## Rocky's Sales Tax Hit

At the August meeting of the Hicksville Regular Town Democratic Club, Stanley Harwood, Democratic candidate for assembly in the 16th district, stated his opposition to the sales tax. Mr. Harwood said that he opposed the tax because it was not needed and because it placed the burden on those least able to pay. Mr. Harwood said that the money needed to enable the state to continue operating could be raised in a fairer manner, he suggested raising the tax on race track winnings, thereby only taxing people away, and raising corporation taxes that have not been raised in 20 years. Mr. Harwood says he feels that the tax on corporations should be standardized with other tax increases on the people of New York State. All 3 Nassau

County Democratic Assemblymen voted against the Rocky sales tax. Hicksville's Assembly in the last session, Edwin J. Fethenbach, Republican candidate for Supervisor voted for the tax.

## Liceta Blvd. Resurfacing

A contract was awarded for the resurfacing of Lincoln Boulevard and adjacent areas in Berhpage. It was announced by Councilman Edward J. Poulos, board majority leader.

The contract was awarded to Liza & Sons Inc. of Oyster Bay at its competitively low bid price of \$41,888. About 18,000 linear feet of roadway are included in the project including Moore (Pershing) Dr., Balfour Drive, Roosevelt Drive, Columbia St., Irving St., Essex Place, Park Lane, North and South Lertina Streets, North and South Violet Streets, Byron St., Lowell St., Rose St., South Outdale St. and Whaley Street.

Councilman Louis A. Sista who advocated the project on the board said that engineers believe that the work can begin on or about October 1. The project was recommended by Highway Superintendent Norman T. Wolf to complete an improvement which began with a storm drainage project some time ago.

## 'War On Waste' At P.O.

"The Hicksville Post Office has joined the President's "War on Waste," Henry E. Platt, Postal Inspector in Charge of Post Office announced today.

"The reduction of waste in manpower and materials is one of the aims of this administration," President Lyndon B. Johnson said recently in outlining the Safety Policy for the Federal Service. There is a great opportunity to make a significant reduction in that most senseless kind of waste - the loss of human lives through accidents, and at the same time save many millions of dollars."

"We have pledged ourselves to meet the goal set for the Post Office Department by the Postmaster General; a 30 per cent reduction in the number of injuries and their cost by 1970," Inspector Platt continued, "The Mission Safety 70 program" as it is called, is designed to reduce Federal work injuries and costs. The goals are: the saving of approximately 200 lives, the prevention of approximately 45,000 disabling work injuries, and a saving to the Federal Government of nearly \$250 million."

"We are starting the new year with a complete reappraisal of our million in costs. Disabling injuries cost the Post Office Department nearly \$22 million last fiscal year."

"We are starting the new year with a complete reappraisal of our past efforts. We plan a continuous program of expanded accident prevention measures to accomplish our goal. Each and every one of our Hicksville employees is being called upon to do his or her part; first, by working safely, secondly, by identifying areas of possible accidents, and finally by submitting suggestions to correct such dangerous conditions or practices. With the continuous and combined efforts of all of our employees," he concluded, "we will do our part in reducing this unnecessary waste of lives, time and money."

## THINKING IT OVER

The sign in the City subway says that it is both illegal and Un-American for employers to consider race, color or religion when interviewing applications for jobs. And the sign was put there by the elected officials of New York City. It could apply to any part of New York State.

But let's take a look at these same elected officials and the parties that nominated them. There are four major races in New York City for the top jobs and guess what these proponents of the ideal of non-discrimination did when they chose the tickets? Catholic, Jew, Irish and a balancing Protestant.

The fact is that on most of the tickets no other qualification was used except how many ethnic votes could be obtained with religion or nationality.

Then when this unholy crew gets elected it will go about trying to convince people that they should not consider race, color or religion in business. And at times these elected officials will have to push to crack down on real estate men and other business men who are

only practicing discrimination for the same reason the politicians are - The financial rewards.

It would be nice to say that the political discrimination policies of the big city stopped at the County line, but nothing would be further from the truth. Locally and in all parts of the County both the Republicans and Democrats have vied with one another to get a Jew or Catholic to represent this area or that where it was believed the group vote could be delivered. And if you examine the tickets throughout the County you can figure an ethnic or religious reason why practically all candidates are on the ballot.

It is pitiful and an utter shallowness that those organizations both religious and civic who have so long campaigned to end discrimination for their particular group should not raise their voices of dissent against the balanced ticket. But alas they are satisfied in the small fruits they have obtained in representation on the balanced ticket. "Forget the ideals about ending discrimination so long as it works in our favor."

## Gold Fights Dem Candidate

Irving Gold, of Levittown, who is running in the Sept. 14 Democratic primary for State Assembly in the new 10th Assembly District, wants to replace the "soak-the-poor" sales tax with an "ability-to-pay" tax program, according to his 10-point platform released over the weekend.

Text of Gold's platform follows:

1. Enactment of ability-to-pay tax program in place of the soak-the-poor sales tax. Let the commercial banks, insurance companies, real estate corporations pay their fair share of taxes.
2. Adequate bus and railroad transportation at reasonable rates.
3. Automatic 10 per cent escalation of state aid to schools for 1966 and 1967. A medical school and additional college facilities for Nassau County.
4. Tax relief for low-income older citizens through reduced property assessments. Adjustment of state

personal income tax exemptions for all in line with higher living costs.

5. Allowance of college tuitions and commutation fares as state personal income tax exemptions.

6. Raise hourly minimum wage to \$1.50. Extension of unemployment insurance benefit period.

7. Positive enforcement of laws to end discrimination against minority groups.

8. Rigid application of basic housing standards to abolish slum conditions.

9. Elimination of unnecessary political jobs. Remove obstacles for independents in election laws.

10. Local youth centers and cultural program with self-liquidating bond issues for facilities.

**Resurfacing For Hicks Streets**

The Town Board awarded a contract for the resurfacing of Franklin Street and adjacent areas in Hicksville, according to councilman Edward J. Poulos, Board Majority Leader.

The contract was awarded to Lizza & Sons, Inc. of Oyster Bay at its competitively low bid price of \$10,997. The surface to be installed will be blacktop.

Councilman A. Carl Grunewald who advocated the project on the town board said that the resurfacing will cover Franklin St., Prospect St., Grove St., Waters Ave., Herman Ave., Lottie Avenue from Bay Avenue to the railroad tracks; Waters Ave. to the tracks and Harrison Ave. from Herman Ave. to the tracks.

Plans are to start construction around October 1. The project was recommended by Highway Superintendent Norman T. Wolf.

Through no great desire to win a prize, but because of a desire to help anyone who attempts to correct the outrageous claims of "Litho" I am giving my reasons for switching.
