the running for a GOP primary. Bruno says that he will fight in the primary for the nomination but the statistics on the new district do not favor either the GOP or the Democrats. The election is supposed to be a close one.

Free Swimming Lesson Regis.

Registration for free swimming lessons at Tobay Stehll, Centre Island and Tappan beaches has been extended for another week, Superintendent of Beaches Edward F. Brickell announced today.

Demand for such instructions prompted the extension of registration. Registration forms can be obtained from the lifeguards at the above beaches.

There will be two one-half hour sessions per week for beginners and advanced beginners; one one-hour lesson per week for intermediates and swimmers; two two-hour classes per week for juniors (12 years) and senior (16 years) life savers.

Superintendent Brickell said that American Red Cross certificates will be issued to all students successfully completing each seven-week course, which started July 6.

Dates and times of the instructions are available from the lifeguards at the specific beaches involved or from the 1965 "Fun in the Sun" pamphlet.

The new Assembly Dist. lines for Hicksville has it sharing District 10 with Levittown. Under Reapportionment there will be an election

in November to elect an Assemblyman from this new district for a term of one year. Formerly Hicksville was in the Fourth Assembly

district and shared it with Syosset now in Dist. 11, Bethpage, now in Dist. 9 and Massapequa now in Dist. 8. The State Senatorial Dist.

Hicksville is now in the Fourth Dist. and comprises the Northern half of the Township of Oyster Bay.

Fishman Named To Library Bd.

The Hicksville Library Board named Abraham Fishman, an attorney, of 22 Balsam Drive, as a member of the Board to fill out the unexpired term of Reverend Nappi, who has resigned by reason of having accepted a new pastorate in Bridgeport, Connecticut. Mr. Fishman is president of North Hicksville Civic Association, and was recently elected president of Study, Incorporated. In remarking

on the Reverend Nappi's resignation, Ellery Bean, Chairman of the Board, praised his services to the Library and the community of Hicksville.

In other action, the Board of Trustees voted unanimously to adopt a fiscal program which by means of curtailed services, would permit it to operate within the monetary limitations imposed by reason of taxpayer rejection of the 1965-66 budget increases.

The reduced and curtailed services will top approximately \$35,000 from the total expenditures which had been recommended by the board for the new fiscal year. The reductions will result in the closing of the library for two nights a week, the elimination of part-time professional help planned to give increased service to the children using the library, and will require a 20 percent cut-back in the amount expended for new books. In addition, new equipment planned for the children's area in the amount of \$2,200 will be eliminated.

Plainview Board Elects Slate

At the organizational meeting of the Board of Education of July 6, Mr. Irving Woliver was elected

President of the Board of Education, and Mr. Charles E. Coe was made Vice-President of the Board of Education.

Mr. Woliver, who was re-elected to a second term on the Board of Education in 1964, served as President of the Board during the period of the 1963-64 school year. Mr. Coe is in the third year of his current term of office.

Mr. Charles Wilson who had been appointed by the Board of Education, began a full term, and Mr. Ronald Cooper and Mr. Harvey Brickman, newly elected members were sworn in as Board of Education members. Miss Josephine Levy was appointed District Clerk, Mr. William Hulkower was appointed Treasurer and Mr. Joseph Campanella was appointed Attorney for the Board of Education.

One of the first actions of the newly constituted Board was to revise the summer meeting schedule so that meetings in July and August would begin at 8:45 P.M. The meeting will be held on July 29th, August 9th and August 30th at the Plainview - Old Bethpage Senior High School. The change in meeting dates and hours was designed to allow fuller participation on the part of the community at Board of Education meetings.

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Get Bible Fraining

Should the Bible be watered down for youths? Not according to Jehovah's Witnesses. To prove it, thousands of Witnesses from the north-eastern U.S. are bringing their children with them to New York's Yankee Stadium the week of Aug. 24-29 to listen to six days of Bible discussion during their "Word of Truth" convention.

One such family is Mr. and Mrs. Salvatore Guglielmo and their four children, who live at 5 Gerald Ave. in Hicksville.

Thousands of families like them will be filling Yankee Stadium. A large part of the audience will be small children who will sit quietly in their seats through two and three hour long sessions, listening to discourses on varied Biblical subjects.

Said Guglielmo: "We've had a number of small children who regularly attend five weekly Bible instruction meetings at our Kingspan Hall, so they have already been well trained to listen quietly."

Mr. Guglielmo added, "If a child can learn how to become a

School Board Puts Over Gag Rule

The Hicksville Board of Education has decided that it will no longer allow the general public to speak at its meetings unless it permits them to and any time allotted to questions will be limited by the chairman of the meeting.

In past years, anyone who had a suggestion or question concerning the operation of the Schools or the conduct of the board of education was given the right to speak at meetings. The new rules were described by the Board of Education as follows:

"The Hicksville Board of Education has adopted rules regarding the decorum of the general public at its meetings. The policy was adopted July 9 as proposed by newly-installed Trustee Marvin Goldberg. All members voted in favor except Vice-President George A. Jackson, who was opposed.

