GOP Contenders Vie In 10th A.D. Primary

Julius Schwartz, candidate for the Republican nomination for Assemblyman in the new 10th Assembly District which embraces most of Levittown, Hicksville and portions of East Meadow and South Westbury, today noted that his opponent in the primary election next Tuesday, Sept. 14, is not a resident of the Assembly District. Schwartz, an attorney long active in Hicksville, was designated at open convention of Republican committeemen.

A resident of 164 Sixth St., Hicksville, Schwartz was a first lieutenant in the medical corps in World War II, has had his own law firm since 1949 in Hicksville. He has been Counsel to State Senator Henry M. Curran in Albany since 1963 and knows the workings of the State Legislature from first hand observation.

The holder of a 25-year service award from Kiwanis International, he is past president of Hicksville Kiwanis Club and a past Lt. Gov. of Kiwanis International.

He is past president of Hicksville Chamber of Commerce and the Hicksville High School Alumni Assoc. A Republican committeeman for five years, he is past president of the Ernest F. Francke Republican Club of Hicksville and is currently the GOP leader in Hicksville. He is also a member of the Manetto Lodge of Hicksville

and the Elks. Known to his friends as "Jay", Mr. and Mrs. Schwartz have a daughter, Sandra.

Schwartz pointed out today that his opponent in the Primary Contest, besides not being a resident of the Assembly District he seeks to represent in Albany, failed during his short tenure on the Board of Education to attend any meetings devoted to preparation of the \$12 million school district budget and boasted of his non-attendance.

"While in a position of trust and responsibility where his voice could be heard in regard to the preparation of the budget which determines the local school tax burden", Schwartz declared, "he failed to be present and exercise his trust to represent the taxpayers of the community. It is difficult to believe he would do more in Albany."

THINKING IT OVER

The art of talking and saying nothing has been with us for a long time. It reaches its zenith around election time each year. Strangely the art is so important that the candidates usually elect and overwhelmingly by the voters.

For this reason John Lindsay is the favorite in New York City and runner up is Abe Beame. They both have to take second honors to retiring Mayor Wagner who in addition to the art of saying nothing was able to use a delaying action for most problems.

In local politics the art of not saying anything is ardently practiced. Mike Peltio got elected Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay on a platform which didn't say anything about what he would do, just what was wrong with the incumbents. His new campaign seems to be slapping us around because that couldn't harm a fly either. He is "elected" the N. Y. State Sales tax which was endorsed by more people in his own party than in the Republican party

Now Ed Fehrenbacher running in the Republican slate for Mike Peltio's job as head of the Township, doesn't take a back seat to anyone in the art of saying nothing while talking. His campaign so far is as ineffective as anything yet constructed. We ran his picture water skiing (like the Kennedy's) a few weeks ago. We have his picture with a local beauty this week and in-between we get poses of him smiling and shaking hands with everyone.

The whole point is that the voters are the fools in these campaigns. They vote for people who kid them and then wonder why the guy isn't worth much when elected. If more voters would pin the candidates down to what they will do if elected, a clearer picture would emerge in November and the voters would know what they were choosing.

THE UNITED STATES SENATE has a new member who may make his mark there: Dr. Donald Russell, until a few days ago governor of South Carolina, once president of the University of South Carolina, a well-educated and highly intelligent conservative, closely associated with Mr. James Byrnes. So South Carolina has two conservative senators, one Democratic and one Republican.

Mr. Russell's resignation of the gubernatorial chair to enter the Senate, succeeding the late Olin Johnston, probably ensures the reelection of the redoubtable Senator Strom Thurmond, newly self-created a Republican, in 1968. For Mr. Russell was Mr. Thurmond's most probable opponent for his seat, until the death of Senator Johnston. South Carolina tends to reflect her distinguished senators repeatedly, so Mr. Russell probably can spend the rest of his life on Capitol Hill, if he chooses.

Olin Johnston was a liberal in almost all things except the color question. His successor will be a distinct contrast. Temperate, a precise dandy, a

social administrator, with wobbles of the demagogue in him. Senator Russell presumably will be a conservative reinforcement of the conservative bloc which will be chosen to play Olin Johnston's role of spokesman for the past office employees' lobby.

The time is approaching when President Johnson must court such able Southern senators as Donald Russell in foreign policy, and particularly in the debate over Vietnam policy; several Northern and Western liberals are increasingly estranged from Johnson, McNamara, and Frank. Senators Fulbright, Church, Mervin, Grenning, and others may become uncooperative in concerns other than for foreign policy.

If that occurs, the Johnson Administration will be increasingly dependent upon the Southerners, and upon such conservative and moderate Northerners as Senators Lausche and Dool. And President Johnson may trim some of his sails accordingly.

In the Senate, South Carolina remains as powerful as New York or California. The gentleman from Spartaburg, under present circum-

stances, may obtain greater influence than that possessed by such comparative veterans as Senators Javits and Kucinski, not to mention Senators Murphy and Robert Kennedy. Chief Justice Warren's passion for "one man, one vote" notwithstanding, this country still is not governed wholly by the attraction that led John Randolph called "King Numbers." For one thing, the New York and California senators might vanish from Washington at the end of their present terms; but a South Carolina will be in the capital a long, long time.

Even hostile Northern liberal observers of the Senate, over the past several decades, have acknowledged the ability and dignity, as well as the manners, of many Southern senators. Security of office, accompanied by political practice, makes an impressive legislator.

This gentlemanly club within "the best club in America," the Senate, Mr. Donald Russell now joins. Little affected by the slogans, feuds, and squabbles of the Roosevelt, Truman, Eisenhower and Kennedy eras, Senator Russell enjoys some opportunity to set the tone for the South to national politics, for the next decade or two.

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Abnormal Bleeding A Sign Of Cancer

(1) "I was told by my doctor that I have hypertension. I also had gravel in my kidney. My right kidney is smaller than the left and it rests on my hip. There is a bulge in the tube that leads from the bladder to the kidney. I wish you could explain my condition more fully," Mrs. J.M.

(A) This is a condition of the kidney resulting from an obstruction of the ureter. A block can occur from a stone, constriction or kink in the ureter. If it is present long enough, urine produced by that kidney will not enter the bladder and will cause an accumulation of urine in the kidney. This gives the disease its name - hydro (water) nephrosis (on the kidney).

In due time pressure will cause damage to the kidney. If the obstruction is discovered and removed,

ed, damage can be avoided.

(2) "Is cervical cancer the same as cancer of the uterus, or does it have any relation to the uterus at all? What are the symptoms of cervical cancer?" JCN

(A) Since the cervix is the neck of the uterus, cervical cancer could be properly called a uterine cancer. However, the term uterine cancer has been reserved for those that occur in the upper, larger part of the uterus. The two are separated and usually require different types of treatment.

The most important symptom of cervical cancer is abnormal vaginal bleeding. Unfortunately, when the cancer reaches this stage, it can be very advanced. The cervical smear test is specifically designed to help in the early diagnosis of cervical cancer; long before any symptoms develop.