"Under present policy, the general public is given two opportunities during each session to address the Board or to make inquiries orally. The new policy asserts that the Board "will welcome and allow only those persons who are residents of

- (1) All questions, remarks and comments shall be addressed to the chair.
 - (2) The time allotted for each question or comment shall be at the discretion of the chairman.
 - (3) Discourtesies such as shouting, interruptions, deliberate name making, disruptions, etc., will not be permitted.
 - (4) Comments or questions that attack, impugn, or relate to the personal lives of Board members and/or school faculty shall be ruled out of order and disallowed.
 - (5) Perpetrators and violators of these procedures will be required to leave the meeting.
 - (6) Chronic offenders and violators shall be subject to local and state laws governing public assemblies.
- The next regular meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education will be held on Friday night, July 30, 1965 at 8:15 P.M. in the teachers lounge of the Senior High School."

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THINKING IT OVER

When will the school board ever learn that it cannot force people to agree with it?

A new set of rules and regulations adopted by the School Board last week is designed to stifle all criticism of its activities.

The six rules (printed elsewhere in this edition), when invoked, will make it useless for the public to appear at school board meetings to voice anything but sweet praise for the school board members. All debate will be limited by the chairman of the school board. You may not insult the thin skinned members and if you are not careful the Board has threatened to call the police on anyone who doesn't obey it.

If you are a heavy taxpayer (or any type of taxpayer for that matter) and do not live in the district you will not be allowed to speak at Board meetings at all. Even if you wanted to go there to perhaps enlighten the members of the board of some facet of the business or industrial community that they might not know, you would have no right to speak to the Board.

The only thing the six rules of the

school board leave for the taxpayer is the right to pay taxes and to vote the criticism-fearing school board members out as soon as possible. They would probably take away the latter right if they could. We are not sure whether the school board is violating the law with its new restrictions and we imagine that the rules will be tested. But we can hardly see how a group that has come to power on what it calls liberal thinking could be so uninformed in the tenets of American government that it believes that limiting free speech is the proper method for a school board which is in existence to further democracy to operate.

It is little wonder that many students graduating from high schools are all for democracy so long as it agrees with them or gives them something, but when the going gets rough, when criticism arises or when a sacrifice such as Viet Nam arises, they are confused. The so-called leaders of the community, the board of education is leading the confusion.

Low Carbohydrate Diet May Cure Meniere's

MEDITORIAL. The cause of Meniere's disease has always been somewhat of a mystery. One or both ears are affected with symptoms of dizziness (vertigo), ringing (tinnitus) and diminished hearing, which come on in attacks of sudden onset. Nausea and vomiting often accompany these symptoms. The ringing noises and the dizziness will taper off after the attack, but may take up to several months to do so. The attacks tend to recur at various intervals.

Treatment has only been moderately successful. Attempts at low-salt diets, fluid pills, antihistamines, have helped only some cases. Ultrasound treatments to the inner ear are complicated to perform but have proved to be more successful in promoting a cure.

The latest thought on treatment, however, concerns the suspicion that Meniere's disease may be caused by an endocrine (internal gland) disorder. A group of 250 patients were placed on a low car-

bohydrate diet similar to the diet of a diabetic. The study, which has been going on for ten years, shows that those who adhered closely to the diet had a lower number of recurring attacks. The patients who went back to their previous "normal" diets were more apt to run into trouble again. A low carbohydrate diet has other advantages and is not harmful to the system over an extended period of time.

(Q) "Please explain exactly what 'spotting between periods' means. Would it be something that occurs daily or just once? How about the amount and color (white, yellow, red, etc.)," Mrs. N.C.

(A) Spotting refers only to bleeding (red or reddish brown color) and to any amount at any time other than the normal period. Spotting is especially significant during or after the "change" and must always be investigated.

People Who Know Demonstrators

As Disorderly "Demonstrations" recur at Selma, Alabama, it is well to pay attention to the remonstrances of some pro-Negro residents of Selma who are trying courageously to restore order and tolerable relationships between white and colored people.

One such is Sister Michael Ann, administrator of the Good Samaritan Hospital in Selma, established for Negroes of limited means. Speaking in Detroit recently to a labor union convention, this nun says that Selma is like a volcano ready to erupt again. Only Martin Luther King, she thinks, "can resolve the trouble there - and I don't think he realizes what's going on."

What is going on? Chiefly, Sister Michael Ann points out, reckless and demagogic agitation by some 100 radicals, white and colored, who have continued to hang about Selma since the troubles in March. These are irresponsible outsiders, a curse to everyone trying to achieve peace and the improvement of the Negroes' condition.

Four categories of "civil rights" demonstrators came to Selma in March, Sister Michael Ann points

out: first, dedicated, religious people, "who really knew they were there"; second, well-intentioned folk who didn't quite know what the fuss was all about; third, rude, uncouth, neurotic rebels, indulging in sexual promiscuity, dreading by Selma's citizens; last, "the followers," who simply came along for the fun and games - as, under other circumstances, they might join a lynch-mob. The latter two groups have almost ruined what the first two groups tried to accomplish. "Oh, if we could just have a breather!" declares Sister Michael Ann.

Incidentally, the Good Samaritan Hospital treated the 100 "civil rights workers" injured in the fight with police on March 7, and most of those hurt since then. None of the civil-rights demonstrators paid the hospital anything.

What are the fresh demonstrations at Selma accomplishing - the new ones organized by the 100 bearded freaks, white and black, who linger mischievously in Selma? Why, provoking racial hostility, mostly. The demands made by these radicals are impossible to fulfill - and even when concessions are offered these extremists, the "civil rights" fanatics fail to turn

up for negotiations, or to cooperate in any way. They thrive upon disorder.

Certainly the continuing demonstrations have little to do with voter-registration. A leading Negro minister of Selma, the Reverend C.C. Hunter, says that registration is simple nowadays.

"It used to be hard," Mr. Hunter explains. "I took the literacy test four times before I passed it, but it has been very easy to pass for a long time now. All during January, the state kept registration open longer than they were required to. They are only supposed to allow people to register to vote twice a month, but they were open every day in January, and anybody could register. All they had to do was walk down and register and sign their name. Hundreds of Negroes could have registered every week, but only 26 went down and registered." This was before Martin Luther King's march to Montgomery ever began!

In the name of "civil rights," fanatics and fanatics are not entitled to destroy a community. "License they mean, when they cry liberty," to use Milton's phrase. Or, in the words of a celebrated Justice of the Supreme Court, "The Bill of Rights is not a suicide pact."

Pool Hours Now Lengthened

The swimming pools in community parks are now remaining open until 9 p.m. for the rest of the season. It was announced by Councilman Edward J. Poulos, Board Majority Leader.

Under the terms of a board resolution adopted last spring, the community pools are open 10 a.m. until 9 p. m.

Pools now in operation include those at Plainview-Old Bethpage, their fourth season, and Bethpage and Syosset - Woodbury - Locust Grove in their first season.

The community park pools are managed by the Parks Department under the direction of Acting Superintendent Gerard Trotta.

Another pool operated by the Department of Beaches under Superintendent Edward F. Brickell is

at Tappen Beach, Glenwood Landing. That pool is reserved for Roslyn and Glen Head schools from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. weekdays and to the public from 1 p.m. to 8 p.m. On weekends and holidays it is open to the public from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

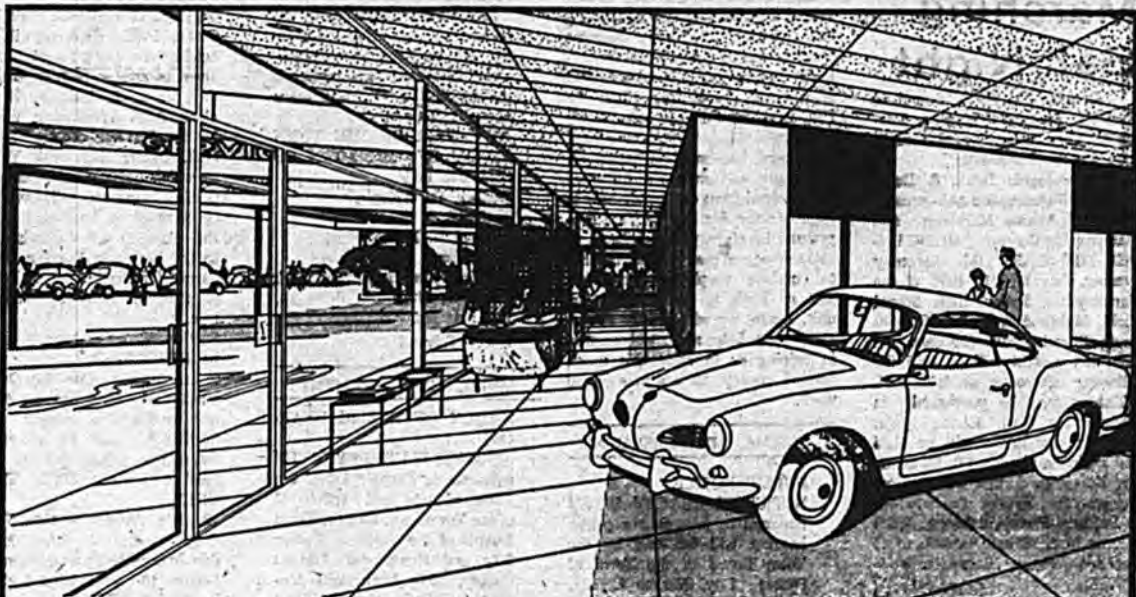
